Committee is formed to screen coach applicants

A committee has been formed and will begin the work of screening applications in order to recommend a football coach and athletic director to the trustees of the Colorado Independent School District (ISD).

The deadline for the committee to receive applications for the coaching position has been set at 5 p.m. on Friday, June 5.

"We have already had 39 requests for applications to fill the

position," said superintendent Don Nimmo.

Those who have expressed an interest in applying for the job include head coaches and offensive and defensive coordinators who are currently serving in positions ranging from 2A to 4A schools.

The committee will screen those applications which are received and bring the recommendations of the three finalists to the school board. It is anticipated that interviews

will be scheduled by the board with the three coaching finalists.

A 7-member screening committee was approved by the board trustees which includes three school board members, two members of the community, Colorado ISD superintendent Don Nimmo and the Colorado High School principal James McSwain.

School board members to serve on the committee include Jesse

Mitchell County veterans will recognize Memorial Day with events which honor those who have lost their life in service for their country.

A flag raising ceremony will be held at by the Veterans of Foreign Wars (V.F.W.) at Post 9178 at 8 a.m. on Monday morning.

Following the ceremony at the V.F.W. Post, a ceremonial wreath will be placed at the monument on the East side of the Mitchell

County Courthouse in honor of local servicemen who lost their life for our country.

After the V.F.W. members and guests have been served coffee and doughnuts at Post 9178, flags will be placed on the graves of departed comrades.

V.F.W. event organizers have asked for assistance in placing the flags, especially at the county's outlying cemeteries.

Trustees okay technology plan

A \$480-thousand plan geared towards providing the students of the Colorado Independent School District (ISD) with assess to computers was approved by trustees on Thursday night.

The plan provides for a 5-year technology plan that addresses the costs of computer equipment, maintenance and updates for the systems to be added at the campuses.

"It is an expensive plan," said board president Dwayne Harris, "but it provides for a definite long-term technology program."

Board members discussed the past efforts to incorporate computers into the classrooms over the past 10-years and noted that it resulted in a 'piece-meal' system of computers that do not provide the availability to students.

"You have made a monumental decision," superintendent Don Nimmo told the trustees after the decision was reached. "You are to be congratulated for the foresighted decision which is geared towards providing a more advanced education for the students of the Colorado ISD."

Payment for the IBM system to be installed in the classrooms for the coming school year will be financed over a 6-year period.

"This plan presents a commitment to get into a 5-year plan," said superintendent Don Nimmo. "This is a plan which is geared towards the middle of the row student and is also a plan that helps students of the district within the next year."

The recommendations came to the board as a result of the findings of a study by members of a committee who were charged with assessing the long-term requirements of the district.
 "We need computers across the district. We're not addressing the needs of all the students," curriculum facilitator Kitten Arthur told the board members in presenting the plan. "The average student receives computer time that amounts to three periods of 20-minutes per week ... and that is not enough."

The equipment that was approved by the board members is geared towards developing the critical thinking and problem solving skills of students by involving them in active learning, said Arthur.

"Teachers are excited about having computers as teaching aids in the classroom," said Kitten Arthur, "and the PSI (Partnership Schools Initiative) program will provide training time for the teachers."
 "The technology committee recommends this plan as not only being the best for the students," said Kitten Arthur, "but also for the teachers."

COUNTY AG NOTES

By BRYAN LIMMER

Surveys for pecan nut casebearer eggs indicate that the optimum time to treat for this pest is rapidly approaching. The predicted spray dates in the Mitchell County area should be from May 25 through June 5 with optimum dates of May 28 through June 1 preferred.

The pecan nut casebearer is a major pest of Texas pecans. This pest overwinters in the tree near the buds and when spring arrives it feeds on these buds and in the small shoots. When these overwintered grubs emerge as adult moths is when the damage starts. The 1/3 inch long female moth will deposit from 50 to 150 eggs on the tips of nuts. Eggs, just visible to the naked eye are greenish white to a reddish brown. The first generation larvae hatch from eggs in 4 or 5 days and migrate to buds below the nut to feed. After a day or two they enter the nuts and the base. The casebearer larvae should be killed before they enter the nutlets. Once inside, the larvae are safe. After destroying the nutlet the larvae may progressively destroy the entire cluster.

The use of insecticides is the only measure to control this pest. The following table list some compounds and their rates.

Homeowner Pecan Nut Casebearer Control Measures

Material	Amount in 1 gallon of water
Malathion	2 1/2 tsp. of 50% liquid
Diazinon	2 tsp. of 25% liquid
Sevin	2 tbsp. of 50% liquid

The second generation of casebearers occurs 42 days after the first generation. The second generation is not usually a severe problem but producers need to watch for their presence.

A spray schedule and further instruction for insect and disease control on pecans can be obtained from the County Extension office.

Remember always read the label before applying any chemical. The applicator is always responsible for the proper use and safety of chemical applicators.

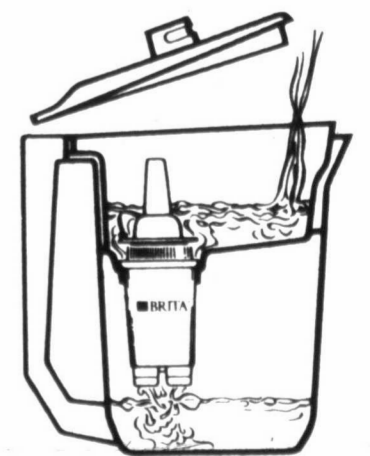

Shaw retires as pastor

Dawn has been active in the United Methodist Womens organizations through the years at the local, district and conference levels.

She served as the Carlsbad District Secretary of Christian Personhood, the Clovis District Publicity and Public Relations committee.

Dawn also served as the New Mexico Conference Secretary, 1984-1986; Amarillo District Secretary of Christian Social Involvement, 1986-1988; Northwest Texas Conference Secretary, 1988-1990; and as the Financial Interpreter of the Conference from 1990-1992.

The Shaw's look forward to hearing from any of their friends and to seeing them when passing through Kerrville.

He then attended Boston University Graduate School where he studied philosophy and transferred to the School of Theology after accepting a call to the ministry.

Rev. Shaw was born in Dallas, while his parents were attending Southern Methodist University.
