Human rights march slated this Saturday

Organizers of this Saturday's Human Rights March planned in Colorado City are expecting from 1,000-2,000 persons to participate in the event.

"We've had a good response to the march, and we're expecting a large crowd," said Sara Ortiz. "We're going to have six chartered buses coming in as well as individuals from throughout the state and perhaps out of state."

The march is being organized by the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC) and is designed to draw attention to civil rights.

"It will be a peaceful march - we're not out to start anything," she said, adding that this is not just a Sammy Gomez case."

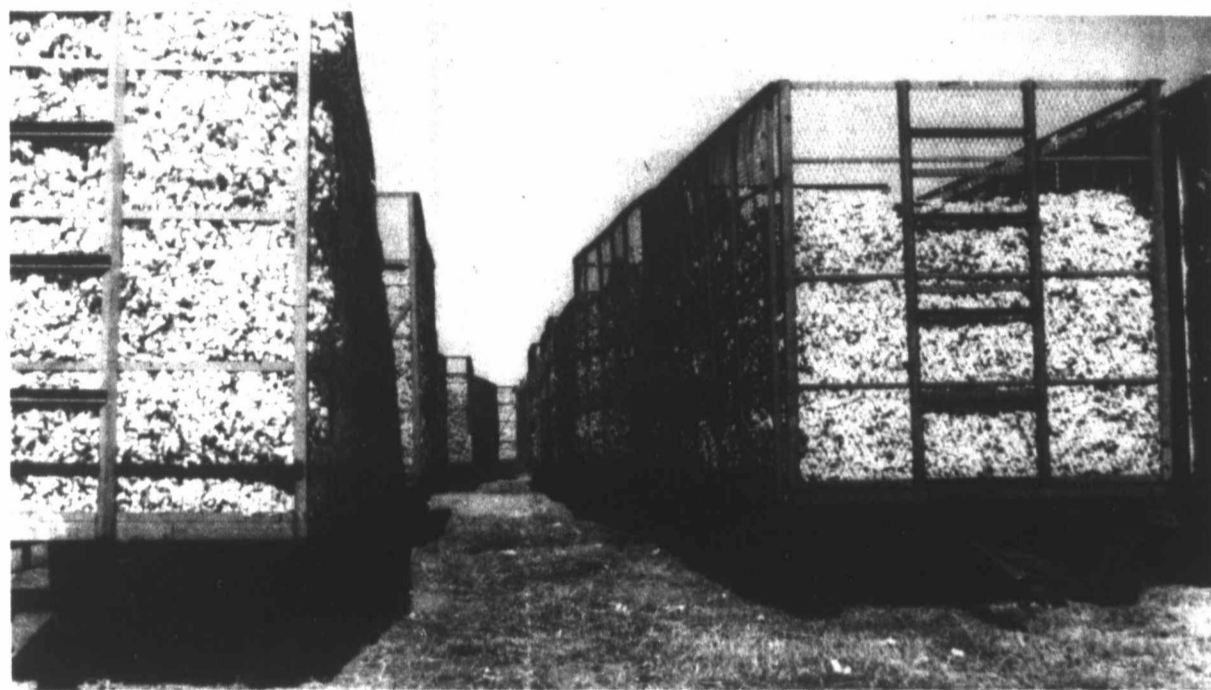
Gomez, a Colorado City resident, was killed on May 13, 1988 by then part-time Colorado City police officer Billy Ray Williamson, who along with other officers, was attempting to arrest Gomez in connection with a sexual assault case.

A suit filed against the police officers and the city alleges that Gomez was murdered and says that Gomez was the victim of years of abuse and harassment by Colorado City police officers.

The chartered buses will be coming from McAllen, Houston, Lubbock, San Antonio, El Paso and Dallas for Saturday's march. Ortiz said in addition to the out-of-town participants, local residents are invited and encouraged to participate in the march as well.

The march will begin at 1 p.m. at the courthouse and is expected to

Annual pecan show scheduled

The 15th Annual Mitchell County Pecan Show has been scheduled for Dec. 5, County Extension Agent Bryan Limmer announced.

The show, sponsored by the Horticulture Committee of the County Extension Program Council, Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce, City National Bank and First National, will be held at the C.C. Thompson Room of City National Bank.

All pecans entered must have been grown in 1990. Nuts must have been grown by the person showing them. Growers are limited to one entry of each improved or papershell variety. If only one entry is entered in any class, the entry will be judged with "other varieties". There is no limit on the number of seedling or native pecans. All entries become the property of the Mitchell County Pecan Show and they will be given to a charitable organization.

Limmer said that each entry must consist of 43 nuts and they will be displayed on a paper plate during the show.

Entries will be taken between 8 a.m.-noon on Dec. 5 and the judging will be at 3 p.m. the same day in the C.C. Thompson Room. Anybody is welcome to help process the pecans the day of the show. Pecans may also be left at either the County Extension office in the courthouse annex or at the Chamber of Commerce office anytime before the show. Entries

must be marked with the owner's name, address and variety of pecan.

Any alterations of pecan show shells by marking, filing or polishing will disqualify that entry. However, exhibitors are encouraged to remove all traces of husks and foreign matter from the shells.

The first three places in each variety will receive ribbons. The champions and reserve champions in the three divisions will be awarded pecan wood plaques and rosettes, respectively.

Best of show and reserve best of show each will receive banners.

Classes will be judged on size, color, appearance, shell thickness, cracking quality, kernel quality, attractiveness and other factors, said Limmer.

Group cites opposition to landfill

The Mitchell County Commissioners' Court Tuesday morning accepted a resolution from Tejas Cattlewomen opposing the proposed hazardous waste landfill and incinerator.

Maureen Morris and Sue Guelker, representing the Tejas Cattlewomen, presented the resolution which reads:

"We, the Tejas Cattlewomen with representatives from Howard, Mitchell, Martin and Scurry counties, oppose the proposed municipal waste landfill, hazardous waste landfill and hazardous waste incinerator by National Waste and Energy Development, Inc. in Mitchell County, because we believe it presents a potential risk of health, safety and welfare to present and future generations."

The resolution was signed by Lucille Sterling, president; June Wall, vice president; LaJuana Solomon, secretary; and Adele Ginzler, treasurer.

Mitchell County has signed a host agreement with the Pennsylvania company. County Judge Mac Morris said the host agreement will take affect only after a permit for the project is granted from the state.

After presenting the resolution, Mrs. Morris asked the court if the resolution and other resolutions of opposition signed by local and area entities mean anything to the commissioners court.

"No, not to us," said Judge Morris, adding, however, that the resolutions could be of influence to the Texas Water Commission and

Resident injured when car hits school van

A Colorado City resident was injured and three Hermleigh High School students received minor injuries shortly before 4 p.m. Monday in a car/van collision near Loraine.

The accident happened on the north service road of Interstate 20 and involved a 1983 Oldsmobile driven by Amy Baumann of Colorado City and a Dodge school van driven by William Cook of Snyder.

The van held 10 members of the Hermleigh High School boys basketball team who were on their way to Grady to play a game. Cook is a teacher/coach at Hermleigh High School.

The van was west-bound on the service road. Baumann had made a left turn onto the service road off county road 442 when the accident occurred.

Hospital census, revenues drop

The Mitchell County Hospital District Board of directors Tuesday were told that until the patient census rises, the hospital's financial status will continue to fall.

Administrator Wendell Alford said that for the month of October, the hospital showed expenses of \$272,000 and net revenues of \$149,000 resulting in a "significant loss for the month."

Alford said the average daily census for the month was 5.19 and that with current staffing levels, the census needs to be at the 9-10 mark in order to increase revenues to the level they need to be.

He said October saw 161 patient days and that the budget called for 295 days. There were 37 admissions and 35 discharges.

In-patient revenue totaled \$95,271 and out-patient revenue totaled \$86,585.

Alford said that the problem can be alleviated by recruiting one or more new physicians. Dr. Dee Roach is the only full-time physician on staff following the resignation of Dr. Frank Kretsinger who moved out of town.

Alford said he has talked with

several physicians about moving to Colorado City and said physician recruitment will remain a top priority.

During his financial report,

Alford reported that the bank loans had been paid with tax monies that are starting to come in and that for the time being, the hospital district is out of debt from the bank.

Other reports heard during the regular monthly meeting included the medical staff report by Dr.

Commodity recertification is scheduled

Recipients who receive commodities at the ag barn must recertify the week of Dec. 3-7 by signing up at the Veterans Service Office between 8:30-11:30 a.m.

Bertie Kidd, coordinator, said recipients must bring a utility bill or a similar document to verify residence.

"This program is for the needy people in our community and with the short supply of commodities, we must be sure the applicant is eligible," she said.

All household members' income must be reported. Income may be earned or unearned as long as a person receives it on a regular or predictable basis.

Kidd said the rules for participation in the program are the same for everyone without regard to age, race, marital status, color, religion, sex, handicap, national origin or political belief.  Roach and the nursing home administrator's report by Marsha Rickard, administrator.

Rickard said the 50-bed Valley Fair Lodge has a census of 45 with two possible new admissions coming in next week. She said there were 1,430 patient days for the month compared to 1,337 patient days the previous month.

She said that new regulations took effect Oct. 1 and that many are already in place and the others are being worked on. All new requirements concerning patient care are in place.

She said that the nursing home is receiving about \$10 per day per patient, but that the extra money goes for increased staffing regulations, increased training for aides and for other new requirements.

Rickard said James Bryant from San Angelo has been employed as a social worker and that she is advertising for a registered nurse to become director of nurses.

Dr. Roach said he is encouraged by the new pharmacy service the hospital has contracted with. He

said the service will help with continuing and ongoing studies and will help with use and trends of medications. The hospital contract with Owen Health Care to provide pharmacy services with a fulltime pharmacist on duty. Previously, the hospital had contracted with pharmacist on a consulting basis.

Marion Bassham, board chairman, presented to service pins to Joan Merket and to Petra Aguilar.

Mrs. Merket, a registered nurse, is also director of nurses and has been employed by the hospital for 35 years.

Mrs. Aguilar is employed in the dietary department and has been employed for 15 years.

In other business, the board:

 - reviewed contracts;
 - heard an insurance report;
 - reviewed and approved the swing bed program manual;
 - heard the ambulance report as given by board member Jay Craddock, and;

 the Texas Health Commission, two of the agencies which will study the permit application once it is submitted.

"We (the commissioners court) have no influence with the Texas Water Commission and the Texas Health Commission," said Judge Morris.

Mrs. Morris also asked the commissioners if they feel any differently about the proposed hazardous waste project following last Tuesday's joint task force hearing on hazardous waste management in West Texas. The hearing featured a number of experts testifying on waste management and other areas dealing with the subject.

Pct. 4 Commissioner Bill Preston, the only one to reply to Mrs. Morris' question, said there was a difference of opinion even among the witnesses who testified at the Sweetwater hearing. He said that he still believes an incinerator can be operated safely and without harm to the environment and to people.

"To me, if an incinerator is hot enough, it will destroy everything that will be harmful," said Preston.

"We've got trash and we've got to find something to do with it," said Preston. "We're just working toward a solution."

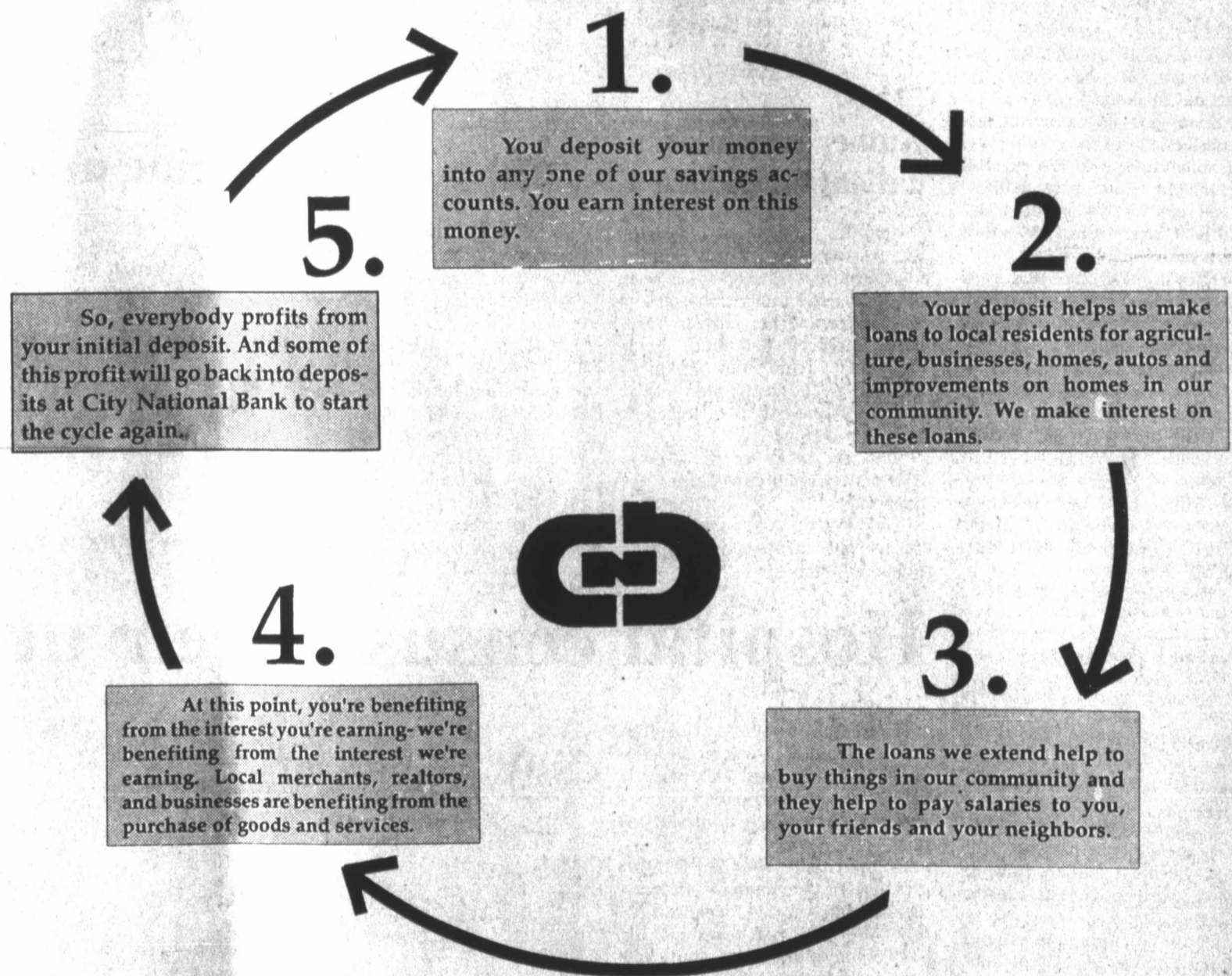

Mr. Rose was our director. He was also band director at Colorado City High School.


As I said, I'm very proud of the spirit at Westbrook High School. We were all proud of our band and

The new items of service and equipment in this application have been added to meet the company's increasing 9-1-1 customer demands and to allow GTE-SW to compete more effectively in the 9-1-1 equipment market.

The product line in the new offerings consists of a mini-computer and specialized console package for larger communities, as well as a personal computer with Automatic Number Identification (ANI) display for smaller communities. (ANI displays a caller's telephone number on the emergency dispatcher's computer screen.) In addition, the product line will include ANI and Automatic Location Information (ALI) display units compatible with, and similar to, those offered by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company and other local exchange carriers in Texas. (The ALI feature displays a caller's address on the computer screen.) The rate charged existing 9-1-1 customers may be revised at the expiration of their contracts with GTE-SW if the proposed tariff is approved.

This filing has been assigned Docket No 9667. The hearing on the merits is scheduled for February 25, 1991, at the offices of the Public Utility Commission of Texas. The deadline to intervene in this docket is December 31, 1990.

Congressman airs trash on incinerator company

SWEETWATER - Ties to a convicted organized-crime figure dealt a blow Tuesday to a Pennsylvania company's attempt to build a \$35 million waste incinerator in Mitchell County.

During a public meeting of the state's Joint Task Force on Waste Management, state Sen. Temple Dickson, D-Sweetwater, raised the roof beams in Nolan County's courthouse when he revealed that Jim Cronin - vice president of project development for National Waste and Energy Corporation - had testified in behalf of a convicted felon.

National Waste and Energy hopes to build a \$35 million hazardous waste incinerator on 5,000 acres of land near Westbrook in Mitchell County.

Tuesday's task force meeting was designed to gather information on the proposed waste disposal projects planned for West Texas.

About midway through the jam-packed hearing, Dickson asked Cronin, "Did you appear before the Pennsylvania Crime Commission to testify in behalf of Jack Nacrelli?"

A visibly shaken Cronin answered that he had testified on behalf of Nacrelli in 1988. He admitted that Nacrelli is a felon who had been convicted in 1978 of taking bribes from gamblers.

"He (Nacrelli) made a mistake. He went to prison for it," Cronin said.

Nacrelli's name and history arose when Dickson prodded Cronin about alleged racketeering within the solid-waste industry in Pennsylvania and New York.

According to information collected by the Pennsylvania Crime Commission, Nacrelli - a convicted racketeer - had been called upon in 1988 by city, county and corporate officials in Chester, Pa., to mediate a dispute over a trash-to-steam plant built by National Energy. Nacrelli had been hired by Westinghouse as a paid consultant.

Cronin said during Tuesday's hearing that National Energy - which had been called National Waste Management before it sold its stock to Mid-America Inc. - would retain Westinghouse to oversee the design, construction, operation and management of the proposed Mitchell County incinerator.

Cronin described Westinghouse as a "sophisticated corporation with a clean slate," in the waste-management business.

When pressed by Dickson for a projected annual revenue that National Waste hopes to collect with its West Texas project, Cronin answered, "Quite frankly, we don't know what the revenues will be. It'll come out in due time."

Cronin said projected revenues would be disclosed in forthcoming Security Exchange Commission reports, which are mandatory.

National Energy is an outgrowth of an investment banking firm in

Pittsburgh headed by businessmen and attorneys, Cronin said.

The company's forthcoming proposal to Texas regulatory agencies would seek to build a solid waste/hazardous waste facility or an incinerator for hazardous waste material, Cronin said.

Mitchell County commissioners had signed a host agreement in March with Natural Waste and Energy, touting the economic advantages of such a facility.

County Judge S.L. "Mac" Morris said the project would employ as many as 100 workers and take a minimum of two to three years to complete.

Besides incinerating oil-contaminated soil, the project would handle solid wastes from other Texas cities and put money in county coffers, Morris said.

Projected income for the county was estimated at 50 cents to 75 cents per ton of material handled, in addition to 2 percent of the facility's gross income.

When asked by state Sen. Steve Carriker, D-Roby, whether Natural Waste and Energy could provide an estimate on the volume of waste it would handle, Cronin said company officials were "trying to evaluate what the market is" and looking to establish a joint venture with an existing plant that handles hazardous waste.

Sweetwater Resources' application is being reviewed now by the Texas Water Commission.

A WEEKLY SUMMARY OF COTTON MARKETING NEWS

For The Week Ending November 22

Nervous best describes the U.S. cotton market as uncertain economic conditions, strong foreign demand and the prospect for war in the Middle East continue to have their impact. As a result, traders seem more concerned with nearby rather than deferred deliveries.

At times in recent weeks, an inverted market has appeared possible with the New York December contract trading at a

premium over the March contract as traders bite the bullet in order to get out of their short positions. Some sources expect traders with long positions may take delivery of cotton, however, the amount that can be certificated may be in question.

The trade also appears concerned that heavy exports could result in the United States running out of

cotton this marketing year. USDA's November supply and demand report indicated ending stocks of 2.6 million bales. Since then, exports have increased dramatically, adding credibility to the trade's fear.

USDA reported exports for the week ending November 15 totaled 196,400 running bales with almost 88,000 destined for China. Facilitating current export levels is a weak U.S. dollar on world money markets.

A bullish cotton trade in the U.S. and Far East, however, is not indicated in distant futures months' prices. Deferred deliveries usually carry prices that reflect carrying costs from nearby contracts or from one month to the following one. Thus, traders may be cautious about taking forward positions. Another concern is that exports may be cancelled later this marketing year in order to meet domestic demand.

Support for this concern was enhanced by the October cotton use report released November 21 which showed U.S. textile mills used cotton at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 8.696 million bales. U.S. mills consumed cotton at a daily rate of 33,660 bales in October. This was up from 33,391 bales in September, according to figures released by the U.S. Census Bureau. Mill activity is expected to decline in November and December, however, as many mills have announced shutdowns ranging from one to five weeks during the holidays to control inventory.

New York's December contract closed up 10 points on November 16 at 74.25, and March settled at 73.63, up 19. The day's trading began strong but weakened throughout the day due to persistent scale-up selling by trade houses and strong technical resistance in December. Prices rallied during the last hour of trading to post the slight gain.

Trading remained thin on November 19 from a lack of market-moving factors and the holiday-shortened week which kept interest light. December closed up nine points at 74.34 and March was up two at 73.65. December virtually kept pace on November 20 as the contract closed up 16 points to close at 74.50 while March posted a significant loss to close down 39 at 73.26 as positioning continued before the first notice day for December delivery on November 26.

The Census Bureau's cotton usage report on November 21 eased fears of a slowing U.S. economy for at least another month. Coupled with tight deliverable stocks, the news helped December to close up 93 points at 75.43, and March made a noticeable gain to settle at 73.78, up 52.

USDA reported cotton harvest has reached 78 percent in the top 14 producing states as of November 18. Oklahoma's harvest was 70 percent complete, and Texas was 54 percent off the stalk.

Cotton trading over TELCOT's electronic marketing system totaled 35,744 bales from the holiday-shortened week of November 16 to 21, compared to 38,957 the previous week. The average price received on November 21 was 61.37, down 171 points from prices received on November 15. The adjusted world price effective through November 29 is 66.84, adjusted to U.S. location and base quality, according to USDA.

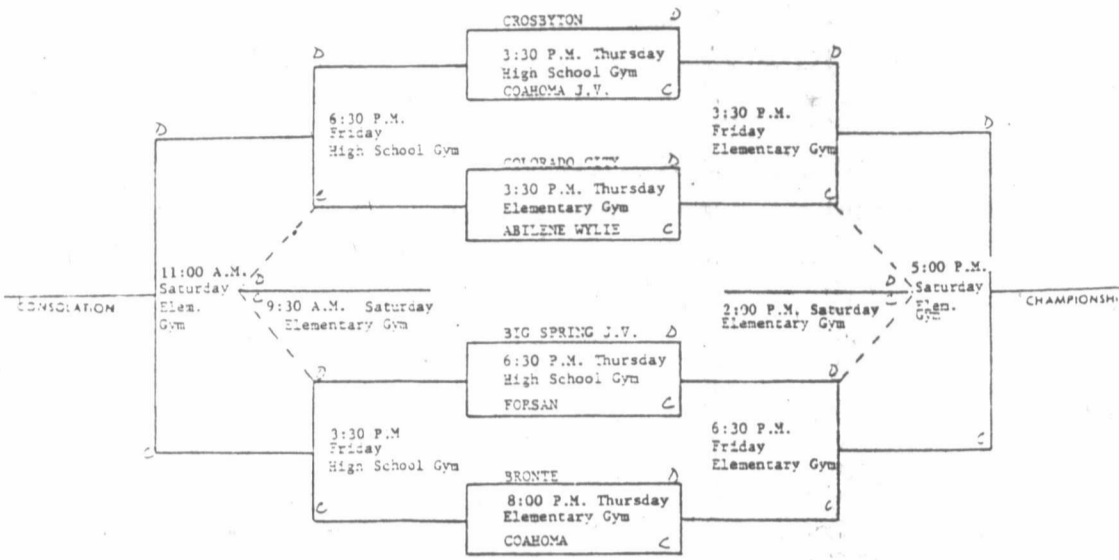

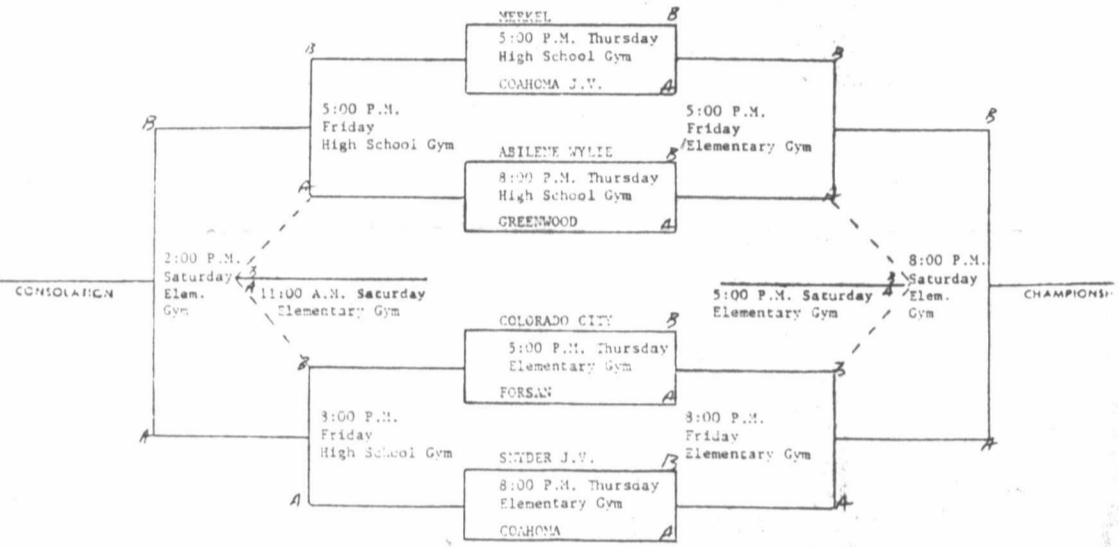

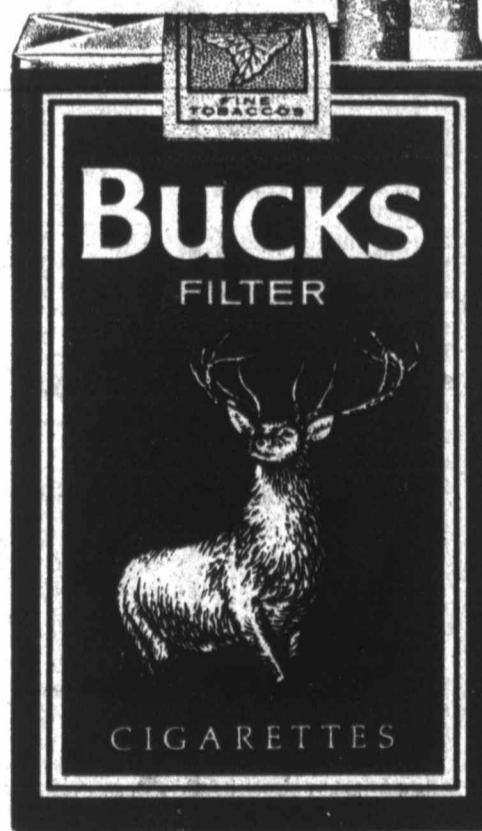
