IKE SCORES VICTORY

Tax Cut Issue Goes Back To The House

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House agreed today to send a Senate-passed tax bill to a Senate-House Conference Committee to try to iron out a hot dispute over a proposed income tax cut.

WASHINGTON (AP)—A dramatic 50-44 Senate vote killing a Democratic-sponsored income tax cut switched back to the House today the political row over President Eisenhower's tax policies.

The Senate yesterday passed by voice vote a bill to extend present corporation and excise tax rates a year beyond April 1. The measure was in exactly the form Eisenhower asked.

Disappointed Democratic leaders saw go down the drain a substitute to give low-income taxpayers a \$20 reduction in 1956, plus \$10 for each dependent other than a spouse. The cut would have gone chiefly to families earning under \$5,000.

On this crucial issue five Democrats—Byrd and Robertson of Virginia, Ellender of Louisiana, George of Georgia and Holland of Florida—joined 45 Republicans to defeat the substitute offered by Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas. Sen. Langer (R-ND) lined up with 43 Democrats on the losing side.

It was a clear-cut, if preliminary, victory for Eisenhower's supporters. They contended Johnson's was an irresponsible proposal in the face of continued deficit financing.

Democrats replied that Republicans had indicated a tax cut would be proposed in 1956 and were favoring big business and high-income individuals over the "little fellow."

Harlan's Name Before Senate

WASHINGTON (AP)—Judge John Marshall Harlan's nomination to the Supreme Court came before the Senate today. Even opponents conceded his confirmation.

Harlan, grandson of a Supreme Court Justice, was selected by President Eisenhower last November to fill the vacancy left by the death of Justice Robert H. Jackson.

Once Harlan's nomination was acted on, Senate leaders planned to turn to Eisenhower's nomination of Joseph Campbell, a former atomic energy commissioner, to a 15-year term as comptroller general. Congress' watchdog on government spending. Campbell has filled the \$17,500-a-year post since last December, serving under a temporary appointment.

Harlan's nomination was approved by the Senate Judiciary Committee a week ago. The vote was 10-4, with one member abstaining. Campbell's nomination was approved the next day by an 8-4 vote of the Senate Government Operations Committee.

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Three Men Parachute To Safety As Bomber Crashes

FLORENCE, S.C. (AP)—An Air Force B-47 bomber crashed in flames near North, S.C., early today but its three crewmen parachuted to safety.

The men had scratches, cuts and minor bruises but were not seriously injured.

They were flown at once back to Hunter Air Force Base at Savannah, Ga., to which the bomber was attached. A spokesman there identified them as Capt. James M. Watson Jr., Lexington, Va., the plane commander; Capt. John F.

Sabels, Muskogee, Mich., observer; and Lt. Floyd D. Doss, Lynchburg, Va., pilot.

Ground crews, a helicopter from the nearby Shaw Air Force Base and Civil Air Patrol planes joined in the brief search for the crewmen.

The plane, on a training mission, was based at Hunter Air Force Base, Savannah, Ga. The public information officer at Hunter, Capt. J. H. Fulton, said no information had been received there as to the cause of the crash.

British Labor Party Kicks Out Aneurin Bevan

LONDON (AP)—Laborite members of Parliament kicked Leftwinger Aneurin Bevan out of their ranks today on charges of disloyalty. This isolates him as an independent in the House of Commons.

The 57-year-old Welsh orator, a former coal miner, was reported to have told a secret meeting of Labor members of Parliament he would never ask for reinstatement.

The action came on a motion to "withdraw the whip" from Bevan, meaning to remove the party label. The vote was 141-112.

This disciplinary move was sponsored by the moderate supporters of former Prime Minister Clement R. Attlee, the party's 72-year-old official leader. He has been subject to repeated attacks from Bevan and his followers in the last three years.

Attlee's supporters rejected a last minute attempt to get Bevan off with a reprimand. The vote on that was 138-126.

The outcome was a triumph for Attlee, but it may prove a costly victory. Observers believed the split would dash the Labor party's hope of defeating Prime Minister Churchill's Conservatives in the next general election, which Churchill must call before October, 1956, and perhaps will call this year.

Bevan, a leftwinger was accused of party disloyalty and challenging the moderate leadership of Clement Attlee.

Bevan still retains his membership in the Labor party, however, until the whole party membership has a chance to vote.

The disloyalty charges grew out of Bevan's headed opposition to the official party line on hydrogen weapons.

Attlee and the Shadow Cabinet backed the Churchill government's policy of building and stockpiling H-bombs as a deterrent to Communist aggression.

"It's no good going to the Kremlin and thinking you can read them the Sermon on the Mount," Attlee said in a speech.

But Bevan kicked over the traces with a call for a British declaration that this nation would never use the H-bomb unless an enemy uses one against Britain first.

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP)—The Thai Criminal Court last night found 49 persons guilty of plotting to set up a Communist regime in this strategic Southeast Asian country.

All 49 were sentenced to 20 years in prison, but the sentences of 48 were reduced to 13 years and four months each because of good behavior since they were rounded up in November 1952.

Five other persons were acquitted.

The defendants were accused of conspiring unsuccessfully to overthrow the government of Premier P. Phibulsongram between 1949 and 1952. Police said in 1952 the Red network had infiltrated the government offices and even the National Assembly.

Seamen Will Strike Rather Than Deliver Fuel To Reds

HELSINKI, Finland (AP)—The Finnish seamen's union announced today the crew of the tanker Aruba will strike rather than sail the ship and its cargo of jet fuel to Communist China.

The union said as a result of Nationalist Chinese threats and the U.N. ban on strategic materials to the Chinese Reds, "the ship finds itself in danger of getting involved in actions of war."

It called on the tanker's Finnish owners to "direct the ship to safer waters." The union announcement said the crew has refused to sail beyond Singapore.

The eastbound tanker is believed to be somewhere in the Indian Ocean.

Finnish shipping circles suggested the owners, the Re-Bel Shipping Co., might divert the Aruba to Indonesia for reloading of the 13,000 ton cargo on to other China-bound ships.

A spokesman for the shipping company said no action could be taken yet because no strike warning had been received.

The Aruba picked up its load of jet fuel from the Romanian port of Constantza, on the Black Sea. When it sailed for Red China early this month, U.S. congressmen launched a series of protests and the Chinese Nationalists on Formosa said they would intercept the tanker.

The Finnish government said it was powerless to stop the Aruba because it was privately owned and chartered "to a foreign country"—reportedly to a Hong Kong shipping firm owned by the Chinese Reds.

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One report from Helsinki hints the tanker, laden with 13,000 tons of jet fuel, may try to slip up the Pearl River to Whampoa, near Canton.

The Nationalist position is this: They have declared all Red China ports closed to foreign shipping and regard the territorial waters of the subcontinent as being theirs, although they cannot exercise effective control over them.

They therefore would regard it as within their sovereign rights to take any action necessary against the Aruba or any other ship within Red China's territorial waters.

Bluntly, if the Nationalists thought it was necessary to sink the Aruba in territorial waters, they would.

The Whampoa area is within easy reach of their planes.

Former Big Springer Shot Down At Llano

Body of Freddie Hoyt Ham Jr., 25-year-old former Big Springer, was being transferred here today from Llano where he was killed Tuesday afternoon.

Ham was shot twice with a 22-caliber rifle and was severely beaten in an incident on the Llano County courthouse square about mid-afternoon.

Malcolm Brewer, 26, of Llano and Big Lake, was charged with murder. An autopsy was ordered to determine whether Ham died of bullet wounds or the beating.

Ham lived in Big Spring until 1947 when he entered the Air Force. Recently he had resided near Big Lake where he worked on the Bar S Ranch.

Funeral services for Ham will be conducted at the River Chapel at 3 p.m. Thursday with Rev. Calvin Wylie, Assembly of God pastor, officiating. Interment will be in the city cemetery.

Authorities at Llano said the shooting and beating occurred after Ham and Brewer had conferred with Llano County Attorney A. G. Mueller concerning a pending divorce action by the Brewers. The discussion also concerned application for a restraining order which would prohibit Mrs. Brewer from removing the couple's two children from Llano County.

Mrs. Brewer, the children and friends had gone from Big Lake to Llano with Ham, according to Mueller.

Many Delinquent Contracts Found

AUSTIN (AP)—The House Special Investigating Committee recommended today that the House consider "liquidation of the Veterans Land Program at the earliest practical time."

The recommendation, based on six weeks' investigation of the veterans land scandal, was made in the committee's initial report to the house.

"We find that the Veterans Land Board has a large percentage of delinquent contracts at the present time," the committee said.

"We find that the Veterans Land Board has heretofore engaged in the very expensive practice of sending state employees at state expense over the state to contact the veterans purchasers in person in an attempt to collect such delinquencies. Your Committee deems this procedure to be impractical and an unnecessary expenditure of state funds."

The committee said it has found "many irregularities in the administration" of the 100 million dollar land program.

"We find that appraisals were made by appraisers in the field, and we further find that many of said appraisals were lowered or raised with a pencil in the office of the Veterans Land Board," said the report.

Among its 13 recommendations, the five-member committee proposed that a "cross-check" be established "on the official appraisal by qualified persons in the county where the land lies."

The same recommendation also suggested that the state "purchase no land at a figure higher than the reasonable market value of said land at the time the same is purchased, disregarding future possibilities of said land and requiring a comparison of land sales in the immediate vicinity on the open market."

Findings of the committee were based on testimony received from past and present employees of the Veterans Land Board and the General Land Office. The investigation will continue, and a final report will be made before the end of the legislative session.

The committee said it found that "multiple or block transactions above five in number were approved by the commissioner of the general land office, personally, upon his instructions."

The reference was to former Land Commissioner Bascom Giles who resigned Jan. 1 and who has since been indicted by the Travis and Bexar County grand juries in connection with the land scandal.

Other findings of the committee:

1. That the land commissioner was in charge of the administration of the Veterans Land Board and that all instructions were issued by him or his subordinates.
2. That neither the governors of the state nor the attorneys general "ever issued any instructions to any employees of the Veterans Land Board, or ever attempted in any way to direct said employees."
3. That the late Gov. Beauford Jester was on the board prior to Gov. Shivers, and former Atty. Gen. Price Daniel, now a senator, served ahead of Atty. Gen. John Benesh.
4. That employees were alerted from time to time to be on the lookout for certain applications, particularly block deals, which were expected to arrive in the office.
5. That in such cases such transactions were expedited and given preference upon arrival in the office.
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Shivers Denies Using Pressure On Any Requests

AUSTIN (AP)—Gov. Shivers testified under oath today before Senate investigators that neither he nor any member of his staff has ever brought any "undue pressure" in veterans land program transactions.

He said he has answered 1,500—possibly 2,500—letters from veterans, mostly inquiring about the status of their applications. He said policy is to refer the letters to the land office.

"Let me say very frankly I'm going to continue that," he said.

Shivers was called back before the Senate committee by Sen. Jimmy Phillips of Angleton.

Phillips said in all of his investigations he had found only one reference in Land Office files to the governor or his office—that in a file concerning a block deal in Robertson County.

Phillips read into the record a copy of a letter the governor wrote Dr. A. J. Ashmore of Corpus Christi in response to Ashmore's inquiry concerning the status of his application.

Shivers' letter replied that the inquiry was being called to the attention of Bascom Giles, then chairman of the Veterans Land Board. It added that the governor was sure Giles would "do everything possible to expedite your application."

The governor said he assumed the emphasis of Phillips' inquiry was on the word "expedite."

"That seems to have gotten to be a bad word," he remarked.

He said the phrasing of the reply was explained by the nature of the inquiry. "The inquiry was about why the processing of the application was so slow," he said.

"If anything is wrong with that letter, then we have been wrong 1,500 or 2,500 times," he added.

The transaction involved concerned land eventually sold to the state for \$99,200 for resale to a group of veterans after two state appraisals had placed the value first at \$64,000 and then at \$86,000.

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Says State Department Should Make Public Yalta Documents

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. George (D-Ga.) predicted today Secretary of State Dulles may change his mind and make public the controversial Yalta conference documents.

George, who heads the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said in an interview he thinks the record of the Roosevelt-Churchill-Stalin conference 10 years ago "should be made public and the State Department should do it."

Dulles was reported to have told some lawmakers he is reconsidering his decision not to make public the documents. The implication, these legislators said, was that he will ask Britain if it still objects.

The British Foreign Office said Saturday a U.S. suggestion to make the Yalta papers public was rejected on grounds "it is undesirable for detailed records of important international discussions to be published so short a time after their occurrence, and in particular during the lifetime of many of the participants."

Senators who have talked to Dulles quoted him as saying he does not believe there is "anything new or startling" in the documents.

Pat Breaks Down As She Recites Call Girl Career

NEW YORK (AP)—Pat Ward returns to the witness stand in the Mickey Jekke vice trial today to make another stab at telling about her life as a cafe society call girl.

The slimly attractive brunette wept uncontrollably when questioned yesterday about her life with Jekke and the men who bought her favors for high fees.

Court was recessed once to give her a chance to regain control. When she broke down again soon afterwards, the session was stopped for the day.

Now 21, Miss Ward repeated testimony which the public and press were not allowed to hear in Jekke's first trial in 1953.

He was convicted at that time on two counts of compulsory prostitution but the verdict was later set aside because the courtroom had been closed while the prosecution presented its case.

Miss Ward, whom Jekke is accused of inducing into a life of prostitution, seemed composed and assured as she took the stand as the state's star witness. Tall and erect, she wore a becomingly plain black dress with a green

scarf tucked gently around the neck.

However, as Asst. Dist. Atty. Anthony J. Liebler drew from her the story of her life, her composure began to crack until she was finally silenced by choking sobs.

She told of meeting Jekke in 1951 and of going to live with him in his East Side apartment. She said that after a short time he told her he needed money and she could help him by taking fees from men she would meet through him.

At the time Jekke was a 21-year-old society playboy and prospective heir to a large oleomargarine fortune. The state contends he took Miss Ward's call girl earnings to finance his high living until he came into his inheritance.

Miss Ward testified that Jekke had told her they would eventually be married but could use money that other men would give her in the meantime.

She said she suggested they both could get jobs and be married, "but he said he wouldn't allow his wife to live in an unbecoming style."

Jaffee said the station was swamped with telephone calls. Some viewers were indignant about the mixup, he said, while some "got quite a laugh out of it" and others were amazed.

Mother Dove Puts Halt To Work On Hospital Building

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP)—Workers building a seven-million-dollar addition to a Naval hospital are leaving part of their job unfinished—until a dove hatches its eggs.

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Matusow Tries To Beat The Rap For Contempt

EL PASO (AP)—Turnabout witness Harvey Matusow sat in the federal courtroom today where he has testified twice before and prepared to defend himself on a criminal contempt citation.

Matusow was held in contempt by Judge R. E. Thomason Saturday after the judge denied a new trial for Clinton Jencks, former Mine-Mill Union leader convicted of falsifying a non-Communist affidavit.

Matusow asserted that if he were sentenced to jail for contempt of court he would be imprisoned for telling the truth.

The self-admitted liar has testified he lied during the Jencks trial. This assertion gained Jencks a hearing on a motion for a new trial last week which Thomason denied.

Matusow asserted he would appeal Thomason's decision if it is one of guilty of contempt. Thomason, in citing Matusow for contempt, said the former New Yorker deliberately and maliciously schemed to obstruct justice.

Matusow said he lied in the first place because "you're able to make a fast buck as a professional witness."

Synthetic fibres have made inroads on cotton markets, he reminded, but the cotton industry has not been asleep. Total consumption is still about three million bales per year more than before the war, but with a parade of new fibres and blends, there is danger of a slip.

"It is a lot better and more economical to keep a cotton customer than to lose and then have to win that customer," he said.

While cotton must sell itself quality and price wise, people of this area may also be reminded of loyalty to cotton, said Gregg.

"You don't need to remind us of the importance of cotton to the economy of this area," observed Mrs. Hayes Stripling. "Business which didn't come in the fall of these drought years has freshened our minds on that point."

Sentence Suspended If He Goes To Church

POUGHKEEPSIE, N.Y. (AP)—Justice of the Peace George Dietz gave William B. Johnson, 22, a 30-day sentence and fined him \$75 for 11 traffic citations, including one for reckless driving. Then the justice suspended the sentence on the condition that Johnson attend church every Sunday for a year. He appointed a local minister to see that he does.

Girl Doing Nicely After Operation On Wall Of Heart

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—Penny Rae Raymond, 7, was reported in satisfactory condition today at University of Minnesota Hospital, where a hole in her heart wall was sewed up yesterday.

The hole had permitted blood from the veins to mix with purified blood leaving the heart.

During the 2½-hour operation, a human donor, Ted Goodman, 41, was linked with the child while blood was cut off from her heart. His heart and lungs did the work for both. The actual interchange of blood took 11 minutes.

Goodman is a close friend of Penny's parents Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Raymond, of Waukesha, Wis. He was kept under observation overnight at the hospital.

Medical men said a hole as big as a nickel was closed in the muscular wall between Penny's heart chambers.

L&N Picketing Issue Before Federal Court

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (U)—The Louisville & Nashville Railroad strike, after stranding passenger and freight service in 13 states, rolled into court again today.

Circuit Judge Stuart E. Lampe may rule on a motion to dissolve his order requiring train crews to ignore picket lines thrown up by 25,000 nonoperating employees.

Six operating crafts objected to the temporary order issued yesterday by Lampe because of the railroad's "emergency." Some of these crafts contended the line is now "unsafe" but the railroad denied any hazards existed.

If the order is made permanent, W. L. Grubbs, general counsel for the L. & N., said he believes it would apply not only in Kentucky but throughout the system. "If not, similar action will be taken in other states," he said.

The company said about 90 per cent of the operating employees were respecting picket lines which sprang up all along the L. & N. and two subsidiaries — Nashville, Chattanooga & St. Louis Railway and the Clinchfield Railroad.

The L. & N. already has suspended 21 passenger schedules. It said freight operations were at a minimum here and "spotty" elsewhere on the 4,737-mile line.

Effects of the walkout also were mushrooming into other industries. Some plants in Nashville, Tenn., were reported shut down and 28 coal mines in Harlan County, Ky., were said to be idle for lack of railroad cars.

"The situation is not very encouraging at the present time," said Frank W. Switzer of the National Railway Mediation Board. He arrived yesterday from Washington and has been in constant touch with both sides.

His job was complicated by a disagreement between the L. & N. and the 10 AFL nonoperating unions over the issue that brought on the three-day-old strike.

The company claims the nucleus of the argument is a health and welfare program; the unions admit this is one issue—but not the most important. Also involved they say, are Sunday pay, vacations and other factors.

Palace Urged To 'Tell All' About Margaret's Romance

LONDON (U)—A new demand was heard in Britain today that Buckingham Palace break its silence on the reported romance between Princess Margaret and RAF Group Capt. Peter Townsend.

The Laborite Daily Herald insisted "it is clearly desirable that there should be a statement from the palace" and declared: "This is not simply a private matter." The tabloid Daily Mirror also lashed out at persons who have complained about reports of the romance appearing in most London newspapers.

London's morning newspapers

displayed pictures of a smiling princess, taken last night when Margaret attended the dedication of a new church in the war-blighted East End.

Hundreds of onlookers gave the princess a noisy welcome when she arrived for the service in the Anglican church of Sts. Phillip and John. Cries of "We'll love you always" and "We're with you, Margaret," came from every side.

The princess sat alone at the head of the 300 congregation members. In his consecration sermon, the Rt. Rev. Sheard F. Allison, bishop of Chelmsford, said the congregation was deeply touched because she had expressed a desire to attend the service.

Her presence, the bishop added, has "brought real joy to us all."

Margaret had promised to attend the service 13 months ago when she witnessed the laying of the cornerstone for the new church.

The princess also has another church ceremony on her schedule. It was announced last night that she would lay the cornerstone for a new church being built for St. John's parish in Newbury.

Finnish Government Workers On Strike

HELSINKI, Finland (U)—Government workers in seven Finnish trade unions stopped work today in a nationwide strike. Of 44,000 workers called out at midnight, only prison guards, a few customs officials and some workers in vital posts remained on the job.

All trains and mail deliveries were stopped. Export-import trade was threatened. International air traffic went on as usual, however. Thousands of nonstrikers could not get to work and private automobiles were loaded with hitchhikers.

Premier Urho Kekkonen's coalition Cabinet has refused the union's demands for pay increases. Negotiations which started a month ago broke down last night.

Grenades Thrown

JERUSALEM, Israeli Sector (U)—An Israeli military spokesman claimed today that "infiltrators from the Gaza strip" threw grenades at a house in Sharsheh settlement at dawn today. He said one person was injured and the house badly damaged.

Want More Facts On Promotion Of Peress

WASHINGTON (U)—Senators sought more light today on how Irving Peress got a promotion to major despite an Army Intelligence "signal" that he was under investigation.

Peress is the former Army dentist whose promotion and honorable discharge after refusing to answer questions about communism are under new scrutiny by the Senate Investigations subcommittee.

Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) proposed yesterday that the inquiry be broadened to cover what he termed "a conspiracy" to block his own previous investigations of the Peress case and to set off, instead, "investigations of McCarthy."

He named as parties to the alleged conspiracy Atty. Gen. Brownell, White House aides Sherman Adams and Gerald P. Morgan and others.

This was an echo of his complaints during the McCarthy-Army

hearings last year that the White House was thwarting his efforts to find out who, as he put it, "codified" Communists in the Army.

Chairman McClellan (D-Ark.) said he would delay calling a meeting of the subcommittee to consider McCarthy's request that those he named be called as witnesses.

Maj. Floyd E. Van Sickle Jr. testified yesterday that "a personal error on my part" was one factor in the Peress mixup. He said his office at 1st Army headquarters had received notice from Army Intelligence on Feb. 5, 1953, that Peress was under investigation and "was not to be moved or given promotion." Peress was then a captain.

Van Sickle said his office approved Peress' application for promotion the following September. He said he had failed to notice a "signal" on an accompanying form card saying there was information about Peress in a confidential file. He said he knew of no "coverup" element in handling the case.

Ben Miller Gets Life Membership In IOOF Lodge

Uncle Ben Miller, who has a 55-year record of affiliation with Big Spring IOOF Lodge No. 117, has been honored with a lifetime membership.

Moreover, his card, presented to him at the Monday evening meeting of the Odd Fellow Lodge, was said to be the only lifetime membership card to have been signed by a sovereign, grand master, Kellie F. Aston, Houston, the sovereign GM, had autographed the card in tribute to Uncle Ben.

The presentation was made by Jones C. Lamar, whose application for membership Uncle Ben had secured 32 years ago.

The first degree was administered to four candidates. Twenty-four lodge members participated in the meeting.

PUEBLO, Colo. (U)—A cross-country telephone call, with a lift from Philadelphia police, helped a Pueblo doctor save the life of a year-old toddler early today.

Somehow the small daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Keiter obtained and swallowed some plastic welding solvent at their home. Dr. Ted Miller, a pediatrician, was called, and he sent the child, Anita, to Corwin Hospital.

"She seemed to have a rather severe intestinal upset," the physician said later, and in addition he had no idea about the chemical content of what she had swallowed. Dr. Miller knew only the name of the Philadelphia firm manufacturing the substance, the Postmatic Co. So he telephoned police there and asked if they could get a company chemist to tell him about it.

Back came a call within the hour, from Dr. Samuel B. Goldman the chemist. He told Dr. Miller the solvent's formula, an antidote was given little Anita and soon she was "doing fine," the pediatrician said.

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Underground Training Helps Woman To Slay Holdup Man

LOS ANGELES (U)—An attractive brunette who served with the Norwegian underground for five years came out best in an encounter with a bandit who tried to rob her husband's liquor store.

The robber was killed by one shot from the woman's .22 caliber target pistol.

The holdup was attempted at the store of Paul Risener. His wife is Mrs. Kjellaug Risener, 36.

Risener was behind the counter yesterday when a man entered, pulled a gun and demanded money. Risener told police the bandit scooped up \$15 from the cash register, then noticed curtains at the back of the store and asked: "Who's in the back?" The bandit started toward the curtains. Mrs. Risener, who was watching, fired one shot. The man stumbled outside to the sidewalk and fell dead.

The gunman, about 30, has not been identified.

Mrs. Risener said she was a radio operator for the Norwegian underground during Nazi occupation of

that country in World War II. She said she was a member of a task force that blew up a German heavy water experiment plant at Rjukan, Norway, during the war. She came to the United States in 1948.

New President For California Oil Co.

PERTH AMBOY, N.J. (U)—Directors chose B. W. Pickard of San Francisco president yesterday of the California Oil Co. He replaces E. W. Endter, who resigned last week to line up with Louis Wolfson and others in their bid for control of Montgomery Ward.

No formal observance is planned, but on Saturday evening the anniversary ceremonies will be climaxed with a birthday ball.

President Makes Surprise Visit At Flower Show

WASHINGTON (U)—Attending a flower show was a new experience for President Eisenhower—and it caused a bit of commotion. Only show officials knew in advance that the President was going to the National Guard Armory yesterday to take a look.

But word spread rapidly through the huge building the moment he arrived and soon he was being followed from one exhibit to the other by a milling crowd. Parents pushed their youngsters up for a better look. One child got a presidential handshake.

The President, who described the visit as "my first jaunt in a flower show," was subbing for Mrs. Eisenhower. She was scheduled to open the National Capital Flower and Garden Show last week but came down with the flu. The White House said yesterday she was "almost completely recovered" but still had not ventured outdoors.

Big Atomic Plant Slated In Michigan

LANSING, Mich. (U)—Detroit Edison Co. detailed plans today for a 45-million-dollar atomic power plant to be built in Michigan. It said it would operate with a fuel cost of "almost nothing."

Company officials told the State Public Service Commission that the plant will be built with the help of 32 other companies joined in a research program for peaceful use of atomic energy.

The plant would be located somewhere in the southeastern Michigan area served by Edison.

Ike Indispensable For GOP Victory?

By ROWLAND EVANS JR.
WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Bridges (R-NH) said today he thinks that in the "unhappy event" President Eisenhower declines to run for a second term the Republicans "could develop a winning ticket." Bridges, chairman of the Senate Republican Policy Committee, emphasized he hopes and believes Eisenhower will seek a second term. Bridges declined to take direct issue, however, with the basic theme of a speech by Vice President Nixon in Los Angeles Monday night. Nixon said: "The Republican party is not strong enough to elect a president. We have to have a presidential candidate strong enough to get the Republican party elected."

Sen. Sparkman (D-Ala.), 1952 Democratic vice presidential candidate, said in a separate interview he views Nixon's speech as "an apology for Republican philosophy and a good indication how indispensable one man is to them." Sen. Monroney (D-Okla.) termed the speech "a confession of the indispensable one-man theory," and he added: "The vice president seems to be saying that unless Eisenhower runs

for reelection the Republicans might as well surrender the ball game before it is even played."

Nixon did not draw any direct parallel between what he called the GOP party's present minority position and Eisenhower's decision on whether to run in 1956. The President himself took sharp issue with the "indispensable man" theory in a recent news conference. He said it was not valid. Sparkman termed Nixon's speech an indication of concern that "the Democratic party is gaining strength."

But Bridges said GOP losses in last fall's congressional test were less than average for the party in power during an off-year election. He said the party is in a stronger position today than in either 1952 or 1954.

The Democrats are "far worse split" than the cleavage they claim exists within the Republican party, Bridges said, and he continued: "If President Eisenhower is a candidate, I think unquestionably that he will win. If, however, the Republican party should be without the good fortune to have the President as its standard bearer, I still think in that eventuality that we could develop a winning ticket."

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP)—She was 32 and the mother of five children. She admitted she was a prostitute. But she fell in love with Asst. County Atty. Carroll Freeman, 30, when she visited his office to seek legal advice on purchase of a home.

"It may sound fantastic," Freeman said, "but she kept pestering me and wanting me to take her out to dinner. I always refused to go."

Police allege she hired her Negro maid and two Negro men to whisk Freeman away from his home early Sunday for a rendezvous with her at a tourist court. He was released after three hours. She and the three Negroes were charged with kidnaping and robbery. All pleaded innocent.

Mrs. Bartram denied any part in the kidnaping but said, "I still love Carroll."

Freeman attributed the kidnaping to "vindictiveness."

During the tourist court meeting he said, Mrs. Bartram tongue-lashed him for spurning her attentions and threatened to kill his wife and son. On advice of police, he declined to give further details.

Mrs. Bartram and the two men, Walter Jackson, 31, and David Lee Walker, 20, were held in bonds of \$10,000 each. The maid, Minnie Brown, 22, was held without bond.

Oil Properties Sold To Sinclair For \$109 Million

WILMINGTON, Del. (AP)—The American Republics Corp. is selling its oil properties to Sinclair Oil Co. for \$109,500,000.

Officials of the two firms announced yesterday the deal which may set a new high in paper work. Officials of both concerns were to meet today to start signing the 12,000 documents necessary for the sale. The signing is expected to continue until early tomorrow.

Then transport planes will fly the documents to Houston where they will be picked up by five other planes and flown to five distribution points for the 200 counties in the seven-state area where the properties are located.

The papers will be turned over to lawyers in each of the respective counties. These lawyers will file notice of the property transfer with their county clerks.

The papers to be signed weigh between three and four tons. Eight notary publics have been hired to notarize the documents.

A catering firm will feed the Sinclair and American Republics officials as they continue the signing.

Body Recovered

TYLER (AP)—The body of B. H. Nutt, 60, Corsicana electrician who drowned Sunday in Lake Tyler, was recovered yesterday in 35 feet of water. His widow and son, who were with him when their boat overturned, were rescued.

UNCLE RAY'S CORNER

The largest turtles in the world are the leatherbacks. This name comes from the fact that the shells may be compared to leather. The shells are tough, but are less hard than those of ordinary turtles.

From head to tail, a leatherback may measure eight feet. Often the weight is more than half a ton, and an especially large one may tip the scales at three-fourths of a ton.

Instead of ordinary legs, leatherbacks have flippers which may remind us of the flippers of seals. With the flippers they make good progress through the ocean. They eat fish of various kinds, also crabs and oysters. Sometimes they feast on jellyfish.

It is rare to see a leatherback on land, but the females go ashore once a year to lay eggs. For the most part they swim in warm waters, but they have been captured at times near the coast of Great Britain, also about Vancouver Island in western Canada.

Here, in shortened form, is an eyewitness account of a big leatherback female which went ashore on Ceylon:

A leathery turtle made a zig-zag trip up the beach, testing the sand here and there with her strong flippers. Finding a proper place, she dug a hole three feet deep, and laid about 100 eggs inside.

After laying the last of the eggs, the turtle used her flippers to cover them with sand. She also broke down the ridges around the nest, and made the sand so smooth that it would be very hard for anyone to tell where the nest had been made.

The big turtle worked her way back to the ocean. It was plain that she was very tired; she stopped every yard or two to rest.

Old Southern Senator In Last Fight For Segregation

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP)—Charles A. Stainback stood before the State Senate with tears in his eyes yesterday and fought his last, losing battle for the way of life he has known for 85 years.

Nobody spoke against him. But, when he finished, he failed by four votes to get the necessary majority to override Gov. Frank Clement's veto of his local bill aimed at maintaining school segregation in Fayette County.

Stainback was fighting against a changing outlook in his native Tennessee.

When he was a boy in Somerville, Reconstruction days were still fresh in the minds of Tennesseans. The 1870 constitutional convention had adopted a provision requiring segregation in schools.

Nobody would have thought of making segregation an issue when Stainback came to the Legislature in 1903. There was no opposing vote when the 1925 Legislature passed a law requiring segregation in schools.

Time and the U.S. Supreme Court have changed all that. The court said last year it would issue a decree that segregation in public schools is unconstitutional. The Supreme Court decision

prompted Stainback to come to Nashville once more, at the age of 85. He had a bill he thought would block integration of the races in public schools. It simply would invoke the police power of the state to allow local boards of education to assign students to what schools they chose.

When the Senate calendar committee tabled Stainback's bill, he introduced local bills of the same type to apply to his two counties, Fayette and Haywood. They were passed routinely, as local bills are, without debate or a formal roll call.

Clement vetoed them Monday night.

Stainback's gray head bobbed above the clerk's desk as he appealed to the Senate yesterday to override the veto on the Fayette County bill.

"The Senate and the House have never failed in the history of the state to pass a local bill over the veto of the governor," he said.

"There is no mention of color or race in the bill. The Supreme Court of the United States, even as presently constituted, would have to uphold the bill." But, he added, the governor had vetoed the bill.

His voice broke and his eyes filled with tears as he demanded: "Am I, in my old age, to be

the first senator in Tennessee to be subjected to such humiliation? I have passed my allotted three-score and ten, and I grow weary of the sun. But I came here because my people, white and colored, wanted this."

When he went back to his desk, the Senate voted 13-9 in favor of overriding the veto. It wasn't enough. Seventeen votes were needed.

Stainback walked slowly from the Senate chamber. One of his colleagues said he may not return to the floor this session.

Ike Confirms That A-Weapons Could Be Used In Any Conflict

By MARVIN L. ARROWSMITH
WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower said today he sees no reason why atomic weapons should not be used in any conflict where they can be directed against strictly military targets.

With this news conference statement, Eisenhower backed up Secretary of State Dulles who said yesterday he thought tactical atomic weapons would be employed in any major military action involving the United States.

By law, only President Eisenhower can make a decision on use of atomic weapons.

The significance of Dulles' statement and of the President's comment appeared to be that any future war, big or little, in which the United States engages will be an atomic war to some extent.

Eisenhower, natty in a chocolate brown double-breasted suit, also dealt with these other topics.

STOCK MARKET — The President said he is just as concerned about a decline in stock market prices as he is about a price decline affecting any segment of the economy.

He has no opinion whatsoever, he

said, as to whether the Senate Banking Committee's current study of the market may have contributed to a price decline.

But, Eisenhower added, we are trying for an expanding economy and an important factor in achieving it necessarily is confidence.

As Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey did yesterday in testimony before the committee, Eisenhower said any group dealing with market operations should proceed with great caution lest a great deal of damage result.

The President said, however, he knows of no particular phase of the committee study which has not been conducted with caution.

Mobile Students Evacuated But With 6,500 'Casualties'

MOBILE, Ala. — Complications late last night showed that 37,228 students were evacuated from Mobile in a surprise Civil Defense test. "Casualties" numbered 6,595.

Nine other schools which participated in Operation Seat yesterday have not reported on their 2,683 students.

Two major hitches developed in the first evacuation of all school children in a metropolitan area, although officials termed the overall operation a success.

The hitches were long traffic jams on main highways while the children were headed to "receiving schools" outside the danger area; and the uneven distribution of transportation. Some schools had too many vehicles and others did not have enough. Two had none.

The test was held to see how quickly students in about 100 public, private and parochial schools within a 10-mile radius of "ground zero" in the downtown business district could be evacuated in case of an atomic bomb attack.

Financial Writer Sees Trouble In Market

WASHINGTON — The Senate's stock market inquiry brought a warning today of a "boom to doom" danger. It also produced an opinion that the market has only been catching up with the nation's economy.

J. A. Livingston, financial editor of the Philadelphia Bulletin and writer of a syndicated column, said he saw danger of a "boom to doom" cycle in a surge of Wall Street optimism not too different, he said, from the one "which led to the poorhouse in 1929."

"To me," he said in prepared testimony, "the fact that this committee is holding hearings is a major difference between 1929 and 1953. This time, a Senate investigating committee is studying the market before a crash, not after. That's pretty good insurance against a crash."

Today's other witness, Wall Street's Dorsey Richardson, told the Senate Banking Committee the stock market in its year-and-a-half price rise has been "catching up with changes that have occurred in our economy—in price levels, in earnings, in gross national product, in technological developments, in populations . . . over the past 10 years."

Richardson, head of the National Assn. of Investment Companies, said much recent market activity stemmed from "the fact that investors with more surplus funds to invest have become more generally aware of the expansion of the economy."

"This can scarcely be regarded as undesirable or unhealthy," he added in a prepared statement.

This testimony came in the wake of a three-row which developed yesterday when Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey told the committee, in effect, its inquiry was going too far and threatening to hurt the nation's economy.

Committee Chairman Fulbright (D-Ark) hit back with a sharp statement saying the public is entitled to know about "the characteristics of the market" which have permitted the recent sharp break in share prices.

The committee's senior Republican, Sen. Capehart of Indiana, calling for an end to the inquiry, charged Fulbright was determined to prove stock prices have gone too high. Fulbright disputed that. Capehart said he'd put exhibits in to the record to bear it out.

Humphrey, Fulbright and Capehart all got somewhat hot under the collar before the session ended. But the stock market was feeling much better.

It scored its biggest daily climb yesterday in more than 15 years. That recovery won back much of the previous day's losses when the market had taken its biggest one-day tumble in almost five years.

Livingston said today there is plenty of evidence of too much speculation.

"Once it becomes easier to make money faster by buying Du Pont stock than Du Pont can make money by producing nylon and dacron," he said, "then it's time to watch out. And that has been happening. More and more people are turning to the stock market page before the comics."

The tour was brought to a climax when the Hanna assisted in the evacuation of the Nationalist Chinese garrison from the Tachen Islands.

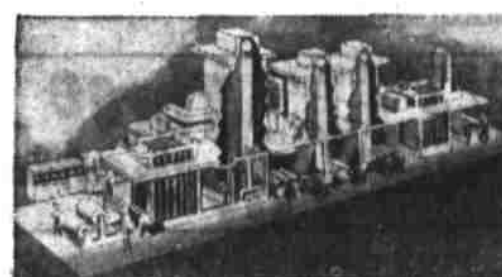

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Union Disclaims Any Knowledge Of Wire Cutting

ATLANTA (U)—Union leaders began a separate investigation of cable cuttings in three states today in an effort to halt vandalism during the strike of about 50,000 Southern Bell Telephone Co. workers.

Officials of the CIO Communications Workers of America emphasized they had no knowledge of the incidents.

G. E. Gill, CWA district strike director in Atlanta, said the cable slicing "is obviously an underhanded attempt to give the union a black eye and we resent it."

John Huss, president of the Atlanta CWA local, and 12 other union members were sworn in as sheriff's deputies to "investigate the cuttings that have already occurred."

Huss added in a statement that "we are going to protect ourselves and the property of the phone company. We are terribly concerned about the cable cutting cutting reported by the company and police."

Company officials have posted a reward of \$5,000 for the arrest and conviction of persons responsible for vandalism in any of the nine Southeastern states affected by the three-day-old walk out.

C. M. Eberhart, Southern Bell Atlanta district manager, reported 16 incidents of cable cuttings and damage to company equipment in Georgia. A long-distance cable between Atlanta and Charlotte, N.C., was damaged south of Lawrenceville, Ga., last night, he reported. The other cases were in the Atlanta area.

Negotiators continued to meet in Atlanta in an effort to settle differences. A company spokesman said a "no-strike" clause was the main issue, but union officials declared several major points still remained to be decided for a new contract.

States affected by the strike, which began Monday, are Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina and Tennessee.

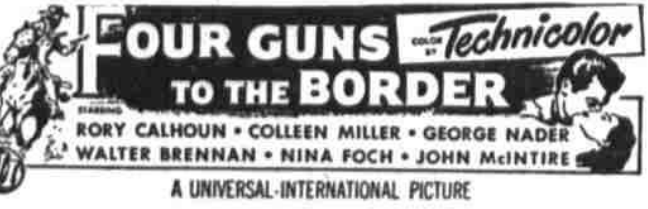

State Spending Plans Held Up For A Hearing

AUSTIN (U)—Plans to speed the Senate's one - package record-breaking 1 1/2 billion dollar spending bill to the floor for debate have run into a two-member committee road block.

Sens. Search Bracewell and O. E. Latimer of San Antonio called for a public hearing with 48 hours notice. It was granted, a hearing set for Thursday afternoon and the outlook for floor debate before next week was dim.

The House meanwhile hopes to be able to take up its similar spending bill tomorrow.

Bracewell said he wanted time to give the junior college spending items a close look to make sure the larger junior colleges are not neglected.

The House in an afternoon session yesterday passed and sent to the Senate 61 local and uncontested bills, and finally approved four minor Senate bills, sending them to the governor.

One bill approved by the House and now ready for Senate action would give candidates for public office just one week to pay their filing fees after applying for a place on the ballot.

Other measures rammed through the House and sent to the Senate would:

Make the first offense of wife and child desertion a misdemeanor and subsequent offenses a felony.

Create the West Texas Municipal Water District including Abilene, Albany, Anson and Breckenridge.

Authorize consolidation of rural high school districts and independent school districts.

Provide for local construction of a dam at Iron Bridge Crossing on the Sabine River near Willis Point if the Sabine River Authority fails to do so.

Amend the Mosquito Control Act in the Orange area.

In committee action yesterday, a bill revising the Texas Title Insurance Code was sent to subcommittee for further study after lengthy hearing.

No time limit was set for the subcommittee to report, indicating slight chance that the measure will survive. Sharp opposition developed at the Senate Insurance Committee hearing from the State Bar.

90 Scholarships To A&M Offered

Ninety scholarships to A&M College will be given this spring in statewide competition, according to Don Newsom, president of the local A&M Club.

Application forms are available at the office of the high school principal or from the faculty committee on scholarships at A&M. They must be completed by April 1.

Each scholarship is for four years and will be granted on the basis of character, scholarship, evidence of leadership and need of financial aid. Values range from \$800 to \$1,500 — \$200 to \$400 per year. Jimmy Porter of Big Spring received the award sponsored by the Big Spring A&M Club last year and now is completing his freshman year.

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Britain Promoting Cold Storage Meat

LONDON (U)—The government has urged Britons to eat more cold-storage meat and thus hold down prices of fresh meat. The cold-storage meat is an emergency stock built up to offset normal winter scarcity of fresh meat.

Faces Robbery Trial

WACO (U)—Bobby Howard, 28, faced trial in federal court today on charges of armed robbery of the First State Bank of Meridian. He was arrested at Glen Rose four hours after the Jan. 31 robbery in which \$3,848 was taken.

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
