City okays yearly budget; pool to stay open

The city council met Tuesday night and adopted the budget for the upcoming fiscal year. The total budget of \$6,378,360 is a 9% increase from this year's budget. City Manager David Hoover said almost all of that increase will go toward the purchase of a compactor for the landfill.

For those citizens wondering, the City Pool will open this summer.

Included in the budget is the purchase of one police vehicle and the Caterpillar Compactor for the landfill. The total for both purchases is about \$520,000.

Though the city's financial condition is still tight, Standard & Poor recently upgraded the City of Colorado City from an A- rating to an A.

In a letter to the council, Hoover said, "This will help us

obtain a better interest rate when we incur future loans for road replacement, sewer main and water main upgrades. We should start preparing a schedule for these repairs and replacements during the next 12 months."

A group of citizens were present for the council meeting. Most were there to hear what their neighbors had to say about some things happening in the

Hillcrest Addition in the northwestern part of the city.

Owens O'Quinn, Alvie Stephens, James Mendoza and Sara Redwine expressed their views about the trailer houses with numbered doors that have been located in the housing addition. The council couldn't respond to comments because the topics were not on the agenda, but the concerns will be included on

next month's meeting agenda and will be addressed by Hoover and the council.

Those speaking told the council they did not want a "man camp" located in their neighborhood. Redwine warned councilmen that there would be an increase in crime, drinking and loud partying in that area if a man camp comes in.

TDCJ testing to be held April 14th

Pre-employment testing for all potential Correctional Officers (COs) is being held Saturday, April 14th at the Wallace Unit in Colorado City.

Salary starts at \$36,000 per year for COs, and there's a \$4,000 recruiting bonus available.

To schedule testing, go to www.tdcj.texas.gov, select "Employment", select "Schedule CO Pre-Employment Testing", choose test location and date, and download and complete the application forms. Bring completed forms and all required documents to the scheduled appointment.

Plan to arrive at the Wallace Unit by 7:30 a.m. on April 14th.

Military veterans and applicants with a degree from a Texas institution are exempt from the testing. Contact TDCJ to apply.

Each tournament in the series has a \$30 entry fee. There will be a \$10 big bass side pot that is optional. Winner will take all the big bass pot. Payouts for each event will be based on the number of anglers that participate and can be changed at any time by the tournament director.

Muranda Garcia, a senior at Colorado High, signed a letter of intent Tuesday afternoon to play softball at Cisco Jr. College. A crowd of family members, students and staff gathered in the cafeteria of the school to witness the life-changing event.

The whole process started back in February. Cisco Jr. College softball coach Joel Prickett visited CHS a couple of months ago for the signing of Taylor Epperson to play volleyball and softball for the college. It was then that softball coach Kara LeLeux talked to the CJC coach about another exceptional softball player named Muranda Garcia.

Landry speaks to Lions Club

Drew Landry, Democratic candidate for District 83 House of Representatives, made a trip to Colorado City last week to speak to the Colorado City Lions Club. Landry has visited Colorado City many times over the last few months to talk about the Texas Legislature and the funding of public education.

Landry is a fellow Lion, as he is a member of a club in Lubbock. He understands that Lions have a passion for service and are active in many programs, especially when those programs help children.

The candidate said he is a Texan by choice. Landry grew up in southwestern Indiana and moved to Texas in 2012 to teach Government at South Plains College in Levelland. He lives in Lubbock with his dog, Thorin.

Landry said he takes education seriously. "It's the key to a better life," he said. He also said properly funding public education is the way to lower property taxes.

For most Texas citizens, school taxes amount to about half of all property taxes. Because the Texas Legislature only funds 38% of public education, taxpayers are left to bear the burden, according to Landry.

"Teachers deserve respect," Landry said. He went on to say they also deserve to be paid more. Some citizens see the "summer break" as a reason to keep teacher

pay low. But the candidate, who is a teacher himself, said most teachers work at least two jobs and are required to get out-of-school training during the summer.

"Teachers do God's work every day," Landry said. "And, teachers deserve a real raise."

The candidate said the Teacher Retirement System of Texas (TRS) is almost bankrupt, and the legislature has had the chance to deal with it before. Only retirees 65 and older enjoy the low premiums and deductibles of days gone by, thanks to lawmakers' reluctance to fund for TRS.

Retired teachers younger than 65 have experienced skyrocketing insurance premiums, deductibles and pharmaceutical costs. Coupled with low pay, teachers around the country have had enough, and some are fighting back.

"To that I say, 'It's about time!'" Landry said.

He said most teachers chose their career because they love kids and value their community. Landry said it seems that education and teachers are less important to lawmakers than bathrooms and sanctuary cities.

"Education is the heart of my campaign," Landry said. "Our leaders need to show they care. They need to pay attention and show that public education means something."

Landry said he knew he wanted to become a teacher at the age of 15. When his own high school teachers told students they need to decide on a plan for their careers, the teen began thinking about his strengths. He already helped his friends with their homework, so teaching seemed a natural fit.

"We (teachers) do this because we love our community, state, and country, and we want to best for the future," Landry said.

While the legislature provides about 38% of funding for public schools, Landry said the state should provide 50% of all funding for public education at a minimum. He said he'd like to see the number be closer to 60%, but 50% should be required.

Landry knows there's strength in numbers, and he hopes teachers will band together to pressure lawmakers to show their support of public education.

CHS students attend advisory council meeting

I am a member of the Congressional Youth Advisory Council for Congressman Conaway. Around once a semester, about eight of us get together in San Angelo and meet about a chosen topic. Yesterday's topic was gun control/second amendment rights. It was interesting to see that everyone was in agreement about the topic, though the congressman said that the group in another region was in complete disagreement about it.

The congressman led off the conversation with one thought-provoking question, "Who is responsible for student's safety?" After some thought, the students agreed that it is up to state and local governments to keep the students safe. This is not something that can or should be done on a federal level.

With this thought at the forefront of our minds, we had the task of discussing the removal of the second amendment, mental health issues, and gun control.

To begin the discussion, Congressman Conaway proposed a

question, "What is the purpose of the second amendment?" Immediately, a junior from Central High School in San Angelo piped up, "The second amendment protects us from a tyrannical government." All nodding in agreement, the conversation shifted.

We all realized that the thinking of removing the second amendment would only hurt the citizens not protect them. We then moved on to gun control. The congressman talked about the recent bill passed the previous week that furthers the legal implications of failing to enter the correct and complete information for background checking.

Conaway explained the process of creating gun control laws. Lawmakers ask the question, "Would this law have prevented any of the mass shootings?" With this new law, the answer is maybe.

Does this mean that there will be any future mandates or laws? Probably not. All council members agreed with the congressman when he stated that there isn't much that can be done in the way of gun control laws without infringing on the constitutional rights of the citizens to protect themselves from a tyrannical government.

This leaves us with the obvious underlying cause of school shootings: mental health. We found that deciding who is mentally fit to own a gun is a completely grey

area, and none of us found an adequate solution. In the words of the congressman himself, "If it were easy, it would have already been done."

As a student, there isn't much you can do to prevent a school shooting in terms of gun control. Walk-outs and marches may raise awareness for your cause, but advocating gun control is advocating taking away the rights of the citizens to protect themselves.

This conversation highlights that this isn't an issue of redneck hunters vs. innocent citizens. It's about whether we should be able to protect ourselves from a tyrannical government, and we should.

The biggest thing you can do as a student is show kindness, compassion, and make sure that you are aware of what is going on at all times. Keeping a careful eye on, yet still showing compassion to, the outcasts and loners of the school can go a long way in keeping the school safer.

While none of us could agree on how to help the loner/outcast student, we can all agree that everyone deserves kindness. In the words of Columbine school shooting victim Rachel Joy Scott, "I have this theory that if one person can go out of their way to show compassion, then it will start a chain reaction of the same. People will never know how far a little kindness can go."
