Radio pioneer services

The pioneer of radio in Spearman and a former mayor Coy C. Palmer, 71, died Sunday at Hansford Hospital.

Services were held at 11 a.m. Wednesday in First United Methodist Church with the Rev. Lane Boyd, pastor, and the Rev. Vernon Henderson of Lubbock officiating. Graveside services were at 3 p.m. in Alanreed Cemetery in Alanreed by Boxwell Brothers Funeral Home of Spearman.

Palmer was born in Lelia Lake and grew up in Alanreed, and his first radio experience came in 1930 when he played piano for couple of hours on Saturday afternoons for 50-watt station KGRS in Amarillo, which later was combined with WDAG to form KGNC.

After the merger, the youthful piano player began to collect \$7.50 a week for a 15-minute Wednesday night show for the local Studebaker dealer. It was "big money in the early '30s," Palmer recalled later, enough to help out with expenses at West Texas State Teachers College, from which he was graduated in 1936. He was a member of the

varsity basketball team at WT and was well-known on campus as pianist for a dance band and for many special programs.

He taught and coached at Alanreed and Stinnett and continued to do some radio work at Borger before entering the U.S. Navy during World War II.

He was a partner in operation of Radio Station KPDN in Pampa from 1953 to 1960 and later operated an FM station in Pampa before moving to Spearman in 1963, when he began radio station KBMF. He owned and operated the station from 1963 to 1978 and returned as manager from 1980 to 1983.

He was the first president of Spearman Rotary Club, past master of Hansford Masonic Lodge 1040, a member of Hansford County Shrine Club, Khiva Temple in Amarillo, and Scottish Rite Bodies in El Paso.

Palmer was mayor of Spearman from 1972-74, was a member of the Spearman Chamber of Commerce and was instrumental in establishing the Palo Duro River Water Authority. He was involved in many radiothons to raise funds for charitable causes.

He composed the Stinnett school song and was grand organist of the Grand Chapter of Texas Order of Eastern Star in 1969, and for many years played the organ and sang at weddings and funerals.

He occasionally served as correspondent for the Globe-News at Spearman and in 1979 was the paper's correspondent in covering the tractorcade of protesting farmers in Washington, D.C.

He was a member of First United Methodist Church in Spearman.

He married Fay Conley in 1942 at Norfolk, Va.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Brice of Amarillo and Michael of Chicago; three sisters, Willie B. Guill of Pampa, Jimmie Elms of Lubbock and Neita McKee of Alanreed; a brother, Herschel of Borger; and six grandchildren.

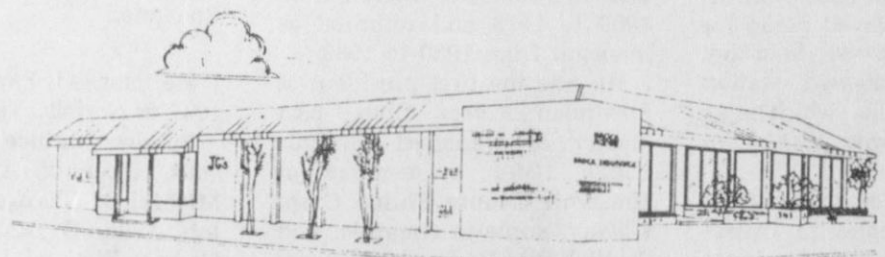

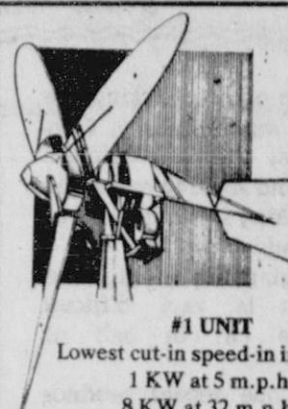

But, judging the quality of a watermelon is very difficult unless it's cut in half or quartered.

In fact, one recent produce industry study showed that about forty percent of consumers find melons the most difficult fruit to judge for ripeness and freshness.

There are a few appearance factors which may be helpful - but not totally reliable - in guiding you to a good, ripe, juicy watermelon.

The surface of the watermelon should be relatively smooth. The rind should have a slight dullness, neither shiny nor dull. The ends of the melon should be filled out and rounded, and the underside of the melon should have a creamy color.

It's easier, but usually more expensive to buy a cut melon. Even then, you may not get the best melon for your money unless you inspect it well. The best melon was firm, juicy flesh with good red color. Look out for white streaks and whitish seeds since these indicate immaturity.

Also avoid a melon with dry, mealy flesh or watery, stringy flesh. These are signs of over-maturity or aging after harvest.

The peak watermelon season is here so there are plenty of delicious melons to choose from at the supermarkets and produce stands. With prices low and likely to get lower as the season progresses, you may have sev-

eral chances to pick the "perfect" melon.

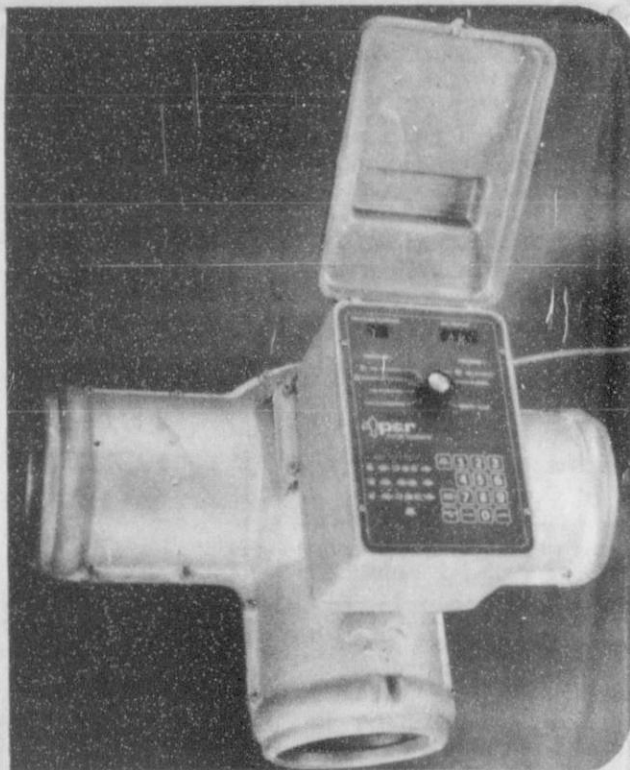

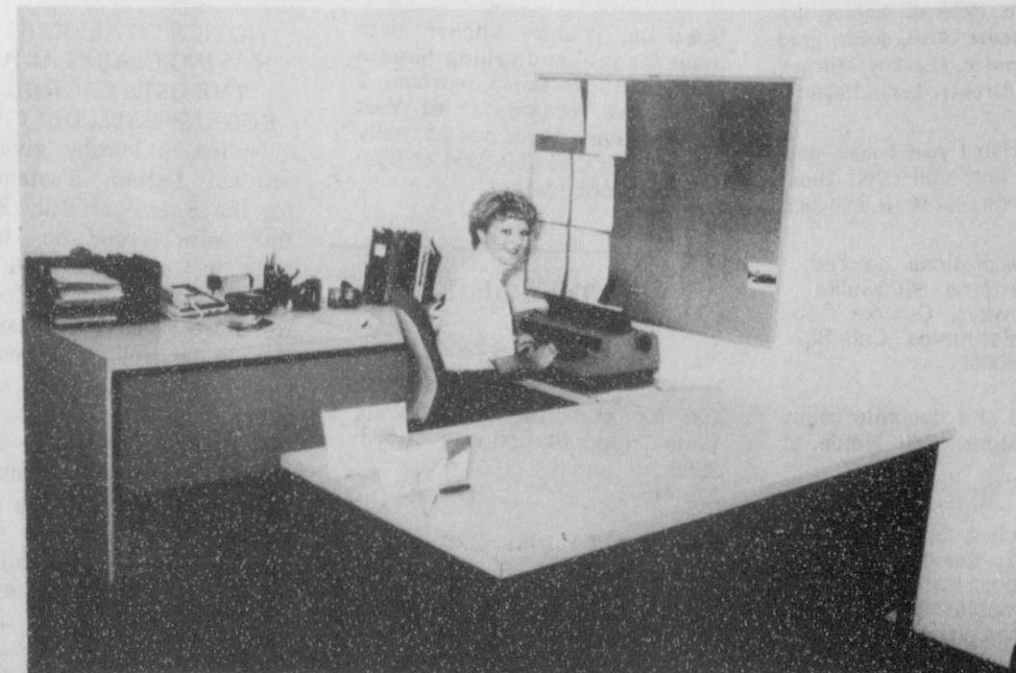

The air filter alert will emit a high pitched alarm when the filter needs replacing. The alert can be used on any heating or cooling system that requires an air filter including central air/heat, and refrigerated window cooling units.

Tips for growing alfalfa

Before Hansford County area alfalfa growers seed a new crop this fall, they should select seed proven in this area, check soil for fertility and prepare a good seed bed, says an agronomist for Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Inc.

"These important management practices should help farmers produce higher yields and better quality hay when they harvest the first cutting next spring," says Jim Higdon, director of agronomy service for the Southwestern Division of Pioneer.

He says that university and Pioneer field tests indicate that several commercial varieties are adapted to this area. One is Pioneer alfalfa variety 555, which has proven itself as a high-yielding, quality hay throughout the region.

In irrigated field tests conducted in Plainview from 1978-1982, Pioneer 555 had total per-acre production of more than 39 tons, compared to 33 tons for Texas common, he says.

"According to the Oklahoma State University/Central Alfalfa Improvement Conference report for 1983, Pioneer variety 555 had the highest production record among 23 commercial varieties in regional yield tests conducted the past four years," he says.

"Farmers can expect five to six years of production from this variety. It is a semi-dormant alfalfa which is high in forage quality and bred specifically to withstand the extreme weather conditions found in the Southwest. It has a high leaf-to-stem ratio and excellent heat tolerance, high disease and aphid resistance and fast recovery after harvesting."

Higdon says that prior to planting any alfalfa seed, farmers should have soil samples analyzed to determine how much, if any, phosphate and potash will be needed. These fertilizers are important elements in alfalfa production.

He says that under normal circumstances, seed should be planted at a rate of 15 to 20 pounds per acre at a soil depth of a quarter to a half inch. Seed should be planted in late August or early September so a proper stand can be established before the first freeze.

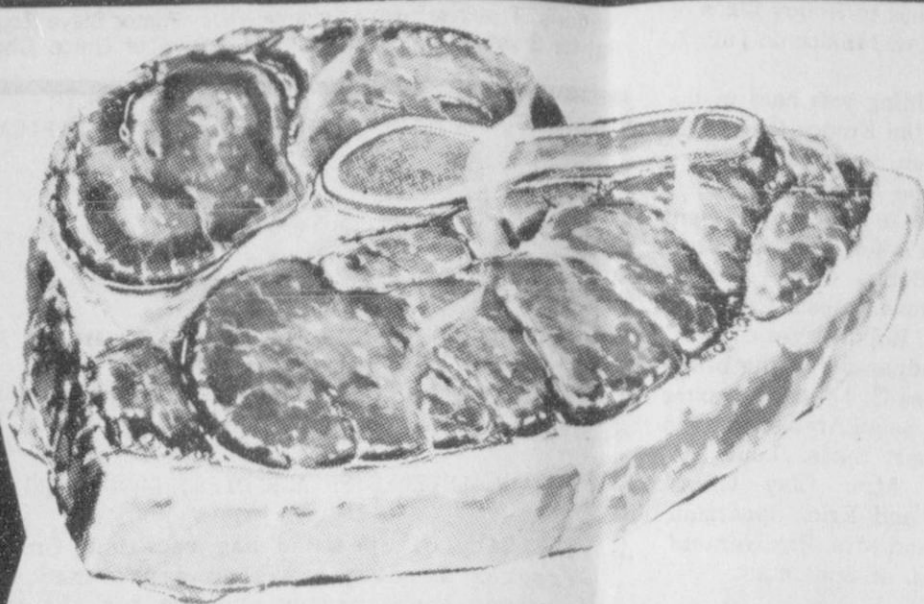

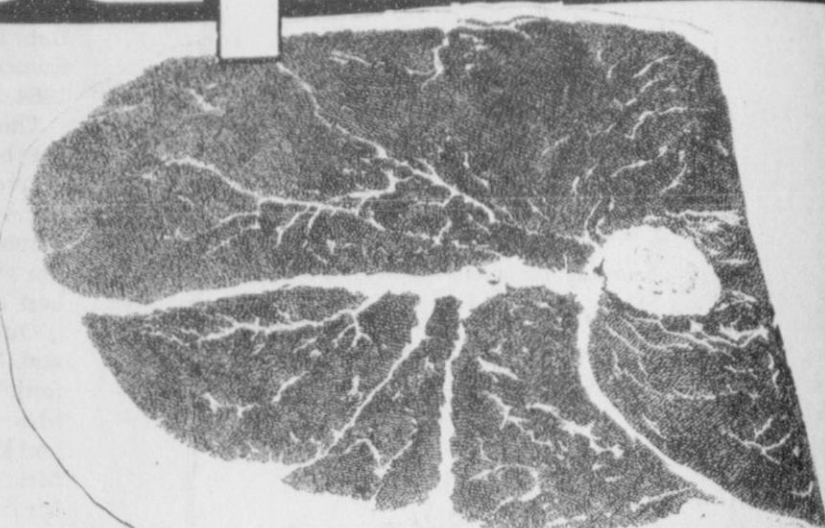

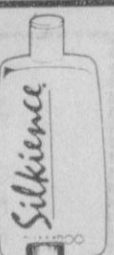

As you can see from our activities, we place a high priority on education and PREVENTION of drug-related problems. We believe that we can, as a community, turn the trend away from the chemical use. It is the present and future generation of kids that we are most likely to be able to help say no to drugs, and they need to know that they have a right to a drug-free life.

Public coffee planned for Phil Gramm

U.S. Rep. Phil Gramm, candidate for the U.S. Senate, will attend a public coffee reception for Hansford County residents at 10:30 a.m. on Saturday, August 4, at the First State Bank's hospital room, 30 Southwest Court in Spearman.

Gramm is best known for co-authoring the Reagan economic recovery program, and for resigning from Congress and winning re-election as a Republican after Tip O'Neill stripped him of his Budget Committee seat in reprisal for his successful efforts to control spending.

The congressman, who won the Republican nomination with an extraordinary 73% of the vote against three opponents who spent total of \$4 million, said Texans deserve an issue-oriented campaign in the general election race for the U.S. Senate this year.

"The people of Texas face a clear choice between two dedicated advocates of distinctly different philosophies of government," Gramm said. "I have spent six years in Congress working for a balanced budget, lower taxes, greater economic opportunity for the working people of this country and a strong defense. My opponent has consistently demanded higher taxes,

more spending and less defense."

Where Congressman Gramm introduced a balanced budget amendment to the Constitution on his first day in Congress -- Jan. 3, 1979 -- Lloyd Doggett voted against the resolution adopted by the Texas Legislature which urged approval of the balanced budget amendment. Doggett also has opposed the balanced budget amendment in his primary and runoff campaigns.

A survey conducted on May 8-9 noted Texas pollster Lance Tarrance showed Gramm with an 11-point lead over Doggett.

Congressman Gramm's stop here is part of a 75-city swing "aimed at continuing to build on our grassroots base of support for the November general election."

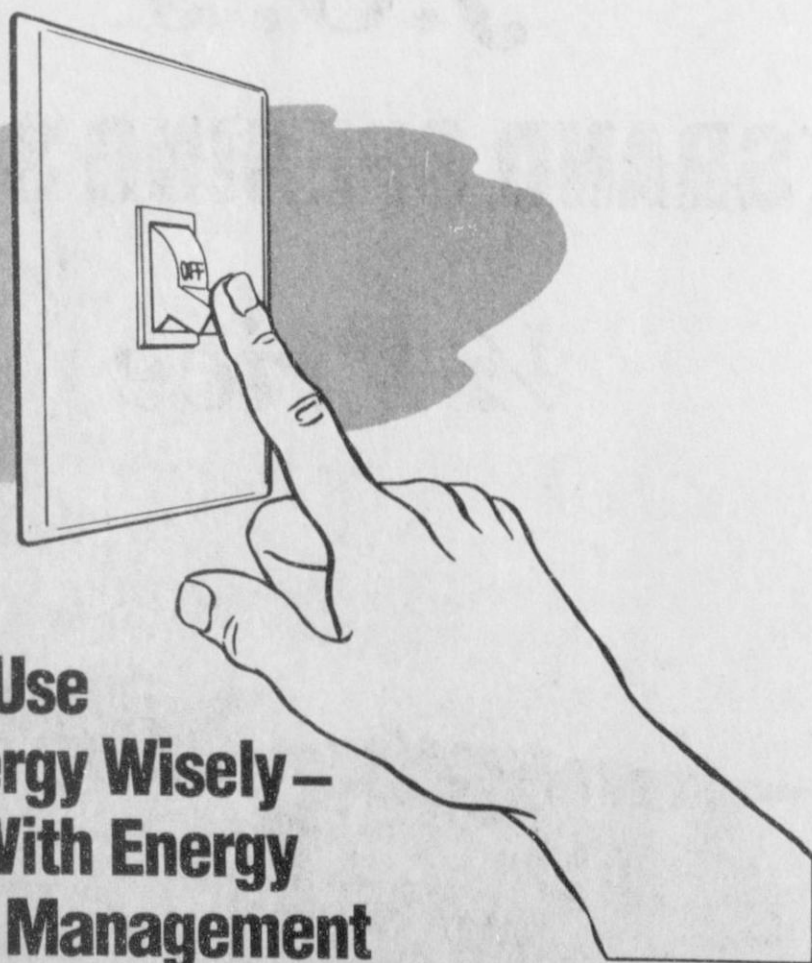

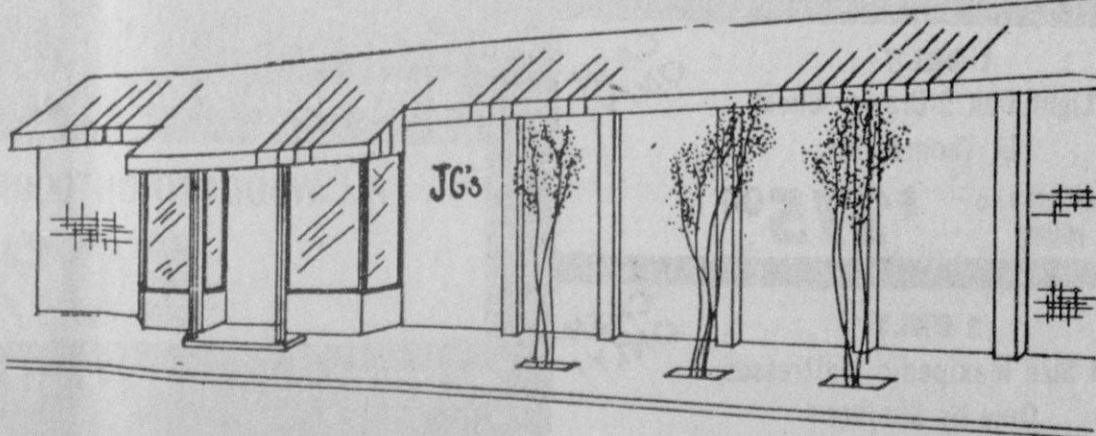
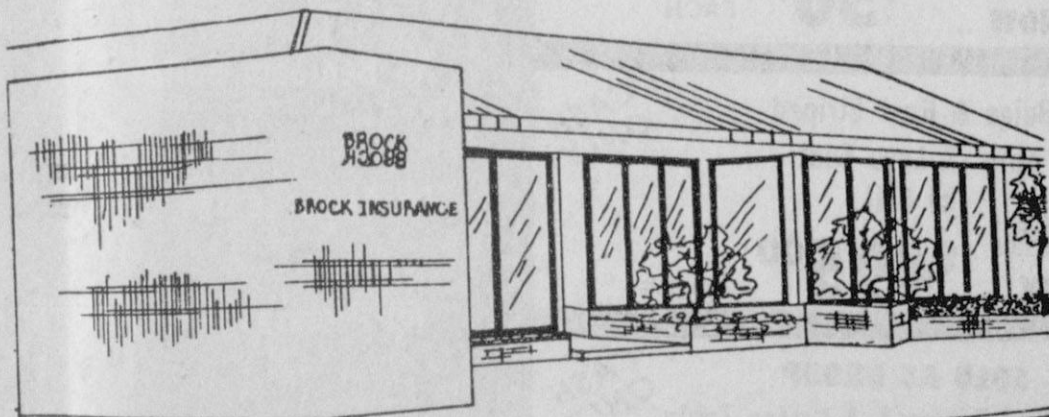
