Incumbents Roberta Conlee, Randy Foster and John D. Montgomery are asking another three years on the school board, and Billy L. Reed is the new-comer asking one of those seats. Holdover members of the Cross Plains City Council are Raymond Franke, Frank Robertson and Dwayne Wilson.

Other members of the Cross Plains Board of Trustees are Benny Glover, Joe E. Hanke, Jr., Charles Payne and Reggy Stover.

Load And Go Ambulance Service Is Relic Of Past

Editor's Note: Following is an article written by persons of the Texas Association of Emergency Medical Technicians, Fleta Gregory LVN-EMT-P, who is TAEHT Region 4 chairperson, and Stewart Eckols EMT-P, who is TAEHT Region 4 Public Relations Chairman. The article follows.

Until recently, the term "ambulance" brought to mind little more than hastily loading a critically ill or injured person into some type of vehicle and rushing off, often at dangerous speed, to the nearest medical facility. If the victim was lucky, he survived the ordeal, although he may have suffered additional needless injury during loading and transport. This "load and go" technique not only failed to save lives that could have been saved, but also cost lives and caused complications of injuries that could have been prevented had competent, well trained personnel and a well equipped ambulance been available.

Fortunately, "load and go" is becoming a thing of the past. Through the development of educational programs on emergency care (ECA, EMT, EMT-P) and the use of vital life saving equipment and the survival and recovery rate of patients requiring ambulance service has vastly improved over the past few years and with the development of new field care techniques and continued education of ambulance personnel it will continue to do so.

The cost of obtaining equipment and training people to use it is often high and this cost is ultimately borne by the public. In larger cities, county and city subsidies often help meet the cost of hiring and training personnel and purchasing equipment. In the smaller, rural areas, the problem of funding often seems insurmountable. In many areas concerned citizens are volunteering their time to serve their communities and attend ECA or EMT programs at their own expense. All too often, in spite of these people who wish to work as non-paid volunteers, city or county governments feel that the cost of purchasing and equipping an ambulance is prohibitive. The result is trained personnel and no equipment, which translates into lives lost. Lives that could have been saved.

How much is a life worth? Most people will agree that there is no price tag. Why then, do we often let the price tag in an ambulance or ambulance equipment prevent us from saving lives? For the sake of humanity, it is time for the people and governments of rural areas to work together to find ways to meet cost and provide the care that their communities and counties need. State and federal aid programs, tax bonds, contributions, and many other means are available to provide a solution to the problem. There is no easy solution, but saving lives is never really simple, is it?

Ice, Snow Freeze Area On Week End

Ice, sleet and snow limited mobility and activity in the Cross Plains area last week end. Rain showers fell over this area early Friday morning as thunder was heard and lightning was seen. That performance was repeated early Saturday, but to a lesser degree and most of the precipitation at that time was in form of sleet or snow.

Impending bad weather with ice forming on man-made objects and vegetation off the ground, curtailed area activities last Friday night. Very hazardous driving condition hampered mobility Saturday most of the day, and especially early Sunday. Church attendance suffered greatly because of the slick road conditions.

Most roadways in this section of the state were clear to "passable" by mid-afternoon Sunday, and by Tuesday mid-morning only patches of the white ice could be seen in shaded areas.

The moisture brought by the showers, ice, sleet and snow was needed and appreciated. R. T. Watson recorded 1.45 inches at his place between here and Burkett, and Roger Watson's gauge showed 1.25 near

Burkett. One gauge in Cross Plains measured 1.55 inches. Hadden Payne, who lives several miles west of town received 1.75 inches, and opined that more sleet fell in that area than was received in town.

Temperatures plunged to the

lower twenties early Saturday, and upon partially clearing the mercury dipped well below the 20-degree level early Sunday.

Executive To Brief Local Oil Folk Here Thursday

Glen Michel, Executive Vice-President of West Central Texas Oil and Gas Association in Abilene, will be in Cross Plains, Thursday, February 14, at 10 a.m., at the Multi-Purpose Center to brief the oil operators and royalty owners on state and federal matters pertaining to the oil industry. Primary topic for the meeting will be the current windfall profits tax bill affecting the oil industry which is under consideration in the Conference Committee in the Congress. Also to be discussed will be current matters concerning the voting records of the Texas Delegation and regulations affecting the oil operators regarding environmental matters, Occupational Safety and Health Administration matters and will touch on the current natural gas regulations.

On the state level, Mr. Michel will visit with those attending on matters concerning the pres-

ent possibility of the State Highway Commission leasing right-of-ways for oil and gas, the possibility of a new statute mandating a time limit on covering of pits, and new changes in some Railroad Commission rules.

The windfall profits tax is of prime importance to the oil and gas operators. However, all royalty owners, both land royalty owners and overriding royalty owners, will be affected very much by the new law about to go into effect and it would be to the benefit of everyone in the area to find out how this will affect their pay checks that they receive from the purchasing companies who purchase their oil. At the conclusion of Mr. Michel's remarks, there will be a question and answer period and he has agreed to stay as long as there are those in the audience that need to have questions answered.

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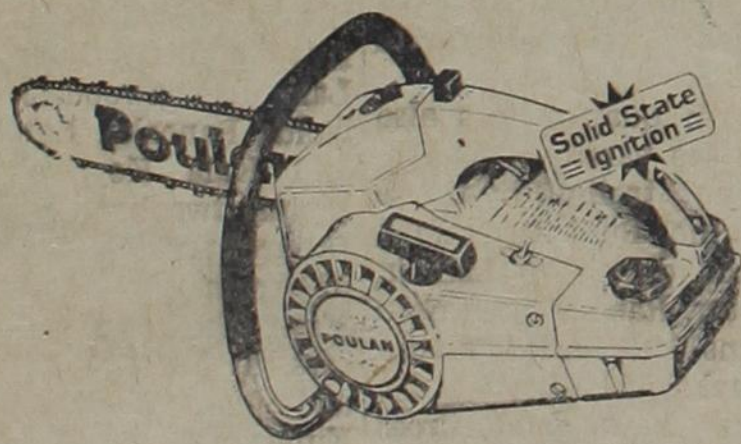
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Cottonwood

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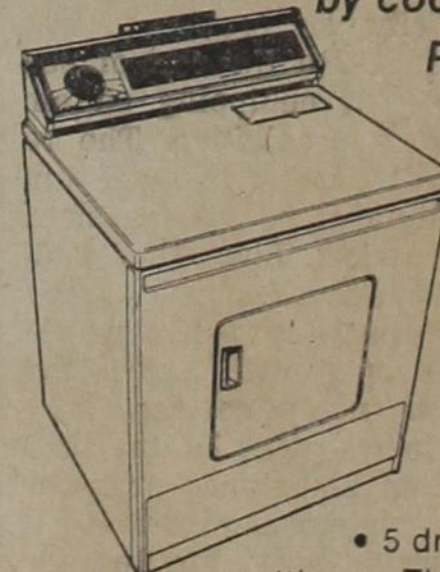

The disaster of Sunday morning, February 10th, 1980, pinpoints what I mean when I say there must be a change before the low and moderate income elderly are blown away. I expect nothing in the Cross Plains Review about the extent of the loss of gas pressure and any injuries or deaths caused directly by it. Unless the "City Dads" worked on the problem Sunday this will be the first alarm.

All I know is that my wall, vented gas furnace and my hot water heater lost so much gas pressure both pilots went out. This must have happened well after midnight as the hot water had not frozen. Knowing from past experience that preheating is necessary when the gas supply line is chilled I used a refrigerator defroster blower and both pilots lighted the first trial.

What do I suggest a proper City Governing body should do? Find out exactly what caused the loss of pressure, how it will be prevented from ever happening again and if it only occurred in the blighted area, the slum, the ghetto, that area South of Texas 36 and from B to Chestnut.

Of course the rudimentary safety precautions of sending the Police Squad Car through-out the affected area to warn all concerned that if their unvented gas heaters have gone out they should not be relied until the deadly fumes have been exhausted. The Gas Utility should send their crews out to make certain that any elderly and/or infirm are assisted in relighting their gas heaters. After all, we are paying so much for gas we should get at least rudimentary care from the Gas Company and the "City Dads".

It may seem to many that no one can fight "City Hall" and win. That is not entirely true. If you read last week's article you may remember that out of \$1,500,000 of HUD only some 50 homes were to be rehabilitated. But originally this was only 3. Because of my agitation, nit picking and making a nuisance of myself the Triumvirate graciously increased the amount 17 times, rather than the 100 times their own survey showed it should be.

On the occasion of the last tax notices I took advantage of the so called tax meeting to prepare an evaluation of the increase and presented it at the so-called meeting. That meeting, parenthetically, was the best example of the Communistic Divide and Conquer principle I have ever seen. There was no meeting, two individuals at a time were conducted into the back room to tables separated by some ten feet. There, where there could be no riotous dispute or engendering of unseemly indignation the 300 percent

tax increase was disposed of. There may be no connection but a special meeting of the "City Dads" was held very soon after the presentation of my evaluation and the increase lowered to 200%.

It should be noted that in addition to the extremely high gas rate the low and moderate income elderly are subjected to unjust charges by the "City Dads". My neighbor to the South has no connection to the Sewer, she is tied into my 4" tile line but she pays \$36 a year for this, the same as a family of eight which imposes eight times the burden upon the sewerage system. This charge of \$36 a year for an elderly single person should be reduced to \$10 for one and \$20 for two elderly people. The existing demand charge of \$36 a year, for no consumption of potable water should be dropped entirely, at least in the case of the low-income elderly. This would mean, in the case of the mentioned neighbor, that she would not be mulcted of \$106 a year.

As evidence of my putting my money where my mouth is I offer to pay filing fees for one woman candidate for Mayor and two women candidates for Councilman. I suggest for Mayor the lady who may be observed through the North window of the store South of 7th Street on Main Street; for Councilman the lady who owns a variegated emporium on Main Street and another lady who owns or manages a resting place for the weary traveler. None of these three have been approached by me to run for office and none of them know of this advertisement.

As the present "City Dads" or at least the Triumvirate, have assumed the right to do anything they wish within the Street and Avenue Right of Ways within the City of Cross Plains I feel they must be removed from office before they make a barren waste of the magnificent tree-lined streets in the North East section of town. So that drunken or reckless drivers can not run into trees that are not there.

Although the destruction of the magnificent grass strip separating the dirt street from my property by the "City Dads" has given me some ten hours a week free time it is impossible to mow non-existent grass unless there is a complete change in the "City Dads" I can no longer waste my faculties and vigor upon the correction of the manifold deficiencies of the HUR Community Development Block Grant. If there is such a change I shall gladly give the NEW Brooms all the help I can, always of course within the moral and ethical bounds properly limiting any professional work.

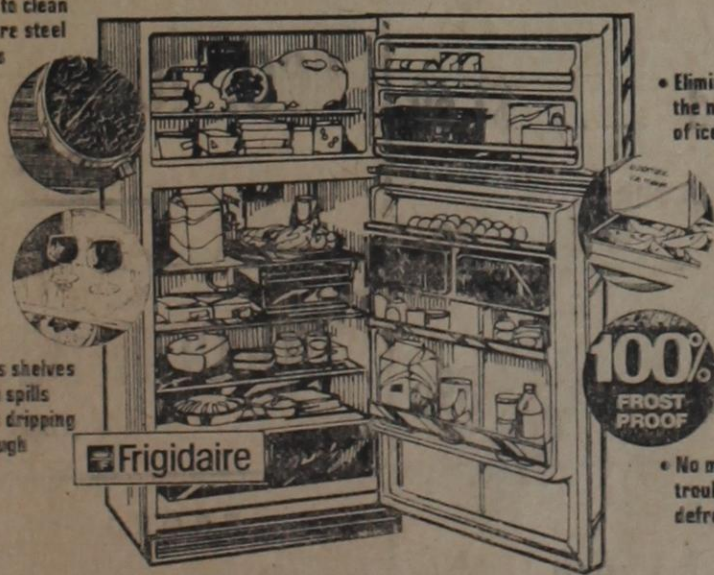

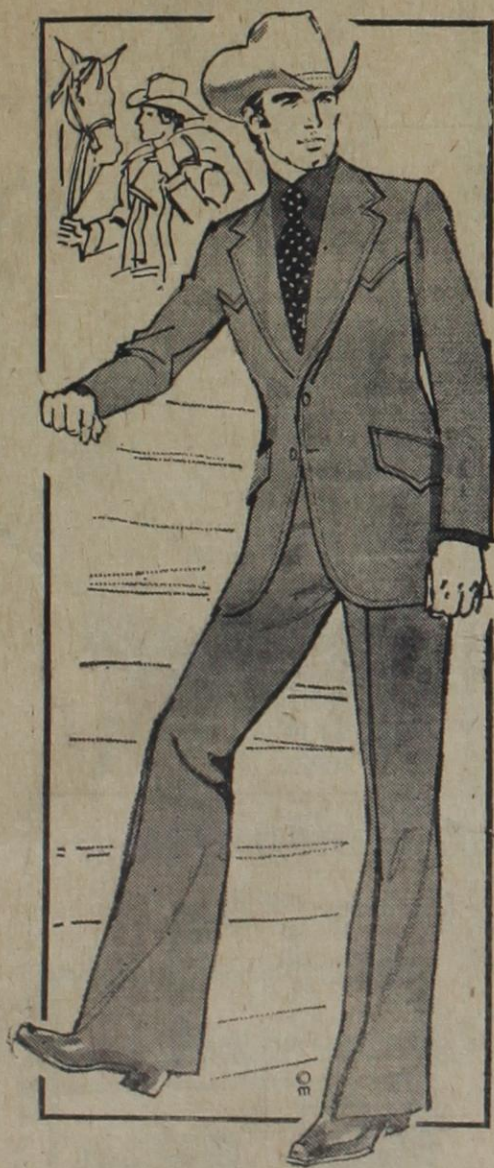
