THREE AMERICANS ON BOARD CHANZY

ALL THE REST OF THOSE LOST
IN ILL-FATED SETAMER
FROM OTHER LANDS.

WRECK WITHOUT WARNING

Is Desperate Hope That Some Were
Able to Escape With Lives in
Small Boats.

By Associated Press.
Paris, France, Feb. 12.—Advices received today at the offices of the French Trans-Atlantic Steamship Company state that the loss of the boat, General Chanzy, occurred Wednesday night while the vessel was running before a terrible storm in the vicinity of the Balearic Islands, in the Mediterranean.

When the vessel struck a reef north of the island of Minorca, the shock was terrific and the ship was literally broken to pieces on the rocks. She struck almost without warning and none of those on board had more than the merest fighting chance for their lives.

It is learned that with the exception of three passengers, all on board were Europeans. Two acrobats from San Francisco and one young lady were the Americans lost.

Palma Majorica, Feb. 12.—Bodies are floating ashore today from the wreck of the steamer Chanzy. The authorities have posted men along the coast to recover the bodies and also to watch for small boats in the desperate hope that some of those on board may have escaped with their lives.

Mr. Parker, in addition to being vice president and a director of the Colorado and Southern, is president of the Colorado Midland and the Cripple Creek Central lines and is also at the head of the Florence and Cripple Creek road.

VIOLATED LIQUOR LAW.

Prohibition Councilman Must Serve a
Term in Jail.

Shreveport, La., Feb. 12.—City Councilman H. B. Scofield, proprietor of a drug store and a candidate for mayor, supported by the prohibition faction, was today sentenced to serve three months in the Parish jail and pay a heavy fine on conviction for violating the prohibition law.

CENTRAL BOTTLED UP.

Southern Pacific Unloads on Tennessee
Railroad.

COLQUITT TO OPEN CAMPAIGN FOR GOVERNOR IN WICHITA

Railroad Commissioner Will Begin His
Race Next Month, Making Open-
ing Address in this City.

Oscar B. Colquitt, state railroad commissioner, and candidate for the democratic gubernatorial nomination, will open his campaign in Wichita Falls, some time next month, at a date not yet determined. This was learned in a letter received from Mr. Colquitt today and confirms a rumor which has been in circulation to that effect recently.

The local Colquitt men will begin to get ready for the reception of the candidate as soon as it is known just when the campaign will be opened and the occasion will be a notable one. It is planned to run excursions here from all over the state, and thousands of people will be in Wichita Falls on that date to attend the affair.

It is probable that the opening address will be delivered at Lake Wichita and the new pavilion will probably be used, unless it is decided to have the affair in the open air.

It has been rumored here for some time that Wichita Falls was to be honored as the opening place for Mr.

Colquitt's campaign and the announcement to that effect will be gladly received.

Plans are under way for the organization of a Colquitt club in this city and it is probable that the cooperation of the Chamber of Commerce will be obtained in making the affair one long to be remembered. It will bring thousands of people to Wichita Falls from all over Texas and will bring this city into added prominence.

While Mr. Colquitt has not yet announced the opening date for his campaign, it will be sometime next month.

GOES TO COURT.

City Political Matters Before Judge in
Dallas.

Dallas, Feb. 12.—The injunction proceedings instituted by Pearson of the city democratic committee against two other rival committees, involving the right of authority, came up today before Judge Eubank. The hearing was continued until next Friday.

TO HOLD ELECTION ON NEXT FRIDAY

PROPERTY OWNERS WILL VOTE
ON ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND
PAVING LAW ADOPTION.

IS LITTLE OPPOSITION

Effort Will Be Made, However, to Get
Out Large Vote and Secure Heavy
Majority.

The election to determine the issuance of more paving bonds, the issuance of additional city hall bonds and the adoption of the new paving law, will be held next Friday and the matter is already being urged upon every property owner. A mass meeting is to be held early next week to arouse interest in the election and steps will be taken to assure the election of the bonds and the adoption of the new law by a substantial majority.

It is proposed to issue new paving bonds to the amount of several thousand five hundred and city hall bonds to the amount of four thousand. If the paving bonds carry, the city will have a total of thirty-five thousand dollars with which to pay her share of the paving cost and with this money, from eight to twelve blocks can be paved this year. The city hall bonds, as previously explained, are to be used in the construction of an addition to the city hall for the automobile fire engine. The contract for this work has already been awarded.

The new paving law provides that the city may pave the street in front of any property, the property-owner paying three-fourths of the contract cost and the city one-fourth, the cost of the intersections to be borne by the city. Under this new law, the city will be able to pave several more blocks than would be possible otherwise. Little opposition to any of the propositions has been manifested.

CHARGES ARE FILED.

Claimed That Road Is Disobeying the
Safety Provisions.

Austin, Tex., Feb. 12.—Complaint was today filed with Labor Commissioner Myers against the St. Louis, Mexico and Brownsville Railroad for failure to use air brakes, automatic couplers and electric head lights on the branch from Brownsville to Port Isabel. An investigation will be instituted immediately.

PROPOSITION FOR PACKING HOUSE

OKLAHOMA CITY MAN HERE TO-
DAY AND MAY SUBMIT CITY
DEFINITE OFFER.

IS CONFERRING TODAY

Will Probably Make Bonus Proposition
For Establishment of a Small
Plant Here.

The packing house matter is being stirred up again today and an Oklahoma City capitalist is in the city conferring with local people regarding the establishing of a plant here. While nothing of a definite nature has been given out, it is understood that a proposition for a small plant, on a bonus basis, will be submitted at an early date. The name of the Oklahoma City man is, for obvious reasons, not published, but it is stated that he is in a position to carry out any proposition he may make in this connection.

The visitor is conferring with local people today and, needless to state, is receiving all possible encouragement for his proposition. It is believed that he had intended to put in his plant at Oklahoma City, but dropped this plan on account of the advent of the new large packing house, for which the city only recently raised a three hundred thousand dollar bonus. It is expected that something definite will be announced on the proposition early next week.

Floyd Tandy Fatally Wounded By

Tandy was enjoying the evening at the skating rink and was called to the door when the skaters were startled by two revolver shots and saw Tandy fall fatally wounded. Phillips escaped. The officers are hunting him. The men had quarreled a short time before the shooting.

GETS \$20,000.

Man Who Lost Hands and Feet Com-
promises.

Waxahatchie, Tex., Feb. 12.—Geo. Hickman today received twenty thousand dollars as a cash settlement in compromising the suit against the H. & T. C., which road he sued for sixty-five thousand dollars and obtained a judgment for that amount from the district court. The company appealed, but the compromise was reached today. Hickman lost his hands and feet in a railroad accident.

ONLY THREE AMERICANS.

Remainder of Chanzy Victims Were
All Foreigners.

Paris, Feb. 12.—Among the passengers on the Mediterranean liner Chanzy which was lost off Island Majorica were two acrobats from San Francisco, Deranda and Green. The only other American, so far as known was a young woman named Elsie Henry. Her address in America is not known.

SNOW AT MANY POINTS.

Severe Fall Is Felt As Far South As
Nashville.

Pittsburg, Feb. 12.—The people here today are floundering through seventeen inches of snow. All traffic on railroads is delayed and the city streets are almost impassable. From almost every community in Western Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Eastern Ohio came reports of suspended traffic and snow-bound highways. More snow is predicted.

New York, Feb. 12.—Four inches of snow fell here last night. Two fishing vessels were driven ashore on Sandy Hook by the fury of the storm. The crew was saved. North Eastern counties report that the storm is the most severe since 1888. The snow fall is heavy and the cold is severe.

Nashville, Feb. 12.—The snow fall measures ten inches on the level in this section and early today is still falling. This is the heaviest snow fall here since 1892.

NEW COMPANY WILL BUILD HOLLIS LINE

'ALTUS, WICHITA FALLS AND
HOLLIS' WILL BE NAME OF
NEW ROAD.

HAS BEEN INCORPORATED

Stockholders Include Leading Capital-
ists of Altus and Wichita
Falls.

A new railroad company was organized recently at Altus for the construction of a railway from Altus to Hollis, Oklahoma and this new company, instead of the Wichita Falls and Northwestern will build the line from Altus to Hollis. The new company will be known as the Altus, Wichita Falls and Hollis.

The incorporators of the new company are Messrs. C. C. Hightower, J. A. Henry, C. E. Cagle, J. R. McMahon of Altus and Messrs. Frank Kell, J. A. Kemp and C. C. Huff of Wichita Falls.

Application for a charter under the laws of the State of Oklahoma has been filed and the organization will be completed at the earliest possible date. The preliminary construction details of the road are already under way and it will be pushed through to completion at the earliest possible date. It is understood that it will be operated as part of the Wichita Falls Route and that direct connection from Hollis through to Wichita Falls will be made, but there has been no announcement to this effect and officially, the new road is an independent proposition.

WOMAN ARRESTED HERE SENT UP FOR BIGAMY

Leads one on and on to Dramatic Foolishness and Gestures

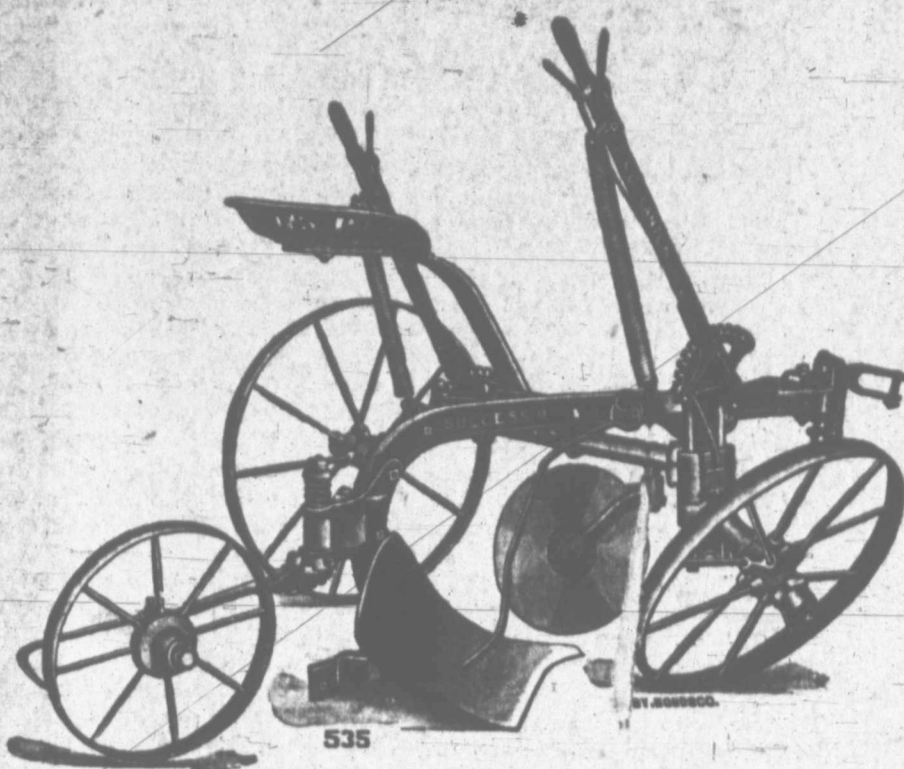
It takes a person of some poise and humility of mind to read aloud and not irretrievably antagonize the people one is favoring. It seems a simple thing reading aloud, not at all a dangerous way in which to pass an evening. Just enunciate with a decent clearness and nothing more, but there are, strangely enough, pitfalls into which the best intentioned may fall. One may begin humbly enough, but after a while it catches your attention that the rich voice which rolls on so uninterruptedly is yours. Really a very fine organ. Every one is listening too; well, well! It is hard to recall when such a thing has happened before. There—er—seems no reason why the most should not be made of such an opportunity and though you may have been barely conscious of the trend of your thoughts here, you take the bit between your teeth and become objectionable for the rest of the evening.

Your capers are of necessity delicate, the affront you put upon your audience is undeniably slimy, but it is there. Your vowels strut, your u's become oily, and a noble caress is condensed given each r. By the faintest shades you cease to be an honest man—few women are ever affected in this way by reading aloud—and become a tonal coxcomb, your voice, and your ears in league to each undo the other. A dreadful boon gathers and echoes in your throat, you read more slowly, succulently making the most of each well-turned phrase. You pause and hurry on; the volume of your voice retires and rings out. When the dialogue is reached you lose all sense of shame, and to your horror you catch your unoccupied hand starting on the downward path toward a flowing gesture. You cease reading abruptly, mutter that you feel the need of a glass of water, and leave the room. It is not a moment too soon. You have barely saved anything out of the wreck. In another moment you would have said "kno'ledge and in a second more dramatic."—New York Evening Sun.

It therefore makes the announcement that Henrietta has secured a planing mill, due to efforts put forth by her enterprising Board of Trade.

You are envious of Henrietta's oil and gas wells, upon which your town draws so liberally and which you have been known to refer to covertly as "The Wichita gas district." JUDGE HENDRY DEAD.

One of the Founders of Mineral Wells Passes Away at Wichita Falls. Mineral Wells Index.

A message was received last night by President I. N. Wynn of the Bank of Mineral Wells apprising him of the death yesterday at Wichita Falls of Judge R. E. Hendry, for years a resident of this city and founder of the famous Crazy Wells.

In the sale of the Crazy Wells in 1907 Judge Hendry received large landed interests in and near Wichita Falls, and soon after the sale took up his residence in that city.

During his long residence here he was ever in the front of every movement for the upbuilding of Mineral Wells, and his long and useful management of the Wells caused him to become known to thousands of people in a dozen states. An old citizen and former business associate of Judge Hendry gave the Index the following biography this afternoon:

Judge Hendry came to this county in April, 1885, having lived formerly at Rusk in Cherokee County; was a member of the 20th legislature and resigned his seat in same and came to Mineral Wells for his health. Soon after coming here he commenced to teach school in a little box house situated on the lot where the Crazy Well property is now located, afterwards interested the citizens of Mineral Wells in the importance of providing a school building and the fruits of his labor resulted in the building of the stone building now at the West end of Wall street. He taught school here for about two years and gave up teaching to fill the office of County Judge during the years of 1888 and 1889. In 1891 he embarked in the abstract and real estate business, associated with Ed. C. Baker, later he bought Mr. Baker out and continued the business under the style of Hendry and Benson. W. D. Benson was the junior member of the firm who married his daughter.

R. E. Hendry was mayor of Mineral Wells for two terms.

In 1893 the Mineral Wells Agency of which firm R. E. Hendry was president acquired title to the Crazy Well and the success of this magnificent property was built up by R. E. Hendry and his associates.

At the age of sixteen R. E. Hendry volunteered and joined the Confederate army.

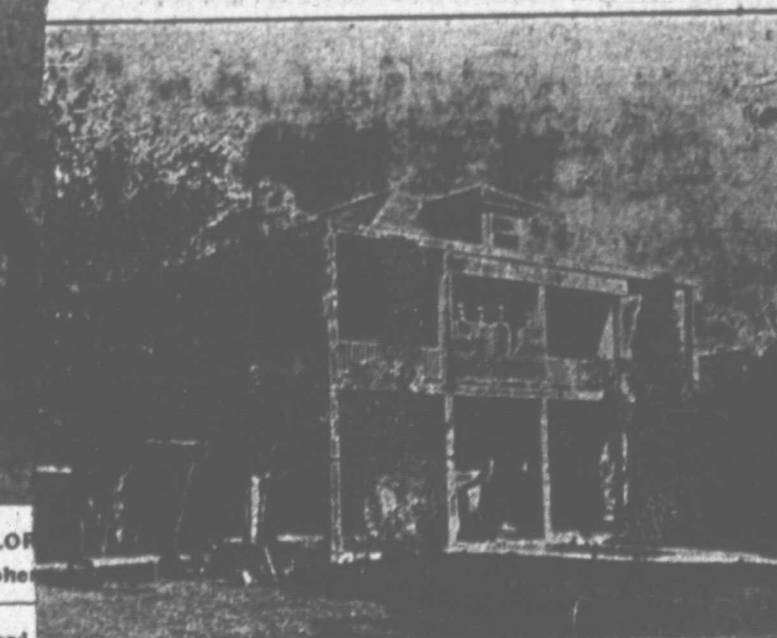

Wright Lorimer Speaks of the Various forms of the Present Day Productions

"A revival of the romantic drama is ah hand. It is the specific for many of the troubles that are worrying managers to death and keeping the public on their nerves. One thing is very certain. The modern theatre goes, North, South, East and West is a dissatisfied being, clamoring for something different in his diet. You must find some way out of the deadlock. Managers are blindly groping to find what the public wants; the public in turn are puzzled. When I step forward with the romantic drama as the solution of both difficulties, I do so from a close knowledge of the theatrical question."

These interesting though disputed doctrines, are put forward by one of the well known actors of this continent, Mr. Wright Lorimer, who is to play 'David' in 'Shepherd King' at the Wichita on Tuesday night, Feb. 17.

Mr. Lorimer is essentially an interesting man, from the fact of his early struggles and later successes. 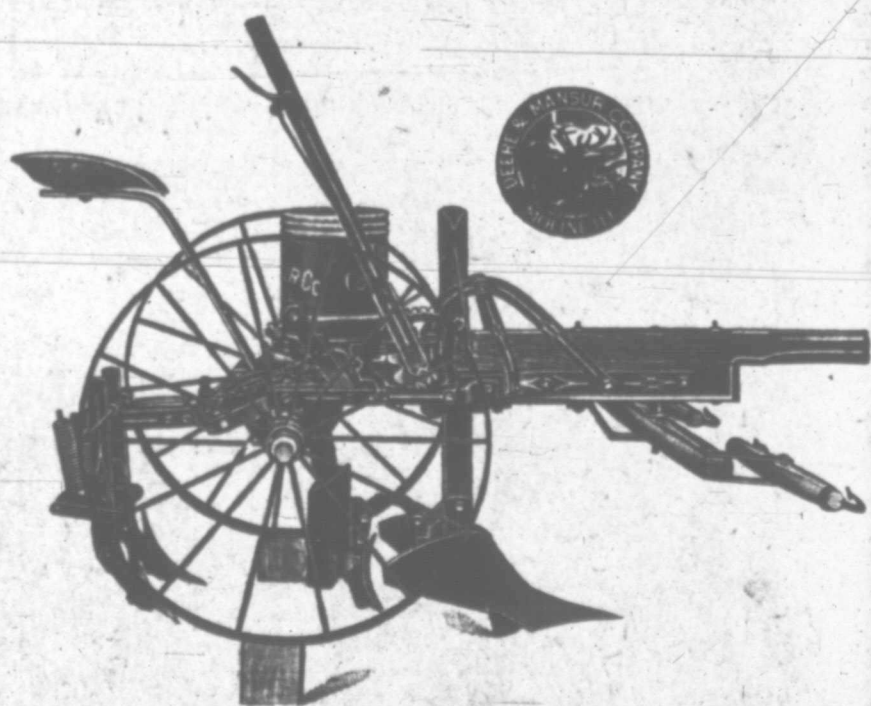
