Sharon Hand, 17, of Paducah, and Linda Eldridge, 16, of Fortsburg, are among the Texas girls who have been awarded trips to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, Nov. 29 to Dec. 3. They will stay at the Conrad Hilton, the world's largest hotel, as part of the delegation of 1,500 who will be attending.

Gene Wilson, 17, of Fort Worth, and Brenda Dalby, 17, of Aspermont, also won state 4-H honors. Wilson receives an engraved wrist watch from the Pure Oil Company for his work in public speaking.

Miss Dalby accepted a \$150 scholarship from Eli Lilly and Company in recognition of her outstanding health projects.

Miss Hand, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James W. Hand, has been a 4-H member for seven years. She is sponsored by Hercules Powder Company for her work in entomology.

Interested in Insects

Her interest in insects stems from a workshop in entomology she attended in a 4-H district camp in 1962. The following year Miss Hand taught entomology at the Cottle County 4-H camp.

Her high school biology class further stimulated her interest in bugs. Soon Miss Hand had her whole family bringing home specimens. She has given demonstrations on cattle grub before groups of Jaycees, Farm Bureau members and area ranchers. She explained to them how loss from cattle grub comes about and what can be done to control them.

Miss Hand also has given talks to ranchers explaining a new method of controlling screw worms by releasing millions of sterile flies.

Miss Eldridge, an eight year 4-H veteran, lives on a 500-acre farm with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Eldridge. She was winner in the garden competition and receives her trip from the Farm Equipment Division of Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing Company.

Through her 4-H garden projects she has learned how to fertilize, rotate crops and use pesticides. She cans most of what she grows and gives the rest away to friends.

Wilson, the son of Mrs. Lady-mae Wilson, hopes to enter the public relations field eventually. He defines public relations as "doing a good job and telling others about it." He took second place in his first speech contest in 1962 and won a week's trip to the National Auction Institute in Bryan, Texas.

Wilson has organized 4-H gavel clubs in other Southwest states besides Texas. This year he ran for Lieutenant Governor at the mock Texas Boys State sponsored by the American Legion.

Miss Dalby, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Dalby, plans to enter the elementary

education field. Her father is a rancher.

She has been selected as assistant to the county nurse at her high school and has been chairman of the polio and cancer fund raising drives in Aspermont.

She also watches out after the health of her family; making sure her parents, brothers and sisters have regular medical and dental checkups.

Miss Dalby has learned how to apply first aid and basic medication to wounds, and fill out health charts.

Burkburnett Kings, Chillicothe Vikings Tie 7-7 Saturday Night

The Burk Burnett Kings' hopes for clinching the Red River Semi-Pro football title were set back at least for another week, as the weatherman teamed up with the Chillicothe Vikings to chill the Kings' offensive power and dampen the homecoming spirit, as the two teams fought to a 7-7 tie. It will be next week, at Arlington, before the Kings have another chance to clinch the crown.

The Kings were hurt badly by the absence of their number one and number two ground gainers, Gerald Combs, a speedy young man who runs as well sideways as he does forward, and averages 130 yards per game, was not present. Gerald's coaching duties beckoned as the class AA Iowa Park Hawks advanced in the high school playoffs. Doyce Walker, bruising fullback and number two ground gainer, is gone for the rest of the season.

The shivering homecoming crowd saw speedy Tyrone English fill in for Combs and pick up 86 yards in 8 carries, plus a 44 yard touchdown. His nights work earned him a trophy for "outstanding back" of the game.

The King passing game was hampered by the 30 degree weather which chilled fingers to the point of numbness. However, two completed passes accounted for 88 yards.

The Kings first hit paydirt in the first quarter. English broke loose on the 49 and his twisting movements and speed sprang him free for the extra point to make it 7-0.

A minute and a half later, the Vikings capped a sustained drive by sending Joe Christopher five yards to paydirt. Then the talented toe of Don Lawson tied the score.

From then on it was a tight defensive battle, with neither side gaining much. However, the Kings gave the partisan crowd a thrill in the final quar-

ter, with the ball on their own three, King quarterback, Tom Williams, went for broke and hit Bob Stewart with a pass which turned into a gain of 75 yards. Unfortunately, the drive bogged and the Kings lost the ball on downs.

When the final whistle sounded the score stood at 7-7, and the Kings had yet to bring home all the "marbles." Next week the Kings invade the haven of the Arlington Red Raiders in another "must" game. They must win, otherwise there will be a playoff game with Chillicothe to decide the championship. The Kings have beaten the Red Raiders once in conference and once in exhibition. But should the Kings be short-handed again next week, the home field advantage might pay for the Red Raiders.

Along with English's trophy one was presented to Johnny Veach for "outstanding offensive lineman" and another to Norman Jones for "outstanding defensive lineman."

In halftime activities, Mrs. Barbara Myers was crowned Homecoming Queen for the 1964 Burk Burnett Kings. She was presented a gold football helmet and a red and white football jacket by Bob Laurick of the Kings and one dozen long stemmed red roses by Mayor James Frye.

So next week, the Kings are on the spot. Everyone in Burk Burnett sends their wishes for the best of luck and victory for the Kings.

LBJ Park Created By State Parks Commission

The Parks and Wildlife Commission authorized creation of the "Lyndon B. Johnson State Park" near the famous LBJ Ranch in the public interest and in recognition of Texas' celebrated son as "a national and world leader."

The site is near the LBJ Ranch itself and will be designed and operated in cooperation with Gillespie County.

The actual acreage involved was not announced but the Parks and Wildlife Commission members, meeting in regular session in Austin, said there would be substantial space "adequate to accommodate the thousands interested in a pilgrimage to the President's homeland."

The Commission instructed J. Weldon Watson, executive director, to proceed immediately to close the deal for the land.

This would be the first recognition of this type given by the State of Texas to its most distinguished citizen who is cited in the formal resolution for his "great leadership and long years of effective and dedicated service rendered to the people of the State of Texas and all of America as well as the free world."

The park site to be identified later is described as between Ranch Road one and U. S. Highway 290.

The area would comprise "from two to three hundred acres and possibly more" and would be bounded on the east by the Lutheran church and cemetery property, on the south by U. S. Highway 290 and on the west by the Community road running from 290 to Ranch Road One. This community road also extends across the Pedernales River at the low water crossing adjacent to the Scout Camp and bounded on the North by Ranch Road One.

Authority was given to purchase or condemn the required acreage for the site. Financed is expected to be enhanced by public donations.

AN OVERWHELMING CASEProponents of the Medicare plan for providing cer-
tain medical benefits to people drawing social security
payments intimate, if they don't actually state, that next
to nothing is being done to meet the medical problems
of the needy elderly.

Nothing could be farther than the truth.

Sometime ago, the federal Kerr-Mills law came into
being. This is a joint federal-state project, which puts
the administrative responsibility where it belongs — at
the local instead of the national level. It offers health care
to all elderly people who are actually in need. And it is
a complete program, encompassing hospital, nursing home,
medical, dental, surgical and drug care. In this all-im-
portant respect, it offers much more than Medicare.The taxpayers are meeting the bill for this. If Medi-
care also becomes law — and the strongest kind of pres-
sure will be put behind it when Congress next convenes
— we'll be paying twice, unnecessarily. And the Medicare
bill would be no small one. It would increase the social
security tax, borne by employers and employees, to 10.4
per cent of the first \$5600 of annual income by 1971.
That works out to \$582.40 for each covered worker. Many
think that even this wouldn't be sufficient to meet the

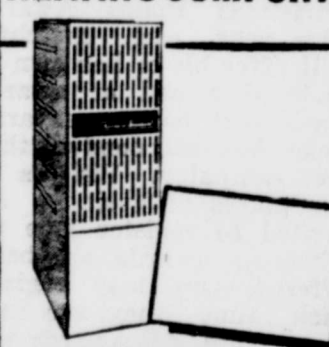

Both Parties Like The Coffee Party



This year, civic-minded women everywhere are coming to the aid of the political party of their choice. All, however, join in their approval of the coffee party, sometimes known as the Candidate's Kaffeeklatsch!

There's something about a friendly cup of coffee that stimulates thinking, makes it easier for people to talk and listen. Time for coffee with our candidate, is a simple invitation, but actions over the past twelve years show that it packs real political power.

How To Give A Political Coffee

If you plan a coffee for your favorite candidate, you will find it is an easy and pleasant task. First, invite enough people to provide a worthwhile audience for your busy guest of honor. Don't be afraid to crowd your guests in—there's a psychological advantage for your candidate if you do.

All you need to serve is coffee, coffee and more coffee. Cookies or some other sweet may be added, but they aren't necessary. The coffee, however, is necessary and should be hot and delicious.

For twenty people (two cups apiece) use one pound of coffee. Two gallons of water. To brew excellent coffee in a kettle, use regular grind coffee in a clean cloth sack, allowing half the space for expansion of the grounds. Tie closed sack to kettle handle. Bring measured water to a boil, then reduce heat below boiling and drop coffee sack in water. Brew over low heat six to eight minutes, agitating sack occasionally.

Q. What legal protection do an employee and his family have under pension plans that are jointly administered by employers and unions?
 A. The laws governing such plans require extensive safeguards to make sure they operate for the sole and exclusive benefit of employees, their families and dependents.
 The principal federal law involved is the Taft-Hartley Act of 1947. Briefly, it requires that:
 1. Payments to provide pensions or annuities must be made to a separate trust fund, which cannot be used for any other purpose.
 2. The payments are to be held in trust for the benefit of eligible employees.
 3. The basis for making such payments must be specified in a written agreement with the employer.
 4. The employees and employer must have equal representation in administering the trust fund. The agreement must contain a provision which, in the event of a deadlock, permits the appointment of an impartial umpire at the request of either party.
 5. The agreement must provide for an annual audit of the trust fund.
 For a fuller discussion of this complex subject, write for a free copy of a "Handbook on Negotiated Multi-Employer Pension Plans," from the Institute of Life Insurance, 277 Park Avenue, New York, N. Y. 10017.

Q. How many American workers are covered by insured pension plans?



A. There were nearly 6.1 million Americans enrolled in pension plans underwritten by life insurance companies at the end of 1963, an increase of about 290,000 persons during the year.

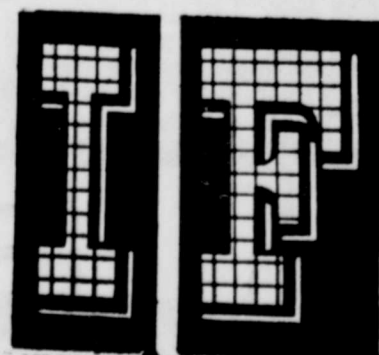
