MORE CIVIL SUITS ARE FILED IN COURT HERE

Since the close of the March term of district court for this county, thirty civil suits have been filed with Miss Georgia Singletary, district clerk, and since Monday four divorce suits have been filed.

With more than a month to go before the last date for filing of civil suits for the October term of court, there will probably be a larger number of cases filed than ever before in Runnels county.

Of the thirty cases filed, twelve are for divorce. Six cases are for trespass to try title and for damages. These cases have been filed during the past few weeks.

The nature of the other suits are as follows: debt, 3; debt and foreclosure, 3; damage suits, 2; damages and cancellation of oil and gas leases, 1; suit to remove cloud from title, 1; suit on insurance policy, 1; partition suit, 1.

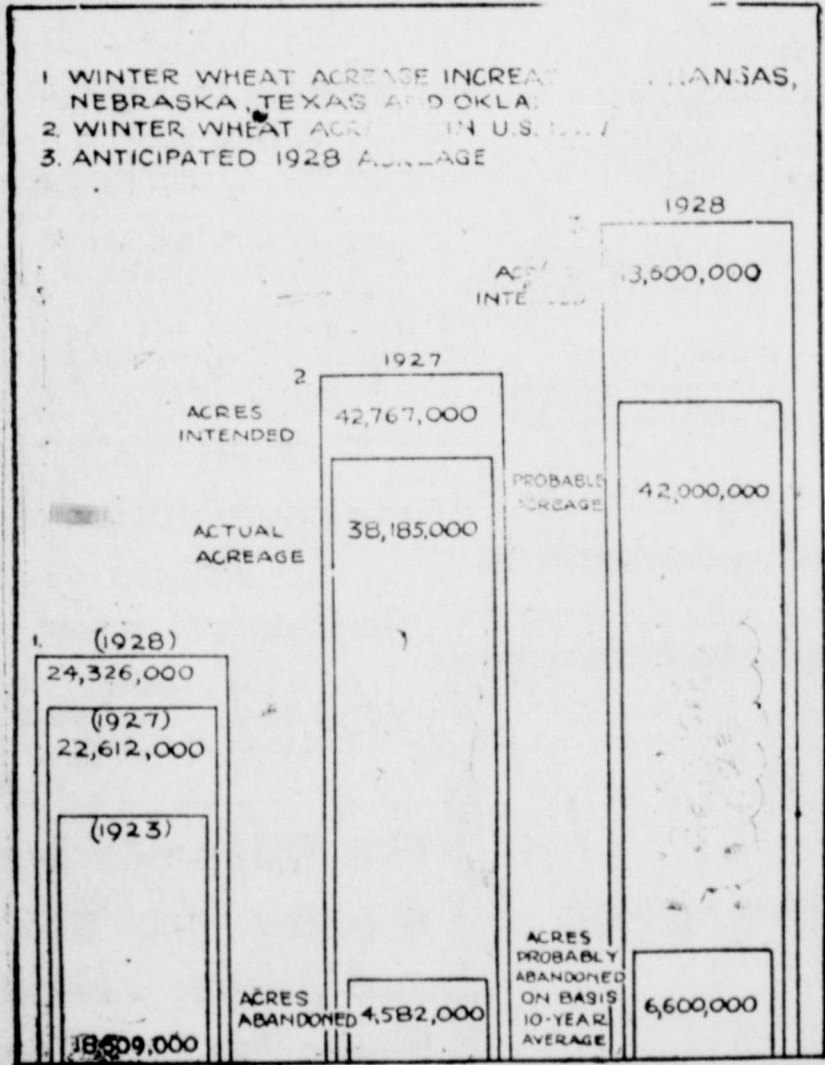
Five of the above named suits, however, have been dismissed on motion of the plaintiffs' attorneys, the record shows.

The case of J. C. Bloxom et al vs. C. E. Sillix et al, in which Mr. Bloxom and others sued for the removal of a cloud from title on land and damages, amounting to \$200,000, was dismissed Monday afternoon after Mr. Sillix and associates had signed papers which gave the land involved in the case, clear titles. This suit involved about 5,000 acres of land in the Hatcher section.

Other cases are expected to be filed in the district court within the near future which concern oil and gas leasing acreage in this county.

See Winter Wheat Export Surplus



(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—Increased dependence upon foreign countries for a market faces the American wheat grower, federal economists say, if production is boosted as indicated in 1928.

Figuring a winter crop of 626,000,000 bushels and a spring crop of 250,000,000 bushels, an export surplus of more than 250,000,000 bushels, the largest since 1924, is anticipated.

"If farmers carry out their intention to increase the winter wheat area 13.7 per cent, as indicated by reports, a total acreage of about 48,600,000 would be sown this fall," the Department of Agriculture says. "Based on a

WILKES BARRE, Pa., Sept. 6.—Mrs. Hope Stedman, member of a firm of Oriental rug importers in the United States composed solely of women, will travel alone in Persia.

Though her route will cover none too safe a region, Mrs. Stedman will push her way alone to Bagdad, Hamidan, Kirmanshah, Ispahan, Teheran, and Tabriz, thus covering the most important rug-producing centers of the East.

Her purpose is to make a complete collection of all types of Persian rugs. Each will be purchased in the center where it was made. This will supplement the complete Turkish collection made by her cousin, Miss Marie Yousouppoff, who is Mrs. Stedman's partner.

WESTERVILLE, O., Sept. 13.—Dr. Francis McBride, general superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League, will assume the active legislative duties of the league in Washington until a successor to the late Wayne B. Wheeler is appointed as general counsel, an announcement from league headquarters here today said.

Believe Sillix Well Will Flow Good When Clean

Hundred Lives Reported Lost in Typhoon

(By Associated Press)

TOKYO, Sept. 13.—There was an unconfirmed report in Tokyo today that besides the 100 or more drowned, a thousand persons perished in one town near Kumamoto.

TOKYO, Sept. 13.—More than 100 persons were drowned and as many are missing, the victims of a typhoon and a tidal wave which inundated a village in the neighborhood of Kumamoto on the island of Kiushiu, say dispatches received here today.

OSAKA, Japan, Sept. 13.—Nagasaki and other nearby towns in the province of Kiushiu were struck by a typhoon this morning.

Many houses collapsed, telephone poles were blown down, and tram service stopped.

DETROIT PLANE STILL AT OMURA

(By Associated Press)

TOKYO, Sept. 13.—The round-the-world monoplane The Pride of Detroit was not believed to have been harmed by a typhoon which struck the island of Kiushiu today, according to dispatches from Nagasaki.

The monoplane is at Omura, only a few miles southwest of the storm area.

Although there were no further reports regarding the intention of the plane's pilots, Edward Schlee and William Brock, to continue their flight across the Pacific Ocean, it is the general opinion of Japanese aviators and foreigners here that the trip will end here.

When drillers at Sillix et al McMillan No. 1 complete the job of cleaning out the remaining 15 feet of mud in the bottom of the hole, caused some ten days ago by an 80-foot cave-in, it will flow regularly, oil operators who have viewed the well declare.

The well is reported to have flowed more than 100 barrels Monday night and several nice heads were made Tuesday morning.

According to those who have been observing the well during the past few days, the flow seems to become heavier as the cave-in is removed. Drillers reported in the city Tuesday at noon that the bailer was working about 15 feet off the bottom of the hole.

It was estimated that the production to noon Tuesday had already doubled Monday's production by several barrels, and the crew is said to be working very carefully so as not to agitate the hole more than necessary. As soon as the mud is cleaned out, it is believed that the well will blow itself in with much more gas and oil produced than at any time since the well blew in Saturday, August 27.

New Well on River

Announcement was made Tuesday that Malone & Caudle, Big Lake operators, had secured a block of more than 2,500 acres in Horse Shoe Bend, the McShann neighborhood, some ten miles down the Colorado River from Ballinger, and that drilling would be started within the next few weeks.

H. B. May, Wichita Falls operator, has notified local operators that he will move onto the acreage three miles south of here with a rig as soon as the titles are okehed by his lawyers. This will be done within the next few days. Location of the test has not been made but it will be on

either the Giesecke or Schneider farms.

Johnson et al Fishing
Drillers at the Johnson et al Simms No. 1, ten miles south of here were fishing Tuesday, after the arrival of fishing tools from Cross Plains Monday night.

Jack Kenzie, head driller at this well, expressed himself Tuesday as being confident that the tools would be recovered within a short time and that drilling would proceed at 2,100 feet without further delay.

As usual, many new deals were reported underway Tuesday, but none of these reported were closed and could not be confirmed by operators here.

AUTOS SELL GOOD DURING PAST MONTH

The automobile business in Runnels county was very good last month, according to registrations at the county tax collector's office.

Twenty-five new cars were registered by Chevrolet dealers. Other makes sold were as follows: two Willys-Knights, six Whippets, one Chrysler, two Buicks, one Dodge, one Ford, one Oldsmobile, two Ford trucks and two Chevrolet trucks.

The total number of passenger cars registered for the year is 4,848, while 449 trucks are registered.
