### GROUND-BREAKING SET SUNDAY

## Daughter of Church's Founder Attends Anniversary Banquet

First Presbyterian Church here Sunday afternoon breaks ground for a new \$50,000 educational building.

The 4 p.m. ceremony at Chestnut and E. Fifth St. will be the climactic event of the church's 75th anniversary observance.

Turning the first spadeful of dirt for the new building will be Rev. Earl Clary, pastor, and representatives from various organizations and age groups of the church.

A diamond anniversary tea in the First Presbyterian parlor will follow the ground breaking.

Sunday morning during the regular worship hour the church will conduct a "service of praise" with the minister, Rev. Clary, emphasizing "building on a foundation of Christ for service."

The 75th anniversary observance by First Presbyterian, the first church organized in Colorado City, opened Thursday night

with an anniversary dinner at the church. The dinner marked the official birthday since the church was founded May 3, 1881. More than 100 persons attended the dinner and heard Rev. R. Gage Lloyd, pastor of First Presbyterian Church in Big Spring and son of an early circuit minister of El Paso Presbytery.

Glenn Robinson, member of the church board, was master of ceremonies for the dinner.

Receiving corsages and special recognition from the pastor at the dinner were Miss Claudia Rogers of Dallas, Miss Nellie Riordan and Miss Mildred Coleman.

Miss Rogers is the daughter of the late Rev. O. F. Rogers, who moved here with his wife and family Feb. 19, 1881, and organized the community's first church.

Miss Riordan was introduced as the person with the longest membership in the church. Her father, the late Jeremiah Riordan, was a founder and senior elder of the pioneer church.

Miss Coleman is the daughter of the late Dr. P. C. Coleman, senior elder when the church began its second building program.

Speaking briefly at the dinner was Dr. John Elliott, pastor of Calvary Presbyterian Church in Fort Worth and son of Mrs. W. M. and the late Dr. Elliott, who was pastor when the second building program — the present church

building — was completed in 1925.

Highlights in the church history were related by Mrs. Gerald Gordon during a program in the sanctuary that followed the dinner.

### STRAIN RESIGNS POST

## Soil District Will Aid Demonstration

Supervisors of Mitchell County Soil Conservation District Thursday accepted with regret the resignation of J. L. Strain.

Strain, supervisor for the district's northwest Zone 4, is resigning from the board of supervisors because of his health. He is recuperating from a heart attack.

Election to name a successor for the Zone 4 supervisor will be scheduled after proper legal notice for district cooperators in the zone.

The conservation district supervisors voted to join with Junior Chamber of Commerce agriculture committee in sponsorship of a root plowing and seeding demonstration on acreage at the W. R. (Jinks) Powell Ranch.

Acreage on the Powell Ranch, off State Highway 101 to Sterling City, is being developed by the Jaycees as a special conservation and experimental plot. The conservation district voted

to appropriate \$20 for purchase of seed to be used in the joint demonstration.

The district supervisors also voted to arrange conservation features in a tour being sponsored this year by the Mitchell County Hereford Breeders Association. Originally planned as a Hereford tour, the project is being enlarged to also include outstanding conservation programs and other features like caged laying.

After their Thursday meeting the supervisors visited the Roy Buchanan place southeast of Colorado City to inspect an excellent stand of blue panic grass. The grass, planted last July 15 on 17 acres of crop land, stands six to eight inches high after already being grazed down once this year.

Color slides showing root plowing and range land seeding at Sterling City were viewed by the board during the regular meeting.

## Stock Feeding Winners Visit Fort Worth

Winners in the commercial stock program of Mitchell County 4-H & FFA Livestock Show returned late Saturday from a two-day trip to Fort Worth.

The all-expense paid trip was their award for their feeding projects in the commercial phase of the livestock show.

Making the trip were Waymon Thurman, Donald Holman, Gene Blasingame, Terry Northcutt, Charles Northcutt, Richard Keathley, Melvin Walker, Tommy Hammond and Wayne McFerrin.

With them was their sponsor, Gene Williams, vocational agriculture teacher.

In the commercial program of the show an entrant must feed at least one steer or three hogs or five sheep on a commercial basis.

The commercial section of the annual county show was started this year to encourage youths and to teach youths the value of commercial feeding as accomplished by farmers and ranchers on the actual market.

The award-winning trip included visits to Swift & Company packing plant and stockyards in Fort Worth. There they saw the complete process of marketing of livestock, slaughtering of animals and processing of the meat.

A group of freshmen vocational agriculture students aren't letting lack of experience stand in the way of an outstanding record for their Future Farmer chapter.

Under the tutelage of Loraine High's vocational agriculture instructor, Raymond Holt, they are earning top recognition in cotton, beef and poultry judging contests.

In fact, the poultry grading team — Darrell Owen, David Redwine and Bobby Compton — was in College Station Saturday for a state contest on Texas A&M Campus.

Wayne Cleaver, Franky Beights and Sanford Bowlin are the first-year ag students on the FFA cotton classification team.

Seeing high in meat judging has been Ronald Haley.

In the Area II contest last week in Lubbock the team of Cleaver, Beights and Bowlin won second in the cotton contest. And Bowlin was fifth highest individual contestant in cotton grading at the area meet.

Haley scored the highest individual score at Lubbock in meat judging and was fourth in the overall meat contest.

Redwine compiled the fifth highest score in poultry grading at Lubbock and his team, which includes Owen and Compton, won the right there to participate in the state meet in College Station.

Holt, the ag teacher and FFA sponsor at Loraine, figures that the record by the group is outstanding for first-year students.

## Extra Holiday Favored in Merchant Poll

Local merchants and business men are voicing heavy support for shorter store hours this summer and an extra holiday in the fall.

Opinions concerning summer store hours and holiday observances throughout the year are being obtained in a mail poll conducted by Chamber of Commerce merchants committee.

Trend for the summer hours and the additional holiday was strongly evident in the first 30 ballots returned in the poll.

Summer store hours favored in the balloting are from 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. weekdays and from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Saturdays.

Seven holiday observances are favored in the balloting. Six are the same as observed by local firms last year and include Memorial Day, Wednesday, May 30; Independence Day, Wednesday, July 4; Labor Day, Monday, Sept. 3; Thanksgiving, Thursday, Nov. 22; Christmas, Tuesday, Dec. 25; and New Year's Day, Tuesday, Jan. 1.

Supported as an additional holiday observance by stores and businesses is Veterans Day, Monday, Nov. 12.

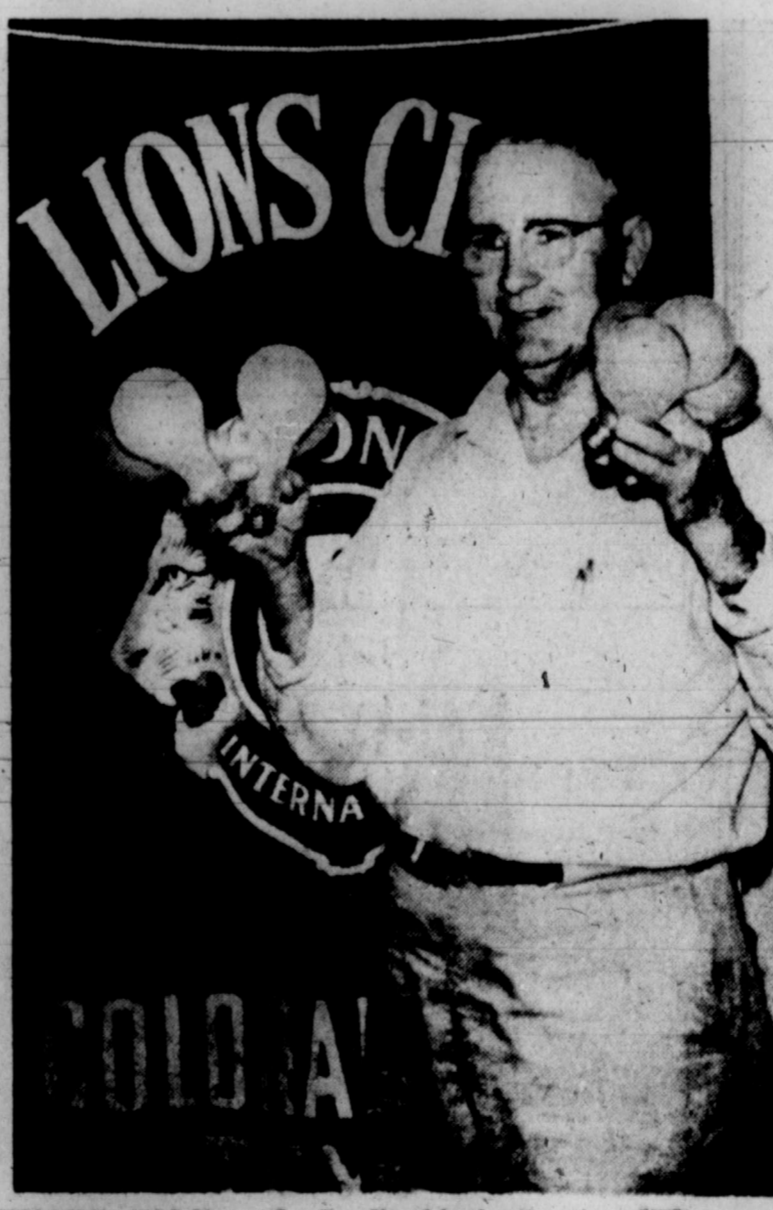

**Visitors to View Advantages of Remodeling in Kelley Residence**

Striking advantages of remodeling will be shown when visitors are invited to tour the home of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Kelley at 614 East 6th Street.

The tour — third annual Pilgrimage of Homes to be sponsored by the 1949 Study Club — will be conducted Thursday from 7 p.m. until 9 p.m.

All partitions and inside structure in the down stairs area were removed during recent remodeling of the early-American style brick home with its white wrought iron trim at front and side entrances.

The house, air-conditioned, consists of four bedrooms, a sitting room, three baths, utility room, dressing room, den, kitchen,

breakfast room, living-dining room combination and several large walk-in closets.

Accenting the rose beige nylon carpeted living room is a pink marble fireplace. Walls, woodwork and draperies in the living room and dining room match the carpet. Furniture is dark mahogany.

Just off from the dining area is a combined silver cabinet and buffet service.

Entrance closet is accessible from the entry in the living room and also serves as a walk-in closet in the dressing room.

Mahogany furnishings are featured in the master bedroom room. The large poster bed is covered with a floral designed coverlet.

Large combination walk-in and dressing closets extend from the master bedroom to the dressing room, which is equipped with a Formica dressing table with built-in laboratory. A small built-in cabinet with velvet lined drawers contain Mrs. Kelley's costume jewelry and cosmetics.

Top of stairway is highlighted by a large leaded window. Furniture in the sitting room is covered with wine velvet. An outside door opens onto a balcony marked by white wrought iron.

Upstairs bedrooms are in green and pink, green and white, raspberry and gray blue. Bath is in wine and a floral design. A walk-in, cedar closet adjoins one bedroom.

The uniquely designed kitchen has copper tone refrigerator, deep freeze, dishwasher, ventahood, table top electric stove and two ovens—all built in. The copper tone washer and dryer are in two separate units.

Walls are finished with a copper tone stain. Floor covering is a brick pattern embossed linoleum.

Breakfast room features a small built-in refrigerator and laboratory and two dining tables which can be made into one.

Highlighting the den is the large circular fireplace of Tennessee stone which extends into the entire east wall. Principal color in the den is aqua. Book shelves are of walnut.

Powder room joining the den is done in pink.

Featured throughout the house are touch latches on all doors and the latest type of electrical outlet and sand switches. The entire home is wired for inter-communication.

The Kelleys' guest house contains a complete rustic type kitchen, accented by natural exposed beams; a bedroom and ceramic tile bath.

The spacious yard, enclosed with a six foot tile fence, is divided into two areas—a party yard and an area for barbecue.

Connecting the double garage and house is a Dutch gate.

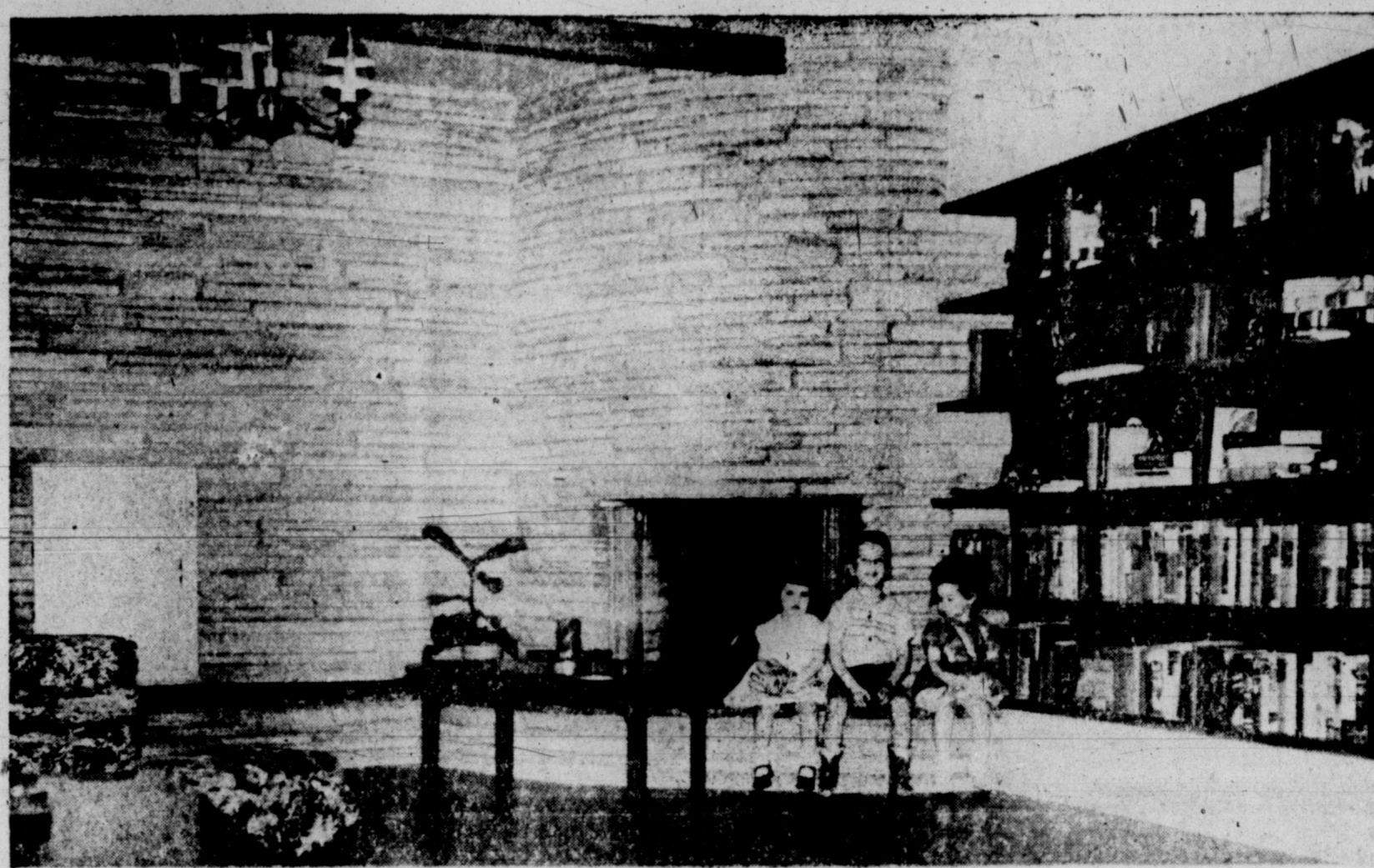

## Exhibit of Quilts Highlights American Handicrafts Program

An exhibit of new and old quilts April 27 highlighted the 1921 Study Club program in the home of Mrs. R. H. Ratliff Sr. One of the oldest quilts shown in the display was owned by Mrs. J. S. Craddock Sr. The quilt was made in Germany and was more than a 100 years old. It was block-printed on hand loomed and hand woven cloth.

A flower quilt, done in crayons, was displayed by Mrs. R. P. Price. Other patchwork and appliqued quilts illustrated various patterns and techniques.

Other quilts shown during the "American Handicrafts" program were owned by Mrs. C. L. Root Sr., Mrs. Ratliff, Mrs. W. C. Hooks, Mrs. W. W. Rhode and Mrs. J. T. Pritchett who are club members, and Mrs. Boyd

Dozier. Two of Mrs. Dozier's quilts were approximately 26 years old. A third quilt was made by Mrs. Dozier's mother, Mrs. Pebbles, when she was 71 years old. Mrs. Craddock was program leader for the afternoon.

Mrs. Lee Lavendera spoke about old quilt patterns. She explained that there is no antique more expressive of our foremothers than patchwork, which in the main took the form of quilts.

"Patchwork is an art that has been known and practiced ever since the first woven cloth wore out in spots," Mrs. Lavendera said.

Ancient Greece, India and China made patchwork centuries before Christ, the group heard. "Most families own at least

one patchwork quilt made by a living or deceased member of their family," the speaker concluded.

"The Romance of Hooked Rugs" was topic of Mrs. Price's talk.

"The romance of hooked rugs from its humble, beginning to its acceptance into the finest homes, reads like the story of Cinderella," Mrs. Price said.

"They both rose from a place by the hearth to unexpected glory and acclaim.

"The hooked rug, like crazy quilts of yore, were composed of bits of fabric having sentimental attachments like the uniform of a Bunker Hill hero.

She concluded her talk by reading the poem, "The Revolutionary Hooked Rug."

During the business session members voted to donate \$5 to the cancer fund. Mrs. Trulock expressed appreciation of the work done by the club during the past year and her pleasure in serving as president.
