TALCO TROJANS LOSE IN TITLE GAME WITH JEFFERSON FRIDAY

A costly fumble on the opening play, an even more expensive clipping penalty in the second quarter and a serious injury in the third proved too much of a handicap for the Talco Trojans Friday night in their crucial battle with Jefferson for the District 17-A title. Jefferson won 12-6 and will represent the district in the playoff this week, meeting a strong Rains team, the champs of District 18-A.

The Trojans received the kickoff with quarterback Ronnie Nelson carrying from the 16 yard line out to the 30. On their play from scrimmage Talco fumbled and the Bulldogs gained possession on the Talco 35. Fullback Owen Fuller blasted thru the line for the Bulldog score. The Trojans stopped the extra point try to hold Jefferson to a 6-0 lead.

The expensive penalty (the Trojans only drew two in the entire game) stopped a Talco drive which had begun on the Bulldog five yard line following a 65 yard quick kick. Nelson fired a short pass to Russell and the sturdy youngster blasted through the Bulldog defenders and into the end zone only to see the apparent score rubbed out by the ill-fated clipping penalty. After failing to make the necessary yardage after the penalty the Bulldogs took over on the 30 yard line.

The final blow for Talco hopes of a win came on the tenth play of the third quarter with Russell smashing across his left end for four yards and the fourth consecutive first down in a drive that had begun back on the 16 where they received the kickoff. Russell was unable to get up from the play, having a badly hurt knee. His right leg had to be splinted before he could be removed from the field. The Trojans had lost their most potent line backer and were equally hurt on offense.

To the credit of the Trojans spirit, they didn't let their buddy's injury stop the drive. A Nelson to Bonds toss for 21 yards gave the Trojans a first down on the 15. Dixon with extra effort in the absence of Russell, blasted into the line four times to take the ball to the two yard line. Bonds hit the middle for the final two and tied the score at 6-6. The extra point try failed when a pichtout went astray.

Bulldog fullback Owen Fuller hauled in a short kickoff on the 21 and sped back to the 46. After reaching the Talco 17 in five carries, Fuller raced over his right tackle for the touchdown to put the Bulldogs out front again 12-6. Extra point try failed and the score held.

The Trojans made a gallant effort on the next kickoff, but were stopped on the 35. A final tough break in the form of a bad pass from center forced Bonds to try to run instead of punt and the Bulldogs took over on the 41 yard line. Jefferson held to time consuming ground plays to maintain possession and let the clock run out. Final score Jefferson 12-Talco 6.

Austin.—Capital city folks already are getting "Inaugural Fever."

"Inaugural plans for Governor-elect John B. Connally will be far more elaborate than any held in the past decade." So reports Frank Erwin, secretary of the State Democratic Executive Committee, who is in charge of arrangements.

Festivities will begin the evening of January 14 when 5,000 Democrats are expected to pay \$25 a plate for a Victory Dinner in Austin's Municipal Auditorium.

On the morning of the 15th, there will be an interfaith Prayer Breakfast in the Driskill Hotel.

At noon Governor-elect Connally and Lieutenant Governor-elect Preston Smith will be "sworn in" in a ceremony supervised by the State Senate and House of Representatives.

Inaugural parade, following the ceremony, is expected to be one of the largest ever held in Austin. High school bands from all over the state are accepting Connally's invitation to participate. Many out-of-town floats also will participate. Also taking part will be the U. S. Navy, with a salute to its former secretary, John Connally.

The Capitol and all state buildings on its grounds will be illuminated that evening. All Texans will be invited to greet their new chief executive and other elected officials and enjoy refreshments and entertainment in the Capitol.

This gala evening event is a brand new innovation.

TEXTBOOKS SELECTED — State Board of Education voted to accept the State Textbook Committee's recommendations for next texts in 13 public school courses, and approved its recommendation not to select new economics texts at this time.

In compiling a list of some 65 textbooks for selection by local boards, the 15-member committee studied 188 books submitted by 33 publishers, with the assistance of 517 professional advisors and 400 laymen.

Texas Education Agency experts in 10 fields then reviewed their selections and submitted

some 400 suggested corrections, which the publishers agreed to make.

Most of the corrections refer to typographical mistakes and minor factual errors.

State Library agreed to keep a copy of each recommended text so that they will be available to individuals who may want to protest acceptance by local school boards.

Board of Education also will send samples to local boards, according to enrollment: one set for 500 pupils; 16 sets for 10,001 to 50,000 pupils; etc.

Local boards must appoint their selection committees by December 15.

EIGHT DAYS AGAIN — Texas Railroad Commission has set an eight-day oil allowable for the 11th month in a row.

January was the last month that oil producers were allowed to operate prorated wells on a nine-day allowable.

Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners proposed fractional-day orders.

A spokesman for the Texas Landowners and Independent Producers Association said his group will ask the Legislature to change the market demand law so the Railroad Commission can set allowances on a basis of Texas' share of national oil reserves.

But Chairman William J. Murray Jr. stated that the commission believes it now has the authority needed "to set allowances as high as the market will take." He added that the commission would go to fractional days, or to a percentage, if such a step is needed.

Murray also said that a plan for tougher new test requirements in the East Texas field is being devised by the commission.

ENROLLMENT UP — Number of students attending local state-supported junior colleges increased 15.3 per cent over the past year to reach a total of 42,991 on October 15.

Thirty-six of the 37 colleges showed an increase in enrollment.

State Board of Education voted to appoint a commission to study criteria for the establishment of new junior college districts.

PRE-CHRISTMAS SURPRISE — A quarter of a million Texans have received a pre-Christmas surprise.

The aged, the blind and the disabled got a raise in their public assistance checks from state welfare agencies.

Increase amounted to \$9 per month for the 75,000 old folks on maximum relief. Minimum was not less than \$3. Top now is \$82 a month.

LAND INVENTORY — State school land and mineral ownership is being inventoried.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler reveals that close examination of over 153,000 separate files is half completed.

He reports that during 1874-1951, school lands were sold under dozens of different statutes.

Sadler estimates that "a mineral estate of 4,000,000 acres was reserved in these transactions."

This, with riverbeds, submerged lands, the University domain and the almost 900,000 acres held outright by the state, create the 22,000,000-acre total endowment for public education.

FREE BUS RIDE — State Board of Education has approved a proposal to make more students eligible for free bus transportation.

Under this change any student living two miles from school and two miles from a franchised public transportation route may become eligible for free transportation.

TAX ILLS CURED? — Texas' new sales tax may have cured the state's financial ills.

Similar views on this subject have been expressed by James W. McGrew, director for the Texas Research League, and Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas, chairman of the State and Local Tax Policy Committee.

The Parkhouse committee will recommend to the Legislature in January some changes, mainly corrective, in the 1961 sales tax act.

He predicted the committee will recommend more new tax exemptions than it will seek to abolish.

Parkhouse says the net result would be a small increase in revenue under the tax now raising \$17,000,000 a year.

Notes On New Babies

A new baby in the home calls for adjustment on everyone's part, for even the tiniest bundle of joy makes many demands on mother's time and energy. During baby's early weeks, he reacts to the atmosphere around him. If all is calm and serene, baby is apt to be that way too. If he senses apprehension and is disturbed by it, chances are he'll howl. Experienced mothers say that for this reason, first babies often cry more than subsequent children.

A new baby often requires adjustment on the part of older children in the family, too. Actually, it is normal for a young child to be jealous of a new baby in the home. A wise mother will find ways for the older child to help with baby care. By "helping," the child will be encouraged to show loving feelings toward the infant.

Child care specialists tell us that every child develops at his own rate of speed, and that comparisons with other children are not wise. So, in setting up your care and feeding schedules for the new baby, allow some room to be flexible so that both you and baby can adjust together.

Changing and diapering can be a pleasant time for both of you, since it affords an opportunity for some cuddling, exercise and play. An older child could help, too, by fetching a fresh diaper. Mother, of course, rubs baby's diaper area with Vaseline petroleum jelly. Gentle petroleum jelly, a baby care



"standby" for many years, forms a waterproof coating on the skin that prevents ammonia burn and protects against painful diaper rash, as well.

Finally, keep in mind that a new baby is a miracle of nature. When you are exhausted at a late feeding, discouraged by a row of bottles to be sterilized or running still another load of diapers through the washer, baby may seem like a lot of work. And he is. But the joy of helping that tiny infant grow and develop is truly one of life's most satisfying experiences.

Miss Mildred Cooper had been chosen vice-president of the Burleson House Council, a girls dormitory organization at Baylor University.

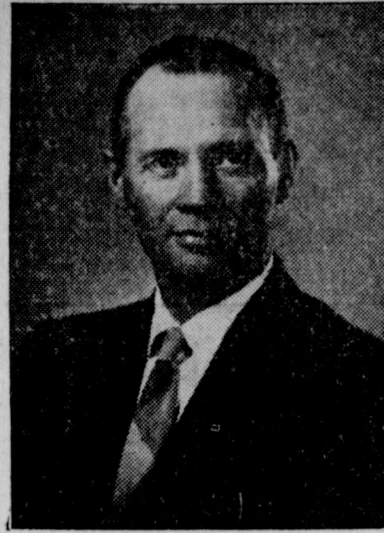
Merl Francis Dyer and S-Sgt. John Mac Shuman of Kelly field, had been married at the home of Rev. O. J. Thompson in San Antonio.

Alcorn Claims Communists Haven't Learned All About Human Nature

Editor's note: Achin Alcorn Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur discusses a weighty matter this week.

Dear Editor: When Mr. Khrushchev's man in Washington, I forget his name, well, I haven't forgotten it but I can't spell it, was telling Mr. Kennedy a while back that Russia had no missiles in Cuba, he knew at the time, as everybody knows now, that he was lying.

Now you might think this would be embarrassing to the Russians, but on the contrary they just laugh about it. Lying is one of the handy devices the Communists use whenever they get ready, and they've found it works plenty of times.

The Communists have found out that telling the truth is in such high standing in the free world that you can gain lots of territory by deliberately abusing it. India is the latest country that can tell you about this at the moment.

But here's a point I'm afraid the Communists have overlooked. They know quite a bit about human nature, but not everything. For example, if you can fool one

group of people with a deliberate lie, what's going to keep one Communist from lying to another Communist. What makes one Communist assume another Communist doesn't have some human nature too.

I'm no more a candidate for the job of expert on international affairs than I am for an award as an outstanding farmer, but I have a notion that the Russian and the Chinese Communists are now learning something about human nature, that if you can fool free countries by lying to them, you can also fool other Communist countries with the same tool. This may explain why Russia and China aren't too happy with each other. One has believed the other when he shouldn't have. They've forgotten that a liar on one front is pretty likely to be a liar on another.

When Khrushchev says Communism will dominate the world, he's talking about Russian Communism. When China says the same thing, they're talking about Chinese Communism.

When a nation establishes throat-cutting as a national policy, it never knows when its own throat will be next.

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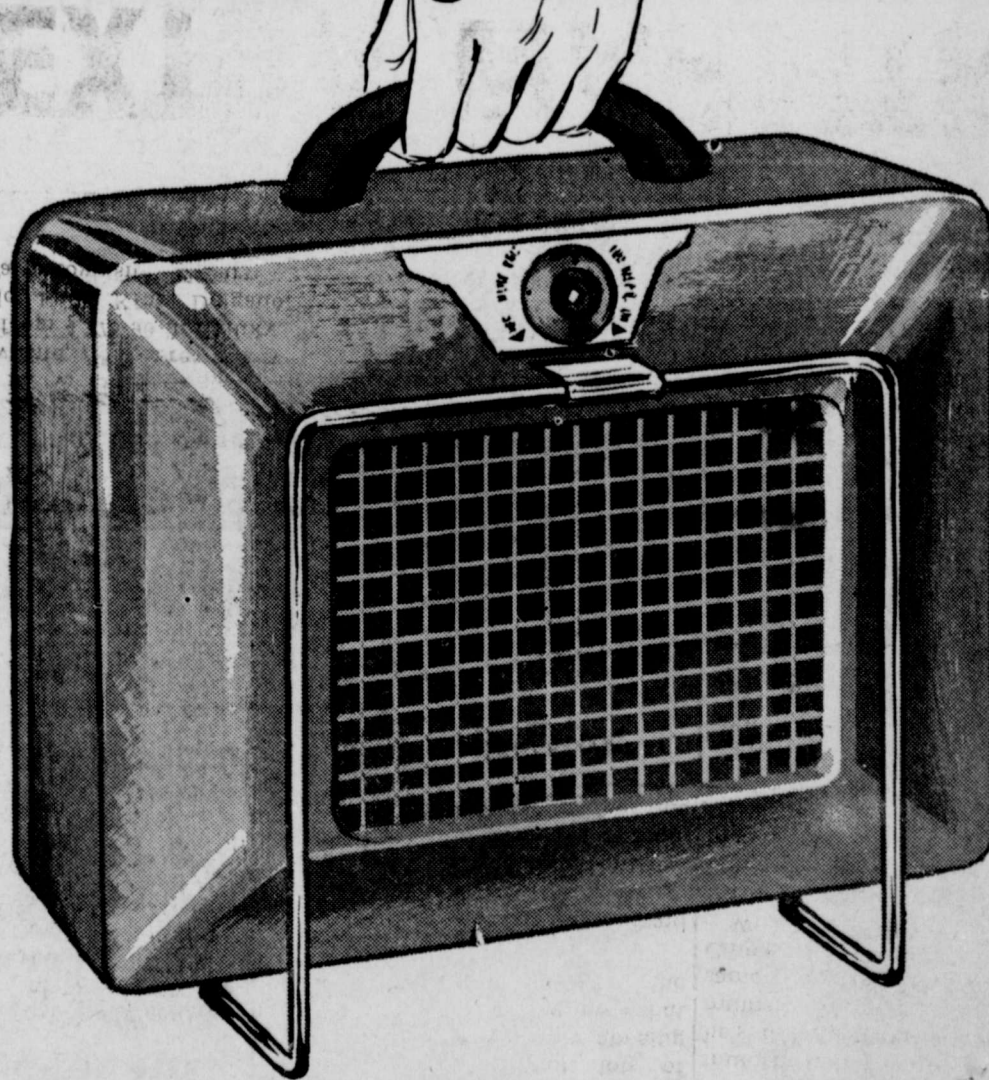
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
