COUNTY AGENT SHEETS QUILTS

R. SHEETS GOES TO TUSCON, ARIZ. TO TAKE GOVERNMENT POST; IS BIG PROMOTION

R. Sheets, first and only agent for Ochiltree county, has resigned his position and left for Tucson, Ariz., to accept an appointment from the federal government as superintendent of the Western United States Unit of erosion plant studies. Sheets took the examination for this position several months ago and made a grade of 92, without the aid of his five percent service connection credit. He was notified of his appointment last week and left immediately to start his new duties. This is a very important position and a distinct and well earned promotion for Mr. Sheets. He will make him to all parts of the west. His unit will make a study of all kinds of plants, trees, shrubs for their adaptability for control of soil erosion from both wind and water. His resignation will be acted upon at the regular July meeting of the commissioners' court on Monday. It is supposed that arrangements will be made at that meeting for the employment of a new county agent. The county commissioners will also be up the question of carrying on the work of the home demonstration agent. The present incumbent, Miss R. A. Wood, resigned on July 1. Miss R. A. Wood, now making up her mind, which was lost between the fact that Miss Crowder left and her successor arrived.

WHEELER COUNTY AND MEMPHIS VOTE BEER

During the past few days "wet" forces in Wheeler county and Memphis, Texas have won hard fought victories at the polls for the legalized sale of beer. In Wheeler county, the official count gave the "beer" advocates a majority of 120 votes. Shamrock and the south part of the county went wet with the north part of the county voting against beer. At Memphis the wets won with a vote of 310 to 252. This was the third attempt in a year, both of the other elections being carried by the dries.

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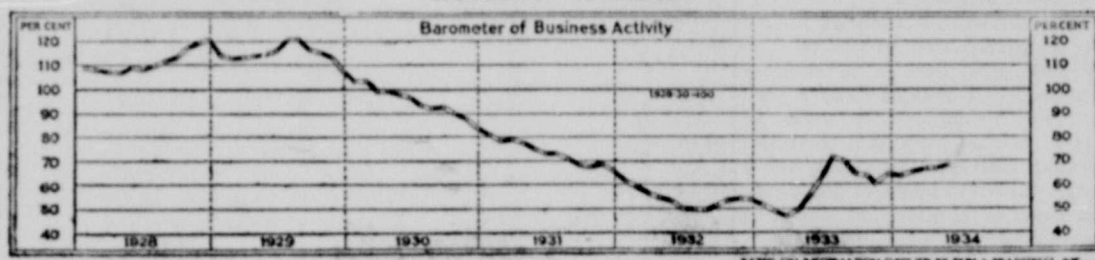
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Business Conditions as of June 1

MARVIN JONES TO TOUR U. S.

OUR CONGRESSMAN TO COVER COUNTRY ON SPEAKING TOUR IN BEHALF OF DEMOCRATS

WASHINGTON, June 29—An outstanding congressional authority and stalwart of the New Deal as it concerns agriculture is going to its defense in the fall campaigns. Representative Marvin Jones (Democrat, Texas), chairman of the House agriculture committee and House manager for all the Agricultural Adjustment Administration's far-reaching legislation, disclosed today he had agreed to accept invitation of the Democratic congressional campaign committee to help in the congressional campaigns by analyzing the farm adjustment programs and telling something of what may be expected from them in the future.

He will join other New Dealers in a widespread drive to rally public support to the administration.

Accepts Invitations

Several members of congress also have given him independent invitations for speeches which he expects to fill.

The Texan said he had prepared no itinerary, and was not certain yet into just what states he would go. He added, however, most of his speeches would be made in the doubtful states in behalf, of course, of continuing the Democratic majority in the House.

Jones is not opposed for the Democratic nomination—tantamount to election—in his home district, and thus will have time to make a rather thorough-going effort in behalf of the party. He probably will concentrate in the Middle West and West, with occasional excursions into the South.

Uphold AAA Program

He is going to uphold the case of the AAA program, its philosophy and its accomplishments on these claims, among others:

At the beginning of the program prices for farm products were the lowest they had been in half a century.

That wheat brought an average of 30 cents a bushel in December, 1932, as against about 75 cents 18 months later.

That corn brought 19 cents as

against better than 48 cents. That cotton brought about 5 cents as against around 11 cents.

That hogs brought \$3.04 per one hundred pounds compared with around \$4.73.

Defends Processing

That milk brought \$1.10 per 100 pounds compared with around \$1.45.

That benefit payments to farmers have reached a total of about \$250,000,000 and that by the end of the year payments will have reached \$750,000,000.

That farm foreclosures have been greatly decreased.

AMERICAN LEGION OUT OF SLOT MACHINE BUSINESS

At a regular meeting of the Pierce Johnson Post of the American Legion on Monday evening a motion was passed without a single dissenting vote that notice be published in the Ochiltree County Herald, that the Legion was connected in no way with the operation of any slot machines in Perryton or elsewhere.

About two weeks ago an operator of slot machines, who does not live in Perryton, made an offer to the executive committee of the Legion Post that he would give the Post 20 percent of the proceeds of all machines owned by him in the county. While every member of the committee expressed themselves as not being in favor of the operation of slot machines, the committee voted to accept the offer owing to the fact that the machines were already in operation. All funds received by the Legion from this source went into the Post's Rehabilitation fund, which is their charity fund. After being connected with the slot machine business for about ten days, during which time the Legion added over \$50.00 to their charity fund from the few machines owned by the out-of-town party, the Legion realized that they had made a mistake and promptly closed their connection with this business. This statement of facts is made by the Legion so that the public may know that the local American Legion Post has no connection whatsoever with any slot machines being operated in Perryton or any other place.

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That farmers received for their produce in the year just prior to the start of the AAA program \$3,979,000,000 against \$5,330,000,000 during the first year of the new administration.

Jones also is going to contend that processing fees incident to the program have not unduly hurt any class, and that the programs themselves were put into effect with the backing of most American farmers.

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MANY PAY TAXES LAST MONTH

SHERIFF TALLEY'S OFFICE COLLECTS ALMOST THIRTY THOUSAND DOLLARS IN PAST DUE TAXES

Another proof of the pulling powers of Herald advertising is shown in the amount of delinquent taxes collected by the office of Sheriff Talley. Early in June, Sheriff Talley ran a one-half page advertisement in the Herald calling attention to the big saving that would accrue to people who paid delinquent state and county taxes on or before June 30.

As a result of this publicity taxpayers of this county turned in to this office \$28,536.64 in past due taxes during the month. Of this amount, \$11,583.60 went to the state, and \$16,953.04 went to the county treasury. In addition to the delinquent tax collections, Sheriff Talley's office collected \$2,670.60 from the sale of truck and car licenses during June.

Down State Politicians 'Cut In' On Panhandle Drouth Relief

(An Editorial)

The down-state politicians and "powers that be" are determined to get their greedy paws on the greater part of the special drouth relief appropriation made last fall for the benefit of a group of drouth stricken counties in the Panhandle and near Midland, all in West Texas. These "down-state" politicians have done everything in their power to prevent any of this money coming to the Panhandle. After many months of delay, Panhandle representatives went over the heads of the Texas Relief Commission and got action from the Federal Government. It is rumored that much of the special fund set aside for this area actually was sent into Texas by the Federal government, but was diverted to other areas by the politicians.

Their latest raid on the funds that rightfully belong to the Panhandle and West Texas is seen in the reports appearing in the papers almost every day, where additional counties down in Texas are being designated as drouth stricken. Just another trick by the politicians to rob the people of West Texas. There is every indication that this is a deliberate attempt by the politicians to divert this money from the Panhandle.

Here in Ochiltree county, those that control the Texas Relief Commission, have already shown their hand. Ever since the Perryton Community Canning Kitchen has

HUNTER SPOKE HERE SATURDAY

FAIR CROWD HEARD OIL MAN FROM WICHITA FALLS SPEAK ON MAIN STREET HERE

"We must restore our state government to the plain people for their interest and contentment through a political recovery at the polls so that we may then, together, accomplish an economic recovery in this state," Tom F. Hunter, of Wichita Falls, candidate for governor, declared in an address in Perryton Saturday night.

"Those who led us into the condition in which we find ourselves are not the ones to lead us out of it. We need not only a new deal but a new dealer as well," Hunter declared in outlining the fifteen principal points of his program for a Texas recovery embodied in the platform upon which he is basing his candidacy. Two years ago Hunter polled more than 220,000 votes in a short whirlwind campaign even though he was comparatively unknown in a large part of the state.

"This state is so large and there are so many more towns than a man can possibly visit that I cannot speak in every place I should like to in this section of Texas. I must depend upon my friends among the plain people to pass my message along to their neighbors," Hunter said.

"If we are to achieve a recovery in this state it is necessary that we adopt a program which has for its aim two things, restoration of an easy available credit and retention for the people of Texas the proceeds and profits of the state's natural wealth. These are the two major purposes of the program upon which I submit my candidacy for the governorship. To accomplish this program a man who aspires to be governor must not only understand the causes for the plight in which we find ourselves but the measures needed to be taken in order to cure them.

"Our great president is exerting every effort to bring about a recovery in this country, and it is the duty of the state and every city and town within it to augment the national plan with recovery programs of their own in order to restore an easy available credit it is necessary that the unfair tax burden now resting on real estate be relieved. While real estate bears 77 per cent of the ad valorem tax burden it brings us but 15 per cent of our income. The other 85 per cent of values in this state, representing income from sources other than real estate, is bearing only 23 per cent as contrast to real estate's load. A blended tax plan must be adopted in order that the tax burden may be reallocated so that all pay in proportion to their ability and that the interests which have been dodging their fair share of the taxes may

International Sunday School Lesson

Why King Asa Was Called Good Lesson 2—July 8, 1934

Lesson Text: 2 Chron. 15: 1-12
Memory Verse: "The Lord is with you while ye be with him." 2 Chron. 15: 2

I. Asa Wins A Battle (2 Chron. 14).
Asa was the third kind of Judah. For ten years peace had blessed the land and had given Asa time to build forts and increase his army to a half million men. But now the war clouds thicken in the south as Zerah of the Ethiopians begins an invasion of Asa's country.

Zerah's army out numbered Asa's two to one. Also he had three hundred chariots while Asa had none. We would suppose that with such odds Ethiopia would win. But Asa was brave and prayerful. He asked God's help in protecting his country. So God helped Asa to overcome the army of the enemy. Judah's king therefore marched back to his capital (Jerusalem) with much spoil such as cattle, sheep and camels.

II. A Prophet Brings Asa A Message (2 Chron. 15: 1-7)

As Asa came back from the battle, a prophet named Azariah met him with a message from God. The message stated that God would be with Asa and the people as long as they would trust and obey him. This great promise was conditional. If the king and subjects would be faithful to the Lord the land would be protected from the enemy. But if they departed from their God, surely oppression and misery would follow. The truth of this message from Azariah is seen in the reigns of kings who followed Asa and were wicked. As they sowed, so they reaped. What a lesson for us today. Let's not become rebellious, a just God puts some conditions to his blessings. Remember how Naaman was angry because Elisha told him to go to the river and dip seven times to be cured of leprosy. Pardon today is obtained by obeying the gospel of Jesus Christ. But those conditions do not render grace any less divine nor the blood of Christ less cleansing. We simply come to where God can bless us.

III. Asa The Reformer

When Asa took the throne many of the people were worshipping idols. How soon can God's people forget his loving kindness and lapse back into the weak and beggarly lamentations of the world. The crime of forgetting is one of the most common ones with many of us. It is lamentable that we should so poorly use these memories of ours in treasuring up the blessings we have received. But the price is always to pay. The forgetter always sooner or later comes into his own. So it was with Judah and Israel. Many of their groanings could have been averted had they remembered God. Let us cultivate our power to remember the good and forget the evil. If we receive a favor, let us write it upon the tables of our heart and make it live forever. Eternal gratitude is the slogan that wins. It is the thought that inspires. It will work in the field of education; it will work in business; it will work in the church. Methinks the key to Asa's wonderful reign was the fact that he never erased God from the program of his life.

III. The Application

What will raise us to a higher level and make us good today? Of course we are not to fight battles as Asa did. Our conflict is of a spiritual nature. "We wrestle not against flesh and blood". But the enemies are legion. On every hand Satan is watching for a chance to ensnare us. But as God promised to be with Asa and his people if they would remain with him, so our success depends upon our loyalty to our God which in turn will yield the greatest service to our fellowmen. Would we make this world a better place in which to live? Would we lift the burdens from the down-trodden and distressed? Would we cheer our comrades along the pathway of life. Then let us, like good Asa of old who dared to stand for the right, live loyal to God's word and we shall surely be successful, and make many a desert blossom as a rose.

The Success of Repeal

GROW A GARDEN

While you are pausing for the maturity of other foods for canning and drying, it might be well to turn your attention to providing proper storage space for the finished products.

Proper storage affects the quality as well as the keeping of canned and dried foods, particularly dried foods. In rural homes a cool, dry cellar, or a room provided with shelves will serve nicely as a storage place.

Canned Foods

A shelf elevation for the storage of canned foods may be arranged with space between the last shelf and floor for the storage of vegetables.

The width of the shelves may be determined by the space to be utilized and the products to be stored. A shelf 12 inches wide will accommodate three jars while four rows of jars will require a depth of 16 to 17 inches. It is an economy in space to store three or four jars deep on shelves. The only precaution necessary is to be sure that the shelves are not so deep that it is difficult to reach the back rows of jars. The space between the shelves is also important, as too much width is only waste space. The shelves should be placed to fit the objects to be stored, but spaces 10 or 12 inches apart are generally most convenient and usable.

Convenience Is Goal

Careful arrangement of stored canned foods aids greatly in the quick location of products when needed for use. A very good plan is to store all of a kind together, having them run back the full depth of the shelves. Furthermore, have a section for vegetables, a section for fruit, and a section for preserves, etc.

It is not necessary to label all foods canned in glass, although certain vegetable mixtures, and jams, butters, etc., which are difficult to recognize readily at sight should be labeled. The gummed tape paper used at drug stores and dry goods stores for sealing wrapped packages would make a convenient labeling material. Tin cans should always be plainly labeled.

Storage of Dried Foods

The proper care and storage of home dried foods is very important, because of the danger of the material molding or becoming infested with insects.

There are a variety of containers in which dried products may be stored. Some of those that are usually available are strong paper bags, cans with tight fitting tops such as syrup pails and lard cans, heavy pasteboard boxes, and flour sacks dipped into melted paraffin a number of times. The containers

may be covered with reasonably close fitting slip covers made of about two thicknesses of muslin.

Beans and peas which have been dried or have been allowed to dry on the vine before being stored. Then spread to the depth of one-half to three-fourths inch in trays and place in drier or oven that is not very hot (150 to 165 degrees Fahrenheit) for 15 to 30 minutes. This treatment will destroy insect eggs and bean weevils, thus reducing the possibilities of loss in storage; but it also destroys the vitality of the material treated, which renders it useless for seed purposes.

If the beans are stored in syrup pails, again heat them for a few minutes and close the pail tightly. If stored, the beans must be thoroughly dry before being placed in the tightly closed pails.

All dried products should be kept in rooms that are airy and dry. Dryness is a factor of much importance.

ON TEXAS FARMS
By W. H. Darrow, Extension Service Editor

So successful was the huge beef canning program for relief purposes last winter in Texas that the Extension Service has been asked to help national relief leaders work out the same program for the entire drought area in the United States. Miss Mildred Horton, state home demonstration agent, has been helping with details in Washington. The re-opened canning plant in Amarillo is to be visited by workers from other states for guidance.

Relief agencies spent about \$500,000 on the entire beef canning relief program in Texas last winter, including cost of cattle and labor and material charges. A product worth \$776,956 was obtained, value being determined by the lowest competitive commercial bid received in a cost investigation.

Texas farmers and ranchers sold 21,720 cutter cows for an average of about \$5 per head above market quotations and 9439 unemployed persons were given wages of \$12 per week. An average of about 3000 people were employed steadily for 26 days.

Each worker in the relief canning turned out an average of 40 cans of beef per day. Labor cost per day was \$2, material cost per person \$4.50, and value of output \$344 per person per day. The net gain or saving to the public was about \$1.94 per person per day.

With hundreds of thousands of starving cattle in drought regions it is not surprising in view of the

remarkable success of the Texas experiment in killing, cutting and canning beef the A and M Way, that national relief leaders have adopted the Texas plan for national application.

Summer Outdoor Meals

Menus, and Easy Ways of Preparing Them, Suggested by A. & M. Home Economist

STILLWATER, Okla.—Here's a menu for that evening meal outdoors which is so enjoyable these hot days:

Deviled eggs
Carrot-cabbage salad, with tomato garnish

Bread and butter sandwiches
Berries and cream Cookies

Milk for children, Iced tea for adults
And here are the suggestions for preparing it given by Miss Daisy I. Pudy, head of the Oklahoma A. & M. College household science department:

"The deviled eggs, allowing one to two eggs per person, may be fixed immediately after breakfast, put in a covered refrigerator dish and kept in readiness for evening; also in the morning the cabbage for the salad may be shredded, the carrots washed, scraped and ground and placed in a covered dish in the refrigerator. The berries may be washed and a small amount of sugar put over them and then placed

in the refrigerator.

Easily Served
"When you are ready to serve, all

that will be necessary will be to add the salad dressing to the vegetables and mix well, place it on a lettuce leaf on the plate and garnish with the tomato. Make your bread and butter sandwiches. (Have you tried the cracked wheat bread on the market now? You will like it.) Place a sandwich and a deviled egg on your plate and it is all ready. The children will enjoy setting up the table in the yard and laying the needed covers."

A second menu suggested by Miss Purdy is:

Stuffed tomato salad
Lettuce sandwiches
potato chips, may or may not be added

Fruit jello, with or without cream
Milk for children, Iced tea for adults

And here are her suggestions on preparing it:

"Stuffed tomato salad has many variations. There are two general methods used in preparing the tomatoes. The first step is to choose uniform tomatoes and then peel them. This may be done in the morning. Then place them in the refrigerator until ready to use. The tomatoes may be scooped out and used as cups, or they may be cut into sec-

tions, not cutting all the way through. When they are placed on the lettuce leaf they will flare open.

Fillings Varied
"Now for the filling to use—here is where you may use your own ingenuity. You may use a fish salad, as salmon, tuna fish, shrimp or crab meat. I like to use 1 c. of flaked fish, 1 c. shredded cabbage, 1 medium apple diced, 1 teaspoon scraped onion, and 1-3 c. salad dressing. This will stuff six tomatoes.

"I often make my chicken salad similarly. Many prefer celery to cabbage; but if expense is an item, try cabbage.

"Have you ever tried canning boned chicken for salad? No. I can hold just a cup of chicken meat. It truly is delightful to be able to go to your pantry shelf and get a can of boned chicken to use these hot days.

Speeds Jello Setting
"Besides the fish and meat salad there are the large varieties of cottage cheese and egg salads, as well as many straight vegetable salads one may use for stuffing the tomato; and each one will give a different effect.

"In making fruited jello, here are two suggestions which help reduce the time required for it to set. First, heat only half the amount of liquid called for in the recipe. Dissolve the jello in this and add the rest, either

er fruit juice or water, cold. Second, have the jello mixture in an enamel pan, or the like, and set it in an ice and salt mixture containing some water. In this way the mixture will be ready to add the fruits and pour into the mold in about 30 minutes from the time it was started."

Fingers, Flies and Food

Are the Most Common Methods of Transmitting Intestinal Summer Diseases

Austin, Texas, The Texas State Department of health has joined the Government and other organizations in the use of letters to designate phases of their work, according to Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer. The letters used at this time are F F F and they stand for fingers, flies, and food—the three most common methods of transmitting intestinal diseases.

The three F's are generally responsible for the spread of typhoid fever, diarrhea, dysentery, and enteritis. Drinking water is considered a food and, as it is used by all ages, great care should be exercised to assure one that their supply is pure. If uncertain the water should be boiled before used for drinking purposes. Surface water and shallow wells are always to be suspected unless proven otherwise. Your city or county health officer will be glad to advise you on the proper method to use in chlorinating your water supply.

It is during hot weather when the most complaints are received on account of diarrhea and dysentery, and parents should do their utmost to prevent it. The chief

include impure milk, water, contaminated foods or wrong diet. Diarrhea develops the feeding should be stopped or greatly diminished and a physician called. Quinine should not be given unless a doctor prescribes them.

The three F's are the three most of danger to the baby. Flies and disease germs to the baby and food. Fingers and hands that are not thoroughly washed before preparing the babies food are likely to be germ carriers also. All milk water intended for the baby should be boiled for five minutes and carefully covered and kept in a place until used.

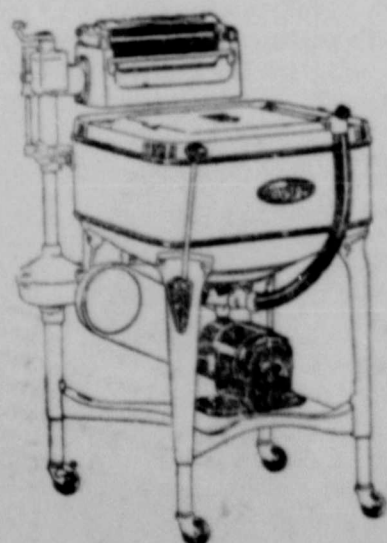

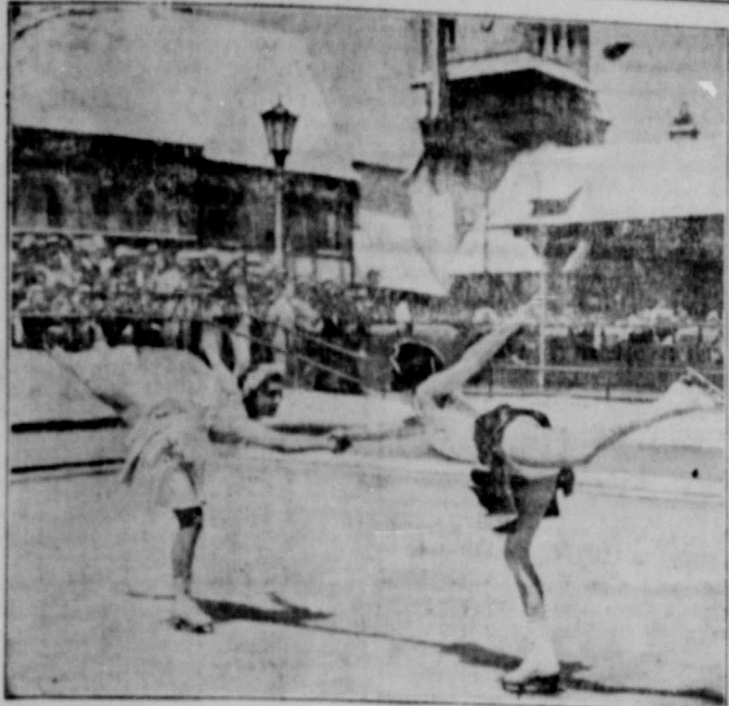

The value of hedges as a silage crop and the trench silo as a storehouse has been demonstrated in Comal county. In a demonstration with the county agent, one man made beef calves weigh 30 pounds more per head on an ensilage-cottonseed meal ration than a neighbor feeding similar calves could do on a bundle of hedges-cottonseed meal ration.

SPECIALIST EXPLAINS IDEAL DIET AND HOW TO GET IT AT HOME

STILLWATER, Okla., (Special)—Many a home economics specialist has outlined the perfect diet, but it remained for Miss Martha McPheters, extension specialist in foods and nutrition at the Oklahoma A. & M. College, to tell how to go about providing it for the rural family which has a limited amount of cash.

Miss McPheters' plan is described in an A. & M. extension leaflet, "Oklahoma's Live-at-Home Plan for a Family of Five."

The leaflet gives the daily requirement for children and adults of each kind of food, followed by the estimated yearly requirements of a family of five, and that followed by the most important point: how to get it.

For example: milk. A good diet requires a quart daily for each child, a pint daily for each adult, with additional milk for cheese and butter. For the family of five, this would take 1,400 quarts (365 gallons) of milk a year. Three cows, two freshening in the fall and one in the spring, will provide the requirements, using the average milk production of Oklahoma cows as a basis for the estimate.

The chart goes on through eggs and poultry, meat, vegetables, fruit, grain products, and honey or molasses, with a "How to get it at home" for each. The cows the poultry flock, the garden, orchard, and cane patch figure prominently in the source of supply.

The "daily food habits for good nutrition" on which the family demands are based are: Protein foods—milk, a quart daily for children and a pint daily for adults; eggs, seven weekly per person; meat, seven weekly serving per person; dried beans and peas, one serving weekly per person; cheese, occasionally.

Vegetables—tomatoes, seven serv-

ings weekly for children and four servings weekly for adults; leafy vegetables, four servings weekly; potatoes, one daily; other vegetables, seven servings weekly.

Fruit—one to two servings daily. Grain products—bread, every meal; cereal, one serving daily. Butter—every meal.

Sweets—one to three tablespoonfuls daily per person, more or less depending on the concentration of the kind of sweet which is used.

WILL ASSIST FARMERS MEETING CREAM GRADES

COLLEGE STATION—Beginning June 1st cream will be bought in Texas on grade, with a 2-cent premium paid for No. 1 cream over No. 2 cream, and No. 3 cream bought at all. To aid farmers to obtain the premium and to avoid losses, the Texas A and M Extension Service announces that county agents will assist creamery road men in explaining to meetings of farmers the necessary steps to produce No. 1 cream.

The cream grades as set forth by the State Department of Agriculture are: No. 1 sour cream is slightly sour, clean to the taste and free from objectionable odors and flavors and containing not less than 25 percent butterfat, and shall be free from all extraneous and deleterious matters. No. 2 cream is too sour to grade No. 1 and may contain slightly off flavors and shall be reasonably free from extraneous and deleterious matters. No. 3 cream shall be any cream which will not qualify as No. 1 or No. 2 cream, and which consists of all cream containing oily, yeasty, musty, onion or any other similar flavor or foreign fats and scrap butter that would render it unfit for human consumption.

be reached. An easy available credit cannot be restored until real estate, our basic wealth, is placed back on a profit paying basis. As long as it is cheaper to rent than to own a property or a home the safety of our state is endangered. Alone, of all the candidates in the race, I am offering a plan to relieve this unfair burden on real estate. The other five known candidates all declared that they will not look to any tax sources, saying in effect that they will permit real estate to continue to bear its unjust share of the load.

In his blended tax plan, Hunter explained, a net earning tax is proposed to be placed upon the larger brackets of income.

"Such a plan will eliminate a case in point, that of a great pipeline company, which during a depression year made a net profit of over twenty millions of dollars and paid in all taxes in the state less than \$500,000 or two and three-tenths per cent of its net profits. While this concern was paying this small per centage, real estate was paying from 50 per cent to 125 per cent of its income in taxes," Hunter said.

Discussing the public utilities, Hunter declared that their control by the state to permit regulation of rates "on a fair basis" is essential to a Texas recovery. He quoted figures to show that in Winnipeg, Canada, where utilities are controlled the rate of 350 kilowatt hours of service per month is \$3.08, while in Texas cities San Antonio being given as an example, the same service costs \$25.50.

"These utilities, too powerful in their set up to be brought into line by any one community are taking millions out of Texas annually in unfair profits," Hunter said.

Hunter declared, in regard to Texas' natural resources, that "our natural wealth is being siphoned out of the state for the benefit of out-of-state exploiters with little or no tax payment to recompense the

state. He urged a larger tax levy upon sulphur of which Texas supplies 80 per cent of the world's consumption.

"A reasonable tax on sulphur alone would retire the twenty million dollar relief bond issue," Hunter declared. He also urged a tax on salt for the benefit of the schools.

Dissolution of the oil trust is another important phase in a program for a Texas recovery," he stated. He charged that the major oil companies, through their integrated set ups "are destroying independent business." He urged the divestment of the filling station and pipeline set ups from the integrated set ups and declared for the enactment of legislation to bar holding company operation of subsidiaries.

Other phases of his recovery program, as outlined by Hunter, included a franchise or privilege tax on out-of-state owned chain stores, reorganization of the 131 state bureaus and agencies of government at Austin into fewer units to eliminate overlapping and duplicating functions in the interest of efficiency and economy, the abolition of the poll tax, reduction of automobile license fees to \$3 and \$5, and enactment of anti-discrimination legislation to prevent chain stores and monopolies from selling at a loss in one community in an effort to "destroy independent competition" while taking profits to make up their losses in other places where competition has been eliminated.

"We must maintain confidence in our government," Hunter said in conclusion. "Two years ago from more than 250 platforms I asked the people of Texas to join with me in making it a felony for a state official to accept a fee from an individual or corporation while on the payroll of the taxpayers. You can't tell me a man isn't influenced by the pay check from the second master when it comes time to decide between the welfare of the plain people and the special interest from which he gets that extra pay."
