\$1 Million Hail Storm Here

Almost All Roofs Damaged; Cars Dented

Mother Nature continued her harassment of Colorado City this week.

The harassment started with a severe ice and snow storm in January, a storm that stranded

travellers here for a week, damaged cotton crops, starved cattle and damaged streets.

More white stuff fell Monday night, but this time it was hard white stuff -- hail that averaged

about the size of golf balls and in some cases was as big as hen eggs.

The general insurance adjustment bureau in Big Spring estimated Tuesday, after their ad-

justors surveyed the situation, that damage caused by the hail would total up to about \$1 million.

Of that \$1 million, \$850,000 was in damage to homes and

\$150,000 was damage to cars, trucks and boats.

The hail storm hit Colorado City about 7:30 p.m., Monday. There was little evidence of any

major damage outside of the city limits.

The storm that came out of a cloud some said was just too

direction of Kiker-Rains-Seale Funeral Home.

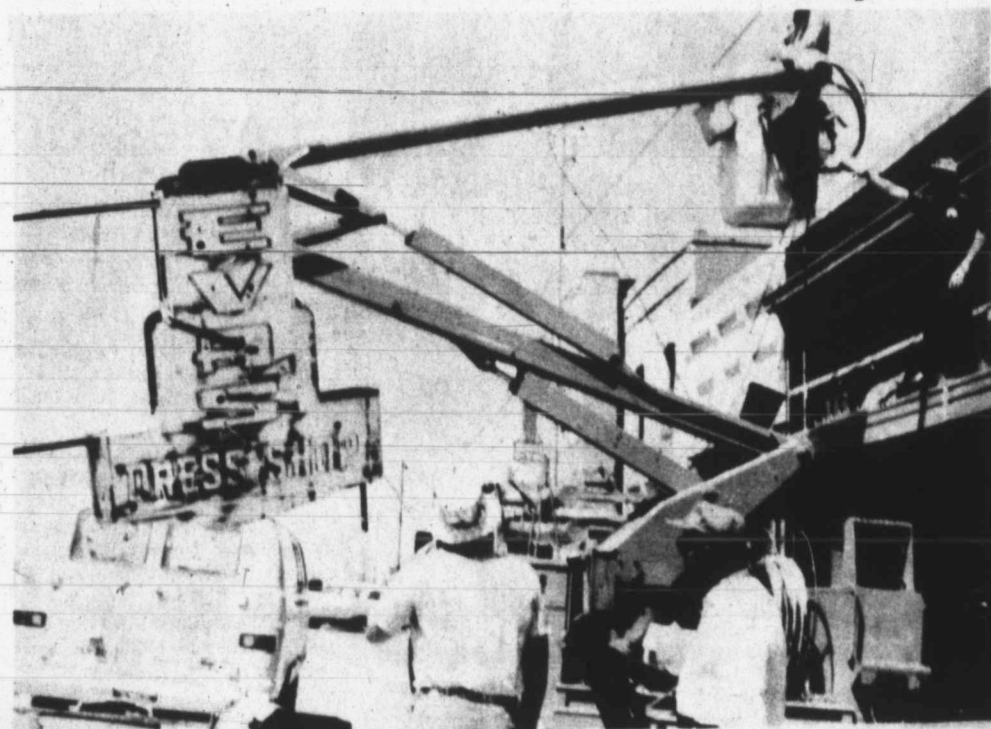

SCS Office Offers New Soil Map

A multi-colored general soil
map of Texas is available for
sale to the public, a local con-
servational official said this
week.

Don Hodges, District Conser-
vationist for the U.S. Soil Con-
servation Service, said the
beautiful 36-by-45-inch map
can be seen in his office. It
shows soil information com-
piled from years of detailed
soil survey work by the Soil
Conservation Service in co-
operation with the Texas Agri-
cultural Experiment Station.

Hodges said the map lists ba-
sic soil information which
should be useful to teachers,
planners, conservationists,
contractors, engineers, devel-
opers, realtors, farmers,
ranchers, researchers, and o-
thers.

The map gives color deline-
ations of the 73 major soil as-
sociations (containing 161 sepa-
rate soil series) in the state
and their extent. It also lists
special limitations of the soils
that affect their use.

Inset maps show rainfall,
temperature, and length of
growing season across the
state. Current and potential
urban and rural uses by soil
associations are also listed.

Many persons scurried off to

in recent weeks as tornadoes
have been sighted in the air but
have not touched ground. The
latest tornadoes were spotted
Tuesday night between Lorraine
and Roscoe when four funnel
clouds were seen in the air,
but none touched down.

Published cooperatively by
the Texas Agricultural Experi-
ment Station and the Soil Con-
servation Service, the map is a-
vailable in two sheets or printed
back and front.

Printed front and back, the
map costs \$3. Printed on two
separate sheets, the map costs
\$4.

For mounting on a wall, Hod-

ges recommended the two-sheet
style. For folding and filing,
he said the map printed on both
sides might be the best.

Station, Texas 77843.

Merritt Tells Of "Good Ole Days"

The Mitchell County Historical Society met Wednesday and enjoyed the memories of long-time resident, Mr. Ford Merritt.

Merritt told of growing up around the Seven Wells area and T.J. Goss displayed a lovely photograph of Seven Wells which he made some 15 years ago.

The area is now covered with the water of Lake Champion.

Reminiscing about his childhood, Merritt remembered fishing, exploring, finding Indian artifacts and arrowheads on these banks.

He related that his father J. G. (Joe) Merritt and Brooks Bell established the TUF Ranch south of Colorado City.

D.N. Arnett, Merritt's grandfather, managed all of Spade's holdings for the Ellwoods for many years. A time when large cattle drives were trailed from South Texas to Dodge City, Kansas, Montana, and points north.

One trail drive to California, Merritt told about, the cattle were paid for in \$20 gold pieces. The gold was brought back to Spade in a leather trunk that is now displayed in the Texas Tech Museum at Lubbock.

He described downtown Colorado City in the early 1900's as having gravel streets and wagon yards.

The dry goods and grocery businesses were handled by early settlers Burns, Bell, and C.H. Laskey.

He remembered Lubbock in 1913 as just a square of business and Spade Cattle were "held" for shipping on the site that is now Texas Tech.
