Band Invited To Fair Parade

LUBBOCK — Six dozen area high school bands are being invited to participate in the "Parade of Bands" which officially launches the 48th annual Panhandle - South Plains Fair here at 10 a.m. Sept. 27.

Russell L. Wiley, widely-known director of bands at the University of Kansas at Lawrence for 31 years, has been named judge of the 1965 event. He is a brother of Dr. D. O. Wiley, Lubbock, who retired in 1959 after 25 years as director of bands at Texas Tech.

The list includes 67 aggregations from South Plains high schools and five from New Mexico, many of which will be competing for \$1,125 in prize money.

Wiley has judged numerous band contests and festivals throughout the nation, but most of his judging has been conducted in the Midwest and Southwest areas.

He attended Hardin-Simons University and later obtained his degree at Phillips University, Enid, Okla. Upon graduation from Phillips, Wiley remained there as band director for four years. In 1932 he established the Tri-State Music Festival at Enid and the event has since become one of the largest festivals in the world.

Born in Comanche County, he was the youngest in a family of six boys and three girls.

Officials decided this year to pare the field of judges from three to one in order to speed up the judging process. Wiley unanimously was selected to evaluate the 1965 event.

In addition, cash awards for the first three places in classes B, A, AA, AAA and AAAA will be presenter instead of the usual \$100 and \$50 will be pre-given. This year, checks for \$100, \$75 and \$50 will be presented and each participating band will receive an engraved trophy.

Garbage Pick-Up Schedule Given

Several inquiries have come into the City Hall regarding city policies on garbage pickup. It is hoped that the below explanation of some of these policies will be beneficial to all persons concerned.

The Sanitation Department cannot pick up trash which is still burning or hot, nor will they pick up trash in barrels which have rusted or burnt out bottoms. Trash barrels of this type are picked up one time, then turned over to make a person aware that he is in need of a new barrel. Trash barrels that are unnecessarily heavy due to having concrete or the like in them will not be picked up. Brush, concrete, dirt or the like should be placed next to the trash barrel to be picked up at a later date.

The following is a weekly route of the Sanitation Department:

MONDAY: Avenue C, D, E running from 1st Street to 16th Street. Avenue F, G, H running from 8th Street to 16th Street. Avenue J, K, L, M, N from 12th Street to 16th Street.

TUESDAY: All of Virgil Phillips Addition and Avenue F, G, H, J, K, L, M, N from 1st Street to 6th Street.

WEDNESDAY: All of Myatt and Vineyard Additions and everything East of Highway 87.

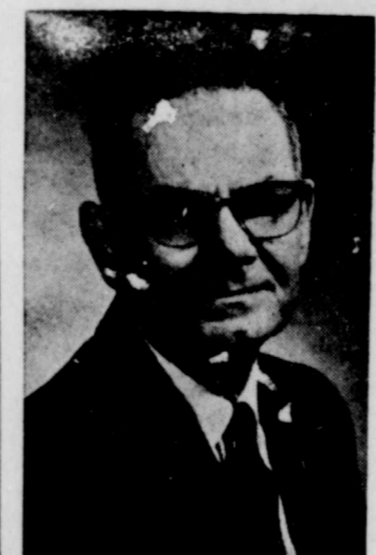
The downtown business district is picked up Monday, Thursdays, and Saturday mornings.

The Abernathy Antelopes handed Head Coach Don Williams a well-played victory over Frenship in his first outing with the team at Antelope Stadium last Friday night. The 40-0 shellacking was a welcome sight to Abernathy fans after consecutive seasons of 0-10 and 3-7.

Senior quarterback Lane Wade was the spark plug for the Lopes in the first half as he ran the ball over for 26 of the 28-0 halftime score. Wade's TD's came on runs of 5, 30, 10, and 11 yards. In the second half Junior Farrell Johnson took over at signal-caller to engineer two more 6-pointers for the Lopes.

Abernathy's first score came after some heads-up defensive play by defensive end Rondall Preston. Preston raced in to block a Frenship punt at the 14-yard line and three plays later Wade was over for the score from five yards out. Mike Tannehill set up to boot the extra point, but a bad pass from center forced him to run. The bobble paid off, however, as Tannehill twisted in for two more points.

The Lopes kicked off and held the Tigers on their own 35-yard line. Frenship punted and Pat Hale grabbed it at the 25 and raced 75 yards to paydirt. All was in vain, however, as the ball was moved back to the Frenship 42 on a clipping offense.

In the second quarter, Wade took the ball in from the 30 in the opening seconds for his second score of the night. The point try by Tannehill failed.

The Lopes regained possession of the ball at their own 10-yard line and Wade ran and passed the Lopes to their longest drive of the night. The TD came on a 10-yard jaunt around right end by Wade, with 3:31 left in the half. The kick for extra point by Tannehill fell wide.

The Lopes kicked off for the fourth time of the night and defensive back Roland Murray immediately picked off a Brent Odonnell pass and returned it to the Tiger 20. Wade took over and slipped the ball in from the 11-yard line, with seconds remaining in the half. Wade also carried the ball for extra points.

Darrell Johnson took over in the third quarter to lead the Lopes to their 5th TD. In his first varsity contest, Johnson pitched a perfect spiral to Preston for 25 yards and a TD. Johnson was stopped on the run for extra points.

The last score of the contest came in the fourth quarter on a 2-yard drive by Sophomore fullback Dale Allenberg. The try for extra point failed.

Abernathy's defensive squad made a strong showing for the first game of the season as it never let the Tigers penetrate past the 50-yard line. Preston and Murray stood out as they both made defensive plays that set up an Abernathy touchdown.

Petersburg Next The Antelopes will travel to Petersburg Friday, September 10, to meet the strong Buffaloes. Although the Buffaloes have lost some good ballplayers from last year, they will be tough competition. Travel to Petersburg and yell for the Lopes. The game begins at 8:00 p.m.

Efficiency Plan Stated

Postmaster Herman Lambert announced today that all Abernathy Post Office employees will be asked to take part in the new Postal Efficiency Plan announced by Postmaster General John A. Gronouski.

"The Postal Efficiency Plan includes comprehensive programs for improving postal service and reducing costs", Lambert said.

"It is our way of helping President Johnson fulfill his pledge to provide more effective and economical government services."

In Washington, Postmaster General John A. Gronouski termed the plan's twin objectives of economy and service betterment "a matter of highest priority" and called for total involvement of all employees through the Post Office suggestion program.

Semi-annual reports will be made to the President, Mr. Gronouski said, and realized savings will be reverted to the Treasury or applied to improving postal service.

A local committee will be organized to fulfill the two purposes of the plan:

1. Reduce costs
2. Improve services

Ideas generated by individual employees will be taken up by the committee. Accepted ideas will be passed on to Washington for possible application on a national level. Employees whose ideas are adopted nationwide will be given national awards. The Postmaster General will personally oversee the program.

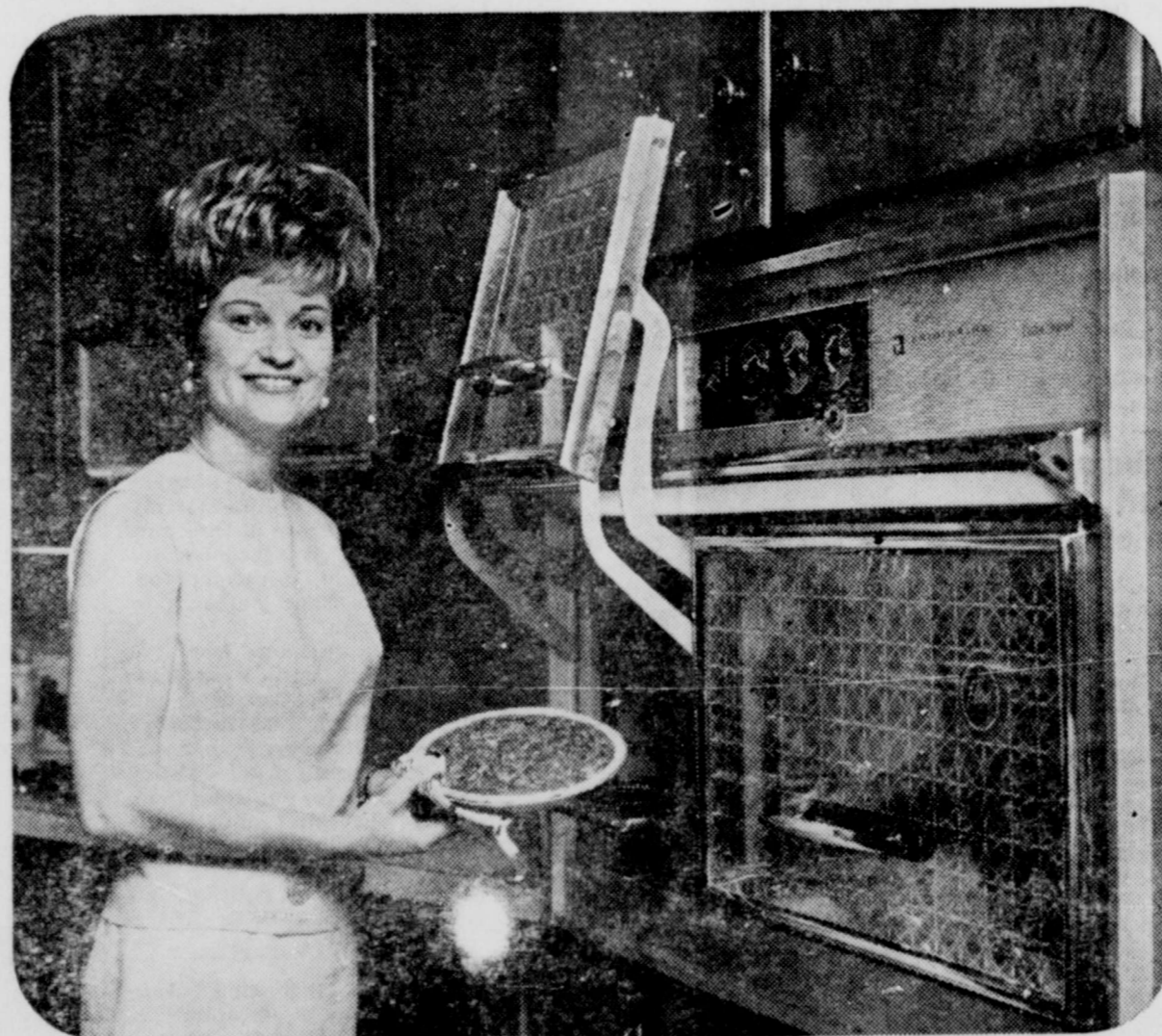

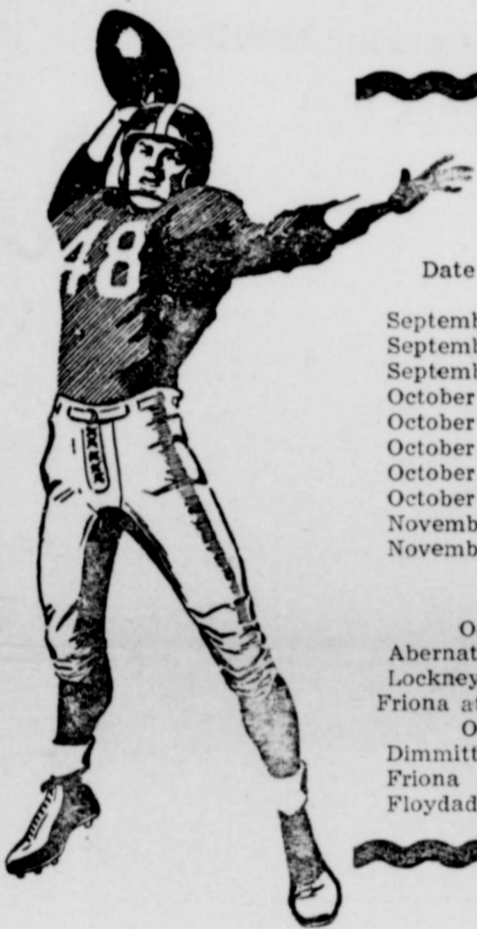

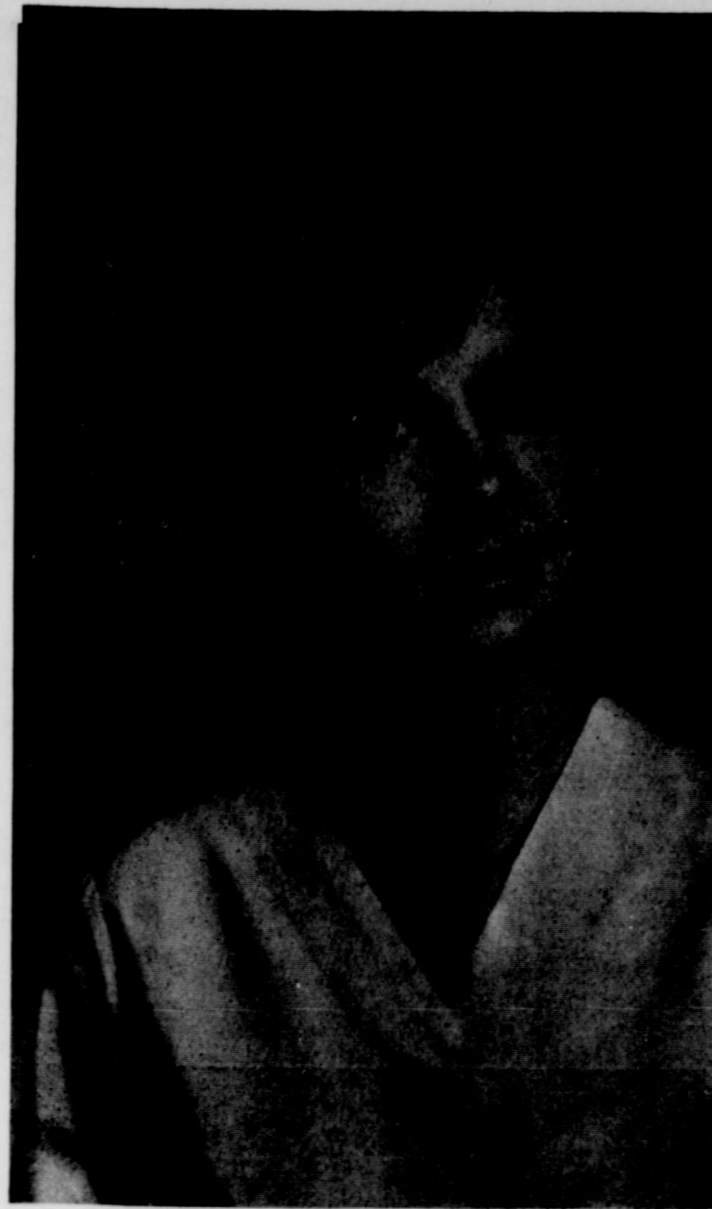
SOCIAL SECURITY INFORMATION GIVEN

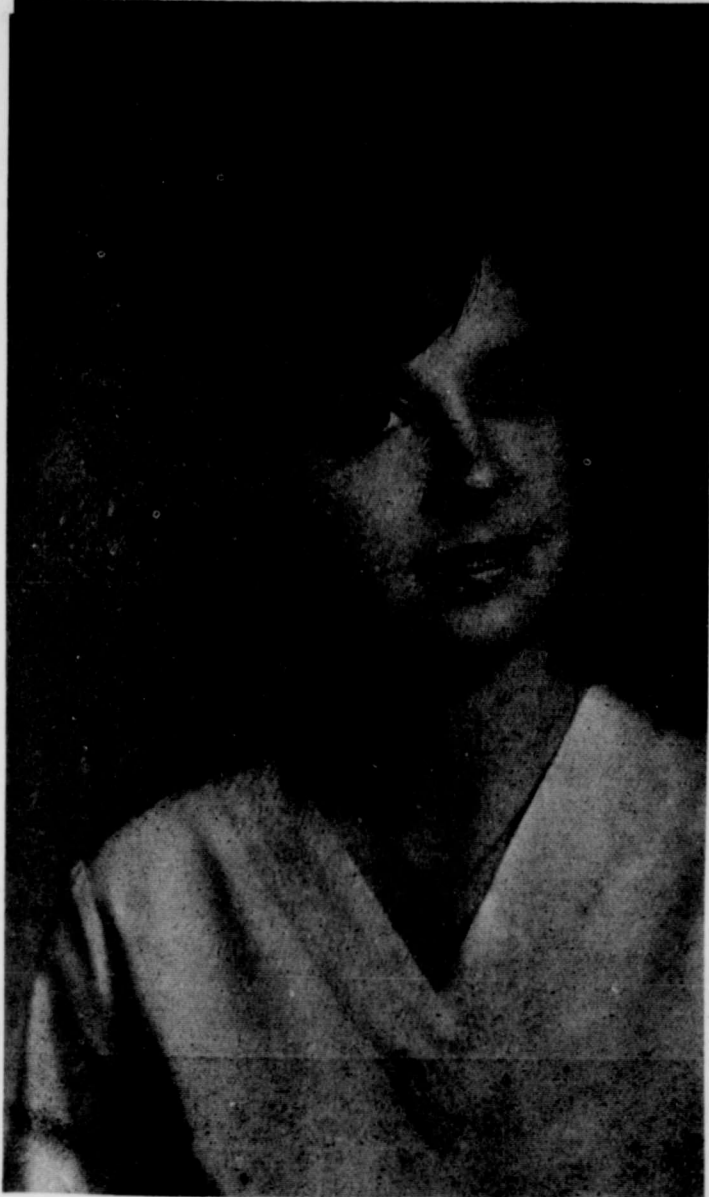
SOCIAL SECURITY INFORMATION GIVEN

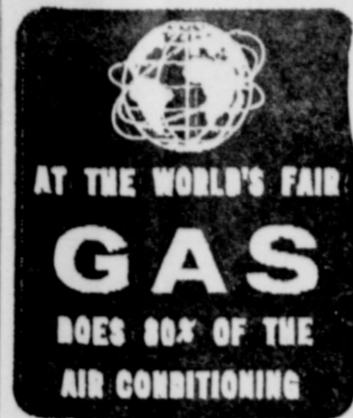

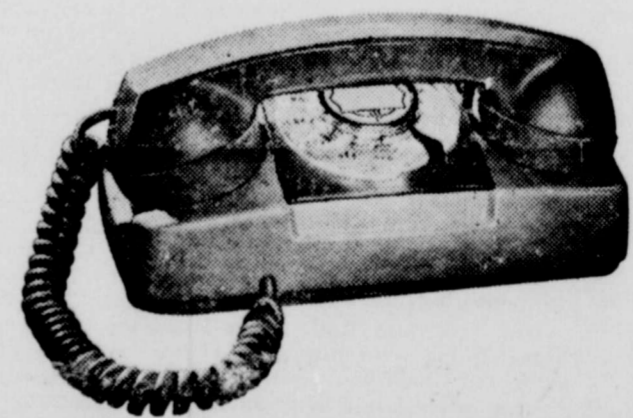

Farmers Vote On ASCS Committee

Public Notice of the Hale County A. S. C. S. Committee election for members to serve in 1966 is hereby given by E. J. Pope, Jr., present A. S. C. S. County Committee Chairman.

Committeemen will be elected for the 12 A. S. C. S. Communities in Hale County. Ballots have been mailed to eligible voters in Hale County. Ballots must be marked and returned to the A. S. C. S. office in Plainview by not later than Sept. 8, 1965.

Nominations for a place on the ballot for each Community may be made by petitions signed by not less than eight eligible voters who reside in the community, and will be made for membership on the committee without designation of a specific position. Such slate of nominees must be received in the A. S. C. S. Office, Box 1271, Plainview, Texas, not later than August 18, 1965. Additional nominations required to bring the slate of nominees up to eight will be made by present A. S. C. S. Community Committeemen. The name of each person nominated in accordance with the above procedure will be placed on the ballot, if found eligible and willing to serve.

Any person who is nominated by petition and found to be ineligible to serve will be notified of such determination prior to completion of the slate of nominees and will have the right of appeal to the County Committee prior to the completion of the slate of nominees.

An eligible voter is any person who is of legal voting age and who has an interest in a farm as owner, tenant, or shareholder and any person not of legal voting age who is in charge of the supervision and

conduct of the farming operations on an entire farm shall be eligible to vote for committee-men and delegates in the community in which he has such an interest if he meets any of the following requirements:

A. A payment or a grant of conservation materials or services is or will be made with respect to the farm under the current agricultural conservation program or there is being carried out on the farm one or more of the current program practices approved for the State by the State Committee.

B. A marketing quota or acreage allotment is currently established for the farm.

C. Is eligible for a cooperator's loan or other price support.

D. Is eligible for a Sugar Act Program payment.

E. Is eligible for a National Wool Act Program Payment.

F. Is eligible for a Soil Bank Act Payment.

G. Is eligible to participate in any other program administered by the county committee.

Any person whose name appears on a farm deed as an owner shall be considered as having an interest in that farm as owner and is eligible to vote if otherwise qualified. Interpretation of voting eligibility. An eligible voter may be an individual, partnership, association, corporation, estate, trust, other business enterprise or legal entity, or wherever applicable a state, a political subdivision of a State, or any agency thereof. In case of joint ownership by two or more individuals, each is an eligible voter.

In any State having a community property law, the spouse of a person who is eligible to vote is also eligible to vote.

Eligible voters are encouraged to make nominations by petitions, Mr. Pope said.
