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## Hospital busy this year; board plans for the future

According to various departments within the hospital, Mitchell County Hospital District has been busier than usual. Administrator Robbie Dewberry said the last two years have seen a dramatic uptick in the number of patients being seen at the clinic, as well as the number of patients admitted.

It was an idea touched on by Dr. Dee Roach when he gave the med staff report. He said, despite a small decrease

in September, the number of patients seen at the clinic is already up by 1,500 over last year's numbers.

All the data collected reflects the increase. Total patient revenue at the hospital as of September 30th is \$25 million for 2018, up from \$23 million in 2017.

The business office staff is doing its part too. Collections have increased by \$3.4 million. Hospital pharmacist Lesli

Tomlin has notice quite an increase as well. She said the hospital has experienced a shortage in flu vaccines, due in part to more vaccines being administered this year. She said the hospital is due to receive its final shipment of the vaccines this week.

Tomlin told the board about a surprise inspection her department had in September. She said it all went well, and the

## Hunters Appreciation Dinner kicks off season in Mitchell Co.

Saturday, November 3rd is opening day of deer season, and 600 to 700 hunters are expected to converge on Mitchell County to take advantage of the good hunting grounds here. The white-tailed deer season in this area begins Saturday, November 3rd and continues

through January 6th, 2019, and the Chamber of Commerce's Hunters Appreciation Dinner will kick things off in style!

A special late deer season is available in this area, depending on the hunting lease and ranch rules. The late season allows hunters to shoot antlerless

or unbranched antlered deer.

While the focus is mainly on deer, quail season also opened October 27th. Quail hunters should be happy for the second year in a row. Reports are the quail crop is as good or better than last year. Quail season

## Voters turn out in record numbers for early voting

Early voting continued this week, and a big voter turnout continued as well in both the city and county elections.

Registered voters living inside the city limits of Colorado City have the opportunity to vote on funding the newly-established Economic Development Corporation. As of Tuesday afternoon at 4 p.m., 73 votes had been cast in the election, and 41 of the 27 mail ballots had been returned.

The city council called for the election to ask voters to approve using 1/8th of 1% of the sales tax rebates currently being sent to the city. Sales tax rebates have been increasing throughout 2018, and if the voters approve the measure, the State Comptroller Glenn Hegar would begin sending the amount directly to the EDC.

All early voting for the EDC takes place inside City Hall, located at 180 W. 3rd, in Colorado City.

According to Carla Kern, unopposed candidate for County Clerk, a total of 884 voters had cast ballots as of 5 p.m. Tuesday in the county election early voting ongoing in the lobby of the Mitchell County Courthouse, located at 349 Oak Street in Colorado City.

Early voting in both elections continues until 5 p.m. Friday, November 2nd.

On Election Day, Tuesday, November 6th, ballots for both elections will be available in all the polling locations. Those locations by precinct follow.

## PNP thinking big when it comes to helping homeless dogs

Pets Needing Parents (PNP) has been rescuing dogs for the last couple of years, but the group got a big shot in the arm recently that has founders Becky Seibold and Jill Lynch thinking even bigger.

Pets Needing Parents is a local dog rescue organization that partners with transport groups and other rescues to save the lives of stray dogs picked up in Mitchell County. The group pulls strays primarily from the Colorado City Animal Shelter

and has plans to expand that reach to Loraine and Westbrook soon.

The rescue group started over a year ago after one of the founding members visited a shelter in Big Spring she described as "incredible." In talking to one of the people who worked there, the woman found out that much of the facility's wonderful infrastructure was paid for with grants. The lady even offered to help with grant applications, so

PNP could get the funding they need.

The founder went back and began talking with five like-minded citizens and they formed PNP. The paperwork has been sent into the state for the organization to be granted non-profit status. It is the vision of the founders to have a facility where unwanted, hard to home, death row pets can be safe and homes can be found.

In a little over a year, well

## EDC town hall draws few citizens

A handful of citizens attended the town-hall portion of the city's Economic Development Corporation board meeting Monday evening. Most were interested in learning more about the EDC, and one volunteered his services to help.

Four members of the board were present, including Larry Chaney, Stephanie Perez, Jim Baum and Melinda Alexander. Those absent were Tim Boyd, Travis Lynch and Jim Bell Harris.

Board president Chaney spoke to those attending, describing the purpose of the EDC, which includes helping already-established businesses grow and better serve the

consumer population here. City Manager David Hoover said another such interest of the EDC would be to help a developer come in and provide housing TDCJ's correctional officers can afford.

"If the officers had a place to live, they might stay here, and both prisons would be open," Hoover said, alluding to the fact the Ware Unit was mothballed partially because the prison was always short-staffed.

Local citizen Hall Dickard said he's been trying to draw people to this area for a while, and he went on to volunteer his services to the EDC. He said he's heard Red Rock Trans-

## I-20 accident leaves one dead, one injured

On Wednesday, October 24<sup>th</sup>, a crash three miles west of Westbrook resulted in the death of an 18-wheeler driven according to a report from the Texas Department of Public Safety.

It was a rainy, wet morning last Wednesday when Roger Bradley, 62, of Oklahoma City, was traveling eastbound on Interstate 20 in a 2018 Dodge Ram pickup. John

David Woody, 60, of Breckenridge, was driving a 2000 Peterbilt truck towing a flat-bed trailer westbound.

The report says Bradley lost control on the wet roadway, slid through the median and crashed into Woody's truck. The crash caused the truck to go off the road to the north and roll over.

The DPS investigation showed Woody was not wear-

ing a seatbelt and was ejected from the truck. He was pronounced dead at the scene, and the body was taken to Kiker-Seale Funeral Home in Colorado City.

Bradley was transported to Mitchell County Hospital with stable but incapacitating injuries.

The crash is under investigation by DPS.

## Sales tax rebates still rising

Sales tax rebates continue to increase over last year's totals, as oilfield services and sales continue in this area. Counties and cities around the region benefit from workers buying food, fuel, products and services both directly related and unrelated to the oil industry.

In looking at the tax rebates chart, you can see rebates to Mitchell County are up over 89% from last year. October's allocation was \$21,249.19 above what was received during the same period in 2017. For the year, county officials have seen a 60% increase in what is being sent by State Comptroller Glenn Hegar's office.

October's allocation to the City of Colorado City was up by nearly 4%, or \$1,984.09 over what was received last year. So far, the city has re-

ceived \$103,534.30 more in 10 months than what was sent in 10 months in 2017.

Oil-centric cities like Midland and Odessa continue to see increases in rebate amounts. Midland's October payment went up from \$5.3 million in October 2017 to \$5.8 million this year. For the year, payments are at \$55.5 million, a big jump from the \$49 million recorded for the same time period last year.

Odessa's rebates look much the same. The Permian Basin city received \$5,975,870.12 in October, a 28.83% increase from the \$4,638,227.58 received October 2017. When comparing the first 10 months of 2018 to the first 10 months of 2017, the difference is even more noticeable. So far in 2018, sales tax rebates to the City of Odessa amount to \$57,167,597.20, a 43% in-

crease from what had been sent in the first 10 months of 2017.

Larger cities are certainly not the only entities profiting from higher oil prices. If sales tax is any indication, sales have ballooned in Stanton recently. Last year in October, the City of Stanton received \$20,648.58 as a rebate. This year, the sales tax rebate spiked by 365% to \$96,076.76 for the same time period.

Allocations are also up in Big Lake and Forsan, with Big Lake seeing a 19.31% increase and Forsan a 44.6% in October's rebates. Oilfield worker populations are booming in areas further west, bringing more sales but also a fair amount of problems, including a shortage of housing, long lines at stores and traffic.

Bigger cities, such as Abilene and Lubbock, have a more varied economy. Both are seeing steady growth and are not as easily affected by oilfield activities. Since the beginning of 2018, Abilene officials have seen allocations go up by about 12% and Lubbock sales have increased by about 4%.

Hegar announced on October 10<sup>th</sup>, the comptroller's office sent cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing district \$735.9 million in local sales tax allocations, 11.4% more than in October 2017. The allocations were based on sales made in August by businesses that report tax monthly.

### Drew Luther Ballard 1933-2018

LUBBOCK - Drew Luther Ballard, 85, passed away on October 25<sup>th</sup>, 2018.

Drew was born in Noble, LA on June 2<sup>nd</sup>, 1933 and moved to West Texas shortly thereafter with his mother and father, Coily and Luther Ballard. They were tenant farmers for Clyde Feaster and Joe Earnest in Mitchell County.



Drew graduated from Colorado High School in 1950 and then attended college in Baytown before enlisting in the U.S. Army in 1953. He was stationed in Ft. Sill, Oklahoma before being shipped to Germany as a unit in the 264th Field Artillery Division in Bad Crezzach, Germany. He was a Morse Code Radio Operator during his two years stationed there.

Drew married Shirley Laverne Simpson of Colorado City in 1953. She joined him in Germany during his military service there. They had three children, Gary of Austin, Margie of Lubbock, and John of Arlington. Shirley passed away in March of 2002. After his Army discharge, Drew worked at KVMC, the radio station for Colorado City. In 1956, Drew started the infamous "Draggin with Drew" radio show drawing more than 125 cards and letters a day from all over West Texas.

Drew later moved to Georgetown, where he managed the radio station. In 1962, Drew purchased his first radio station in Colorado City from Eldon Mahon. He later purchased radio stations in Lubbock, Lampasas, Boerne, Round Rock, and Big Spring plus two other stations in Oklahoma. He sold all his radio stations by 2003.

Drew later married Camilla Bascham of Colorado City, and they traveled extensively in the Western United States, Canada, Yukon, and Alaska.

Drew was preceded in death by grandson, Dr. Corbin Shawn.

He is survived by wife, Camilla; daughter, Margie Shawn (Stan) of Lubbock; sons, Gary Ballard (Brenda) of Austin and John Ballard of Arlington; and grandchildren, Dr. Megan Schuler (Joshua), Coily Ballard and Zane Ballard as well as several great-grandchildren. He is also survived by loving blended family April Ferguson (Dale) and their family, Shelby, Jarrett, Chelsea and Neiman.

## “MCHD’s future looks bright” according to Dewberry

Mitchell County Hospital District CEO Robbie Dewberry was the guest speaker at the Colorado City Lions Club meeting last Friday. He talked about what’s been going on at the hospital and also about plans for the future.

Dewberry told Lions the local hospital has been very busy throughout the summer and fall this year. It’s been a record-breaking two years for the district, and there was no slow-down experienced during the summer like usual.

The hospital has had an average of 10 to 15 patients in-house per day, and providers at Family Medical Associates are seeing between 80 and 100 patients per day.

“We’ve got some great providers, and they’re working hard,” Dewberry told Lions.

A new addition to the hospital district is telemedicine, and MCHD is also beginning to offer telepsychiatry as well. The clinic staff has two slots on Thursdays where psychiatric patients can come and have a consultation with a provider located elsewhere. They talk to them and can see the physicians through a monitor.

Dewberry said the slots have been filled the past couple of weeks, and patients using the service are talking to doctors out of Houston. The tele-psychiatrists are out of Dallas.

“It’s really worked out well,” the CEO said, adding that the telemedicine service sometimes saves patients from having to be transported by ambulance from Mitchell County Nursing & Rehabilitation Center to the hospital.

Dewberry said the Special-

ty Clinic is in full operation, and he’s trying to recruit a dermatologist to add to the lineup. The hospital board has asked the administrator to find a dentist to add to the clinic, since Colorado City is without a dentist now.

“I’m very excited about the future,” Dewberry said. He then began talking about the possibility of some new construction on the MCHD campus.

Dewberry said he has contacted an architect to create drawings of what a new long-term care facility and assisted living center would look like and give estimates as to the cost of construction. Along with new construction, Dewberry is including plans to renovate the emergency department, physical therapy and add in a place to house an MRI machine.

With privacy laws in the forefront of his mind, Dewberry said, “We have the poorest laid out emergency department I’ve ever seen.” He said the nurses can’t even see all the emergency rooms from the nurses’ station.

If the price is right, Dewberry would also like to renovate the physical therapy department, adding in an aquatic feature that will provide two or three lanes for swimming, along with a wave pool for water aerobics.

Dewberry said he’s getting estimates for the construction, and if the board thinks the plans are affordable, he would like to see a 65-bed nursing home attached to the hospital’s main building, 10 of which would be used for memory-care patients. He

knows there is a need for an assisted-living facility which would be detached.

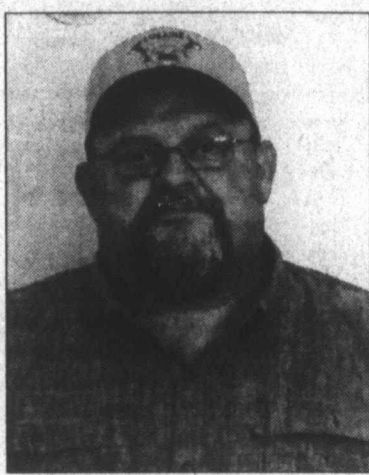
The administrator said he expects total costs to come in somewhere between \$13 million and \$16 million. He said it may be possible to get a bond passed with payments the same as the bond expiring in 2020. If the construction does take place, he estimated it could be finished as soon as the summer of 2020.

Ultimately, it will be a decision made by the board, and Dewberry said there would be plenty of town hall meetings for citizens to attend if that route is chosen.

Dewberry has been the administrator at MCH for eight years, and he told Lions he plans to stay until he retires. He’s proud of the hospital’s staff and said many complimentary things, such as, “I would put our physical thera-

py department against any in the state.”

While new construction is exciting, Dewberry said he remembers a promise he made to the board when he began working here. Those board members made him promise to never let the hospital’s finances get as bad as they were at the time, so Dewberry said he would only consider construction if the district can afford it.

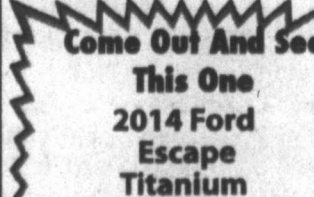

over 100 dogs were adopted through PNP. Many find homes through the internet and are transported to other states all over the country. Donations also trickle in from the internet, and one particular donor had been making small donations to the charity over time.

Fast-forward to the late summer of 2018 when rains drenched Mitchell County. Lynch posted photos of a flooded rescue facility due to a severely leaking roof. That's when things began to go in a different direction.

The donor sent a message to PNP, saying she would like to help the rescue pay for a new place if Lynch and Seibold could find one. Because Seibold and Lynch have poured their blood, sweat and tears into the cause, they weren't sure the offer was serious, but the donor flew to Texas four days later.

The former cattle auction facility on Westpoint Avenue in Colorado City seemed a perfect fit, after all, it was made for animals. There's plenty of room: but plenty of work to be done also. Seibold and Lynch made clear to the donor they would accept the offer from the donor only if it came with no strings attached.

"The donor believed in our vision," Lynch said last week, "and we made a cash offer on the property."

That's when the vision expanded and where the real work begins.

Seibold said the location in Colorado City will be a central location for other rescues around the area to bring their dogs for transport. She's also busy lining up air transports for the future. In case you didn't know, people actually fly places in private planes to transport rescue dogs to their new homes.

The pair have big plans for the new location. They have been talking with other rescue groups about what works and what does not. Lynch and Seibold hope to make the 22-acre property an attraction for pet lovers all around.

They are working on plans to upgrade the facility enough to hold AKC Agility Trials there eventually. They hope to start a companion dog training program and have a location where law enforcement can come to train drug dogs, search and rescue dogs and victim advocacy dogs. The creation of a dog park is also part of the plan.

"We want this place to be nice," Lynch said, adding that boarding and grooming services will also be offered eventually. She said she hopes PNP can employ up to seven part-time employees when it's

all up and running.

While the vision is a good start, there's many hours of work to be completed first. Lynch estimated there's about \$119,000 in repairs that need to be made, and it takes about \$200 per dog for proper vetting, not counting feeding and housing.

PNP supporters and volunteers will be holding fundraisers, and applications for grants will be submitted. Donations are also still a huge part of the success of PNP.

There are two things PNP needs most to make the vision a reality: volunteers and donations. The need for money is obvious, but volunteers can be even harder to come by.

Lynch said the need for people to help clean out pens does exist, but PNP is also looking for people who will come out and help socialize the canines. Many times, rescued dogs haven't had the best experiences with humans and don't trust anyone.

"We just need people who will come out and sit and hold and talk to the dogs," Lynch said.

And, no need to worry, PNP doesn't accept aggressive dogs. They also don't take owner-surrendered dogs, because they believe people need to take responsibility for their pets.

pharmacy department had no deficiencies.

"We try to stay continuously ready," Tomlin said.

She made the board aware of something that is changing in the field of drugs. The pharmacist said Medicare is implementing changes to limit prescriptions for opioid pain medication, as of January 1, 2019.

She said no one is certain of what the ramifications of the limits will be as of yet, but she warned it could affect some patients that use the hospital here. Tomlin did say there would be exemptions to the limit for certain conditions, such as hospice patients, long-term care patients, cancer patients and those being treated for chronic pain management.

Dr. Roach said another trend is coming to light. He said board members could expect to hear the buzz words "antibiotic stewardship" a lot in coming months. Dr. Roach said all medical providers have been guilty of prescribing an-

tibiotics for non-bacterial infections.

Roach said physicians often feel pressure from parents of sick children to prescribe antibiotics, regardless of the cause of the infection. He said new guidelines encourage doctors not to over-prescribe antibiotics, as it can lead to antibiotic-resistant infections.

During his report to the board, Dewberry showed a quick slideshow of drawings of possible future renovations and construction broken down into phases.

No decisions have been made yet. However, Dewberry and the board are considering renovating the physical therapy and emergency departments, as well as the construction of a new nursing home, assisted living facility and EMS station on land already owned at the campus.

If decisions are made to go ahead with the plans, the first step will be to move the physical therapy department to the front of the hospital, right next

to the patient rooms wing, increasing the department's square footage from about 4,000 to between 6,000 and 10,000 square feet. The move would provide the space needed to renovate the ER for better privacy and a better view of the rooms from the nurses' station.

Phase II of the plans would include the construction of

a new 65-bed nursing home, with 10 beds designated for memory care. An assisted-living facility is also being considered. The separate building would house 16 units, with enough space for two people per unit.

portation Inc., the crude oil transportation company, is locating a yard here and hiring up to 50 drivers.

Those attending learned of several incentives the EDC can use to draw businesses to town, including the forgiveness of ad valorem taxes, discounted property and more.

"In 39 years, or since I moved here in 1980, this is the first initiative by the city of this kind," Mayor Jim Baum said.

As the town hall meeting ended, the business of the board began. Minutes from previous minutes were approved.

The board also designated certain signatories for the bank account to be set up at City National Bank. Chaney, Boyd, Hoover and Rayanna McGaha will be added to the signatory card.

A discussion was held regarding a business incubator and acquiring property to create one. Chaney said a business incubator is typically held in a large space that can be divided into sections. Start-up businesses can come in and pay a discounted rate, or any rate set by the EDC, giving owners a chance to establish the business before finding and paying for a spot of their own.

"Every business needs something different," McGaha explained.

The EDC is in the process

of putting in an option bid on the old Berman building, which was most recently occupied by Tommy Wright. A \$25,000 bid will be offered on the property if it hasn't sold before the first of the year.

And what if the property sells before then? Well, that's just a great thing for Colorado City, was the consensus of the board.

In other business, Chaney took the opportunity to meet with the Mitchell County Board of Economic Development to make contact about the two entities working together in the future. While there's nothing on the horizon right now, Chaney said BOED members expressed an interest in working with the EDC in the future.

"I think there's some things we can do together," Chaney said.

A meeting planned for December 31st was moved to February 25th.

The only other topic was the ongoing election to fund the EDC. Early voting continues at city hall to designate funds to be sent from the state comptroller to the EDC. Those funds are sales tax rebates already being sent to the city in the amount of 1/8th of 1%.

Those voting on Election Day Tuesday, November 6th, can vote in the city election at the same time they vote in the county election.

All proceeds go toward paying for the note used to reroof the Railhead Building, where many community events are held each year.

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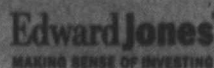

## Bell-tolling on Nov. 11th will honor WWI deaths

Nationwide Bell-Tolling on November 11, 2018 at 11:00 a.m. will honor the 116,516 American men and women who died in WWI.

WASHINGTON DC: The World War One Centennial Commission, along with the Pritzker Military Museum & Library, the Society of the Honor Guard of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, the American Legion, and the Veterans of Foreign Wars, announced BELLS OF PEACE: A WORLD WAR ONE REMEMBRANCE.

BELLS OF PEACE is a collaborative program, whereby American citizens and organizations, across the entire country, are invited to toll bells in their communities 21 times on Sunday, November 11, 2018 at 11:00 a.m. local time.

Conceived and designed in collaboration with the nation's veterans of service with the Honor Guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, the bell tolling provides a solemn reminder of the sacrifice and service of veterans of World War I, and all veterans.

Bells will be tolled in communities across the nation, in places of worship, schools, town halls, public carillons, and cemeteries, to mark the centennial of the Armistice that brought an end to hostilities, in what Americans fervently hoped had been "The War to End All Wars."

This nationwide program is designed to honor those American men and women who served one hundred years ago, during World War One. The war ended by an armistice agreement between the warring countries at 11 a.m. on November 11th, 1918.

The World War I Centennial Commission has created a page on its website: [ww1cc.org/bells](http://ww1cc.org/bells) where people can find information and tools to conduct the bell tolling, and to meaningfully commemorate the service of their local World War One veterans.

World War One took place between July 1914 and November 1918 and was one of the deadliest conflicts in world history. Over nine million combatants and seven million

civilians died as a result of the war. The United States officially entered the war on April 6th, 1917. Some 4.7 million Americans stepped forward to serve in uniform during the war, 2 million of them were deployed overseas to fight, and 116,516 of them never made it home.

The U.S. World War One Centennial Commission was established by Congress in 2013 to provide education programs, public outreach, and commemorative events regarding the American involvement in the war. The Centennial Commission was also authorized by Congress to create a new national-level memorial in the nation's capital, to honor the men and women who served. Information on the new National World War One Memorial can be found at [www.ww1cc.org/memorial](http://www.ww1cc.org/memorial).

The American Legion was founded by three World War One veterans in 1919, as a veteran support organization made up of former and current U.S. military members. Throughout its history, The Legion has been committed to mentoring youth and sponsorship of wholesome programs in America's communities, advocating patriotism and honor, promoting strong national security, and support for service members and veterans.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars was founded in 1899 to support all honorably-discharged service members, from any military branch, who served the U.S. in wars, campaigns, expeditions, on foreign soil, or hostile waters. The VFW grew rapidly after World War One, with hundreds of thousands eligible veterans returning from the war. Today, it stands with the American Legion as the two largest veteran service organizations in the world.

While it is a Congressional Commission, the U.S. World War One Centennial Commission operates largely through private donation. The founding sponsor for the Centennial Commission was the Pritzker Military Museum and Library, in Chicago.

The leading sponsor for the Centennial Commission is the Starr Foundation, based in Washington DC. Other major supporters include the Diana Davis Spencer Foundation, the Bloomberg Foundation, and the General Motors Foundation.

# Abernathy spoils Wolves' bid for perfection

The ghouls and goblins arrived a few days early for the Colorado High School football team. And there weren't many treats involved.

Abernathy rode four first half touchdowns to a stunning 40-0 victory on Friday night in front of a large crowd at Antelope Stadium. The game showcased the top two teams in the District 2-3A standings.

With the victory, Abernathy improved to 7-1 for the season and, more importantly, took the inside track to claiming the district crown with a perfect 3-0 record. Colorado City, which had entered the game having won 18 of their previous 20 games, suffered

its first setback of the 2018 season and fell to 7-1.

The loss also dropped Colorado City into second in the district standings at 2-1.

Abernathy took a page from the Wolves' playbook early, using a powerful rushing attack to gain the upper hand. Abernathy rushed for 274 yards and five scores in the contest.

Bryson Daily sparked the Antelope offense early on. He led Abernathy on a 10-play, 73-yard march on their first possession of the contest. Daily finished off the drive by breaking free for a 13-yard touchdown romp. His ensuing extra-point kick staked the Antelopes to a 7-0 lead with

more than half of the first quarter left.

Abernathy added to its lead later in the first, scoring on a 61-yard run from running back Kole Carlisle.

Carlisle staked the Antelopes to a 14-0 lead heading into the second quarter.

Life didn't get any easier for the Wolves from there. Abernathy tacked on touchdowns on a run of four yards by Adrian Macias and a 16-yard pass play from Daily to Ryan Sandoval in the second and rolled into the half with a 28-0 lead.

Carlisle and Macias, who combined for 191 of the Antelopes' rushing yards, both added scoring runs in the

second half to close out the scoring.

Offensively, Colorado City struggled to get its offense rolling. The Wolves managed a season-low 152 total yards, including a stunning 82 via the ground.

Markis Monroe and Akimas Clarrett paced the C-City rushing attack against the Antelopes. Monroe amassed 40 yards on 10 carries, while also completing seven of his 13 passes for 70 yards. Clarrett rushed for 33 yards on 10 tries.

Colorado City will try and get back on track this Friday when they host rival Coahoma. The game will begin at 7:30 p.m. at Wolf Stadium.

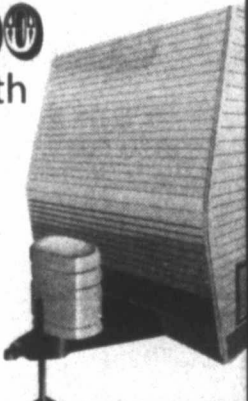
