Lamesa Winner In Annual League Meet

The results of the literary events of the University Interscholastic League meet which was held in Lamesa last Friday and Saturday have been tabulated and printed below. The meet was largely attended by keenly interested pupils, parents and friends. The Lamesa High School building, the Lamesa Elementary School and the Church of Christ building were required to hold the events and to hold the crowds wishing to witness the contests. In addition to the literary events there were contests in certain athletic events which were also largely attended by interested spectators. These were the Tennis contests, the volley ball games played by the girl contestants, and the preliminary events in the Track and field events of Friday and the finals in these contests on Saturday. The athletic results are also published this week.

The League contests in debate were conducted under the direction of Mr. Leo Reithmeyer of Sparenberg who announced the results of the round-robin in debate as follows: Boys debate, Lamesa High School team composed of Guin Tipton and Angus Wages ranked first and will represent the county in the District Meet at Lubbock on April 14 and 15. The girls debates were won by the Lamesa High entries who are Misses Louise Gill and Laura Kirk. They will represent Dawson county in this. The debating teams of Hancock school were runners-up. The boys team was composed of Lonnie Stephens and Paul Harrell, the girls team was composed of Minnie Edgmon and Mattie Ruth Harrell. Third place in boys debate went to Arvid Hackelmann and Everett Henderson of the Five Mile school. Third place in the girls debates went to the Liberty School whose representatives were Laura Dell Davis and Marie Hilburn.

Miss Astalee Key, director of Choral Singing for Dawson County, announced results of this contest as follows: A large crowd attended the Choral Singing contest at the Lamesa High School auditorium on Tuesday night, March 28. Three choral singing contests were held on that occasion. Each event was closely contested. In the first group of competing schools, Lamesa Elementary school was awarded first place points, second place going to Ackerly Elementary. In the second grouping Liberty received the decision for first place, second place going to Hancock. In the third group of competing school, Lou received the ballots for first place, Fivemile was awarded second honors and Grandview was third.

This event is now a full-fledged part of the annual meet. The second year of this contest showed that considerable interest has been developed and that the competition is likely to be close among the schools in choral singing hereafter. Choral Singing contests were tried out in this county before such were made a part of the League work. Since the beginning these contests have been popular.

Arithmetic results were announced by Director G. M. Roberts who with assistants conducted this contest. In the rural school division, Kilmer Corbin and Gladys Lisembee of Hancock won first honors. Second place certificates were won by Fay Gant and Kathleen Edwards for the Eason school, while Hardin Easterwood and Floyd Haney won third place points for Liberty school.

Arithmetic results in the ward or elementary school division were that Harold Williams and Howard Allen of Lamesa Elementary won first place points for their school; Virginia Cherry and Aubrey Moore secured second place for Ballard; Alice Mae Holt and her partner Nina Mae King, took second place for the Woody school.

Extemporaneous speech contests for boys and girls were directed by Prof. F. Y. Martin of Higginbotham who announced that in the boys division, Travis Key of Lamesa High won first place; Wallace Jones of Hancock won second and Billie Gill of Liberty won third place for that school. Key of Lamesa will represent Dawson County in the District meet. The girls extemporaneous speech contest was won by Marie Hilburn of Liberty with Alice Cornet of Fivemile second. Miss Hilburn will represent the county at Lubbock in this event.

Music Memory contests results were announced by Miss Lois Adkins, director, as follows: Maynette Moore and Virginia Lindsay of the Lamesa Elementary school won first place; Virginia and Gilberta Cherry won second place for Ballard; Morris Medlin and Juanita Miller won third place for the Hancock school; Othelene Nieman and Clovis Wright won fourth place for Fivemile while Bobbie Gill and Maurice Davis won fifth place for Liberty.

RFC Cuts Out Work For Individuals

Beginning with April RFC work the instructions coming from the Texas Relief Commission and Governor Ferguson specify that the county committees are to spend moneys allotted on public work and no individual work is permitted. Rules heretofore did not prohibit work for individuals and the committee was glad to comply with the requests of individuals for work as the requests help the committee to find work for a large number that registered each month. But it is now mandatory upon the committee to find public work upon which to expend these funds. This explanation is made to save individuals the trouble of requesting further work of the committee.

Hester To Ship Show Stock Saturday

E. W. Hester, prominent Jersey breeder, known over the entire South Plains, plans to ship his car of Dairy Show stock to Plainview Saturday in order that they may be fully prepared for the opening of the Plainview Dairy Show Tuesday of next week. The show will continue through April 14th.

Mr. Hester said Monday that he had hoped to have several other breeders go from this section, but for various reasons they had been forced to cancel their plans. He will ship ten head from his own herd, the famous bull, Buttercup, heading the list. Another animal in the party who has also won honors at the Plainview show is White Heart, who showed them how a real calf should look and act last year, and who is, Mr. Hester believes, even in better shape this year. Seven heifers will go as show representatives from the dairy herds of this territory.

Mr. Hester's entries will be the only ones, so far as we have been able to learn, from the South Plains, or from this section of the South Plains. Most of the breeders are coming from the north this year. Mr. Hester said Monday. Work of grooming the entries has been under way for the past several days at the Hester farm, the owner saying with a grin that they had done about everything but use fingernail polish and permanent waving machines on Buttercup and his team mates.

Mr. Hester was one of the founders of the show, and has been a director since its opening several years ago.

The editor had been promised an inspection tour of the herd this week but was unable to make it before publication date. However, every one in this part of the country knows that Hester's dairy herd is one of the best in the country, and that dairy stock fanciers bid eagerly for calves. It will be remembered that Chocolate Lad was shipped to a point near Ft. Worth last year, right into the territory of some of the nation's best known breeders.

Results of the Plainview show will be watched with much interest, and with confident expectation that Mr. Hester's entries will bring home their share of the honors. —O'Donnell Index.

Crop Loan Office To Close April 30

Field Supervisor, Mr. Fred N. Warren, advises that all who wish to make crop production loans will do so before April 30, as this is the time limit set by the Secretary of Agriculture for making applications.

The former ruling that persons who are indebted for the past two years to the Crop Production Office might not borrow in excess of \$100 has been modified by the new Secretary of Agriculture. In lieu of the foregoing provision, each borrower who has outstanding balances for 2 previous years will be given consideration on the basis of his individual circumstances by the Regional Offices. It is the desire of the Regional Office to assist those who made an honest effort to pay their loans and through no fault of their own were unable to do so.

Loans will be made, the regulations further declare, "to farmers who are unable to obtain loans for crop production during the year 1933 from other sources. These loans may be made to such individuals as are found by the Secretary of Agriculture to have acreage fit for seeding and who are without means to purchase the necessary supplies for crop production during the year 1933. No loans will be made to any applicant who has a means of livelihood other than farming. . . . Loans will not be made for the purchase of machinery or livestock, or for the payment of taxes, debts, or interest on debts. Loans will not be made for the feeding of livestock other than work stock used in crop production."

Congress declared these loan funds "to be impressed with a trust to accomplish the purposes provided for by this resolution . . . and it shall be unlawful for any person to make any material false representations for the purpose of obtaining any loan or to assist in obtaining such loan or to dispose of or assist in disposing of any crops given as security for any loan made under authority of this resolution, except for the account of the Secretary of Agriculture, and for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this resolution."

Teeth for Section 3 are provided in a clause which orders a fine not exceeding \$1,000 or imprisonment not exceeding six months, or both, for any person found guilty of violating the above provisions.

As the loans are approved, checks will be mailed from the Dallas Office directly to the borrower.

Fruit Crop Cut Short
 By February Freeze

Old timers say you will be able to get as many as two or three good fruit crops from a peach tree in Lynn county.

And judging from the experiences of the fruit growers during our sojourn in this part of the country, these old timers know whereof they speak. Even in this good year of 1933 when folks thought they were escaping the disastrous freezes of past years, Old Man Frost nipped the buds of practically all would-be peaches, and the crop will apparently be conspicuous for its absence.

The hard freeze which came early in February is apparently to blame. Though some of our closest observers were hopeful that the buds were still too green to be injured later investigation revealed that very few blossoms would ever mature. It will be remembered that it was a March freeze last year and the year before. Late plums and cherries give promise of fruit, if nothing else happens, but prospects now are that Lynn county's fruit crop will be very light indeed.

However, we can still enjoy the beauty of the trees without suffering as great a loss as those sections that depend largely on their fruit crops.

We have heard not reports from the Claude section and other parts of the country where fruit is a source of income, but it is feared that the same freeze brought a considerable loss to residents of that part of the country.
