## Banks Tie On Bids

Bids submitted by the Talco State Bank and the First National Bank of Bogata to serve as the Depository Bank for school funds were declared as tie bids at the Talco-Bogata School Board meeting Tuesday night. The Talco State Bank was designated as the receiving bank for school funds with the First National Bank of Bogata sharing in the school deposits. It was stated that the two local banks will continue to share in school deposits basically the same as since consolidation, but that the above procedure was necessary to meet legal statutes.

In matters related to personnel, Sandra Whitten Cox was approved as an elementary teacher for the Bogata Campus. Mrs. Cox is a recent graduate of East Texas State University and is also a graduate of Rivercrest. Also, Leanda McElroy was approved as an elementary teacher for the Talco Campus with her employment contingent on approval under one of the Federal Programs. Miss McElroy is a graduate of Tarleton State University and is working at the present time in a summer program at the Talco School. Odis Wilkerson and Bill Vickers were employed as bus drivers con-

tingent on meeting State and local requirements for bus drivers.

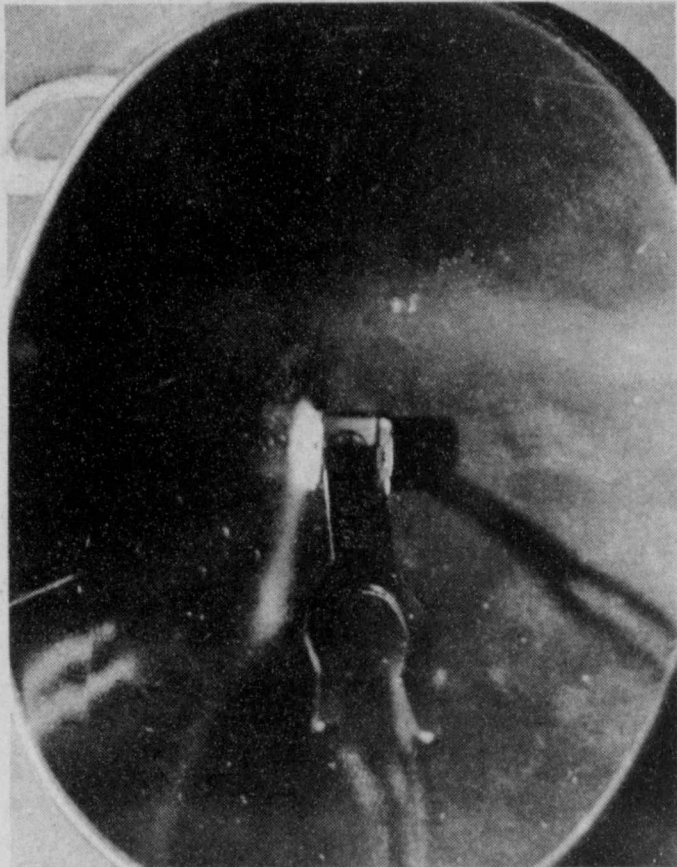
In other action taken by the Board: (1) Approval was given to the lowest bid for the purchase of 10 manual typewriters for the commercial department at Rivercrest as well as the service contract for

typewriters for the 1977-78 school year to Miller Office Equipment Company of Antlers, Oklahoma. (2) A bid made for the sale of a school owned house and lot in Talco was accepted. (3) Approval given to continuing in a cooperative agreement with Region 8 Service Center for

Drug Education and Crime Prevention workshops. (4)

Approved a review to be made of the school district total insurance programs by the school servicing agent. (5) Approved a future meeting with representatives of McClanahan and Holmes, school auditors, to discuss various auditing procedures. (6) Authorized the superintendent to have certain areas of the Rivercrest Campus mowed and hay baled in order to cut down on mowing expenses.

In final action, approval was given to the various financial reports. The next meeting of the Board will be Tuesday, August 2, 1977 at 7:30 p.m. at Rivercrest with the public cordially invited to attend.

## Rhodes Killed

Funeral services for Benjamin Franklin Rhodes, 77, of Joliet, were held at 4:00 p.m. Friday at the Joliet Missionary Baptist Church. The Rev. Calvin Hancock officiated and burial was in Smith Cemetery at Rosalie by Bogata Funeral Home.

Rhodes was killed early Thursday morning as he apparently tried to stop his runaway car.

According to investigating officer Howard Dunham of the Texas Highway Patrol, the accident happened in front of Rhodes' home near the Joliet community about 8:20 a.m. Dunham said Rhodes had backed from the driveway of his home when the car apparently stalled. He was then thought to have started the motor from under the car's hood with the gear still in reverse.

Officers said the man apparently fell as he attempted to get back inside the car, which was circling the county road in front of his home.

Rhodes was born Oct. 12, 1899, in Charleston, and was a lifelong resident of Red River County. His parents were James and Emma (McGuire) Rhodes. He married the former Fannie Hinson on Dec. 9, 1921, in Joliet. He was a retired ginster.

Survivors include his widow; five sons, B. F. Rhodes, Grady Rhodes and Dean Rhodes, all of Joliet, and Charles Rhodes of Troupe; one daughter, Mrs. Ruby Rogers of Joliet; one sister, Mrs. Ruby Clark of Henderson; one brother, Cicero Rhodes of Malott, Wash.; two half-brothers, Francis Foster of Joliet and Fred Foster of Bogata; 20 grandchildren; and 21 great-grandchildren.

## Talco Burglaries Solved

The arrest of Robert M. Watkins of Franklin County by Franklin County officers and Titus County Deputy John Kirkpatrick last week cleared up two burglaries and one attempted burglary in Talco.

The burglary of B&B Hardware in Talco Friday night, July 1, 1977, was cleared by Kirkpatrick after the arrest by Franklin County officers of a 14 year old Talco youth who was driving Watkins car. Merchandise found in the vehicle included boxes of shotgun shells, screwdrivers and tools with B&B sales tags on them. According to Titus County Sheriff John Moss, the 14-year-old was not involved in the burglary, but had knowledge of the offence.

Kirkpatrick was called at 4:00 a.m. July 4, to go to Mount Vernon to identify the merchandise in the vehicle, then he and Franklin County officers arrested Watkins at his home. Watkins admitted to a previous burglary of B&B and the attempted burglary of The Store in Talco.

Titus County officers have also recently solved the burglary of the Houston Burkheart and Ross Morris homes in Winfield and the Winfield area. Arrested were Teresa Hightower and Cynthia Cramer, with bond set at \$5000 each.

The merchandise from these two burglaries was recovered in a mobile home in a wooded area north of Winfield on July 5, 1977.

## Hangar Talk

The 67th Tactical Reconnaissance Wing of Bergstrom AFB, Texas announced the resumption of high speed, low-level intensive training routes for pilots. These routes in the Paris, Texas area, encompass a flight path from Athens to south of Winnsboro to Lone Star to north of Dekalb, south of the Red River to Bonham, Texas, and 20 miles on either side.

In eastern Oklahoma and Arkansas the route starts east of Antlers, to east of DeQueen, Arkansas, north west of Hot Springs, circling north and west of Rich Mountain VOR and termination north east of Antlers, Oklahoma.

These low-level flights are between 500 and 1,500 feet above the surface. The most concentrated flight activities along these routes will be on Wednesdays and Thursdays of each week, with flight hours between 10:00 a.m. and midnight.
