Hawkins Given Fifty Years For Crosby Slaying Brady's Insanity Defense Attacked By Prosecution

Both Lay, Expert Witnesses Offer State's Rebuttal

Chief Of Counsel For Aged Defendant Announces Case Closed; Health Officer Testifies For State

No Insanity Signs

Witness Called By Defense Used By Prosecution To Show Brady Appears To Be Sane And Rational

(By Associated Press)

COURT ROOM, AUSTIN, Jan. 30.—The prosecution smote the insanity defense of John W. Brady charged with slaying Miss Leila Highsmith, 26, from both its lay and expert, this afternoon in Brady's trial for murder.

At the end of the session, E. A. Berry, chief of counsel for the 39-year-old former appeals court justice, removed the conditional phase of the defense's earlier announcement that it had rested, saying that his side definitely had closed.

Health Officer Testifies

Dr. Lee Edens, city health officer, was District Attorney Henry Brooks' first expert witness. Edens said he treated Brady's hand wound an hour or so after the stabbing of Miss Highsmith, with whom the defense contends Brady had been intimate. He found the physician went on after qualifying as an alienist, no evidence that Brady was insane and discovered nothing in eight later professional visits to Brady's cell to cause him to believe Brady was not cognizant of the difference between right and wrong.

Berry, on cross examination, put Dr. Edens the same hypothetical question which he had given Doctors Goodall and Joe Wooten yesterday, a question which the brothers answered by saying such a man as Berry described was insane, a man who turned away from law practice, abused his wife and became physically and mentally the husk of

Lubbock Loses In Waterworks Fight

Waco Awarded 1931 Confab In Annual Convention At Abilene; Local Delegates Withdraw Plea

According to a telegram received yesterday by the local chamber of commerce from H. N. Roberts, who has been attending the twelfth annual Texas waterworks school at Abilene, the next convention city of the organization will be Waco.

Lubbock delegates to the school extended an invitation to meet for the 1931 convention in this city. Mr. Roberts stated that he had withdrawn the invitation in favor of Waco and stated reasons for such action.

His telegram, in part, reads as follows: "On account of the waterworks school being held this year in West Texas, and because of the southwestern waterworks district convention, which is affiliated with the school, being scheduled for Amarillo in October, I thought it the proper tactics to yield Lubbock's application to Waco. We, however, are almost sure to get the convention in 1932."

Several other persons from Lubbock have been attending the school which ended its session yesterday afternoon.

Tech Enrollment Shows Increase

Enrollment at Texas Technological college, as announced yesterday from the office of the registrar, at this time is 3,270 students, an increase of 260 over the corresponding period of 1929.

Of the total number enrolled there are 523 more men than there are women, the figures being 1,990 men and 874 women.

Freshmen students in the college far outnumber those of any other class. Listed in the personnel are 1,192 freshmen, 560 sophomores, 286 juniors and 187 seniors and only 26 graduate students.

Of the four schools at the institution that of the liberal arts has the largest enrollment with 1,386 recorded.

Other schools report totals as follows: agriculture, 189; engineering, 496; home economics, 228.

Brother of Some Local Woman Is Shot at Marlin

Some Lubbock woman's brother is dead in Marlin. A long-distance telephone call to the Lubbock police department early last night from Waco police stated that an unidentified man had been shot and killed in Marlin, his only statement before dying being that he had a sister living in Lubbock.

Name of the dead man was not known and details of the shooting could not be learned by local officers—their only information being that somewhere in this city a sister to the man had been killed.

Measurement Of Naval Power Aim Of World Powers

Problem Publicly Attacked And Partly Diminished In Plenary Session Of Naval Parley Thursday

LONDON, Jan. 30.—In a plenary session at Old St. James's palace today, the five-power naval conference publicly attacked and partly diminished the problem of finding a method to measure naval strength for international treaties.

The problem of measurement of global tonnage in categories of ships tonight was in the hands of a special committee charged with making them presentable and acceptable to a compromise for the conference.

Admiral Gifford, named Secretary of the Navy Adams and Ambassador Hugh Gibson are the American members with Secretary of State Stimson ready to assist them. For the British, first Lord of the Admiralty Alexander and a delegate from the Dominions will act with Prime Minister MacDonald.

The first committee meeting will be held at 3 p. m. tomorrow. With the help of Secretary Stimson, Prime Minister MacDonald steered today's plenary session through European politics.

The American diplomatic explained that there were, roughly, two schools of thought. That of limitation by categories fixes the tonnage each country may use for each type of ship and thereby fixes the total tonnage for each navy and allows each country to appear that tonnage as it sees fit among the various types of ships.

EPISCOPAL HEAD DIES

Rev. Charles Palmerston Anderson Succumbs

CHICAGO, Jan. 30. (AP)—Most Rev. Charles Palmerston Anderson, 64, who gave 43 years to the service of his church, died today just 11 weeks after his elevation to the primacy.

Death for the second time in three months had made vacant the highest office in the Protestant Episcopal church of the United States of America.

For 25 years the bishop of Chicago, Bishop Anderson put on the robe of presiding bishop and accepted the added labor of his double office last November 13 in the full knowledge that a frail heart might yield to overstrain at any moment.

Cotton Co-Op Is To Be Available To Every Farmer

Directors Of Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association Vote On Changes To Aid All Agriculturists

Any One Eligible

21,000 Members Of Group Will Act On Proposals; Organization To Start Functioning Soon

(By Associated Press)

DALLAS, Jan. 30.—Subject to ratification by its 21,000 members, directors of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton association agreed today upon changes in the organization whereby it will be available to every farmer who wishes help from the Federal Farm Board.

The words "Farm Bureau" were taken from the association's title, and the by-laws and charter changed so that the association may act as a cooperative under the Federal Board.

Harry Williams, general manager, said that a referendum will be taken on the proposal as soon as possible so that the organization may start functioning with little delay.

Any Farmer Eligible. Under the new plan, almost identical with recommendations made by a special committee, headed by Dr. T. O. Walton, president of Texas A. and M. college, which Governor Moody appointed at the farm board's request, any farmer, whether or not he is a member of a farm bureau, will be eligible to participate.

The association will be decentralized with marketing activities carried on from strategic points over the state. Last year branch offices were maintained at El Paso and Corpus Christi. Others will be set up until the state is thoroughly covered.

"Little Joe" And "Tynmites" Mourn As "Knick" Passes On; Noted Artist To Be Buried At Auburn

By NEA Service. CLEVELAND, Jan. 30.—Irving S. Knickerbocker, known as "Knick" to thousands of newspaper readers through his comic drawings and sketches, which appeared daily in newspapers throughout the country, is dead as the result of injuries received in an automobile accident here.

Knickerbocker, who at 32 had established himself as one of the leading comic artists in the country, was killed when the automobile in which he was riding was struck by another car.

With a group of friends, Knickerbocker was on his way home from a dance. The force of the collision drove the car in which he was riding into a telephone pole, and Knickerbocker died of a fractured skull and punctured lung.

Funeral services will be held at Auburn, Wash., the home of Knickerbocker's parents.

Three feature drawings gained "Knick" a wide following. These were "The Tynmites," an imaginative daily story for children by Hal Cochran with illustrations by "Knick"; "Daisy Dugan," a popular

Deep Sea Diver Claimed By The Death He Always Feared--Helpless, Alone

Body Recovered From Fantastic Shadows Of River Bottom

(By Associated Press)

MONTREAL, Jan. 30.—Peter M. Trans, whose quest for livelihood led him into paths that he feared—down along the cold and lonely beds of seas and lakes and rivers—is dead.

And somewhere in far-away Denmark are two little boys who won't be "going to America next spring to see Daddy."

Trans died as he feared he would die—helpless and alone, locked in the grotesque habitations of his job, deep down in the black waters, surrounded by the fantastic shadows of the river bottom.

Body Recovered. His body was brought up at dawn today from the bed of the Outardes river, where he had been imprisoned since Monday forenoon after his lines caught in spikes in a cofferdam, in which he was working.

"I don't like this job," Trans told a friend in Montreal a few days ago, just before he started for the little work camp of Pointe Aux Outardes, at the junction of the Outardes and St. Lawrence rivers, to help build a cofferdam for the Ontario Paper company.

His body was badly bruised, according to the meagre story that trickled in over the wire, and his diving suit was torn, but not badly enough to have let in water to drown him.

No Response Given. There had been little hope that he was alive since yesterday afternoon, when Arvo Sivola, a laborer who, without previous diving experience had gone down several times to try to free Trans and to give him courage, reported that he got no response when he grasped his hand.

At dark last night Quenel Morneau, Lewis Beggs, who had flown all the way from Quebec in their heavy diving suits with their

Comb Underworld For Perpetrators Of Three Crimes

Two Shot To Death, Another Dying, Great Property Damage Aftermath Of Series Of Bombing, Fights

(By Associated Press)

CHICAGO, Jan. 30.—The underworld was searched today for the perpetrators of three crimes which left two men shot to death, another dying of bullet wounds, and a mass of debris to mark the place where a powerful bomb played havoc with a wholesale grocery firm.

The slain men are Barney Mitchell, treasurer of the Checker Taxi company and George Jackson, a Checker Cab driver. Both were found dead in Jackson's bullet splintered cab.

Racketeer Shot. John Genaro, reputed racketeer, was shot down by two gunmen after he had been "put on the spot," at a Chinatown restaurant. With five bullet wounds portending his death, Genaro "sang to the cops" violating one of gangland's unwritten laws by "squeaking." He named Louis De Luca and Angelo Lucchi as his assailants, and accused James Belcastro of "putting him on the spot." Belcastro was arrested, but denied complicity in the shooting.

Grocery Wrecked. The wholesale grocery wrecked by the bomb was owned by John J. Cullotta, who told police he suspected extortionists of the plot. He turned over letters in which he had been threatened and was placed under a police guard. The blast, shattering windows in structures two blocks away, and injured nearly a score of persons by falling glass and flying debris.

Verdict Returned After Four Hours Of Deliberations

Found Guilty Of Shooting Father-In-Law To Death By Jury In 72nd District Court At Crosbyton

Defendant Nervous

Arguments Are Closed Late Thursday; Wife And 6 Small Children Of Hawkins In Court Room

CROSBYTON, Jan. 30.—After a deliberation of four hours and five minutes, the jury in the trial of Joe Hawkins, 35, charged with murder of his father-in-law, S. M. Walker, 78, returned a verdict of guilty tonight, assessing a penalty of 50 years imprisonment in the state penitentiary.

Arguments in the case came to an end late this afternoon with the closing speech by District Attorney Durwood Bradley who, in words clear-cut and matter-of-fact, painted Hawkins, not as a man afraid for his life but as one who murdered with malice aforethought. As Bradley foretold the events of the tragedy, as given in the evidence, Hawkins appeared nervous while his wife and six small children sat nearby.

The case went to the jury at 3:45 o'clock and at 7:50 their report was made.

Outlaw Opens Arguments. Afternoon arguments were opened by M. C. Outlaw, Crosby county attorney, who declared in his speech that the shooting was done maliciously and that at the time Hawkins was calm and deliberate.

R. H. Temple, chief defense attorney, made a stirring appeal for the sympathy of the jurors, picturing a lonely wife with six small children without a husband and father to care for them.

Chest As Clearing House Is Proposed

Plans Discussed To Make Community Organization Handle All Of Charity Cases In Lubbock

Plans were discussed last night at a meeting of officers and directors of the Lubbock Community Chest to have the organization act as a clearing house on all charity cases in Lubbock.

The directors agreed that all of the agencies should give a report of their activities during the month of October. November, December and January on standard forms which are furnished by the community chest. These reports are to be handed in at the regular meeting of the board in February.

The present plan would eliminate duplications and save hundreds of dollars. State, Federal Officers Combine In Fight On Alleged Bootleggers Band

(By Associated Press) LUBBOCK, Jan. 30.—State and federal officers joined forces today and arrested six men in a second attack on an alleged band of bootleggers who last night killed a deputy sheriff in a gun battle when officers raided a Sandia Mountain ranch.

The mountain fastness bristled with gunfire last night when the officers swept into one of the remote regions where people of pioneer stock still live to themselves and where cash men make his own laws. Deputy Sheriff Emilio Candelaria was shot to death and one of the alleged bootleggers was wounded.

Gregorio Espinoza, 45, was charged with murdering Candelaria. Five other farmers, alleged to be moonshiners, were in jail in Albuquerque and another is sought by officers.

It was the second raid in two weeks on the ranch of Gregorio Espinoza near Sandia, N. M., 24 miles from Albuquerque, and in each visit the officers had difficulty in finding evidence.

At the time of the raid two weeks ago men of the ranch threatened the officers. Last night their threats broke into a gun battle, and after Candelaria's death the raiding party withdrew while a posse was gathered in Albuquerque.

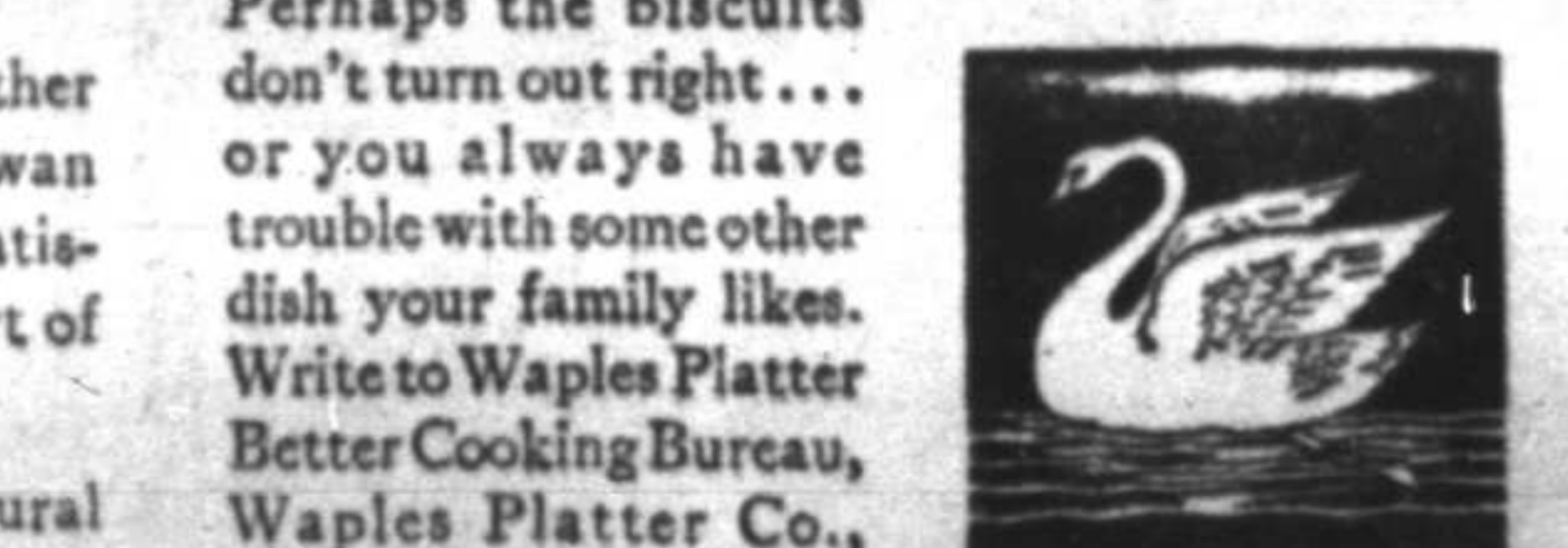

The first round was terrible. Collins, figuring Willis to be a "pale," started to beat him down in the first round. Willis, chin withstood the onslaught, but he didn't look so well.

At the end of the round Chaplin arose, and started to put on his overcoat. I noticed him.

"Tell me, honestly, Tim," Willis asked, "Is that really Charlie Chaplin, or are you kidding me again?"

Chaplin heard it. He began to laugh. He took his overcoat off, and resumed his seat.

"If Collins doesn't bother him more than that, this will be a fight," he said.

"Sure it will," I replied. "Jack's going out punching this time."

And early in the evening, Willis had knocked Collins cold, and established himself.

One Killed, Four Trapped By Blast In \$500,000 Plant

Absorption Plant Wrecked By Explosion In California Oil Field; Others Are Injured

FRESNO, Calif., Jan. 30. (AP)—An explosion today wrecked the new \$500,000 absorption plant of the Petroleum Securities company in the Kettleman Hills oil field, south of here, killing one man and apparently trapping four others in the flaming ruins. At least two other men were injured.

Rescuers started into the ruins after the first blast, but the explosion of a second tank drove them back, preventing them from recovering the body of Charles L. Phillips, foreman of the plant crew, who was killed outright.

Four Men Missing
Fire fighters said bodies of the four missing men were in the ruins. Intense heat prevented fire fighters from operating. Three other tanks in the plant were abandoned because it was impossible to approach the plant.

Field workers asserted friction caused the explosion. The plant, erected to handle the output of the new Felix No. 1 well of the company, was completed only recently. Development a few days ago of the Felix gusher raised a new question in plans for curbing the output of the big oil field and Secretary of the Interior, Ray Lyman Wilbur, made a trip from Washington to look after government interests affected by its operation.

Pressure Blamed
Workmen said gas and oil from the well had been coming with terrific pressure through the lines to the plant and that even pipe lines became hot. It was believed that gravel thrown up by the well had struck sparks against the side of a pipe, causing an explosion.

The well is about a quarter of a mile from the plant. Field workers believed the well was in no danger of igniting. Supply pipes from the gusher were shut off after the explosion.

Tax Payment Rush Is Expected Today

Offices Will Remain Open Until Midnight On Last Day Before Penalties Go Into Effect

With opening of windows this morning heralding the last day for payment of county and city taxes, employees of all tax offices are expecting an unusually big day.

Announcement was made yesterday from the office of R. A. Holland, city tax collector, that his office will remain open until midnight, final hour for payment of taxes. A 10 per cent penalty will be added for taxes paid after today. Mr. Holland announced that only \$150,000 have been paid in city taxes on the total assessment of \$270,000.

A. C. Jackson, tax collector for the Lubbock Independent School district, announced that his office will be open as long as payments will be made tonight. Long lines of patrons filled the corridors of the court house yesterday and in the office of County Collector A. J. Clark. No figures were available on the amount of taxes collected but it is understood that the office also will remain open tonight until midnight.

WOULD END REGULATION

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30. (AP)—Expressing no objection to the pending Coughenour communications bill, Walter S. Gifford, president of the American Telephone and Telegraph company, said before the Senate Interstate Commerce Committee today that passage of the measure by congress probably would mark the end of state regulation of utilities.

More Feed Plants Are Proposed For South Plains Area

Committee Is Appointed By Lubbock Board Of City Development To Work Out Establishment

With appointment of a committee yesterday morning at the regular meeting of its board of directors, the Lubbock Board of City Development is planning for the establishment of more feeding plants for livestock on the South Plains.

T. B. Dugan, S. C. Arnett and Jot Smith compose the committee and they will investigate plans now in operation in several cities of the Southwest.

W. L. Stangel, head of the department of animal husbandry at Texas Tech, will present to the BCD a report of his conclusions formed from collection of statistics revealing results of feeding of grain sorghums.

To Provide Market
The committee yesterday pointed out that the farmer would be provided with a certain market for grain sorghums and bundle feeds, the latter for which he has no market.

Under the tentative plan discussed, as is in operation where other feed plants are established, 50 farmers would enter into a five-year contract with the feeder, each farmer to agree to plant 50 acres in grain sorghum and sell the production to the feed plant operator. The committee pointed out that approximately three tons of grain sorghum, which could be sold for about \$5 per ton, could be grown on each acre.

Section Advised
South Plains, Inc., has advertised this section as ideal for feeding out cattle. The Lubbock Board of City

Development was instrumental two years ago in getting a feed in transit rate established, a measure which has influenced organization of three feeding plants over the area.

Under the feed in transit rate cattle may be shipped on freight charges from San Angelo to Kansas City and may be fed in Lubbock for the market, eliminating the additional charge of reshipping.

Directors announced that the chamber of commerce will complement visitors to the second annual farmers short course at Texas Tech next week with a Dutch lunch.

The directors authorized A. B. Davis, manager, to attend the Trinity river navigation meeting next Monday in Dallas for the purpose of studying the extent to which Lubbock's freight rate structure would be affected in the event the river is made navigable.

Band Directors To Gather Soon

(Special To The Avalanche)

PLAINVIEW, Jan. 30.—According to Ralph Smith, Plainview band director, band directors in every town, city and community in every county north of Dallas will be invited to a meeting in this city soon of the western division of the Texas State Band Teachers' association. Date for the meeting will be named in a few days.

Colonel Earl Irons, of Arlington, is the newly elected president of the association, having been named to that position at the annual state meeting in Abilene. D. O. Wiley, director of the Simmons Cowboy band, was elected secretary.

Fifty directors are expected to attend the local gathering.

Methodist Pastor Held For Shooting

Aged Minister Injures Two Then Attempts To Take Own Life; Demands That Letter Be Returned

MENDOTA, Ill., Jan. 30. (AP)—The Rev. J. A. Wilson, 60-year-old Methodist pastor, was held today for the shooting of two persons and an unsuccessful attempt to kill himself.

Neither Amos Elliott, church janitor, nor Elliott's wife was seriously wounded. With Wilson they were taken to a hospital.

The pastor, accompanied by Mrs. Wilson, went to the Elliott home last night and demanded the return of a letter. The minister believed Elliott was using it to injure him with his congregation.

Police understood the letter was written by the minister to a woman member of the church, but that it was innocent in itself.

Upon Wilson's demand, the janitor surrendered the letter. A moment later, Mrs. Wilson said, Elliott drew a revolver, firing first at Elliott and then at Mrs. Elliott. Each was grazed by a bullet.

Mr. and Mrs. Wilson then returned home. Wilson went to his desk and sorted out his insurance policies. He was explaining them to his wife when police knocked at the door. The minister turned the pistol on himself, firing several shots, but inflicting only two scalp wounds.

The theory was supported by a report made to military officials by Lieut. George L. Brittingham of Ft. Bliss, in whose car Allen was seen just before his disappearance. Brittingham said he has received anonymous letters protesting against soldiers entering the prize ring in Juarez.

It is believed that Allen was mistaken for Brittingham and was "taken for a ride."

Juarez cavalry has been searching the hills south of the Mexican city for Allen's body or the Brittingham car. Thus far the search has been fruitless.

Today Brigadier General W. A. Short in command at Ft. Bliss was granted permission by Mexican officials.

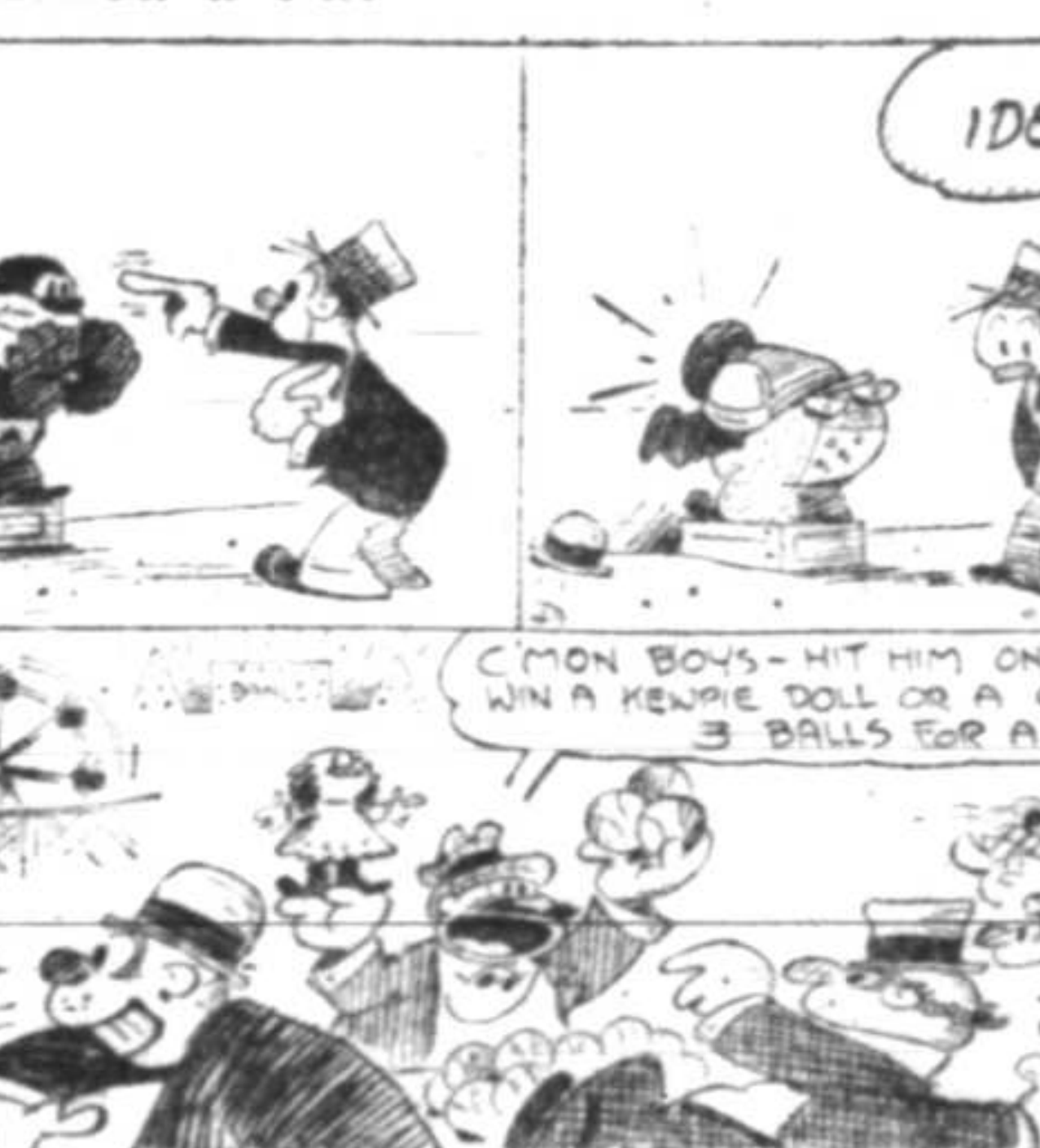
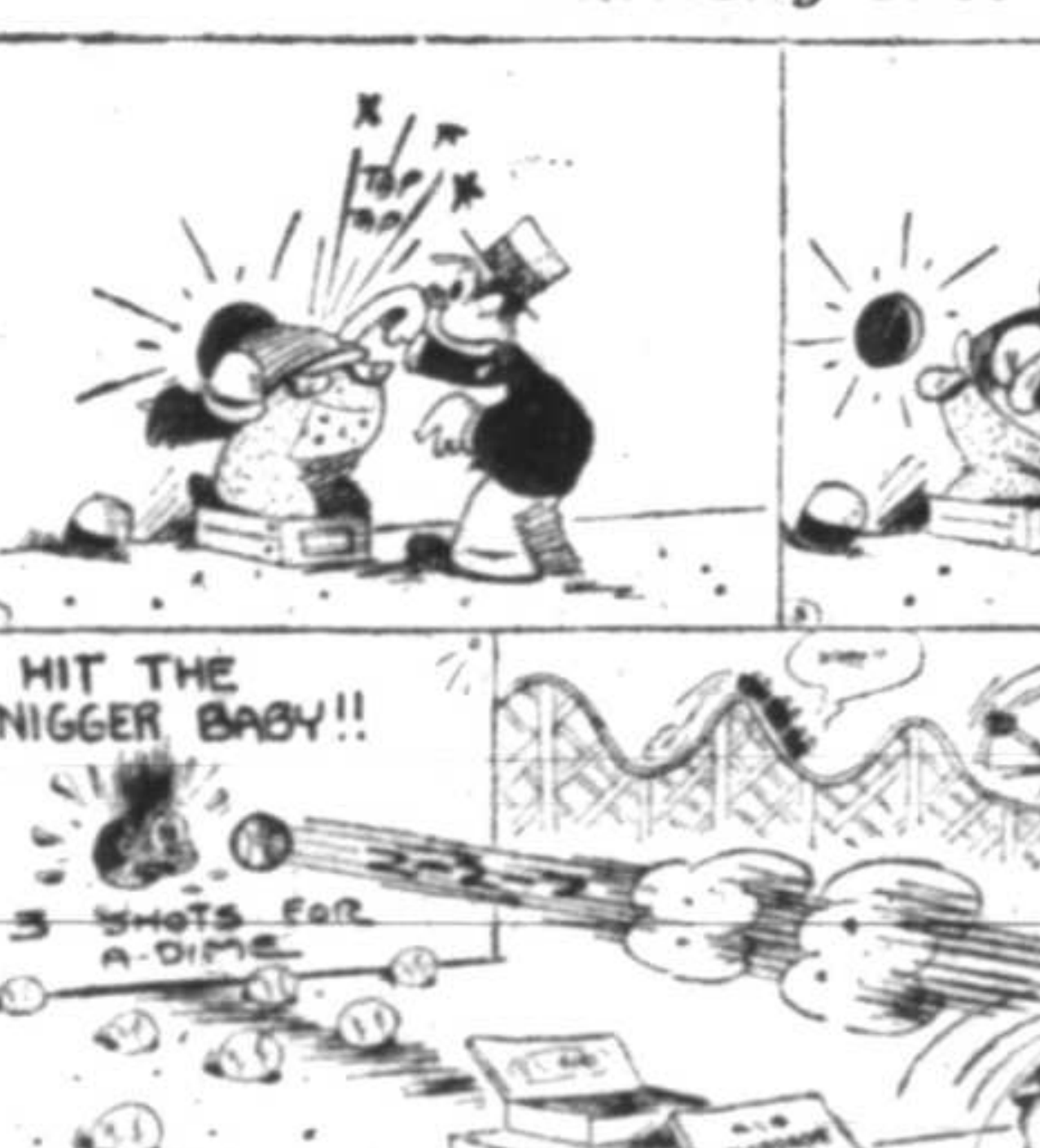

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Cotton Market Slumps; Stocks Gain

Prices Sag About \$2.50 A Bale Due To Heavy Selling
Statement of Federal Farm Board Chairman Legge Blamed For Sharp Drop In Prices Thursday

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 30. (AP)—Cotton prices sagged nearly \$2.50 a bale today under heavy liquidation and selling in extremely active trading with broad and frequent fluctuations. Denial by Secretary Legge of the federal farm board of a report that the board proposed to buy any large amount of cotton at higher prices was the main incentive behind the decline which reduced May contracts to 18 1/2. The option closed at 18 1/2, or 42 points net lower. The general market closed steady at net declines of 42 to 45 points.

Liverpool cables were irregular and first trades here showed losses of 2 to 3 points. Prices eased in early trading under pressure of liquidation mainly in near positions. March and March 25 closed to 16 1/2 and May 16 1/2, or 25 to 28 points down from the highs.

Market steadied and carried prices up to within a few points of yesterday's closing quotations.

Towards noon, however, the market began sinking again, and on Chairman Legge's statement and all active positions traded into new low ground for the season. March broke below the 16-cent line to 15 1/2-57 or 45 to 48 points below the close.

The top of 10.40 was paid at Chicago and St. Louis. Offerings 143,000, an increase of 11,500 over a week ago and 4,500 more than the corresponding day last year.

More open weather has stimulated demand for stocker and feeder steers and prices this week have strengthened materially. EIGHT MEN BURNED

Johnnie Bragden, 17, of Iowa Park, died a few hours later from burns. T. C. Holbrook of Rolland and Roy Edwards and J. S. Stevens of Iowa Park are in critical condition with little hope for recovery. Four other men suffered serious burns about the face and head.

HELMETS, GLOVES FOUND
NOME, Alaska, Jan. 30. (AP)—The flying helmet and gloves of Earl Bourland, Seattle mechanic who disappeared with Carl Ben Eielson, noted Arctic pilot, on a flight over Siberia November 2, were found today among the wreckage of Eielson's plane which was buried in snow ten miles from the Arctic ocean and 90 miles southeast of North Cape, Siberia.

Wets Planning To Launch Attack On Citadel Of "Pro"

Hearings To Be Held Before House Judiciary Group On Amendment Or Repeal Of Dry Laws

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30. (AP)—Congressional wets were busy today planning an assault upon the citadel of prohibition in open hearings before the house judiciary committee on measures proposing that the Eighteenth amendment be repealed.

The anti-prohibitionists were frankly gratified at the prospect of a thorough investigation of conditions under the dry laws. They prepared to take full advantage of this opportunity for which they have clamored for months.

Battle Anticipated.
A spectacular battle was anticipated as the drys, too, made preparations to present a vigorous defense.

Wet strategy was expected to resolve into a concentration upon the one or two measures thought most likely to be approved by the committee. Representative Linthicum of Maryland, democrat, chairman of the unofficial house wet organization, was inclined to favor a resolution by Representative Sabath, democrat, Illinois, as the one that should be vigorously pushed.

This measure proposes an amendment to the Eighteenth amendment, under which congress would be empowered to govern the manufacture, transportation and sale of liquors under government permits and in packages.

Referendum Proposed.
Another proposal favored by the wets was that of Representative Mary T. Norton, democrat, New Jersey, for a national referendum on the question of repealing the Eighteenth amendment.

The hearings begin on February 12. The full judiciary committee

will look into proposals for the repeal of the Eighteenth amendment. Measures modifying the existing laws will be considered by a subcommittee under the leadership of Representative Dyer, republican, Missouri, himself a wet, and the author of a measure to exempt breweries with an alcoholic content of 2.75 per cent.

Representative Graham, republican, Pennsylvania, chairman of the judiciary committee has announced that all persons and organizations wishing to be heard will be given an opportunity to present their side of the argument.

To Conduct Inquiry.
He said he had decided to conduct the inquiry because he believed the proponents of repeal and modification measures were entitled to a hearing and for the reason that a great number of citizens had asked that such an investigation be undertaken.

Should some one or another of these measures be brought eventually to the floor of the house, the sponsors of prohibition are confident of their voting strength. The highest estimate of the number of ballots commanded by the wet bloc is a little more than 100, or approximately one-fourth of the house membership. The drys scoff at this figure and estimate it at about 50.

Dawson Schools Are Unaffected

(Special To The Avalanche)

LAMESA, Jan. 30.—Rural schools in Dawson county will not close nor will their nine-month terms be affected by the recent injunction granted concerning Texas' five million dollar rural aid fund, according to W. T. Webb, county superintendent, in answer to rumors floating in the school districts of this county. This county has already received her portion of the rural aid fund, which is \$14,805, and largest portion of it has been spent, Webb states.

Several rural schoolhouses in Menard county, Texas, have been built by volunteer workmen.

Chilling Wind On Atlantic Seacoast

Winter Again Brought To South By Strong Gales; Buildings Unroofed In Mississippi

ATLANTA, Jan. 30. (AP)—Chilling winds which sifted snow and churned up gales along the Atlantic and Gulf coasts brought winter to the South again today.

Small buildings were unroofed in Mississippi, and as the cold wave swept eastward snow reached a depth of nearly nine inches at Bristol, Va.

A tornado dipped down into two central Florida counties, killed a negro woman and tore at residences before passing out into the Atlantic.

Off Wilmington, N. C., rough seas buffeted a tug boat carrying seven men for 12 hours before the craft reached a village south of that city. Three negro fishermen were believed to have drowned when their schooner capsized off the Mississippi coast.

The Florida twister, which struck Marion and Flagler counties in the central part of the state, damaged a dozen buildings near Summerfield and wrecked a turpentine settlement near Bunnell.

Three Men Burned In Baytown Blaze

Two Hotels, Two Residences And Water Plant Razed By Flames; Victims Are On Road To Recovery

BAYTOWN, Jan. 30. (AP)—Three men were injured, two hotels, two residences and a water plant were destroyed and another building was damaged by a fire here late yesterday.

Victims of the fire were regarded by physicians at the Humble Baytown hospital as on the road to recovery today.

T. R. Ellis, 23, and A. F. Moersch, 24, were trapped in the blazing Reidland hotel. Before they could be gotten out, they were severely burned, and their condition at first was described as "critical."

W. F. Cain broke his right ankle when he jumped from the second story of the Reidland hotel.

The fire destroyed the Reidland hotel, owned by Louis Reidland, the Tyson hotel, owned by J. D. Tyson, two frame residences owned by G. M. Snodgrass, and water plant, owned by Dutch Petch, and it damaged the H. E. Brunson building. Loss was estimated at \$40,000.

Second Venire May Be Called In Case

OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan. 30. (AP)—Probability that another venire of prospective jurors would be needed to complete a jury for the trial of 32 defendants charged with conspiring to violate the federal prohibition laws in Pottawatomie county loomed today as the first venire of 40 dwindled.

Three peremptory challenges each remained shortly before noon today to the government and defense. Challenges for cause were responsible for the elimination of the greatest number of prospective jurors.

Roy St. Lewis, United States district attorney, asked virtually all veniremen if they knew W. A. "Bill" Strong, former state representative from Texas and Cimarron counties and whether they had been in communication with him recently. None admitted talking with him. Lewis did not explain the reason for his question.

AMERICAN NAMED

LONDON, Jan. 30. (AP)—Secretary of the Navy Adams and Ambassador Hugh Gibson were designated this afternoon as the American members of the special committee appointed to consider the question how to measure naval power by total tonnage or by tonnage in categories of ships.

PANTAGES REFUSED BOND

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 30. (AP)—The third attempt of Alexander Pantages, multi-millionaire showman convicted of a criminal assault, to gain his liberty on bond failed today. Superior Judge Fricke, denying the petition for bail, prefaced his decision with a fiery denunciation of alleged attempts by members of the theater man's family to influence him.

Snow Storm Halts Capital Traffic

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30. (AP)—A driving snow that almost brought traffic to a standstill failed today to keep the president of the United States from reaching his office on time—9 o'clock.

Herbert Hoover had little more than a block to go from the White House to his temporary office in the state war department building, and by using an automobile he arrived without getting his feet wet.

Members of congress and other officers of the government, however, had more difficulty. Taxicabs, usually thick on the city's streets, seemed to have vanished. To those looking for them, all that were seen carried passengers and to obtain a "vacant" was an achievement.

TO FIGHT INJUNCTION

TYLER, Jan. 30. (AP)—Plans were announced here today by T. M. Jones, school attorney, for organization of East Texas counties into a permanent body to fight the school law injunction tying up \$5,000,000 in funds of rural schools. He said every East Texas county was invited to attend a meeting here next week to form the organization "to combat propaganda of the Texas league for equal and uniform taxes," which obtained the injunction.

SCHOOL GIRL WOUNDED

DETROIT, Jan. 30. (AP)—A Highland Park school girl was wounded today by employees of the People's Wayne County bank branch at Hamilton and Glendale avenues, who fired after a man who had entered the bank, held up a teller and escaped with \$700.
