RAISE NEARLY \$200 FOR PARK

SOROSIS CLUB TAG DAY IS
SUCCESS, HIRE LAND-
SCAPE TO LAY
OUT PARK

The municipal park tag day drive conducted by the members of the Sorosis club last Friday and Saturday was a decided success, according to Mrs. H. C. Brillhart, president of the club, and \$196.50 was raised to start off the improvement program with considerable more promised.

Immediate action was taken following the drive in getting a definite plan to work toward and J. P. Boyd of the Canadian Floral company, a landscape gardener of considerable note met with the members of the committee in charge on Wednesday of this week and discussed plans for the work.

"Perryton is to be congratulated," Mr. Boyd said, "in having such a splendid plot of ground, so admirably located for a park. It is ideal for this purpose, easily accessible, and can be made into a place of beauty." Mr. Boyd advised developing the park on a two or three year program. In this connection he offered to draw up the plans and specifications for a fee of \$35.00, which proposition was accepted by the committee.

Mr. Boyd expects to submit his preliminary plans in from two to three weeks. As soon as the plans can be decided upon the work of piping the water supply and laying out the drives and walks will be started. Mr. Boyd stated that he would not advise any planting this year as the season was too advanced, but that everything necessary could be done for an early start next year.

SUICIDE TURNS TO BE MURDER?

WIDOW AND BROTHER-IN-LAW
INDICTED FOR MURDER
OF GEO. E. BOND
MERCER, TEX.

Word was received in Perryton on October 23, 1929, that Geo. E. Bond, a former resident of this county, had committed suicide by shooting himself at Mercedes, Texas, in the lower Rio Grande valley, where he was operating an automobile tourist camp and a citrus fruit farm. Now it appears that Mr. Bond was murdered and it was not a case of his taking his own life.

Through the efforts of his brother and other relatives who live in this section an investigation was started by District Attorney Rogers Kelley of Edinburg, Texas. Attorney Kelley employed W. J. Pottoff, head of the Bureau of Identification and investigation of Ochiltree county, to make the investigation. Mr. Pottoff unearthed sufficient evidence to cause the grand jury of Hidalgo county to return indictments against the widow, Mrs. Maudie Bond, and her brother-in-law, Otis O. Glover, charging them with the murder of Mr. Bond. Mrs. Bond is at present at liberty under bond. It is understood that since the tragic death of Bond, that she has married a man by the name of Roy Davidson. She is reported to be only twenty-eight years of age while Bond was about sixty years of age. Glover, the brother-in-law, is now in jail at Cheyenne, Okla., charged with arson and we understand that he will be released to the Texas authorities just as soon as he stands trial.

The Interstate Railroad Commission, Tuesday granted the Santa Fe permission to build a railroad from Amarillo north to Las Animas, Colorado. Decision on the application of the Santa Fe to build from Dumas across to Spearman, connecting up with the Shattuck-Perryton-Spearman branch was withheld on account of pending negotiations between the Santa Fe and the Rock Island over point trackage rights, so the commission announced.

The official 1930 census will give Perryton a population of 2817, according to the final figures which have been sent in by J. M. Bull, enumerator for Perryton and Ochiltree county. The preliminary report issued by Supervisor Galen E. Smith, Amarillo, was 2776, but this report has been supplemented by additional names from Mr. Bull. It is thought that this final tally is fairly accurate.

BIG PIPE LINE NEAR PERRYTON

LINE FROM BORGER FIELD TO
CHICAGO WILL PASS THRU
OCHILTREE COUNTY
NEAR PERRYTON

J. G. Scott, representative of the Empire Oil Co., has been working out of Perryton for the past few days obtaining rightaway for the building of the immense twenty-two inch line which the Standard group made up of Insull Son & Co., Cities Service Co., Texas Co., Phillips Petroleum Co., Skelley Oil Co., and the Columbian Oil Co. propose to build from the Borger field to Chicago by way of Omaha.

The line will come from the southeast corner of Moore county, pass about one mile west of Spearman, running through the northwest part of this county, the nearest point to Perryton being about eight miles distant, thence on an air line to Forgan, then straight for Omaha and on to Chicago.

The line will be 950 miles long and the initial installation will consist of a single main with pumping stations, so constructed to facilitate the laying of parallel mains as the consumption is increased. A single pipe line of twenty-two inch will deliver upwards of 100,000,000 cubic feet of natural gas daily.

The first cost of the line will be "many millions of dollars" and officers state that a more accurate guess is impossible until full engineering details have been completed.

ENROLLMENT IS 956, OFFICIAL

PERRYTON SCHOOL SHOWING
MARKED GROWTH; EX-
PECTED OVER 1100
NEXT TERM

Up to date there have been 956 pupils enrolled in the Perryton schools, the latest official check of the records show, during the 1929-30 term. This is considerably more than was expected at the beginning of the term.

The scholastic census of the district indicates that there will be 1191 for next year. No doubt many were missed and others are coming to this country every week. Under ordinary conditions, an enrollment of at least 1,100 is expected in the Perryton schools next year, counting the six year old children who are to enter.

Texas produced 99.99 per cent of all sulphur produced in the United States in 1929. Nevada and Utah produced the other 0.01 per cent.

Texas has the largest tract of land owned by a single family in the United States—the King ranch of 1,200,000 acres, or 1,875 square miles.

The National City Bank, have arranged to manufacture commercial dirigibles of huge size, on the successful Zeppelin design, in both Germany and the United States. It will be a year or more before the first of these is ready for service, but within five years we may look to see an immense volume of freight and passenger traffic carried by air in these huge ships. Meantime, other Americans are experimenting with allmetal dirigibles on a smaller scale, and those look promising.

EUROPA

The fastest passenger ship in the world is the new German Europa, which crossed from Cherbourg to New York in four days, 17 hours and six minutes. The next fastest is the Bremen, also a German ship, which did the trip in only 17 minutes slower time. There are only three ships in the world larger than the Europa and the Bremen. They also were built in Germany. They are the Majestic, originally the Bismarck, seized during the war by Great Britain, the Leviathan, originally the Vaterland, seized by the United States, and the Berengaria, originally the Imperator.

Commercially speaking, these big fast ships are not profitable. Speed costs too much. But as advertisements of their respective nations they pay large dividends in goodwill. Just now Germany seems to be getting most of it.

DRUDGERY

The world is full of people, especially young folk, who thing there is some short cut to fame and fortune. They try to write stories and poems, paint pictures, carve statues, act leading roles on the stage or make their fortunes in business, without serving the long and painful apprenticeship which always precedes real success. It can't be done.

Just now two young men who broadcast a Negro comedy feature every night are attracting world-wide attention. "Amos 'n Andy" are reported to be drawing a salary of \$100,000 a year, so thousands of young men who think that is easy money are trying to break into the same game.

The young men who are earning a fortune for their ability as entertainers went through years of ill-paid, long-hour drudgery before they became masters of their art. So did every other great artist in any line. So did every man or woman who has made a success in business or industry. Young people don't believe that. It was true when the pyramids were built; it will still be true when they have crumbled into the dust.

FEDERAL FARM BOARD STATES VIEWS ON THE FUTURE MARKET IDEA

In response to a request from the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Forestry, the Federal Farm Board has sent the following letter to Senator Charles L. McNary, chairman of the committee:

"April 12, 1930.
Hon. Charles L. McNary,
United States Senate.
Dear Senator:

"I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of April 10, asking that the Federal Farm Board express its views in connection with Senate Bill 4129 entitled 'To Prevent the Sale of Cotton and Grain in Futures Markets.'

"Inasmuch as the handling, processing, and financing of several of our major crops are so completely based on the present futures market system which has been in operation for many years, we are fearful that so drastic a change would completely upset the marketing machinery, although we realize the need for improvement. We think a change, in order to avoid disruption, will have to come gradually.

"We believe that decided improvement in the present system could be accomplished if the exchanges were placed under proper supervision and control of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, with power to intervene whenever the Secretary of Agriculture finds any operations in the farm commodity futures markets are antagonistic to the best interests of producers or consumers, or both.

indications of the stability of Perryton's growth is the fact that during the past year or so, it has been recognized as the logical location for district offices for a number of large corporations and business firms. Many towns and counties in the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandle are now served from this city.

The utility corporations: the Texas-Louisiana Power Co., the Standard Telephone Co. and the Public Service Gas Corporation, maintain district offices and warehouses in Perryton. The Texas State Highway Commission has a district office and warehouse here with a resident engineer, maintenance foreman and a large number of employees headquarters in Perryton.

In the implement line, the following companies have district headquarters in this city: John Deere, J. I. Case, Advance-Rumely, Oliver, and Caterpillar. The latter company operated by the Plains Tractor and Equipment Co. has recently opened up a large distributing warehouse. The Perryton Coca-Cola Co. serves five counties in Texas and Oklahoma. The Perryton Equity Exchange, one of the most successful institutions of its kind in the world, operates a line of elevators from the Perryton office.

The Shearer Produce Co. of this city has buying stations located in a number of other towns and ships in carload lots from Perryton. Roper & Witt are wholesale tire dealers, serving many cities in this section. The Wilson Funeral Homes, with headquarters here, are an institution in all of the leading towns of the north Panhandle. The Maytag Washing Machine Co. ships carload lots of machines to their district office here and distributes by truck to the other towns.

Perryton is the home of the North Plains Poultry Association, which has members in eight counties in Texas and Oklahoma. The Perryton Motor Co. is distributor for Chevrolet cars and trucks and Goodyear tires. W. C. Bryan & Son have recently opened a branch store in Spearman. Cone's Radiator Shop has a branch shop in Booker. The Johnson Motor Co. is distributor for Quaker State Motor oils. T. C. Shaw, with headquarters in Perryton, is distributor for a number of counties for Deleo light systems and Frigidaires.

It is logical that Perryton should become a district center, as it is far removed from other larger sup-

ply centers and is located in the heart of a fertile agricultural country. A number of other large concerns have their eye on Perryton and it is predicted that many other district offices and wholesale houses will be located here within the next few years.

light a cold light. This makes for economy in current consumption and reduces the cost of illumination to about 6 per cent the usual cost of a similar sign.

Neon is an inert gas, non-explosive and incombustible, and the various colors used in the signs are secured by mixing Neon with other elements such as mercury, argon, etc., in varying proportions. Neon, when mixed in the proportion of 80 per cent Neon, 10 per cent mercury and 10 per cent argon, the light is blue and when this same mixture is used in amber colored tubing it shows green. Twenty-six different colors and shades can be produced.

The new air washer was installed by the Buffalo Engineering company of Dallas, built by the Carrier Air Washer company. Air is sucked in by the ventilating fan, through fins that are covered by a fine spray of water. The water is kept spraying on the fins by means of a centrifugal pump operated with electric motor. The air when forced into the theatre, is fresh and cold.

When the ventilating fans are running wide open it forces air into the interior at the rate of 20,000 cubic feet per minute.

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Sunday School Lesson

International Sunday School Lesson for May 4
PROMOTION IN THE KINGDOM
Matthew 20:17-28

Companionship on a walk has much to do in determining the value of the afternoon. Steadily Jesus and the Twelve were approaching Jerusalem where the Jewish Passover would soon be celebrated. It was school time daily for these men who would soon be left alone to carry on the work for which they left their fishing nets, receipt of custom and other occupations. They were in Peraea, the region on the further side of the Jordan river.

Jesus often spoke in parables as He told them about the establishment and development of the Kingdom of Heaven. The last message had been under the simile of the owner of the vineyard who hired men at different times during the day and paid each one the same amount at the end of the day. That plan would start an interesting row in organized labor if it was tried today. Jesus kept his contract with all and added a bonus to those who began later in the day. Just like the complainers, the disciples were thinking of material things and forgot about the spiritual aspect of the Kingdom.

On two previous occasions, as recorded in Matthew 18:21 and 17:22, Jesus had told His disciples about his death by crucifixion that would take place in ending His earthly ministry. This fact was now even more constantly in the mind of the Saviour. Now addition details are presented, and the climax is less than three months away. An important situation is pictured by Mark in 10:32, and the disciples were both amazed and afraid. It was because their Friend seemed to draw apart from them, as He was the more absorbed in His meditation and went on ahead. Already He was tasting the "cup" that would soon be spoken of.

Evidently there had been a family discussion, for we find that Jesus and John, as well as their mother Salome, made the same urgent request of Jesus, who may have been a cousin, since many think that Mary and Salome were sisters. They are sure that something will soon take place in establishing the Kingdom that has been mentioned so often. James and John boldly ask that each be made a prime minister in the new commonwealth and Salome supports their plea. If she did not offer the request, this early petition may have been to get ahead of Peter and the others. When the fact is known the ten are indignant because some sought to get the advantage over the others. When Jesus makes reply he has rebuke and instruction for all alike.

When told about the suffering that lay ahead, these prospectors claim that they are able to "drink the cup." Some did in later years, for James was a martyr. Peter had prison experiences and John was exiled to Patmos when about 100 years old. All were told that the real way to greatness was not by seeking a position of distinction but by serving others in every way that might be possible; and even unto death. The title that Jesus makes very honorable is that of "minister," or "servant" as given in the margin. Parables had been used on other occasions to make the truth very plain and now Jesus makes Himself an acted parable. He invites them to think back over His life during the past three years that they had been with Him and reveals the highway to real greatness in our Golden Text: "The Son of man came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, and to give his life a ransom for many." Matthew 20:28. As we are eager to do His will we are more concerned in developing character as we serve others than in attaining a crown by seeking it.

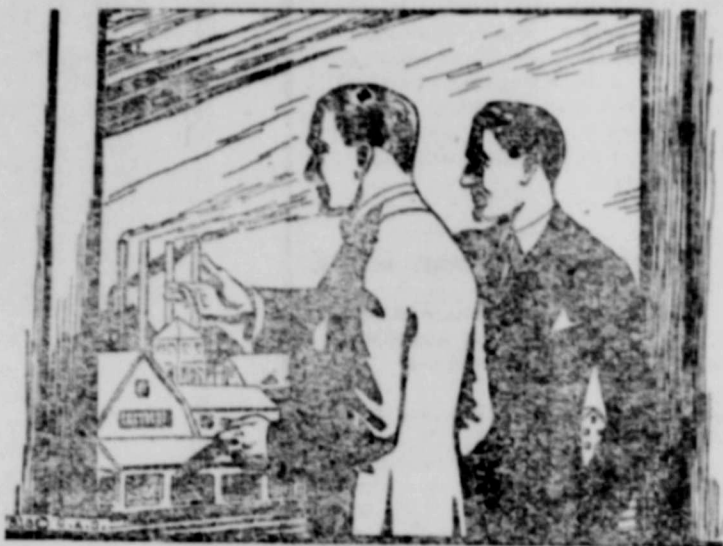

Government Not Greed, Roads Not Raskob, Taxes Not Roads

By Lynch Davidson

Houston, April 30.—Texas Democratic candidates were urged in a statement issued here today by Lynch Davidson, former lieutenant governor and chairman of the party's harmony organization in 1928, to "throw no bombs which might wreck party solidarity and make way for Republican victories in the state."

"We are accustomed to laugh at Republican talk of capturing state officers and we can afford to laugh so long as we do not become divided in our state campaigns as we did in the last national campaign," said Mr. Davidson.

"But we must remember that the Texas Republican patronage ring, fattened by its slot machine distribution of state offices, is keeping greedy eyes alert for a rift in our party ranks. They have openly exulted at the chance to bring forth some disgruntled Democratic candidate under the robe of 'independent' or 'fusionist' but wearing the soiled banner of the G. O. P. beneath. The chance is real, unless our leading candidates leave mud slinging and rock throwing to the petty political racketeers."

"Happily, ninety per cent of Texas Democrats can now agree upon one thing that caused strife in the national election—the chairmanship of John J. Raskob. His removal, as I recently suggested, should be urged by the party convention, after the Democratic nominees have been selected."

"But this is a matter for the party, in its family gathering, to attend to. Let no candidate, before the nominations, try to steal the privilege for self-serving political purposes."

"When the time does come, the party as a whole should make its demand as a plank in the state platform. There will be little division. The wets can come into the camp of the dries on this. It will not be difficult to unhorse Raskob. He is so extreme, so politically clumsy, so vulnerable. And he is very dangerous to the Democratic Party. For he has kindled and rekindled fires that should have smoldered out."

"Mr. Raskob, in fact, is just about the ablest Democratic Chairman the Republicans could have."

"Our high party councils should have no place for fanaticism, wet or dry. We should keep out the Hefflines as leaders as well as throw out the Raskobs. They harm no one except the Party they profess to serve."

"But let the candidates leave these fall cleaning matters to the Party as a whole. Government not greed, roads not Raskob, and taxes not Tammany, should be their campaign texts. Let them throw no bombs which might wreck party solidarity and make way for Republican victories in the state."

—a problem which William Green, President of the American Federation of Labor, tells the Senate, will result in a government dole or revolution unless it is solved.

Senator Couzens puts the responsibility thus:

"I do not charge you men with being inhuman. I charge you men with being careless, with being thoughtless of the results of your failure to solve this problem, and I have a right to charge it, because ten years ago I had the honor of being your Mayor when 150,000 men were laid off in a day by the snap of a finger at the command of industry and we, your city servants, were left to grapple with the situation; we were left to find a way to buy shoes and milk tickets, pay rent, and send children to school.

"You passed it off like the water on a duck's back. Government

come to the relief. But you paid for it, however. You paid for it through taxation, and you will continue to pay for it, believe me, you will pay for it, and you will pay for it in the most expensive way; you will pay for it through government, which is the most expensive way.

"You can prevent high taxes; you can prevent bureaucrats from interfering with the progress and the development of business; you can prevent officials from sending out forms by the bushel for you to fill out and return, if you will solve these problems for yourselves. Government does not interfere with business until business itself has created the necessity."

Having repeated this warning for the benefit of industry at large, Senator Couzens remarks on the Bolshevik criticism of our capitalistic system: "We give everybody the opportunity for such criticism so long as we neglect the human factors that live by our capitalistic system. Those who profit by it, those who make money out of the efforts of human beings, have an obligation to those human beings."

"We are our brothers' keepers," Senator Couzens reminds us, though he acknowledges that he is not a church-goer. He does not find fault with those who do go to church. But he does find fault with "the man, church-goer or not, who employs labor to create wealth and luxury

for himself, and neglects the workers when he finds it convenient to keep them on his pay-roll.

During the time he was in the motor-car business, Senator Couzens saw periods of depression come as one came last winter, when industry laid off thousands of men, millions of men.

"Does that mean anything to you?" he asks of industry:

"Does it mean anything to you that 2,000,000 men with perhaps 15,000,000 people to support are out of work in the United States? Do you realize that the decreased purchasing power and the decreased consuming power of these people means anything to American business? Did it not accentuate the difficulty? Who ever heard of a person having a fever doing things to make the temperature go higher? Yet that is what American business has been doing. So long as we fail to stabilize production and employment, we are walking into trouble such as we have been in this winter."

Senator Couzens would like, then, to repeat to American employers generally what he said to the employers of Michigan:

"This unemployment situation that enters into this winter's depression is your fault; no one's but yours. You could have prevented it. You could have refrained from your high pressure salesmanship; your forcing luxuries upon people who are unable to buy them, which you in sane moments know they can

never pay for. But you will say that a man ought to know enough not to buy these things. You will say that people must protect themselves. You will say that you can not help it if a man is foolish enough to buy beyond his means to pay. But I submit, gentlemen, that you are the ones who have forced upon them through your high pressure salesmanship and your ambition and desire to keep up production to the sky, have forced upon millions of people in this country articles which they can never pay for.

"I wonder if you really thought that this pyramiding of installment sales up into the billions of dollars could keep up. Did you really think there was no stop to it? Did you really think that people would go on buying on the installment plan forever and ever? You had a temporary benefit from it, but you are paying the price now. You will continue to pay the price every time you disobey sound economic laws; and I submit that it is unsound and uneconomic to force upon people by the millions luxuries which you know they can not afford to pay for.

"Gentlemen, we do not follow through. We are all taught when we play golf to follow through, but we are never taught to follow through on some of our economic policies. We are too anxious to grab the dollar of the day, and let posterity take care of itself; but we are

overtaken by posterity before we get through. There isn't any answer to that; you know it, and that is the reason, because you have known it, that you are to blame for not having taken cognizance of the fact; that is the reason we are in this state of affairs today.

"I do not care how much propaganda is sent out, how many statements are issued that business is sound; I do not care how many brilliant college professors and captains of industry issue statements that business is normal. I am here to try, if I can, from my experience and observations to instill upon you men the necessity for recognizing sound economic principles and adhering to them; for stabilizing the income of the workers so that they can consume, for by that means only can you stabilize business and have good business."

Stabilization of income must be accomplished by business, warns the Michigan Senator, or it will be accomplished by the Government "through unemployment insurance, through old age insurance and all the other sorts of insurance necessary to preserve human life."

As some of the railroads, great utility companies, great manufacturing concerns, have already done, says Senator Couzens,

"It will be more human, and American employers would have an easier conscience, if they took enough earnings out of fat years to stabilize the income of the work-

ers during the lean years. If every industry were to pay its men by the year instead of by the hour or the day, industry would find a way to stabilize its production so that it got its money's worth.

"Competent management finds a way to go through periods of depression, and it can find a way to help its workers through them.

"Men are unthinking; they are careless, they are thoughtless about the results of their acts, but they are not heartless, and it is my hope, in presenting this matter as I have, that others will present it in such a way as will really wake up our consciences."

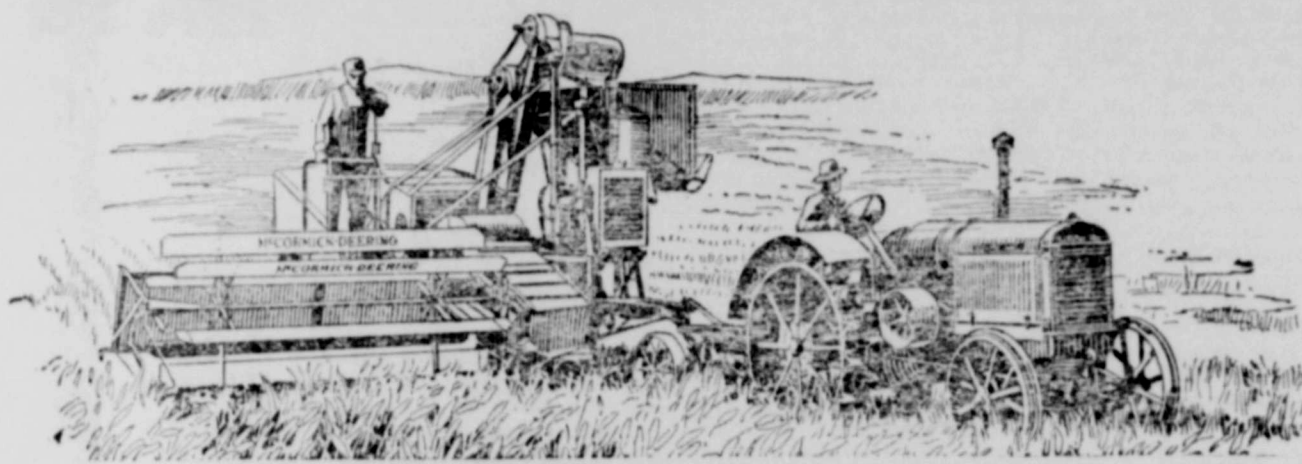

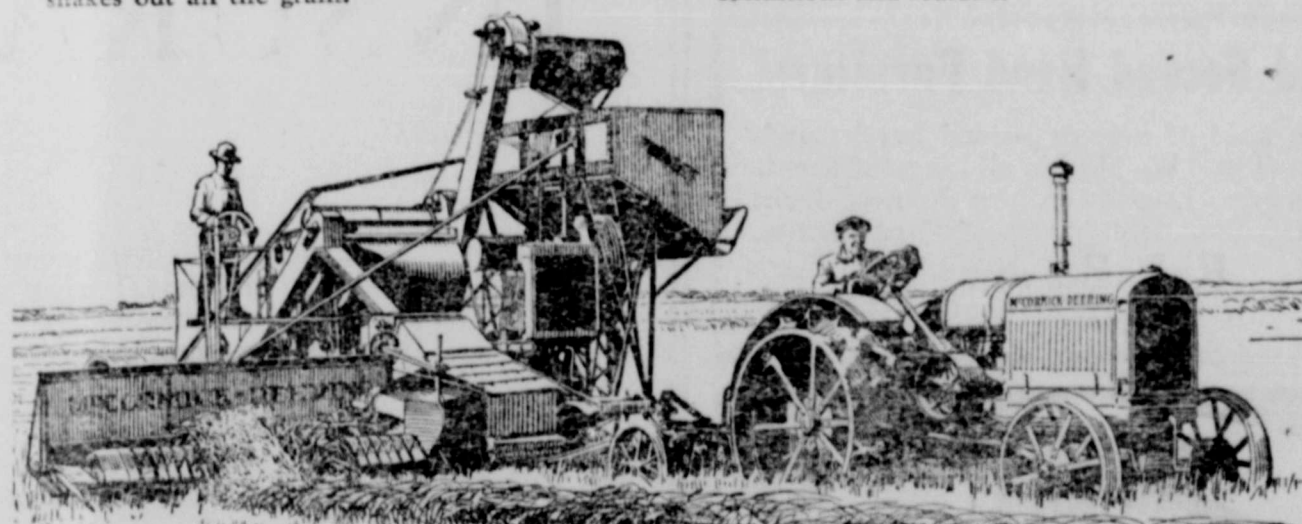
