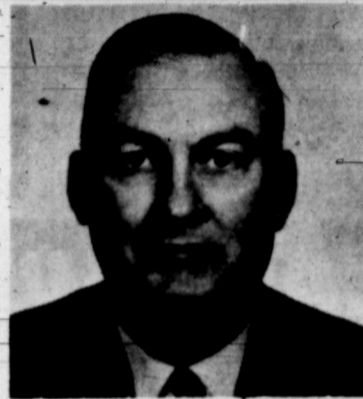

## ★ Masonic Lodge Building Contract Let

Masons here are to remodel the Masonic Building, corner of Oak and Second Sts., and will move their meeting room to first floor after complete renovation inside and out.

Contracts for the project, to cost between \$15,000 and \$17,000, went to Virgil Stone, contractor, and Hardcastle Refrigeration, both of Colorado City.

Work is to begin, said

Charles Godwin, secretary of Mitchell Lodge No. 563 AF and AM, as soon as steel beam reinforcements are received by Stone.

Blue prints call for the closing of all downstairs openings, both doors and windows, with the only entrance to be at the west end of the building and to face Second St.

Upright posts on first floor, formerly occupied by Bery

Fee Hardware Store, will be removed and steel supports added. The old awning at the building's old Oak St. entrance will be removed.

Exterior walls will be restuccoed. To be added at the south wall, adjacent to the new lobby planned, will be two lounges, a hall, and a chapter counseling room.

Interior of first floor is to be refinished altogether and partitioned to facilitate Masonic

Lodge, Eastern Star, and Rainbow Girls meetings.

Entry opens into a 12 by 30 ft. lobby which will feature the serving bar and the kitchen complete with cabinet, range, refrigerator, and sink.

Dividing the lobby from the meeting room will be an 8 by 10 ft. preparation room, an 8 by 14 ft. storage room, an entry hall flanked by the 8 by 8 ft. Tiler room.

Meeting room, 30 by 50 ft.,

will be carpeted wall-to-wall. Theater-type seats will be installed against the walls which will be of wood paneling.

The meeting room will be wired for sound, cooled with refrigerated air, and centrally heated.

Upstairs will be used as a practice hall when the building remodeling project is finished. All upstairs windows will be repaired and interior walls re-painted.

## Tour To Kickoff Industrial Clinic

Economic Development Clinic for Colorado City, all day Thursday, will be preceded by a tour of the town.

Participants in the clinic program in Community Room at the Chamber of Commerce will travel by bus to leave the Chamber office at 8 a. m. Development Committee and members of Colorado City Industrial Team, Inc. will be hosts.

Program for the development clinic, sponsored by the Texas Industrial Commission, gets underway at 8:45 a. m.

Don Benson, president of the Colorado City Chamber, will give the welcome address at 9 a. m.

Ten out-of-town speakers from the Texas Industrial Commission will speak at various hours during the daylong clinic.

Also expected here for the day's events are three area-development executives for companies, including Oscar Castillion manager of area development for Texas Electric Service Co., John Perryman, Lone Star Gas manager of area development, and Lou Vinet, Texas & Pacific Railroad manager of industrial development.

First guest speaker will be James E. Heath, senior industrial consultant for Texas Industrial Commission of Austin. Heath will give the introduction to the clinic, at 9:05 a. m.

Heath attended San Antonio College for two years and received his BBA degree from Baylor University where he also attended law school. He is graduate of the Institute of Organization Management, University of Houston.

Before joining the Industrial

Commission he was manager of Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce, a staff executive for the Chamber at Wichita Falls, and manager of the Snyder Chamber of Commerce. He joined the Commission in 1966 as senior consultant with his primary responsibility remaining in West Texas.

At 9:10, James E. Harwell, executive director for the Texas Industrial Commission, will discuss the topic "Introduction to Industrial Development."

"Improving Colorado City's Community Image," will follow at 9:30 a. m. with Jerry Heare of Austin as speaker.

TIC consultant Heare holds a degree in sociology from University of Texas. Before joining the staff he was manager for Chambers at Atlanta and Seguin. He also served as research analyst for the Governor's Committee on Education.

Phil Davis of the Texas Tourist Development Agency will discuss "Developing An Effective Tourism Program" at 9:50 a. m.

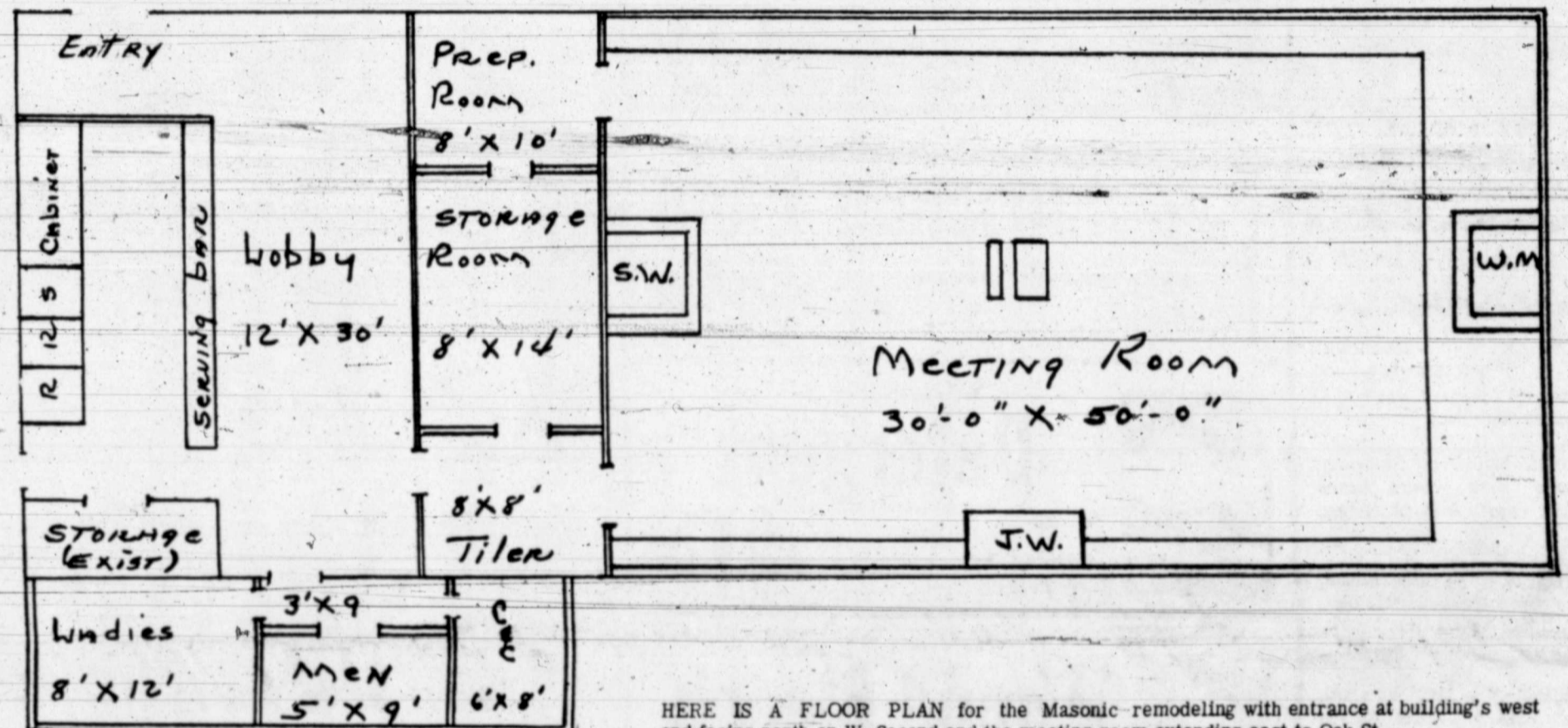

## 137 Kids Go For New School Breakfast Here

Breakfast program for pupils in Primary, Hutchinson, and Wallace schools began Wednesday, first day of school since the Easter holiday recess.

First day for the school lunchroom breakfast program, 44 children were fed breakfast at Primary School with 23 of that number free. At Hutchinson 35 pupils were fed with 19 free. At Wallace only one pupil had breakfast.

Thursday, 85 children took advantage of the new breakfast program at Primary with 47 free breakfasts served. Hutchinson fed 46 pupils, 24 of them free, and Wallace fed 4, with one free breakfast.

Friday morning, figures for Primary were again 85 with 22 free; for Hutchinson, 48 with 22 free; and Wallace 4 with one free.

Breakfast program is available under the National School Lunch and Child Nutrition Programs. It is intended for use by schools drawing attendance from areas with a substantial number of needy children who receive no breakfasts - or inadequate breakfasts at home.

It is also designed for children who spend considerable travel time to reach school and have to skip or slight breakfast at home.

Pupils unable to pay for the breakfast service are fed without charge. All children who are eligible for free breakfast will be served free breakfast between 8:05 a. m. and 8:25 a. m.

Other children who want to have breakfast in the cafeteria can buy it at extra cost, 15¢.

The simple breakfast served

offers half pint whole milk as a beverage or to be used on cereal; one half cup of fruit or vegetable juice or serving of fruit; one slice of whole grain or enriched bread toast or 3/4 cup of whole, grain cereal or enriched or fortified cereal.

# CONVERSATION CORNER



PAPER at Loraine, the Mitchell County News, takes its readers 'way back sometimes by way of those advertisements they run from Loraine's First State Bank.

Thursday's issued carried, under the usual heading "A Vignette From The Past," an account of that deep snow that fell over this county April 7, 1938.

That brought out the old "Remember when" in this reader. Remember when it snowed here in C-City, too, thirty-one years ago on the seventh day of April?

It was one of the most beautiful snows in the world and it lay like glistening meringue everywhere, on evergreen and redbud alike.

It defied all our accepted theories for late freezing weather. The zinnias were up and doing well and even the mesquite trees were out with their fern-like foliage.

REMEMBER WHEN can be a fine game to play by yourself or with somebody else.

It is especially fine when the things remembered make you happy, proud, sentimental in recalling the day. And therein lies a strong hint.

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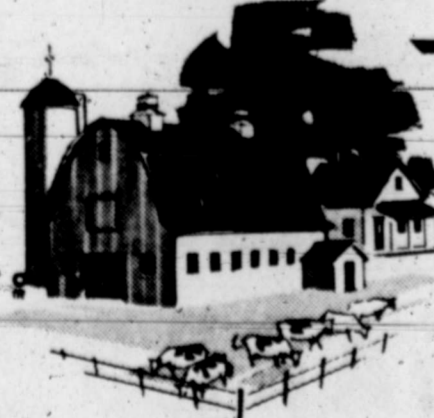

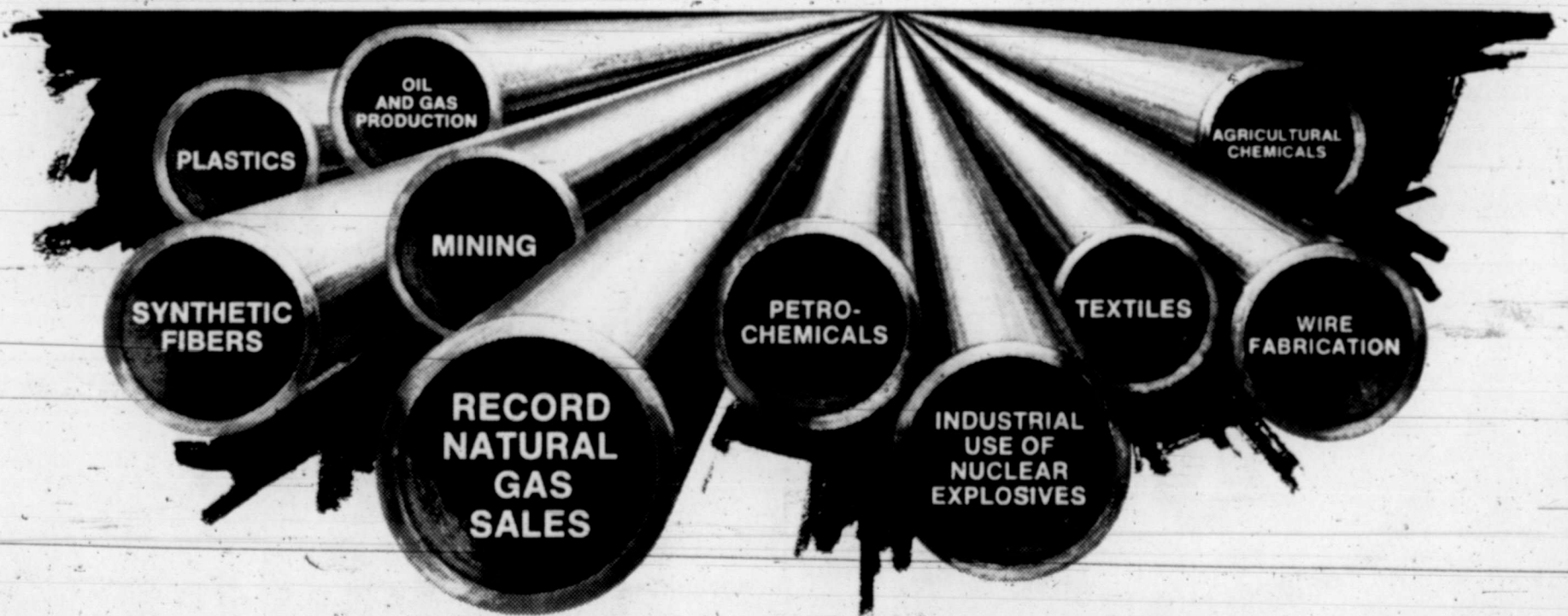

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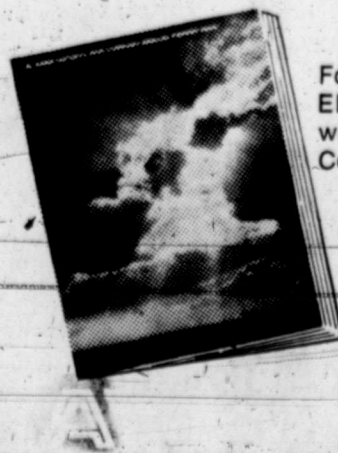

is not a free program for those who can pay.

Comparative figures between Colorado City and Big Spring where the breakfast program has been in operation since January, show that, to date, more Colorado City pupils are paying for the breakfast than are paying in Big Spring, percentage-wise.

For older students in Junior High and High School there is no free breakfast program. However, snack bars are now open when those buildings open and are selling milk, juice, and rolls.

Teachers aids are assisting with the program in the Primary and Elementary Schools.

**Machinery Bids To Council**


City Council Monday night will consider three bids for the city to purchase a tractor-loader for its sanitary-fill operation.

Three firms - Treanor Equipment Company of Abilene, Consolidated Equipment of Odessa and Tilson - Godsey Equipment of Odessa - submitted proposals.

Consolidated proposed \$16,230 for a Massey-Ferguson Tractor loader weighing 19,700 pounds; Consolidated \$18,000 for a 19,000 pound Massey-Ferguson and Tilson-Godsey \$11,218 for a 10,590 pound John Deere. However, in advertised bid specifications, the Tilson-Godsey vehicle was under weight requirements.

The heavy trac-type machine is needed for covering trash at the city's sanitary - fill disposal ground. All towns with 5,000 population or more are required by new state law to have the sanitary-fill dump operation in full operation by July 1 with daily burying of waste dumpings.
