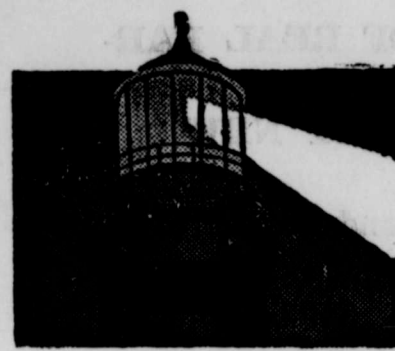

Texas Mental Health, Mental Retardation Act Now Law

Gov. John Connally signed into law the Texas Mental Health and Mental Retardation act on April 5, 1965. Effective date will be Sept. 1, 1965.

PURPOSE: To provide for the conservation and restoration of mental health among the people of Texas; to provide for effective administration and coordination of mental health services at state and local levels; to provide, coordinate, develop and improve services for the mentally retarded to allow them to develop their respective mental capacities to the fullest practicable extent and to live as useful and productive lives as possible.

Public policy of this state is to encourage local agencies and private organizations to assume responsibility for effective administration of mental health and mental retardation services, with the assistance, cooperation and support of the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation.

The Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation is created, consisting of a Texas Board of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, a Commissioner of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, a Deputy Commissioner for Mental Health Services, a Deputy Commissioner for Mental Retardation Services, and a staff.

The department shall have exclusive management and control of the state hospitals and special schools, and the Houston State Psychiatric Institute for Research and Training.

Community centers. One or more districts, school districts, rehabilitation districts, state-supported institutions of higher education, and state-supported medical schools, or any combination of these, may cooperate, negotiate, and contract with each other to establish a community mental health center, a community mental retardation center, or a community mental health and mental retardation center.

Eligibility of community centers for state grants-in-aid, and methods for applying for, and allocating, these grants, are described in the law.

Sunday, April 25 was one of the brightest days so far in April though it was cloudy and dreary all day. The brightness came between 4:30 in the afternoon until approximately midnight as showers of rain came at regular intervals leaving 1.50 inches of mois-

ture in the government gauge. Other gauges in the area caught varying amounts ranging up to near 2 inches. But everywhere the moisture in whatever amount was needed and appreciated. No hail of the damaging variety had been reported in the territory early Monday morning.

These showers brought the total moisture for April to 3.20 inches and at the time this is written five days remain in the month with prospects excellent that more moisture would fall. This brought the total for the year to April 25 to 5.25 inches.

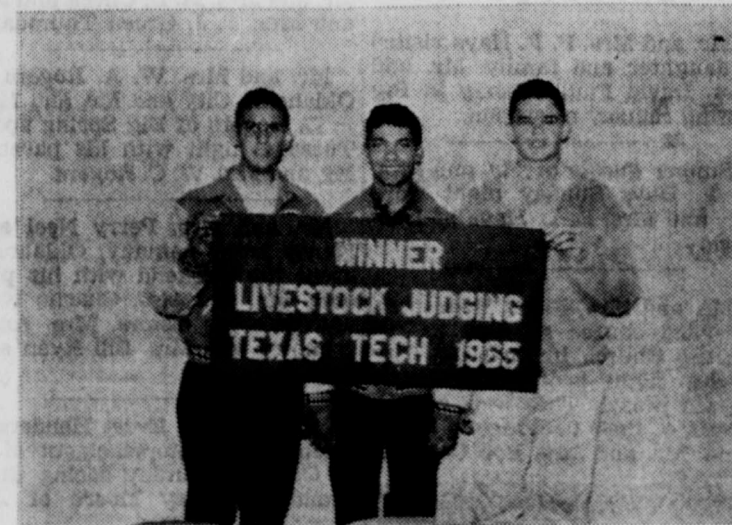
They will also be taken on a tour of the building and the lunchroom where they will be served milk and cookies.

The livestock judging team from the Loraine F.F.A. Chapter was a double winner in the annual Texas Tech Judging Contest held at Texas Technological College, Lubbock, Texas on Saturday April 24, 1965. The team composed of Johnny Baumann, Keith Hackfeld and James Mahon placed 1st in the overall contest competing against 143 other livestock judging teams. There were 144 entered in the livestock contest and this was the largest number of teams entered in the history of the contest. A member of the Loraine team, Keith Hackfeld, took overall high individual honors in the entire contest and received a medal for this. He scored 414 points out of a possible 450. There were 432 boys competing for individual honors. Keith was also the 3rd high individual in judging of sheep and the team was 5th in sheep judging. The Tech contest was the Area II and District contests and by virtue of the Loraine team placing in the overall contest, the team placed 1st in Area II and Lone Wolf District in livestock judging. The team also qualified for the state FFA judging contest to be held at Texas A & M University at College Station, May 1, 1965. The top ten teams in the contest were: 1st, Loraine, 1183 points; 2nd, Slaton 1181; 3rd, Wall 1169; 4th, Lamesa, 1158; 5th, Sterling City, 1153; 6th, Plainview, 1151; 7th, Hamlin, 1145; 8th, Roscoe, 1141; 9th, Robert Lee, 1139, Shamrock, 1135.

The poultry judging team composed of Mike Mearse, Ronnie Finley, and Donie Bowles also qualified for the state FFA contests by placing 8th in Area II competition. In the overall contest, Mearse was 6th high individual in egg grading and the team was 10th high in egg grading. There were 51 teams entered in the poultry contest. The top eight teams in Area II were: 1st, Brownfield; 2nd, Wellman; 3rd, Hawley; 4th, Meadow; 5th, Wilson; 6th, Odessa; 7th, Seminole; 8th, Loraine.

The cotton classing team placed 8th in the overall Tech contest and 3rd in Area II competition. Members of the team were Danny Butler, Dennis Cornutt and Roland Graham. The top ten teams in cotton classing were: 1st, Monterey of Lubbock; 2nd, New Home; 3rd, Littlefield; 4th, Wilson; 5th, Slaton; 6th, Tom S. Lubbock; 7th, Friona; 8th, Loraine; 9th, Cooper of Lubbock, 10th, Meadow.

Other teams participating in the Tech contest but failing to place in the top ten was the dairy cattle team composed of Peter Galvan, Stanley Long and Herman Mitchell.

The teams were accompanied to Lubbock by Raymond Holt, Vocational Agriculture Teacher and coach of the teams.

A Bar-B-Q supper was served to all the contestants courtesy of the Plains Cooperative Oil Mill, Lubbock, Texas. There were over 1600 boys participating the 10 various contests held.

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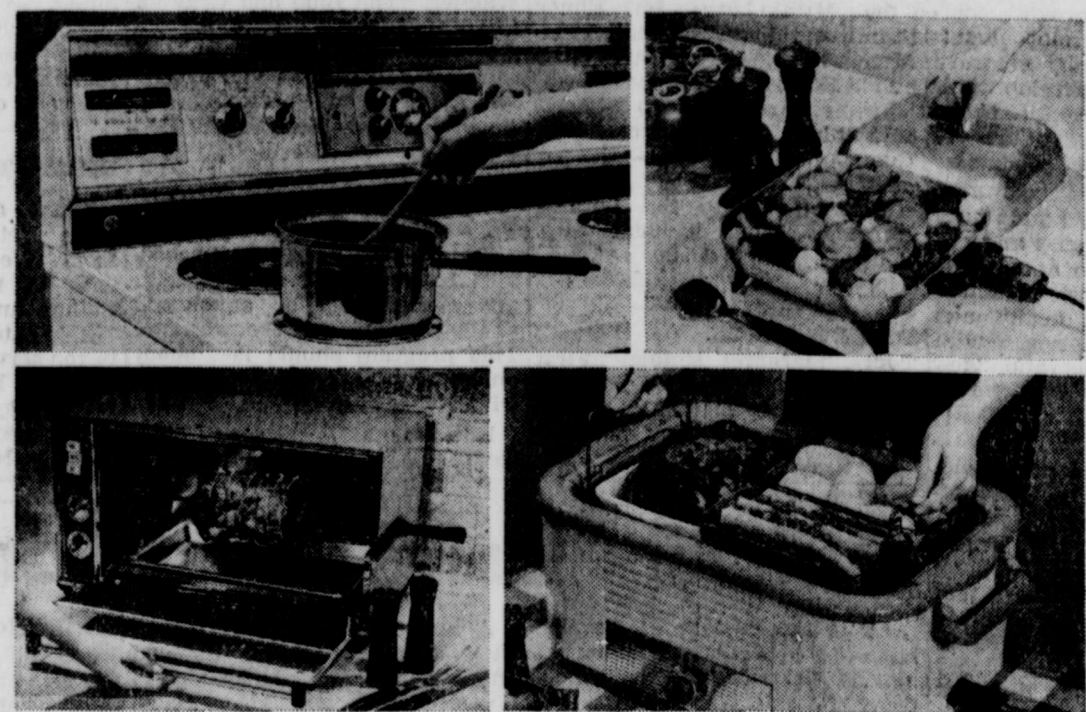

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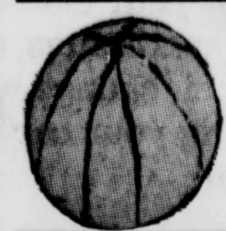
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
