33 attend meeting

Skiing regulation kept

Thirty-three residents and property owners in the Morgan and Cherry Creeks areas attended the regular meeting of the Mitchell County Commissioners' Court Monday afternoon to express their feelings on the skiing and wake regulations on Lake Colorado City.

Of those present, 23 felt that the regulations forbidding skiing and posting a speed limit in

the channels should be kept in force, citing safety as their major concern.

Don Stewart, Mrs. C. D. Downing and others noted that skiing in those areas was dangerous to the skiers because of hidden hazards in the water and the narrowness of the channels.

Many of those in favor of keeping the regulations also complained of the boaters who delibe-

rately endangered the property of residents, specifically their docks, and showed little regard for fishermen and children who were in or near the water.

Some of the property owners who wanted the regulations rescinded said that they had bought their property so that they could ski and felt that the five mph speed limit was unfair. Joe Stegall said that he

had taught kids to ski on Morgan Creek and also that at the five mph speed limit, "it takes 20 minutes to get from the dock to the ski area."

All agreed that, under any circumstances, the channels needed to be more closely patrolled.

The Court decided to table the matter until a later date, since the coming of cooler weather has cut down on the problem.

CISD Superintendent Charlie Useton and Tax Assessor-Collector Clarence C. Burt appeared before the Commissioners to give them an update on the case with Valero Transmission Company.

Useton reported that he, Mr. Burt and Jay Craddock had gone to Austin week before last to talk to their delinquent tax attorney and also talked to Ken

Grabler of the State Tax Board.

Useton said that they had been told if the case "goes to court, it will go to the Supreme Court," adding that it would be very expensive, possibly in the hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Many attempts to negotiate with Valero over the amount of the tax valuation of their property had been met

Jack Richardson and Abbie Northcutt presented their case informally to the Council members present.

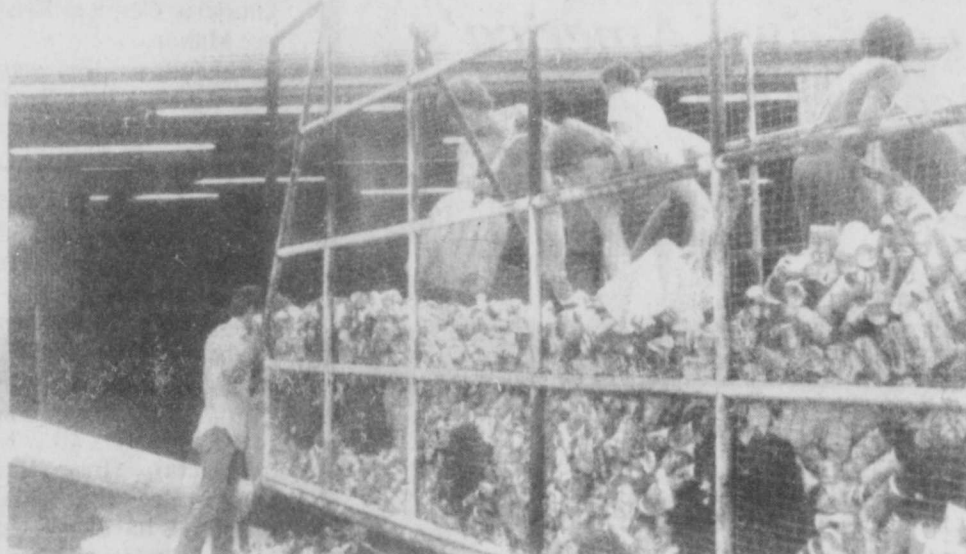
They would like to have a fence built between the city's dumping ground and their land which would stop blowing trash from getting past a public road that lies between the two

Loraine School Board approves test exemption

Loraine School Board members approved a semester test exemption

policy for students in grades 9-12 Monday night at their regular monthly meeting.

The exemption is designed to encourage all students to do their best scholastically and to make punctuality and good citizenship a habit. "It will definitely help attendance and hopefully students will study harder," said Superintendent Glenn Sanders.

A student may be exempt from semester examinations if the following grade average and the number of ab-

sences are:

--Grade of 100-95 and not more than three absences.

--Grade 94-88 and not more than two absences

--Grade 87-80 and not more than one absence.

--Grade 79-75 and no absences.

In other action, Sanders reported to board members on insurance payments to school property that was damaged by the wind and hail storm back in June. According to Sanders, just about all the damage will be repaired

Board discusses school policies

The Colorado Independent School District Board of Trustees met Monday night to discuss, among other items, two points of school board policy.

The first point was the formalization of the duties of the LPAC Committee, which concerns bilingual education. The LPAC Committee is already in existence, Superintendent Charlie Useton said, but certain rules and criteria needed to be formally established.

The Board approved the policy.

The other point of school board policy concerned social promotion and was discussed during an executive session.

The Board also approved the Professional Communications Agree-

ment with the local Classroom Teachers Association, which must be renewed every year.

Different types of roofing for several of the school buildings were shown to the Board and they instructed Useton to advertise for bids for the roofs.

Useton reported to the Board on the Valero Transmission Co. suit, saying that he would double-check to make sure the answer had been filed.

Joe Kirschbaum gave a report on the TASA/TASB Convention that he, Mac Morris and Useton attended in San Antonio.

In other action, the Board approved the 1982 tax roll and the 1981-82 audit presented by Joe Morren.

Loraine calls general election

Mayor Royce Beights of Loraine has called a general election for Tuesday, November 30 to fill the two vacant positions on the Loraine City Council.

The two positions came open when councilman Raymond Hackfeld resigned last month and with the death of Calvin Forbus September 24.

Persons interested in filing for these two positions should stop by Loraine City Hall. Filing deadline has been set as Friday, October 29 at 5:00 P.M.

There was no quorum for Tuesday night's regularly scheduled meeting but Beights called the special election at the recommendation of City Attorney, Frank Conard, Jr.

Wolves try for number four

The Wolves start their second step toward the district 6AAA crown Friday when they do battle with the Ozona Lions in Wolf Stadium.

The Pack started district off on the right foot last week when they trounced the Coahoma Bulldogs 28-0. On the other hand, the Lions lost their first game of the season to Ballinger 28-13.

Ozona, under new head coach Don Abbott did not play quite as

tough of a non-district schedule as C-City, as they defeated Junction 33-14, Wall 31-6, Big Lake 45-7, McCamey 29-28 and Eldorado 21-12.

Abbott has done a remarkable job with only two offensive and four defensive returning starters. He has an "offensive gem" in quarterback David Badillo, who is a threat in the air or on the ground. He has completed 31 of 61 passes for 573 yards and five touchdowns. He has carried the ball 53 times

for 207 yards, and Abbott says Badillo is definitely the dominating back in the Lion backfield.

The Lions are basically a slot-I team, but will run a little Wing-T and Houston Veer at times. Abbott has a stable of backs he likes to use to wear opposing defenses down. Robert Flores (140) is the leading rusher with 273 yards. Willie Payne (175) has 251 yards and Harvey Huereca (175) has added 188 yards. Fabian

Delgado and Greg Fierro will also see duty in the backfield.

Abbott says the Lions prefer to keep the ball on the ground three-fourths of the time, but when yards are needed in a hurry, wide receiver Robert Massey and backup quarterback Allen Dews gets the call. For the season, Massey has caught 22 passes averaging 22.4 yards a catch. Dews, who has a little stronger arm than Badillo, came in last week against Ballinger and completed 2

of 4 passes for 117 yards.

The offensive line has good size averaging just under 200 pounds per man. Abbott says his top blocker is senior center David Tijerina (180).

The Lions' 27 defense was pierced for 387 yards last week against Ballinger. "Ballinger was good, they out-hit and outthrustled us. We stopped doing the things we had been doing all year to win," said Abbott.

Ozona will be hurting in the secondary with the

loss of cornerback Will Mason with a broken foot. He leads the team in interceptions with five. Mason could also kick field goals from 50 yards on in.

The Wolves offense continues to improve each week. The offensive line has been giving Doug Chitsey adequate time to find his receivers, and Larry Hamilton has been on a tear in the ground gaining department.

The fleet back will be

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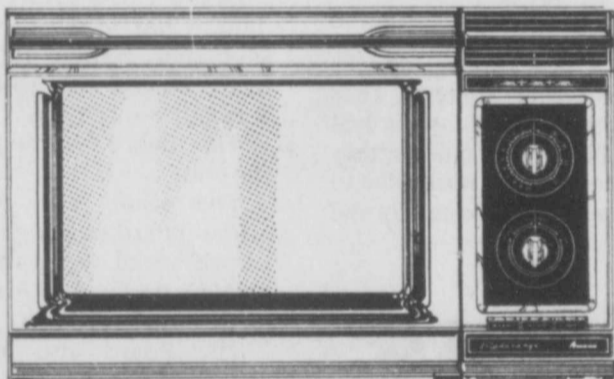
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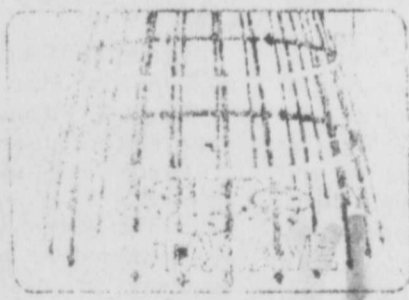

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Oil, gas discoveries up in Texas

Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Nugent announced that Texas operators reported 128 gas and 52 oil discoveries in September 1982.

One year ago, 116 gas and 37 oil discoveries were filed with the state's energy regulatory agency.

Gas discoveries in the ninth month of the year included 44 in deep South Texas, 38 in the Refugio area, 22 in

Southeast Texas, seven in the San Antonio area, five in the Panhandle, three each in West Central Texas, North Texas, and the Midland area, two in East Central Texas, and one in the San Angelo area.

Oil discoveries included 18 in West Central Texas, six each in North Texas, East Texas, and the Midland area, five in the San Angelo area, three in the

Lubbock area, two each in the Panhandle, East Central Texas, and the San Antonio area, and one each in Southeast Texas and the Refugio area.

Through the first nine months of this year, there

have been 1,121 gas and 487 oil discoveries throughout the state. For the same period last year, there were 957 gas and 457 oil discoveries.

In September, operators reported 331 exploratory and field

tests wound up as dry holes. New applications for permits to drill oil and gas tests totaled 2,667 in September compared with 3,207 in the same period of 1981.

Applications to drill, deepen, plug back and

for service wells in September amounted to 3,059 against 3,520 a year earlier.

Operators filed 785 amended applications to drill. A year earlier they submitted 846 amended requests.

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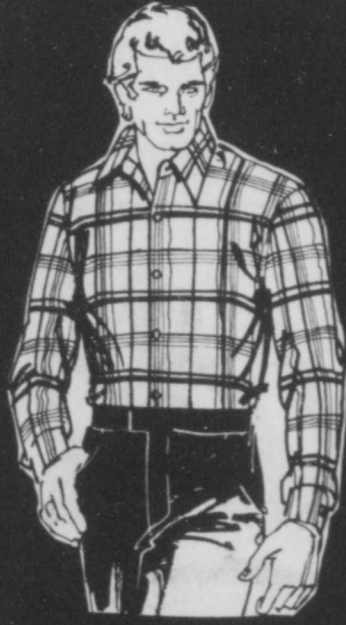


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Wolves claim win over K City netters

Tuesday night at Wolf Gym the Wolves freshmen, junior varsity and varsity all treated the home crowd to victories over the Knox City Houndettes in volleyball action.

The freshmen collected their first victory of the season in straight sets, 15-8, 15-10. In the first match with the Wolves holding a slim 4-2 lead, Denise Jackson got things started with three points to up the lead to 7-2.

Knox City scored a point, but the young Wolves scored five straight when Diane Gregory stepped to the line. A hard kill shot by Janie Deloera helped the cause, and the Wolf lead was 12-3.

The start of the second match was all C-City as Shannon Perkin, Jackson and Deloera serves gave the Wolves a commanding 12-3 lead. The Pack went on to an easy 15-10 win.

In the first match of the junior varsity tilt, the Wolves jumped to a 3-0 lead on serves by Sherr Morris, Chris Castillo and Anita Silva.

But then the Wolves hit a slump as they missed hits and bad serves helped the Houndettes regain a 4-3 lead. But the tide changed when the Pack's Rebecca Erwin stepped to the service line.

Traci Blackwell added a point, Cres Aguilar two more; with the aid of a block by Silva and the score read 11-8 in the Wolves favor.

Knox City scored one more point, and then the

Wolves ended it with serves by Erwin, Blackwell and Aguilar for a 15-9 victory.

The second match was all C-City as Morris got the ball rolling by reeling off seven consecutive points. Carla Callaway added three more and the Wolves lead bulged to 10-0.

Later on in the match, with the Wolf lead 11-6, Morris finished things off, aided by driving spikes by Silva to give the junior varsity a 15-6 win. The win is the junior Wolves sixth in nine tries.

In the varsity contest, the Wolves proved that you can't keep a good team down; as they battled back in two matches to come from behind and to win.

In the first match with the game tied 2-2 on points by Kerry Spivey and Pam Wilson, the Houndettes went on a tear. Knox City's Delores Stafford went on a scoring spree with the aid of timely blocks by teammate Tammy Rogers. Knox City led 6-2.

Carolyn Green came off the bench and added new life to the Wolf attack by promptly scoring three points to cut the lead to one.

That's when Wilson came around for her second service. Three good serves coupled with a timely block by Laura Baum and a booming spike by Stacy Hamrick led to five points. The Wolves had the lead for the first time 11-7. The Wolves went on to ice the match when Baum

scoring the final four points with the aid of some overpowering spikes by Randle, 15-10.

The second match started much like the first. Knox City took a quick 2-0 lead behind the service of Karane Beason. C-City promptly tied it up with Spivey's two points.

But the Houndettes quickly regained the lead 7-2 behind the serving of Stafford. That's when the Red and Black started their comeback. Robyn Turner's two points cut the lead to 7-4, Mona Molina, aided by three Spivey kills scored four points to give the Wolves the lead 8-7.

Knox City added one more point to cut the lead to four.

After the Wolves regained the service, Wilson served one, the Houndettes could not handle, and with the partisan crowd standing and cheering Wilson ended the contest when she set Hamrick who hit a well placed dink over the outstretched arms of the Knox City front line. Final score; Wolves 15 Houndettes 9.

The win evens the Wolves record to 8-8 for the year, while Knox City records falls to 20-4 with two of the losses coming to the Wolves.

Wolves mentor Tom Ramsey said the win was a total team effort and his team is full of

Ozona. "They are big, fast and run a lot right at you. You have to be ready for everything against them. Their backs are against the wall. If they lose to us it's hard for them to get into the playoffs. Our kids know that every game is a

championship game for us."

Abbott says the Wolves are a well coached team and look impressive. "We will be in for a good ballgame. I'm anxious to see how my boys rebound from a loss."

Bulldogs try to get back on winning track

Last week the Lorraine Bulldogs played Roscoe, one of the better teams in District 7A. This week it doesn't get any better when they take on district power, the Klondike Cougars.

The Cougars, under the direction of coach Bill West, returns six offensive and defensive starters from a team that finished 5-5 last year.

The Cougars are currently 4-1-1, and defeated a good Roby squad 18-6 last week in their district opener. Klondike tied Jal, NM, 6-6 and lost to Jayton 21-6. Against Jayton, the Cougars turned the ball over eight times, five times inside their own 30. This led to their downfall.

West says the key to his team is defense. "We

bend but we don't break. We line up in our 4-3 and play good technique and try to force turnovers," he said.

And the Cougars have been doing a good job, with the exception of the Jayton game. The Cougars are only allowing four points per game.

Linebacker Mike Barkowski (160), an All-South Plains player and

one of the finest linebackers West says he has ever coached, is the leader. He and defensive end Ray Airmendez (165) are the leading tacklers.

Blaine Todd is a quick agile noseguard that can get into the backfield and mess opposing offenses up. The Cougar's secondary has picked off 13 passes. The leading "thieves" are Barkowski and safety Oscar Castaneda with three each.

Offensively, the Cougars are to be reckoned with. Their high powered Wing-T attack is engineered by the South Plains' leading passer Tim Cope. He has thrown for over 600 yards and has eight touchdown passes.

When Klondike keeps the ball on the ground, they have three backs who are capable of gaining yardage. Barkowski, Brent Airhart and Airmendez all have collected over 400 yards this season.

But the big play man is

wide receiver Todd who has snagged 12 passes for five touchdowns, with a 22.0 average per catch. Kent Airhart is averaging 15.0 with his 15 receptions.

Lorraine will counter with leading rusher Jerry Darnell and quarterback Adam Merket, whom West says Klondike must stop. Last week Darnell gained 50 of the Bulldog's total 78 yards. Merket had a bad night passing the ball, but played good defense as he picked off a pass from his cornerback spot. Darnell had a good game

from his cornerback position. He was the team's leading tackler last week.

Bulldog head coach Jimmy Fine was also impressed with the play of defensive end Rodney Blankenship, who was only 70 percent healthy.

Fine said his team played as hard as they could, but just got tired in the last half. "The kids are just out there to play football and have a good time playing it. We are still out there trying to win football games," said Fine.

Preparing for major industry changes

Two changes are coming up which will have a significant impact on how Southwestern Bell provides telephone service to its customers.

First, there's the decision by the Federal Communications Commission (which regulates telecommunications on the national level) that AT&T (the parent company of the Bell System) should set up a fully separate subsidiary to market telephone equipment.

This subsidiary, called American Bell, is expected to begin operations on January 1, 1983.

Southwestern Bell will continue providing telephone equipment after that date. Under current plans, all business or residential equipment on our customers' premises or in Southwestern Bell's inventory will be regulated by tariffs filed with the Texas Public Utility Commission. Beginning January 1, equipment provided by American Bell will not be subject to such regulation.

Competition Offers Customer Options

Competition in providing customer equipment has been an established fact for several years now. The introduction of American Bell into the picture will provide one more option for customers when it comes to selecting a vendor for such things as telephones, PBX's and other communications equipment.

An even bigger change is slated for January 1, 1984. That's the target date for Southwestern Bell being divested from AT&T.

After this divestiture, Southwestern Bell will be primarily a local telephone company. Most of our long distance calling facilities will remain with AT&T.

The 22 divested Bell telephone companies, like Southwestern Bell, will be reorganized into seven re-

gional units. Southwestern Bell will be one of these seven units.
