## Local Council Will Sponsor Waste Paper Drive In August

Members of the home demonstration council met Saturday afternoon, June 30, and agreed to sponsor a waste paper drive in this county. Plans which have been made thus far provide that the council arrange to have a carload of paper shipped from this county sometime in August.

A steering committee was selected to supervise the paper drive, and members of the committee include Mesdames R. D. Spruill, C. F. Gowen, J. L. Morris, C. W. Shafer, T. L. Higginbotham, and J. C. Stewart. In addition to the committee, 2 women from each club in the county will aid in the drive.

Members of the council heard a report from Mrs. C. F. Gowen, chairman of the marketing committee at the Saturday session. Mrs. Gowen stated that the car of pineapple which was ordered earlier through the efforts of the council had been received at Harper's Feed Store and was being sold for \$4.50 a dozen, with a guarantee of 50 pounds to a bushel.

The success of past cooperative buying has been an incentive to the women to make plans for the cooperative buying of peaches, pecans, and tomatoes.

Those present for the meeting also heard a report of the work of the state education board by Mrs. J. L. Morris who stated that the women of home demonstration clubs had been most helpful in getting bills passed through the legislature. She reported that the securing of appropriations for carrying on the work of Extension Service had been aided by them, that the women had helped with the health bill, and the soldier vote bill. She stated also that some work had been done on the oleo margarine bill, although it has not been passed.

## Rains Amounting To .35 Of An Inch Fall In County

Slow rains falling at intervals Sunday and up to 10 a. m., Monday morning amounted to .35 of an inch according to the official government guager.

Reports from the various sections of the county indicate that approximately 3-8 of an inch of moisture was received in most areas of Dawson County.

This is the second fall the county has received in an eleven day period, 1-4 of an inch to a 1 inch rain having been recorded from the moisture received over the county Wednesday, June 20.

Although this area has not yet received enough precipitation for planting purposes, it is thought the crops which have been dry planted will benefit from the moisture.

## E Sales Lagging As County Enters Last Week Of The Seventh War Loan Drive

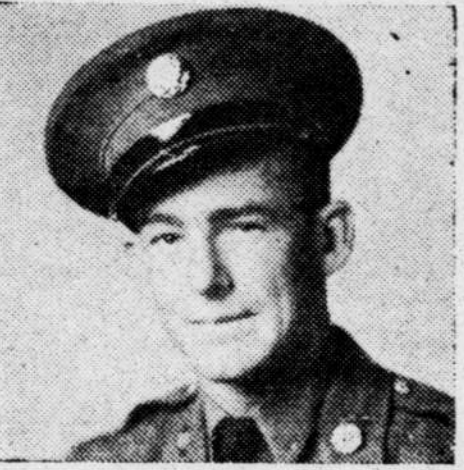

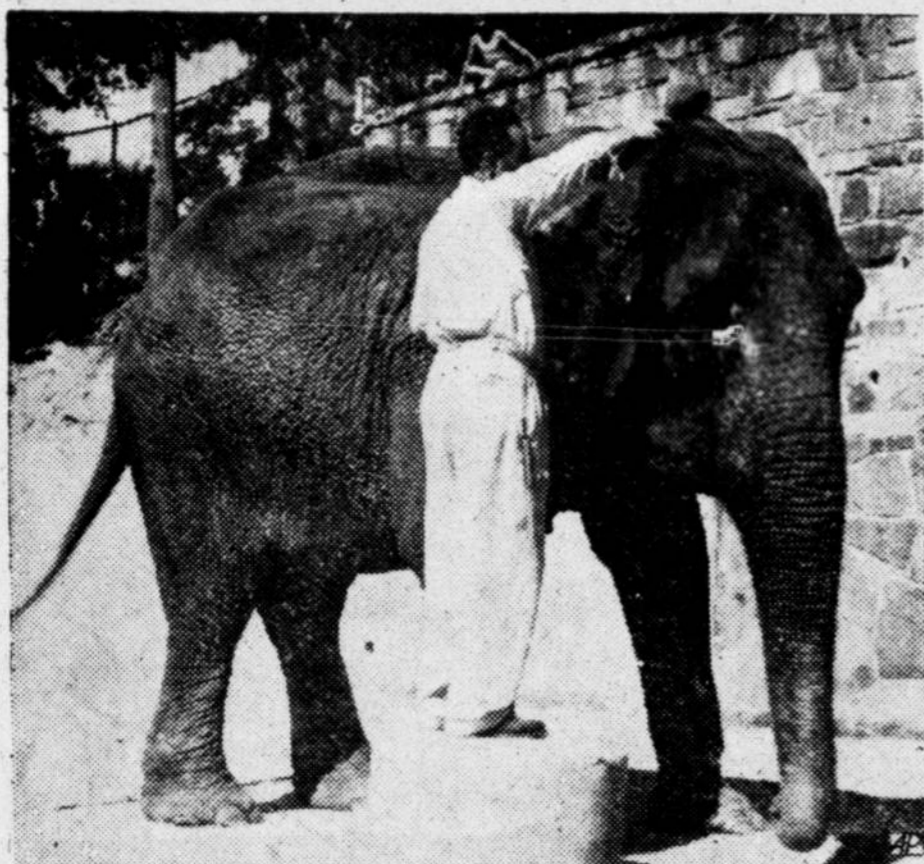

### Garden Hints Are Given By Agent

T. A. Barfield, local county agent, has released a number of garden hints that you will find helpful.

He states that a number of people in the county have asked about the planting of Fall Irish Potatoes. He reports that small potatoes from your Spring crop should be stored in a cool, dark room and allowed to rest there until planting time, which is around the middle of August. The agent says "Your potato grounds should be prepared in the usual way and the crop should then be planted."

He continues, "Now would be a good time to start collards and watermelons. In taking out a row from Spring or Summer gardens, you can plant collard seeds now and they will make a good crop. A 10 cent package will plant 100 feet Wtermelons planted now will make good crops of late melons, provided they have moisture."

### L. Meares Helped Destroy Japs On Sierra Madres

WITH THE SIXTH ARMY ON LUZON — Searching out and blowing up Japanese cave hideouts, a 38th "Cyclone" Division patrol, including Pfc. Lloyd Meares of Lamesa, accounted for at least 25 Japs in a two-day march through the Sierra Madre mountains.

Leaving base in the afternoon, the patrol surprised and eliminated four Nips in a dug out position shortly before nightfall. The next morning they crossed a deep ravine into a bamboo thicket, filled with hostile fortifications.

Using riflemen to spot snipers, automatic weapons to deliver protective fire, and demolitions men to throw in the charges, the patrol destroyed seven large caves and 10 more Nips.

Pfc. Meares is the son of Jack Meares who resides on Motor Route C in Lamesa.

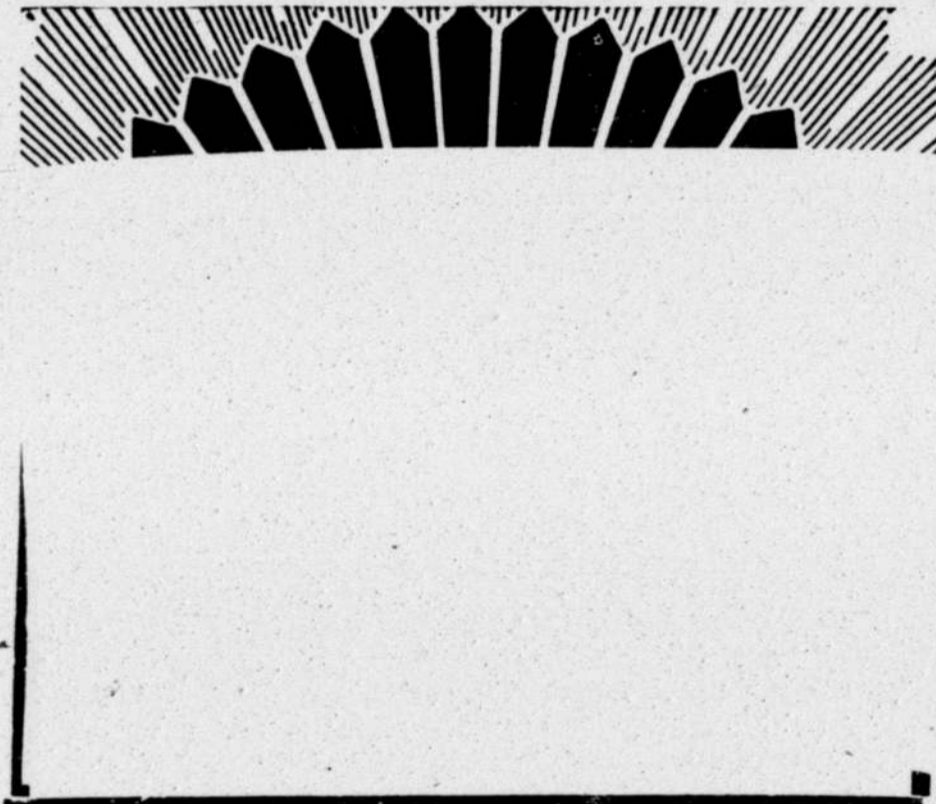

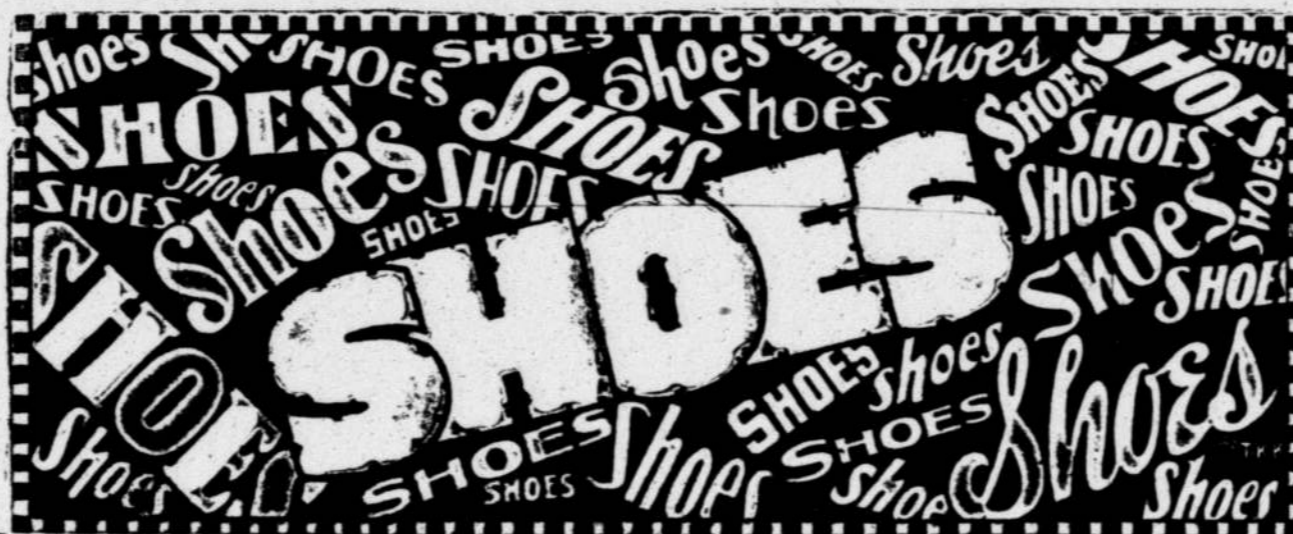

## French Black Market Still Flourishes

PARIS — French city-dwellers have been operating under the black market for so long that no one considers any longer the morality or legality of getting along by any method at hand.

What it is doing to the national economy is beside the point here, but the black market is for all in-

tents and purposes an open market, and its prices are considered by almost all French to be the official prices for commodities.

Marche noir prices are pegged of course at whatever the traffic will bear, and therefore fluctuate. A sizeable peice of beef, veal or pork will cost between \$4 and \$8.

Most essential clothing is rationed — which means that stores will tell coupon-holders the desired article is out of stock. A man's suit of poor material costs \$125 and upwards. A woman's blouse made of something that passes for silk but with fine lace inserts carries a price tag of \$60.

The normal processes of business trade have been turned upside down. A man consulting his attorney will pay off with an oxtail, a kidney and a couple of pork chops. A woman needing the services of a physician pays her fee in baked goods.

You can do the most wonderful things if you have some American cigarets. The correct approach is to start off by offering one cigaret. That assures an audience for you. From there you go ahead with the deal—and you can get almost anything if there are cigarets included in the payment. A whole pack of American tailor-mades is a treasure fit for the Louvre.

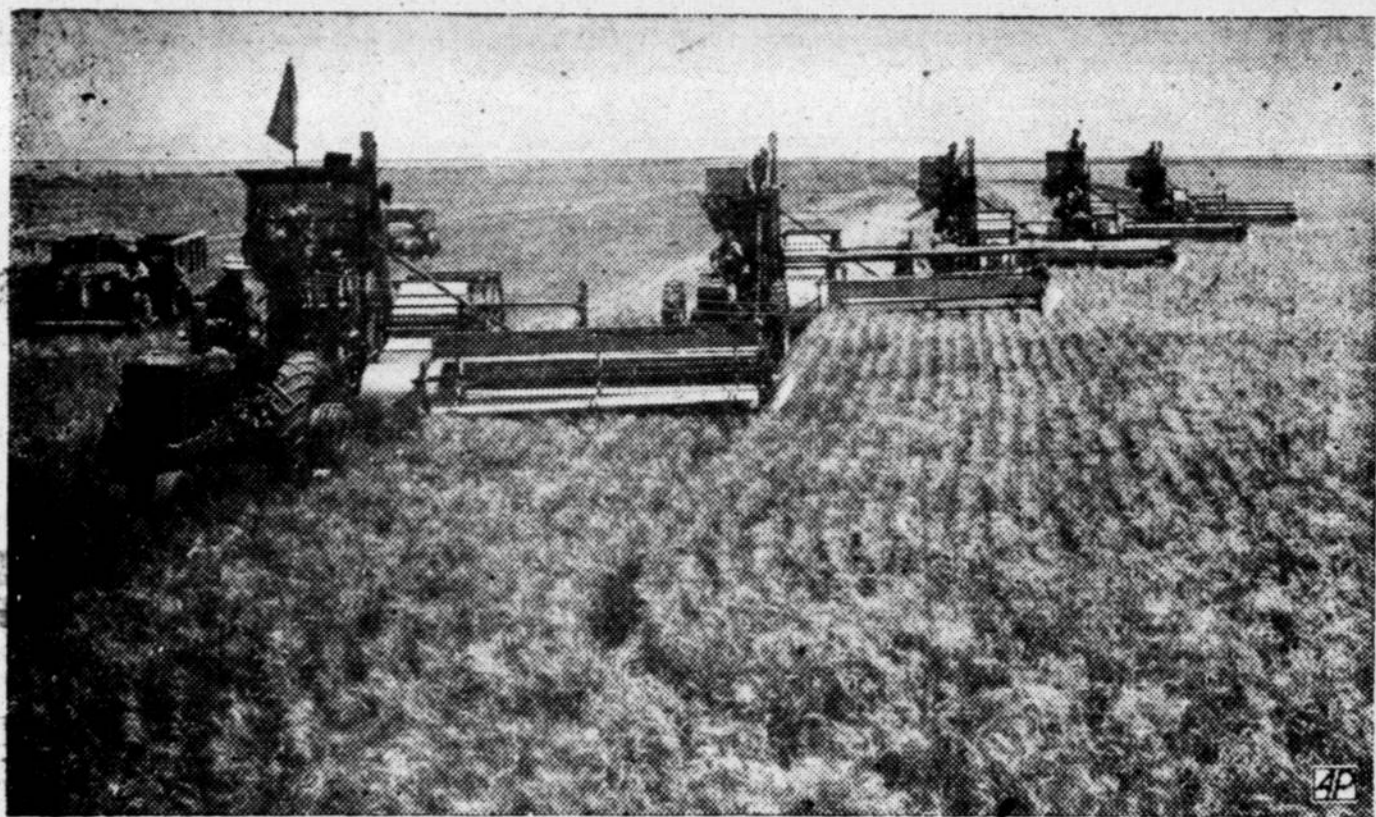

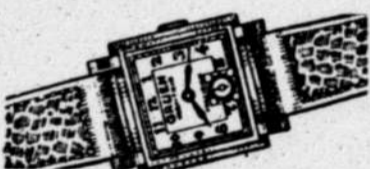

### Lake Texoma's Recreation Points To Be Put To Use

So that the public may make immediate use of the recreational facilities of Lake Texoma, reservoir for the giant Denison Dam 4 miles north of Denison, Texas, on the Red River,

Brigadier General E. H. Marks, Southwestern Division Army Engineer in Dallas, announced yesterday that temporary sites for boating facilities and other commercial activities will be made available for leasing Tuesday, July 17 at 2 p. m., in the Southwestern Division Real Estate Office in Denison. General Marks said that bids will be received for general concessions at seven of the most accessible points along the 1,250 mile shoreline of Lake

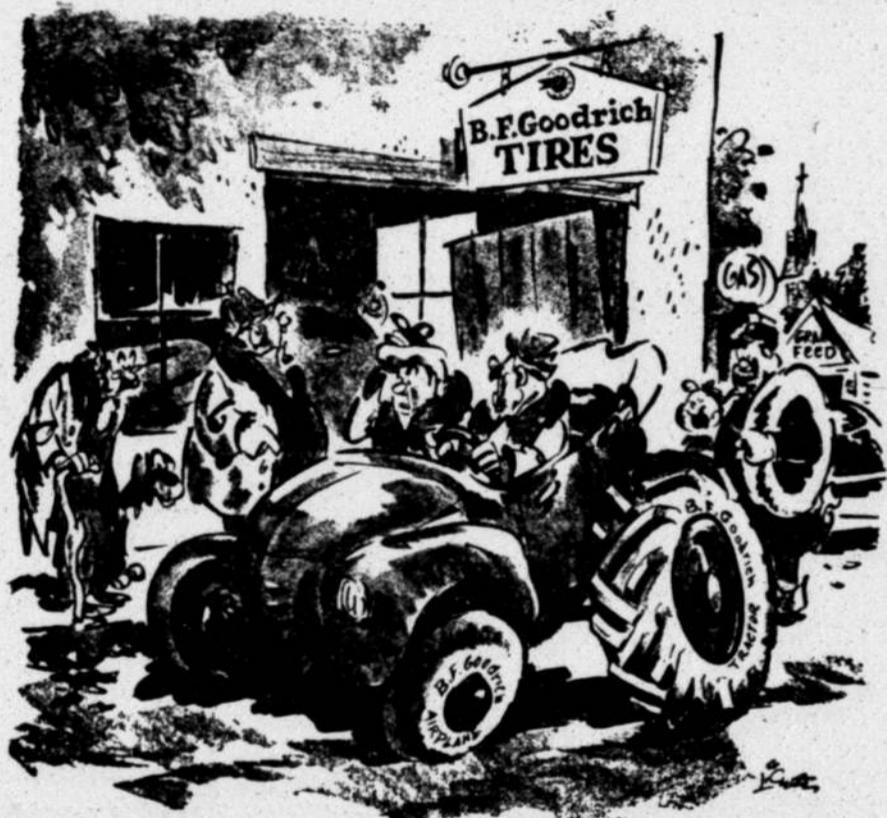
Texoma, the country's fifth largest lake.

Turnarounds and boat launching ramps are now being constructed by the Army Engineers adjacent to the seven points to be available for leasing. The facilities to be established at each of these locations will provide services such as boat docking, boat repair, and the sale of fishing tackle and bait, together with food and other necessities. General Marks emphasized, however, that no tourists cabins will be permitted at these seven points.

General Marks said that inquiries concerning location and short-term leases for commercial sites should be directed to the Southwestern Division Real Estate Offices in Denison, Texas, or Tulsa, Oklahoma. The General added that temporary leases for commercial sites will extend through the calendar year 1946 thus affording leasees benefit of the full 1946 season.

Sites for summer homes are now being laid out by the Army Engineers for leasing later in the summer, and may be available for leasing as early as August 15th General Marks said. Home site leases, he explained may be based on terms extending up to 25 years. Many inquiries regarding leases for summer homes have already been received the General added.

General Marks said that it is the War Department's policy to grant the public the earliest possible use of Lake Texoma's facilities consistent with the war effort, and that the present leasing program does not conflict with the already approved master plan for complete recreational development of Lake Texoma's resources in the post war period.

### Mrs. Randle Gives Report On Work Of Health Office

Mrs. H. Randle, county health nurse has reported on the work of the health office for the fiscal year ending July 1st. The report she submitted covers the period beginning June 30, 1944 through July 1, 1945 and lists the services done at or by the health office.

She reports that 2,178 skin tests were given, 96 chests X-rayed, 78 home visits were made, 75 home visits for maternity service were made, and that 265 home visits to infants and pre-school children were counted.

She states that 214 pre-school children and infants were in attendance at Well Child Conferences held.

The office gave 634 smallpox vaccinations, 2560 typhoid vaccinations, 459 diphtheria vaccinations, and 192 whooping cough vaccinations. Blood tests given totaled 585, with 2,334 listed as being treated for venereal diseases.

Mrs. Randle states that 95 patients were sent to El Paso for rapid treatment.

She reports that 2,994 school children were inspected through the period, and that 63 home visits made, 32 class room health talks were given, and 17 moving pictures concerning health were shown.

Tonsils of 31 persons were removed, and 64 home visits to morbidity were made.

According to her report 30 home visits were made to crippled children, and 7 new crippled children were admitted for medical services.

Fifty-seven glasses were fitted for school children, and 8 pairs of glasses were paid for by the Lions Club.

She states, "We appreciate the arrangements made by the Rotary Club to send a local crippled child to school in a taxi. It was the child's first year in school and his teacher reports that he read 34 books during the term."

She asserts that 211 health certificates were issued, and that a total of 235 hours were spent in school, and states that home nursing classes were taught to students, and that Red Cross certificates
