

Sales Tax to Go Into Effect Sept. 1

A broad-based sales tax will go into effect throughout the State of Texas Friday, September 1. This tax will affect every person who makes purchases from almost any kind of retail outlet. It will also affect most manufacturing concerns and general contracting concerns.

It's going to be hard for the customer as well as the supplier to get used to this tax, but the Legislature has passed the law that it would go into effect — and now we are going to have to live with it.

Below, in a question and answer form, most of the contents of the new law are discussed. We urge you to read this discussion very carefully as it is very important to each and every person who makes purchases.

QUESTIONS FROM A CONSUMER

(1) When does the tax go into effect?

September 1, 1961.

(2) How much will this new sales tax cost me?

On the average, the American people spend about 24% of their total income on items subject to this tax. This means that a man with an income of \$5,000 a year will spend about \$1,200 on taxable goods and will pay an annual sales tax of about \$240.

(3) What are the main things on which I will pay the sales tax?

Furniture, household and kitchen appliances, most clothing, household supplies, toys, restaurant meals and electric and gas utility service.

(4) What are the main things on which I will not pay the sales tax?

Groceries, housing (whether you own or rent), medical and dental expenses, insurance, telephone service, your car and the gasoline you buy to run it.

(5) Why won't the tax apply to a car?

Because motor vehicles have been subject to a selective sales tax in Texas since 1941. That tax is now at the rate of 1-1/2% and will not be increased by the new sales tax bill. Because the state already levies taxes on such things as cigarettes, gasoline and beer they too will be exempt from the new sales tax.

(6) What about a television set which is already subject to a state tax?

The new sales tax will apply to television sets, but the old state tax has been repealed. Actually the tax on television sets, radios, and air conditioners is reduced from 3% to 2% by the new tax bill. The tax on cosmetics is reduced from 2.2% to 2%.

(7) How will I pay the tax?

When you buy something that is taxable, the retailer will add the tax to the purchase price. He will determine the correct tax by applying a tax "bracket" stated in the law. For example, purchases under 25c will not be taxed. If the price is between 25c and 74c you will pay a tax of one penny; the tax will be two cents on items costing from 75c to \$1.24, and so on. Over the long haul, this bracket system is designed to average out to a 2% tax on what you buy, and it enables the retailer to collect the tax without the nuisance of stamps or tokens.

(8) Can I get credit for this tax when I pay my Federal income tax?

Yes, this tax is levied on the consumer. Probably the Internal Revenue Service will shortly issue a special bulletin which will provide an easy way to determine how much of a deduction you may take. IRS has done this for all other sales tax states. Of course, you can always keep your own records and use them instead of the standard IRS deduction.

QUESTIONS FROM RETAILERS

(1) Won't this be difficult for me to collect?

Collection of the new tax will impose some additional responsibilities on you and your employees, but similar duties are being handled with no great difficulty by 1,200,000 other retailers in the 35 sales tax states. Most retailers, including grocery stores, are already collecting some state and federal excise taxes and have some experience on which to rely.

(2) How will I collect this tax?

By a prescribed bracket system which will tell you how much tax to add to any given sale. Briefly you will not collect a tax if the sale is less than 25c; if it is between 25c and 74c you will collect one penny tax; if it is between 75c and \$1.24 you will collect two pennies and so forth.

(3) Will I have to keep track of the pennies I collect?

No. You will pay the state a flat 2% of your taxable income.

(4) What kind of form will I file with the State?

The Comptroller will devise a form in the very near future. It will probably be simple enough to fit on an IBM card.

(5) Do I have to get a license from the State?

High School Registration Next Week

Roy B. Mathews, principal of the Santa Anna High School, announces registration for the four high school grades will be held Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of next week. School is scheduled to begin on Tuesday, Sept. 5th.

Mr. Mathews said the Freshmen and Sophomores would register on Monday, Aug. 28; Juniors and Seniors would register on Tuesday, Aug. 29. Those who cannot get to the building on either of the above dates will register on Wednesday, Aug. 30. Registration hours will be from 9:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon each day.

Registration in the elementary school will be on Sept. 5.

Supt. Cullen N. Perry said the faculty was completed early this week with the employment of Mr. Daniel J. Tindol Jr., who will be the Science and Math instructor in the high school. He will also coach tennis.

Another new teacher in the local school will be Mrs. Larry Manning, who will teach commercial subjects and English.

Mr. Perry said the school board would meet in a called meeting Thursday, Aug. 24, for the purpose of studying the budget for the coming year. The meeting will be held in the evening and the public is invited to attend.

A complete list of the faculty and other information regarding the opening of the schools for the fall term will be published next week.

Wheat Marketing Referendum Thurs.

Wheat farmers are urged to cast their vote in the wheat marketing quota referendum, being held Thursday, August 24. Voting places are at the Coleman County Agricultural Building and the Santa Anna National Bank.

Polls will be open from 8:00 a. m. to 6:00 p. m.

Yes, but there is no charge for this permit. If you now pay the state store tax you will automatically receive an application for a sales tax permit.

(6) Do I have to buy a special cash register that keeps track of exempt and taxable sales?

Not unless you wish to do so. The Comptroller will work out some reasonable and simple methods of enabling you to separate taxable and non-taxable sales.

(7) Suppose I do buy a new cash register do I pay the tax on it?

You do. In this case you are the consumer and you must pay the tax.

QUESTIONS FROM OTHER BUSINESSMEN

(1) I am a wholesaler, will I have anything to do under this tax?

Yes. In the eyes of the sales tax law you are a retailer. However, most, perhaps all, of your sales will be exempt because you are selling to persons who then re-sell to the general public. When your customers buy from you, they will sign a re-sale certificate.

(2) I am a manufacturer. How will this tax affect my business?

You will not have to pay the tax on your raw materials — that is on the component parts of what you manufacture. You will have to pay the tax when you buy machinery, supplies, office equipment, etcetera.

(3) I am a printer. How will this tax affect my business?

You will have to collect it in most cases. If you print some letterheads for a business firm, you will have to collect the tax on the total amount of the sale, assuming you provided the paper. If the customer supplied the paper and you just did the printing, then the tax would be due on the amount you charged for that service.

(4) I am a building contractor. How will this tax affect my business?

You will be viewed as the consumer of the tangible personal property which goes into your construction. This means that you will pay the tax on the lumber, nails and bricks, as well as on your equipment, tools, etcetera. Since you cannot collect the tax when you sell the construction (it now being real estate and not subject to tax) you will have to allow for the tax expense when you quote prices.

62 Year Old Men And Women May Be Losing Money

Nobody wants to lose money. Yet this is happening every day, according to R. R. Tuley Jr., manager of the Abilene social security office.

This is true because many people who are 65 or older do not seem to know that they do not have to quit work completely to get all or some of their social security benefits during the year.

Under the social security law, if you are eligible for retirement benefits, you can earn up to \$1,200 a year and get a benefit check for all 12 months in the year. If you make more than \$1,200 you will still receive a check for any month in which you do not earn more than \$100 or do not render substantial services in self-employment.

In addition, even if you earn more than \$1,200 a year and work all months in the year, you may still get some benefit checks during the year. For earnings over \$1,200 and up to \$1,700 benefits are withheld on the basis of \$1 in benefits for each \$2 earned. On earnings over \$1,700, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$1 earned. Therefore, the benefits a person or family can actually receive when the person earns more than \$1,200 a year depends on both his total wages and the total amount of benefits due.

State Capital NEWS

Austin — Ben Ramsey's appointment as Railroad Commissioner — after a decade in which his name has been synonymous with the Lieutenant Governorship — carries with it several major political implications.

First, it's a pretty safe bet that the quiet-spoken East Texan will not be in the field of contenders for the Governor's chair. Pre-campaign speculation has had Ramsey in practically every gubernatorial race in recent years.

Second, it leaves the 1962 race for the Lieutenant Governorship wide open. At least a half-dozen likely prospects already have been mentioned.

Third, it puts Sen. Bruce Reagan of Corpus Christi automatically in charge of the Lieutenant Governor's duties. He was elected by his colleagues as President Pro Tempore of the Senate shortly before Gov. Prive Daniel's announcement of Ramsey's appointment.

There could be several "Lieutenant Governors" before the election this year. This depends on how many legislative sessions occur between now and then. Texas' Constitution provides that a President Pro Tempore shall be elected at the beginning and at the end of each session.

Governor Daniel has announced that he will call another special session before the end of the year. So it will be up to the Senate to elect a man who will assume the duties of Lieutenant Governor for that session. Then another will be chosen for the interim between it's windup and the beginning of the next one. And so on!

Meanwhile, Reagan is first in line of succession to the Governor's office.

Ramsey's appointment to the \$17,500 a year Railroad Commission post came as no surprise in political circles.

Appointment is for the unexpired term of the late Olin Calkerson, which runs until January 1, 1963. Then, if Ramsey desires a full six-year term, he will have to stand for election.

Ramsey joins Ernest O. Thompson and William J. Murray, the present chairman, on one of the most important agencies in the state government. The Railroad Commission not only regulates all Texas oil and gas production, but all highway and railroad freight and passenger rates in the state.

ANOTHER SPECIAL SESSION ASSURED

At the close of the called special session which voted a teacher's pay raise averaging \$810 per year, Governor Daniel announced he will call another session sometime before the end of the year, to act on several matters.

He said he will submit such subjects as loan sharks control legislation, a law to include banks in the recently-passed abandoned property act, juvenile delinquency legislation, and controls over municipal annexation.

The short session, in addition to the teachers' pay raise, also provided additional money for the operation and maintenance of school buses and for administration.

A law requiring runoffs in congressional elections when one candidate doesn't receive a majority was passed in the dying moments of the session.

Although the major objectives of the Texas State Teachers Association have been reached, there are more to come.

These include a sick leave plan for teachers; provision for assistant superintendent units for large school systems; using average daily attendance, instead of scholastic census, as the factor for determining distribution of the State's available school funds to local districts; more driver education teachers; compulsory attendance for all children, six through 16, for the whole school year; and creation of regional film libraries.

Incidentally, the \$810 teacher pay raise doesn't necessarily mean every teacher in the state will get such a raise. Some districts already are paying their

teachers more than the state minimum. In such cases it's up to the districts to decide whether a raise is in order.

SALES TAX EXPLAINED

Prime targets of the state's new two percent sales tax, which becomes effective September 1, are furniture, household and kitchen appliances, clothing with some exceptions, household supplies, toys, restaurant meals and gas and electric utility bills.

But those are not all by any means, as you'll soon discover.

However, groceries, housing, medical and dental bills, insurance and telephone service will not be covered by the new levy.

One break for the taxpayer came with the new tax bill. The three percent tax which was on television sets, radios and air conditioners will be reduced to two percent. Cosmetics tax will be lowered from 2.2 percent to two percent.

It should be some consolation, at least, to know that all sales taxes under the new law are consumer taxes and thus deductible from the federal income tax.

DANIEL ACCEDES TO SALES TAX

Governor Daniel filed the sales tax bill with the Secretary of the State, unsigned. This permitted it to become law without his signature.

He said to veto it at this time, when appropriations must be met September 1, "would be disastrous to the State of Texas, its school children, state institutions, old age pensioners, and other programs which are dependent upon adequate revenue

and appropriations."

"It is with considerable regret," he said, "that I feel compelled to permit this type of bill to become law. Among other inequities it contains a limited type of general sales tax which I have opposed for 22 years."

"There is no time to 're-fight' the tax battle," he added.

SCHOOL BUS PRICES FIXED?

An anti-trust suit has been filed by Atty. Gen. Will Wilson against 16 persons and firms. Suit alleges that bids on school buses sold to the state have been rigged.

Wilson said something like 5-100 buses costing \$23,000,000 are involved. Allegation is that those named agreed to "fix, maintain and increase the price at which school buses are sold in the State of Texas."

Suit asks penalties up to \$3-600,000 for price-fixing acts covering a period from January 1, 1955 to August 16, 1961.

DO'S AND DON'TS WITH STATE MONEY

The Legislature says it's all right for the Governor to transfer funds from other appropriations into the Civil Defense and Disaster Relief appropriation if the resident proclaims the national safety is in danger.

It also says he can purchase a \$10,000 limousine for official use — but Governor Daniel quickly announced he would not do so "as long as the state deficit continues."

Legislature says it's NOT all right for state money to be spent on embossed or engraved printing or stationery, except for the

offices of Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House, members of the Legislature, and for degrees and diplomas from state institutions of higher learning.

SHORT SNORTS

There will be no more game wardens in Texas after September 1. Thereafter they will be called "conservation officers." "Actually," says Howard Dodgen, secretary of the Game and Fish Commission, "they spend more time on prevention of violations than in actually making arrests."

Advertising of liquor stores is legal in dry counties as long as the ad doesn't refer to liquor, according to an Attorney General's opinion. In the case in point, the name of the liquor store didn't indicate what it sells.

Big rhubarb is in the making in Texarkana, over the new two percent sales tax for Texans. When Arkansas levied a three percent sales tax, Texarkana, Arkansas, was exempted because

Texas had no sales tax. There was a provision, however, that when Texas does levy a sales tax, citizens of Texarkana, Arkansas, must start paying the Arkansas tax.
