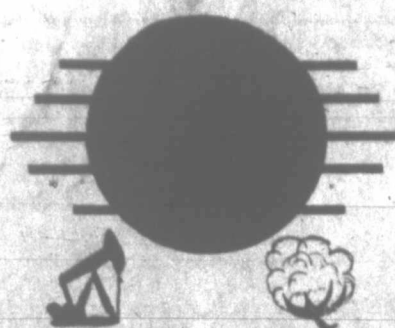

Bid opening poses charter question

The Colorado City council, meeting in regular session Tuesday night, awarded a bid for a new police car subject to final approval from the Texas Attorney General's office and the Texas Municipal League.

Council member Phil Anderson, who owns Anderson Motor Company, a Dodge, Chrysler, Plymouth dealership, had asked previously if he would be allowed to submit a bid. City Attorney Pete McKinney initially told him yes, but later after re-reading the city charter, said Anderson

couldn't submit a bid because the charter specifically denies it.

Anderson's bid was not opened at Tuesday night's meeting, but those of Joe Weaver Chevrolet and Hutchins Ford Sales were, although both were submitted after the deadline, it was noted. Anderson submitted his bid before the deadline, City Manager Brenda Tarter said.

Weaver's bid for a 1987 Chevrolet in the amount of \$11,900 was tentatively approved. Hutchins' bid was \$12,995 for a 1987 Ford LTD Crown Victoria.

Anderson said he would abide by the Attorney General's opi-

nion but suggested that the city charter might need to be revised. The charter was approved in 1949.

McKinney said that state law does allow council members to do business with the city but that usually the city charter is the determining factor in such matters. McKinney said that according to the Colorado City charter, no member on the council can conduct business of any nature with the city.

Anderson said that the city owns several Chrysler made products that occasionally have to be serviced and that the charter as it now reads will

prohibit him from servicing the vehicles.

In other business, Mayor Elmer Martin appointed a committee of council members Dee Hearn, Don Webb and Robert Hoback along with Mrs. Tarter to study water system needs and report back at a later date.

Buz Rich, director of public works, said that a 12-inch water line needs to be installed from the overhead water tower to an area near 22nd and Walnut streets in order to increase water flow and pressure north of the interstate. He anticipated cost of the materials at \$21,000 and labor at about \$12,000.

Mrs. Tarter said that although there is barely enough money in the budget for such a project, there would not be any money left in event of emergencies such as a major break.

Council members agreed that a new line is needed, but were reluctant to delete the funds in that account since it is so early in the fiscal year.

The committee is to study the budget and determine if the project should be undertaken at this time.

An ordinance was approved raising the hotel-motel occupa-

Rodeo begins four-night run

The exciting sights and sounds of a rodeo came to life Wednesday when the Ninth Annual AJRA Rodeo, sponsored by the Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce, got underway at the rodeo arena west of town.

Over 300 contestants from Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Louisiana are in Colorado City for the event which continues nightly at 7:30 p.m. until the final performance Saturday.

The rodeo parade will be Saturday at 5 p.m. and will feature floats, riding groups and clowns, according to Sharon Hoover, chairman.

Parade theme is "Texas - A Pioneer Spirit". Four sheriff's posses representing Nolan, Dawson, Howard and Scurry counties will be included in this year's parade. Shriners will also have one or more entries.

Several floats from the recent Westbrook sesquicentennial parade are among the entries.

Clowns will dot the parade

route. Distributing toys to the kids.

A Marine Corp color guard from Abilene will lead the parade. Back again this year will be the Red Raider from Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

Mrs. Marion Bassham will be parade marshal.

Prior to the parade start-up, recorded music featuring old-time favorites including Sons of the Pioneers will be played. Jim Babin will announce the parade from in front of the RECORD office.

Following the parade, the 4-H Rifle Team will sponsor a barbecue on the courthouse lawn. The menu includes sliced barbecue, sausage, beans, chips, onions, pickles and drinks. Cost is \$3.75 with children under \$2.

The rodeo queen will be announced at the beginning of Saturday night's performance. Contestants include Mandi Farber, Anne Kimmel, Amber Stephens, Katie Walls and Sherri Webb.

School board studies budget

The Colorado Independent School District board of trustees Tuesday night began the first of a series of budget workshops in order to prepare a budget for the coming school year.

Supt. Charlie Useiton said that the board will examine proposed budgets from each of the schools - high school, middle school and Kelley and Hutchinson elementary schools - and compare them with the current year's actual budget. Tuesday night's discussion centered on the high school budget as well as the athletic budget.

Useiton said the school distr-

ict is looking at about \$80 million in decreased evaluations for the district which will mean a loss in tax dollars of \$500,000-\$800,000.

Useiton explained that the board will be looking at ways to cut back in the budget. A tax raise from the 77-cents per \$100 valuation will also be considered as well as using reserve funds to help make up the difference.

Some of the cuts in the budget will be to eliminate all but the very necessary capital outlay projects, said Useiton. He said the board will very probably consider reducing the staff in some areas where

resignations occur. There are four or five positions in the school district which may not be filled for the coming year.

Useiton explained that the loss in evaluation is due to the energy crunch as well as to decreased farm values. Other school districts are also faced with the same problem, he said.

In other business Tuesday, the board accepted the resignations of Mel Gierhart, high school math teacher and coach, and Cindy McMillan, volleyball coach.

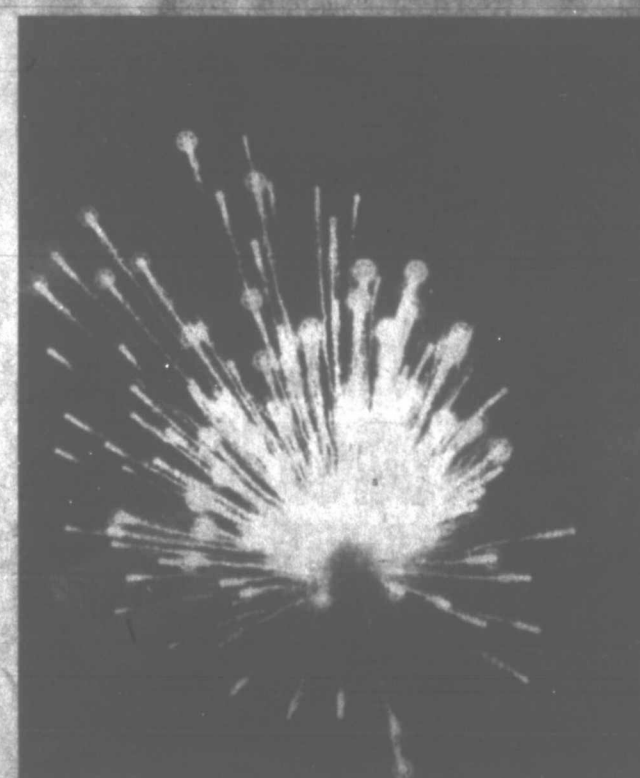
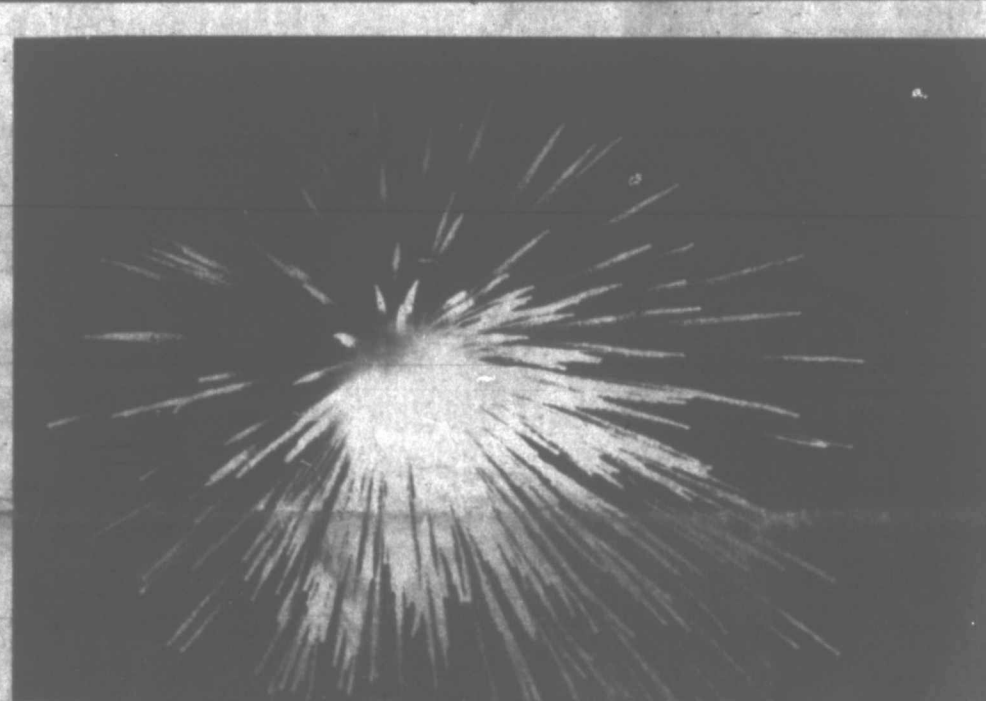
The board also approved changes in the discipline management program.

Stolen eagle statue is recovered

A 100-year-old cast iron eagle that adorned the entrance to the Renderbrook-Spade Ranch has been recovered, according to Mitchell County Sheriff Wendell Bryant.

Bryant said the eagle, one of two at the main gate to the ranch, was taken March 4 and recovered on July 3 at a private residence in San Angelo. No charges have been filed in the case, but may be filed at a later date.

The eagle, with a wing span of 4 1/2 feet, weighs 750 pounds.

Do-anywhere exercises help alleviate stress

Stress, dealing with pressures, is something that we all must learn to live with. It does not go away nor is it created by any one event. Stress is personal. Your own way of viewing the event, its importance in your life or its anticipated outcome can cause stress.

So how are you going to deal with it? Simple exercises that help overcome stress can be done almost anywhere, anytime. The following are some stress maneuvers for you.

- 1) Breathing—Under stress, the body is often deprived of oxygen. To improve oxygen intake close your eyes, sit up straight as you inhale slowly, deeply, count silently one, two. Hold the air in on three, then let the air seep out, four, five. Hold again, six, seven. Breathe this way for ten minutes. Open your eyes.
- 2) Exercise—Walking, jogging, and swimming are particularly good exercise. However, desk exercises can also be good: Try to raise your shoulders up to the ears. Hold to a count of four, then drop the shoulders. Repeat as many times as needed. A

variation is to rotate both shoulders, then rotate one at a time. Back, arms, and neck all respond to rotation exercises.

3) A Mind Vacation—Sit in a chair with both feet on the floor. Close your eyes. Imagine your favorite, most beautiful spot—mountains, the Hill Country, South Padre, or the piney woods. Relax there. Feel the breeze blow, smell the fresh air, hear the birds. Stay on your mind vacation at least 10 minutes.

4) Talk to Someone—Anything that can be shared is a lesser burden because two now carry the load.

5) Avoid Self-Medication—Over-use of alcohol or drugs makes stress worse. In the long run, you have to get over both the stress and the hangover.

If you're trying to change your high-pressure living conditions, remember that change requires two elements, alternatives and nourishment. Everyone needs a second chance (alternatives) and to be listened to, appreciated, loved, and given a chance to share himself (nourishment).

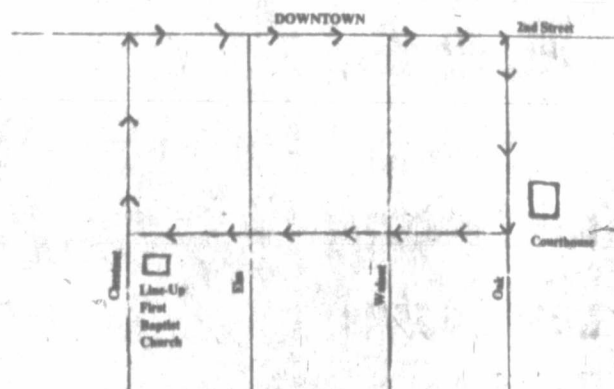
Computer course for kids

County Oil News

Two new producers have been brought on line in Mitchell County's Coleman Ranch Field by Robert G. Cox and Associates.

Both located about nine miles northwest of Westbrook, the wells are designated as the No. 3 and No. 4 Preston Burchard.

They showed ability to pump 28-gravity crude at the rate of 18 and 27 barrels per day. They also made 38 and 190 barrels of salt water daily, respectively.

Production intervals (in the Permian Formation) range from 2,696 to 2,860 feet into the wellbore.

No details on production prospects have been released following the perforation of an interval in the Strawn Sand at the No. 2-6 Ellwood C," a Mitchell County wildcat located 25 miles southeast of Colorado City. Tuthill and Barbee Inc. is

the operator.

The well is bottomed at total depth of 7,340 feet after being spudded late in January of this year.

A total of four new producers have been completed in Mitchell County's Sharon Ridge Field from two to three miles northeast of Cuthbert. Grand Banks Energy Inc. is the operator.

The wells are designated as the Nos. 3, 6, 8 and 9 Coleman Ranch. They showed ability to pump 15, five, six and 15 barrels of oil per day on open choke. Oil tested at 28-gravity.

Each of the wells also showed water production of about 40 barrels per day.

All will be producing from the San Andres Formation. Production intervals will range from 1,681 to 1,762 feet into the wellbore.

Possible production intervals have been perforated at two developmental ventures in the Sharon Ridge Field, Mitchell County, with William H. Zuhone Jr. as the operator.

Perforations were shot at undisclosed levels in the Clear Fork Formation. The wells are designated as the No. 1 Minatra B and the No. 2-B Minatra, both located about three miles southeast of Cuthbert.

An undisclosed production interval has been shot at the No. 4 Coleman Ranch in the North Coleman Ranch Field, Mitchell County, by Vista Energy Inc., operator. The venture is bottomed at a total depth of 3,500 feet in a quest for Clear Fork Formation pay.

Location is about two miles northeast of Cuthbert.
