Eli Rivera Is New Owner

Cowen Shoe Store has been purchased by Eli Rivera, who has managed and operated the downtown business for the last 2 years.

Rivera, 25, announced Wednesday he had bought the entire stock and fixtures from C. D. (Jake) Boatright of Sweetwater.

Boatright is the father of Mrs. Rivera, the former Carla Boatright, who assists in the shoe store's operation.

"Ours will be a complete family shoe-store," Rivera emphasized, "fitting the entire family with up-to-date fashion, quality brands with economical pricing."

Staff will continue the same with A. C. Craig in the store Thursday, Friday and Saturday, Mrs. Lester (Jewel) Horn in the store Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, plus Miss Linda Sample, who was employed while a student at Colorado High.

In addition to women's, men's, children's and infants footwear, Cowen's will continue to feature footwear accessories which include hose, socks and handbags.

Mr. and Mrs. Rivera are natives of Sweetwater. They moved here from Big Spring to assume management of the

store for Boatright in October 1969.

"We are confident of the economic well-being of Colorado City and Mitchell County," said Rivera, "and believe our investment in ownership is an opportunity for business progress and growth."

Rivera, who had experience in shoe and insurance business before moving to Colorado City, a director in Jaycees, a director Mitchell County Boys Club and a member of Chamber of Commerce. Mrs. Rivera is past secretary-treasurer of Jaycee-ettes.

City Approves Pipe, Seal-Coat Contracts

City Council Monday quickly approved 2 contracts, speeding the city toward a 7,000 foot water pipe line installation and seal-coating for approximately 40 blocks of paved streets.

Contract for the seal-coating went to Price Construction Company of Snyder, the same firm which completed a similar job here last year.

Price's bid is for 11 cents square yard with the city furnishing rock while the contractor furnished asphalt, labor and equipment.

Total cost to the city--including rock--is estimated at 13.49 cents per square yard of pavement.

Contract specifies three-tenths of a gallon of OA-90 asphalt applied per square yard with 1 cubic yard of No. 5 gravel to each 120 square yards of surface.

The seal-coating will be divided into two projects, which will combine for about 60,000 square yards.

In the initial phase--38,746 square yards for \$5,226.85 expenditure--will be:

East 10th St., from Eastover to Hickory.

East 17th St., from Monticello to Hickory.

West 17th St., from Pine to city limits.

Seal-coating on 10th and 17th streets will be on top of new pavement placed last year.

The Snyder firm, which is

completing the new parking area at Root Memorial Hospital, will schedule the second phase of street work about 30 days after beginning the first project. Streets in the second phase will be designated by City Council later.

One other firm, M.L. Burnett Construction of Sweetwater, submitted a bid for the seal-coating, but it arrived too late to be considered. However, it was at a higher price --14 cents per square yard.

Contract for 7,000 feet of 6-inch water pipe that will be installed in Eastover Addition

and to the Trucktown business area of Interstate 20 in Certain-teed Products Corporation.

Certain-teed, with home offices in Ambler, Pa., and a plant in Hillsboro, bid \$1.19 per linear foot for Class 150 asbestos cement pipe with couplings. Total price will be \$8,163.40.

Representative of the pipe company will be here Thursday (today) to perfect the contract. Delivery is usually about 20 days from date of order.

The Hillsboro company was the only bidder. However, the city did receive a \$2.03 quotation from a cast iron pipe firm.

A separate contract will be made for ditch digging for the pipe installation.

The 6-inch water line will replace a 2-inch line that has been severely inadequate for an area between East 16th and 17th streets, Watson and Eastover.

Extending to the Interstate 20 area, the line will serve business, industry and residences.

Roadside Dump Threat

Officials Ask Cooperation Of Citizens

County officials are seriously concerned about trash and junk dumping in the rural areas.

They view the practice--which continues despite the fact dumping is against the law--not only as eye-sore damage but also as a cause for water pollution.

County Commissioners and County Judge Bill F. Carter discussed the problem Tuesday during Commissioners Court session.

They are asking for more public concern and cooperation in stopping the violation.

They are urging citizens who observe dumping of trash, junk, dead animals and other refuse to report the violations immediately to law enforcement officers.

Each violation can result in a fine up to \$200.

At the same time, Commissioners Court is planning to post "no dumping" signs at key locations in the county. The signs will call attention to the violation punishable by fine.

However, public concern and cooperation is viewed as the best measure for eliminating unlawful violations.

Cans, bottles, roofing, junk materials, trash and dead animals--such as calves--are being dumped on county right of ways adjacent to county roads and accessible creeks and draws.

Commissioner Moody Richardson said he had crew working Tuesday trying to clean-up some of the mess created by dumping.

Two dead calves were dumped in one spot last month, according to Commissioner Marcus Vest. More animals have been dumped this month in county areas.

"With streams now low on water," said Judge Carter, "these dumpings can pollute water supplies and can be a serious health menace."

"We are hopeful the public will recognize the necessity

for placing trash, junk, garbage and dead animals in authorized dump grounds," said Judge Carter "and will cooperate in keeping our countryside clean."

"Then, when a citizen does observe a dumping violation, he can assist the clean-up by notifying officials immediately so that violators can be brought before the law."

New Firm Plans Funeral Home

A new Colorado City business partnership has purchased a vacant church building and will open the community's second funeral home there within the next few months.

It will be Franklin-Britton Funeral Home, owned and operated by Thomas Franklin and J. C. Britton of Colorado City and Emil Franklin, now of San Antonio.

Britton is owner of Western Auto Store here, a business he will continue to own and operate, and Thomas Franklin is minister of Northside Church of Christ. The third partner, Emil Franklin, is the father of Thomas Franklin, and a long-time funeral director.

Remodeling already has started at the newly-purchased property, formerly Sixth & Elm Church of Christ, which has been vacant since the church congregation moved into new and larger facilities at 22nd and Austin Streets several years ago.

There is no definite target date for opening the new service business, but the partnership is hopeful it will be within the next 3 months.

Major facilities for the funeral home will be on the main floor of the 7,200 square feet building. Renovation work began this week under supervision of Britton and Thomas Franklin.

North half of the main floor will be converted into a new chapel. Offices, reception and viewing rooms will be housed in south half of the main floor.

The facilities will be completely remodeled with paneling and carpeting throughout.

Residence apartment for a

funeral home staff member will be constructed in the lower floor area.

Improvements also are scheduled for the building's exterior, plus a parking lot east of the building and landscaping.

Facilities for the firm's automotive equipment also will be added.

The Franklins are members of a family steeped in the funeral home business. Emil Franklin, a licensed mortician and funeral director, has been in the business since 1935 and his father's career dated back since 1925.

Tom Franklin's career in the field extends back to 1955.

Emil Franklin, is a graduate of Cincinnati College of Mor-

tuary Science, Cincinnati, O., and has attended Abilene Christian College.

His son, Tom, also is a graduate of the same mortuary college, also a graduate of Freed Hardeman College, Henderson, Tenn., with additional study at Mountain State Commercial College in Parkersburg, West Va.

Tom also has completed a course in emergency transportation at University of West Virginia College of Medicine.

Both the father and grandfather, operated a funeral home in Parkersburg, West Va., in previous years, and both earned the Nunnamaker award at Cincinnati College of Mortuary Science for restorative arts and scholarship.

GRADUATION night in high schools everywhere is a point-with-pride event for the whole community.

That is especially true for people who have shared a community so many years they can remember when the mamas and papas of the current class were girl and boy graduates themselves.

Graduation night is a thing of traditions kept alive through the years no matter how fast the world changes. One tradition at Colorado High School happens to be tears in the eyes of graduates as they take part in the processional and the recessional.

To march in and out with tears on the lashes has been the acceptable procedure for at least 35 years. And most of the graduates, even the happiest, proudest ones, keep that tradition the minute the music starts.

Graduation night is not necessarily sad. It is an emotional experience for parents and progeny alike.

OTHERWISE, graduation night is a joyous occasion. By tradition as soon as cap and gown and diploma are put away the all-night parties begin. Every graduating senior in town expects, by tradition, to sleep all of the morning after the night before.

That's another tradition known to have been going on for several decades now.

It is part of putting away childish things like going to bed and getting up by the clock and parental guidance and griping.

Well, what with annuals, finals, practicing, and parties, they are probably sleepier than usual anyhow, in spite of all the excitement. And it isn't considered polite to sleep through the graduation address.

GRADUATION night address is the oldest tradition of all. Kids don't just have to listen but by tradition they do have to sit still and look reasonably intelligent and interested.

Have some sort of vague feeling that the speaker urged hard work, the continued pursuit of knowledge, clean living, and high principles of honor so that success, fame and fortune could embrace us one by one.

GRADUATION night speech for that little class was not altogether wasted.

Let's see. . . looking back, can recall that many of us went on to college. . . most of the girls got married and reared children to educate. . . two of the girls became high school teachers. . . one boy became a multi-millionaire. . . one became a football coach. But then, one boy wound up in federal prison so he probably wasn't listening, a-tall.

Not listening is one of the best things teenagers of any generation do. It is part of their idea of the art of self defense. Tuning out words of wisdom is doing what comes naturally when you're 17 or 18 years young.

NEVER made a graduation speech and certainly never intend to get invited to make one.

If ever the invitation came and was accepted (heaven forbid) it would be a most unorthodox address.

It would admit without preamble, "You think you're smarter than your parents and probably are but try not to let them know it. Such small favors are deeply appreciated by your elders."

And it might even end with "May the good Lord bless and keep you 'til we meet again when it comes time for your sons and daughter to graduate . . . which is likely to be sooner than you think."
