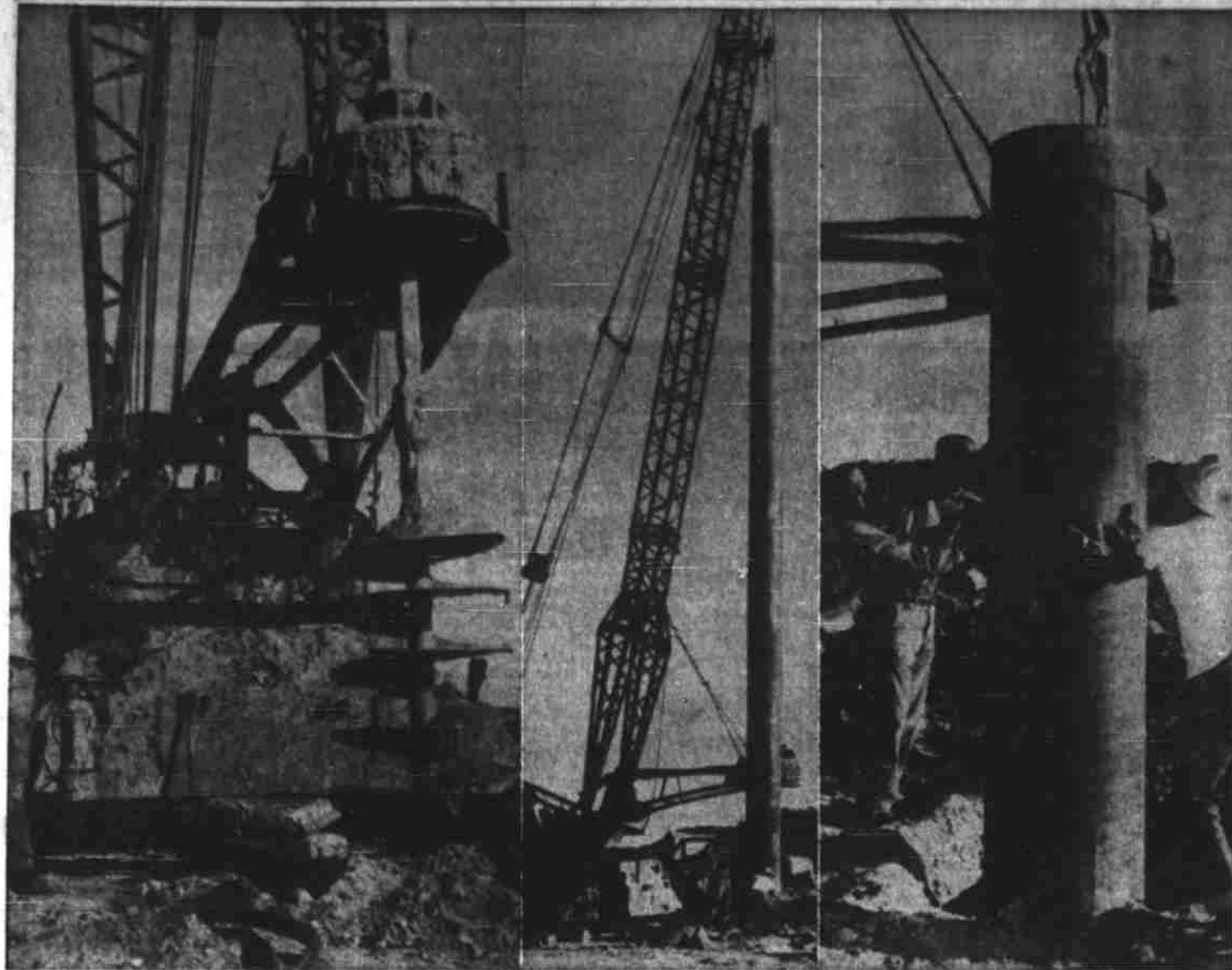




Felony DWI Case Trial Under Way

Benjamin Tyson went on trial in 118th District Court this morning on felony charges of driving while intoxicated.

Judge Charlie Sullivan called the case from the criminal docket after the supply of civil cases which had been set for the week was exhausted.

Tyson is charged with being under the influence of intoxicants on Aug. 25 when his car crashed into an ambulance which was parked at the scene of a fatal accident on the Snyder Highway about 15 miles northeast of Big Spring. The state also alleged a previous conviction on DWI charges, which would make a conviction in this case subject to a penitentiary sentence.

Tyson pleaded not guilty to the charges. Three witnesses were heard this morning and a fourth state's witness was ready to take the stand early this afternoon. Testimony was taken during the morning from A. D. Wright, formerly an employee of the service department at the Big Spring Motor Company; Bobby West, Howard County sheriff's deputy; and Wiley Joe Oliver, truck driver who suffered multiple injuries when he was caught between an ambulance and a car at the scene of the accident.

Wright testified that he accompanied Deputy West to the accident scene on Aug. 25. He said he was assisting the deputy who was taking pictures of the back of the ambulance into which the bodies of two men had been placed. The witness testified that he was standing approximately in the center of the road when he heard Highway Patrolman Green of Snyder shout "Look out." He said he saw a car approaching the wreck.

Man Who Slew Founder Of Rice Institute Kills Self

HOUSTON (U-P)—An 83-year-old man who admitted he committed one of the nation's most famous crimes—the murder of the founder of the Rice Institute—was found dead of a bullet wound in his Baytown home last night.

Charles F. Jones, former valet and companion of millionaire philanthropist William Marsh Rice, had admitted he chloroformed his employer to death in a New York City apartment on Sept. 23, 1906. Jones turned state's evidence and testified against the late Albert T. Patrick, an attorney and confidential adviser to Rice. Patrick was sentenced to death and stayed in the Sing Sing Prison death row four years before his sentence was commuted to life by New York Governor Frank Higgins in 1906.

Six years later, Governor John A. Dix gave Patrick a full pardon. Rice, who was 84 years old when he was slain while sleeping, had earmarked his vast estate to establish the William M. Rice Institute for advancement of literature, science and art.

The murder trial and litigation over forgeries of the will kept the estate tied up several years after the murder and delayed the opening of the Houston Institution until 1912.

Police said Jones had been shot once in the head. Justice of the Peace Walter Queen returned a verdict of suicide.

It'll Be A Deep-Rooted Bridge

The contractor faced the task of constructing a bridge on a lake of mud, sand and water as the U. S. 80 freeway is being opened at the east edge of Big Spring. Bridge footings had to go through the muck to solid ground. Scene at left shows the gigantic auger that drilled a 30-inch hole 50 feet deep. Russia Warned U.S. May Act

MOSCOW (U-P)—The United States warned Russia today it will be forced to act to protect its planes on legitimate missions unless the Russians take steps to prevent further aerial incidents between the two nations.

A note delivered by the U. S. Embassy to the Soviet Foreign Ministry asked the Soviet Union to clamp down on such cases as the destruction of a U. S. RB29 photo-mapping bomber by Soviet jet fighters Nov. 7.

Referring to that incident, which Moscow has blamed on the Americans, the note said: "Such actions are in flagrant contradiction to recent statements by high Soviet officials that the Soviet Union seeks to abate international tension."

The Soviet government charged at the time that the American plane had violated island territory of the Russians off the northeast

tip of Japan and fired first when Soviet fighters encountered it. American spokesmen said the plane was 15 miles out and had not fired at all. Ten crewmen parachuted safely. The 11th became entangled in his parachute and drowned.

(The use of Sabrejet fighter escorts, which proved more than a match for Russia's MIGs in Korea, is one of the means which has been debated in Washington for the protection of reconnaissance and transport planes assigned to work anywhere near the Red orb.)

The new American note was a sequel to one delivered immediately after the incident.

The new note rejected the Soviet version that the American plane intruded into Soviet air space and repeated the American version.

Significantly, it referred to a dispute between Japan and the Soviet Union over control of the Habonai Islands.

This is the area where the incident occurred.

"The United States government," the note said, "further shares the deep concern of the Japanese government that the Soviet government not only continues illegally to occupy Japanese territory in the Habonai Islands, but also carries out unprovoked attacks on U. S. aircraft lawfully operating in this region."

The note requested the Soviet Union to take disciplinary action against Soviet fliers involved "and all other possible steps to prevent a recurrence of such incidents."

The note added: "In the absence of appropriate action by the government of the U. S. S. R., the United States government will be impelled to provide necessary defensive protection for United States aircraft engaging in legitimate, peaceful missions, and the full responsibility for any consequences which ensue will revolve upon the government of the U. S. S. R."

The American note, unusually mild in tone, concluded that: "The United States government reserves its rights regarding reparation for human and material losses" incurred in the Nov. 7 incident.

Senators who have been angling for a compromise recognized the day's developments as a setback but were not giving up hope.

Sen. Dirksen (R-Ill.), a McCarthy supporter and a leading force in the compromise efforts, said "you never can tell until you try."

Sen. Bridges (R-N.H.), temporary president of the Senate who has been active in compromise talks, was reported planning to address the Senate later in the day.

He said he thought the additional compromise proposed by Bennett would make efforts to work out a compromise "a little difficult."

Orders Confirm Dean's Transfer

Orders were received Wednesday confirming the transfer of Brig. Gen. Fred M. Dean to Waco to become the vice commander of the Flying Training Air Force.

The contemplated move had been announced earlier in the week. There is no word as to the immediate successor of Gen. Dean as wing commander here and Col. Cleon Freeman likely will assume the duties as he has in the past during Gen. Dean's absence.

At Waco, where he will serve under Maj. Gen. Gabriel P. Disway, commanding general of FyTAF, Gen. Dean will succeed Brig. Gen. Russell L. Waldron, who is going to Japan to command the 51st Air Division. Gen. Waldron has made several visits to Webb one as recently as three weeks ago.

The orders call for Gen. Dean to report to his new assignment as of Nov. 20. A command pilot and combat veteran of World War II, Gen. Dean has been in the air arm for 16 years. He assumed command of Webb AFB on June 30, 1953.

Ike Offers Democrats Pledge To Cooperate

Policy Reviewed At Bipartisan Session

WASHINGTON (U-P)—President Eisenhower today told Democratic and Republican congressional leaders it is "essential to have a continuing bipartisan approach to foreign affairs and national security matters."

Meeting with Democratic chiefs of the incoming 84th Congress for the first time since the election, the President declared such an approach is necessary "in the best interest of our nation, regardless of which political party controls the Congress."

The views Eisenhower expressed to the leaders of both parties were outlined to newsmen by James C. Hagerly, White House press secretary, after a two-hour and 15-minute conference.

In response to questions, Hagerly said a proposal by Sen. Knowland of California, the Senate Republican leader, for review of administration foreign policy was not discussed at the session.

Rep. Rayburn (D-Tex.) stated to House speaker in the new Democratic-controlled 84th Congress, also told reporters the Knowland proposal did not come up.

Both Rayburn and Knowland, as well as other leaders who attended the conference, declined to discuss what went on. They said there had been a general agreement that only the White House statement would be issued.

Earlier Sen. Wiley (R-Wis.), now chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, had reported that the President promised "absolute cooperation and collaboration" with the Democrats. Wiley left the meeting early.

Asked whether there was any discussion of how the President will handle foreign policy consultation with the Democrats, Wiley replied:

"The President says there will be absolute cooperation and collaboration."

Related foreign and military policy was the scheduled topic of the conference in the White House Cabinet Room. Secretary of State Dulles planned a briefing on worldwide developments since Congress adjourned last August. Secretary of Defense Wilson also was to participate.

Watch Ripped Off After Blood Dry, Coroner Says

CLEVELAND (U-P)—The wrist watch Marilyn Sheppard wore the night she was murdered was ripped off after the blood on her wrist had dried, Coroner S. R. Gerber testified today.

The coroner, pointing to a picture of the pretty young woman's wrist for the jury trying her case, said the watch was found on the floor near where Sheppard sat stripped to the waist the morning of the murder.

This wrist watch testimony was the second "surprise" clue hurled by the state at chief defense counsel William J. Corrigan.

The first was Gerber's statement that the bloody outline of a surgical instrument was discovered on the murdered woman's pillow.

The Orthopedic Frame Co. of Kalamazoo, Mich., said today the prosecutor's office had mailed it a copy of the bloody imprint.

The company was asked whether the imprint matches any surgical instrument it has made and sold to the Bay View Hospital where the osteopath in the Sheppard family practice.

The state contends that Dr. Sheppard clubbed his wife to death, then went about the house pulling out drawers and disarranging furniture in an effort to make it appear a robber had committed the crime.

Dr. Gerber, explaining the drying action of blood under questioning today by Saul Danaceau, assistant county prosecutor, said the blood becomes sticky within a few minutes, and then takes between 15 and 20 minutes to become dry.

Defense counsel Corrigan insists: "We're not just going to lay down and admit it was a surgical instrument."

After Danaceau finished his examination of Dr. Gerber, Common Pleas Judge Edward Blythin reminded the coroner of his surgical instrument testimony.

"Did I understand you to say that it could not be made by any other instrument?" Blythin asked.

"No sir, I didn't mean that," Dr. Gerber replied.

"It could have been made by another type of instrument?" Blythin asked.

"Yes, another instrument resembling a surgical instrument," the coroner said.

"Then you did not mean to confine it to a surgical instrument?" Blythin asked.

"No sir," Dr. Gerber replied. "The weapon that killed Marilyn never has been found."

The coroner then went under cross-examination at the hands of Corrigan.

Dr. Gerber's face bore a faint smile as Corrigan began questioning him about his performance of his official duties. Last July, Dr. Gerber had the defense lawyer thrown out of the inquest he was conducting into Marilyn's death when Corrigan insisted on trying to get statements of his own put into the record.

Corrigan is expected to spend at least a day hacking away at Dr. Gerber's testimony. The two have tangled several times in the past.

Corrigan refused to discuss how he plans to attack the pillow testimony, but another defense source gave an indication. He told reporters that an instrument, pressed against blood on a pillow, would invariably result in a lighter amount of blood under the outline.

The mark on the murder pillow showed a fairly uniform amount of blood.

Dr. Stephen Sheppard, the defendant's brother, told a reporter that to his knowledge, the defendant did not own a "stilet" cast cutter.

Dr. Gerber said he examined 18 X-ray pictures of Dr. Sheppard and found no sign of an injury. Dr. Stephen Sheppard claimed shortly after the slaying that the defendant suffered a broken neck in fighting the "intruder."

The prosecution contends he received only a black eye and that it doesn't know how he got that.

The coroner fixed the time of death for Mrs. Sheppard at between 3 and 4 a.m. Earlier, he testified Dr. Sheppard's wrist watch, found outside the home, had stopped at 4:15.

Dr. Gerber said he discovered water inside the watch's crystal. Dr. Sheppard said after being knocked out the second time he came to on the beach with the waves rolling around him.

Velde Says House Un-American Panel May Question Hiss

WASHINGTON (U-P)—Chairman Velde (R-Ill.) said today the House Un-American Activities Committee may call Alger Hiss for questioning when the former State Department official is released from prison.

Velde said a proposal by Rep. Clardy (R-Mich.) that Hiss be called was brought up in a closed-door meeting of the committee this morning but a decision was postponed until tomorrow.

Clardy said he understood the Senate Internal Security Committee was also studying the possibility of calling Hiss for a hearing.

Hiss was convicted in 1950 of perjury—lying when under oath—for denying that he passed secret State Department documents to Communist agents in the years immediately preceding World War II when he was a department official.

He was sentenced to five years in prison but with time off for good conduct is due for release from the Lewisburg, Pa., federal penitentiary on Nov. 21.

Ruling By Youngdahl Not To Face Appeal

WASHINGTON (U-P)—The government announced today it will not appeal from a ruling by U. S. Dist. Judge Luther W. Youngdahl refusing to disqualify himself as the trial judge in the Owen Lettmore perjury case.

The announcement that the government will take no further steps toward removing Youngdahl from the case was made by U. S. Atty. Gen. J. Edgar Hoover.

Hoover said the decision was made by the Justice Department. He explained that the Justice Department makes all decisions in cases involving appeals.

Wider News Variety Urged At AP Meet

TAMPA, Fla. (U)—The Associated Press Managing Editors Assn. was told today the American press ought to give newspaper readers a wider variety of news coverage.

What the typical American is looking for in his newspaper is something other than police court news, said Frank Eyerly, managing editor of the Des Moines Register and Tribune.

Eyerly, as general chairman of the APME Continuing Study Committee for 1954, outlined to editors of AP member newspapers at the opening of their annual meeting ways in which his committee feels the news report can be improved. It isn't that the committee feels that too much wordage is being given to Marilyn Monroe's domestic problems, or to stories dealing with New York school problems, or the like, he said.

"What this criticism really grows out of is a feeling that the newspapers and the press associations have too much preoccupation with the news that can be lifted from a police blotter, and not an adequate concept of American life," he said in a prepared talk. "The typical American family, we believe, has a home and sometimes a yard and frequently a family. He and his family have interests that range from sheet shooting to croquet, from bird watching and outdoor cooking to fine arts and gardening."

Praise for the work performed

by the Continuing Study Committee and by the association during the past year came from Wallace Lomoe, managing editor of the Milwaukee Journal, association president.

Lomoe said studies had been completed with a distinct professional polish. He was impressed by the amount of time and effort editors had spent in trying to develop a better news product.

Interpretation and attribution in news stories from Washington and from the general AP news report were discussed by Michael J. Ogden, managing editor of the Providence Bulletin and Journal, and by John Cauley of the Kansas City Star.

Cauley said there were three schools of thought on the subject of allowing Associated Press newsmen to use information which doesn't name the source and in interpreting news events.

These are:

1. That good interpretive writing is nothing more than good reporting; that the newspaper owes it to its readers to give them explanatory facts.

2. That the AP must be the reporter of the news and not the source of the news, and that any letting down of the bars on attribution and interpretation would be dangerous.

3. That a middle of the road approach should be followed, with each story coming from a source who declined to be named being weighed on its news merits, carefully checked and handled.

Ogden said the greatest problems in this respect arose in the highly competitive Washington field.

Three Die In Headon Crash In South Texas

DEVINE, Tex. (U)—Two persons were killed instantly and another fatally injured last night when two automobiles crashed head-on four miles south of here on U.S. Highway 81.

Highway Patrolman Bob Richardson said Raul Navarro Hinojosa, 33, of McAllen and Miss Francis Pacheco, 21, were killed instantly. The lone occupant of the second car, Benjamin Richard Hokit, 26, of Moore, Tex., died three hours later in a Pearland Hospital.

Mexico City Site Of Theater Boom

MEXICO CITY (U)—This city, all of a sudden, finds itself with a booming theater business. About a dozen stage shows are running, most of them translations from U.S. hits. Three night clubs and a bowling alley have been turned into theaters to house new shows. And all are making money.

This is a far cry from Mexico City's past, when the three million population didn't even keep a stock company going.

David Reed, head of the speech and drama department at the American High School, says, "Mexicans have suddenly discovered they like drama." Reed, from San Francisco, helped spark the rush to the theaters. His production cost for "The Medium" recently was only \$280.

"Everything is cheap here," he said. "You might have to pay up to 500 pesos—\$40—a week for the leads. But the other salaries are very low and \$15 a week is high. Two men came in and agreed to build and paint the scenery for 'The Medium' for 75 pesos—\$5."

The APME said by sharing these stories and pictures with other members of the Associated Press, the five went "far beyond the usual expectations of membership obligation."

The Alice Echo was cited for its coverage of the many interlocking developments in the tense political situation in Duval County and the 7th Judicial District of South Texas.

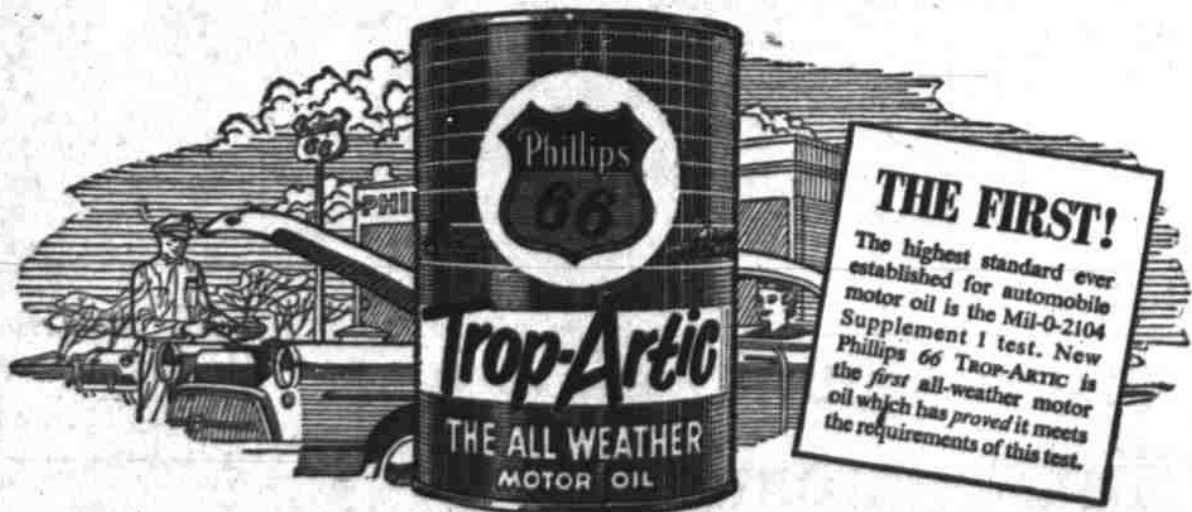

ROCKVILLE, Md. (U)—The estranged, teen-age wife of a Texan was questioned today in the strangulation death of her six-year-old stepdaughter.

Police said last night a person who identified herself as Little Katherine Nadine Bannister, 15-year-old Mrs. Marion Mosley, 15, called the Rockville Police Station and said:

"My sister has been choked to death, and I know who did it."

Police Dispatcher F. S. Mosley asked who did it, police said, and the caller replied, "I did it with a towel."

The Bannister child's body was found by police with a dish towel looped around its neck and tied to a door knob in an upstairs bedroom of her home here.

"I hated her," Mosley quoted the telephone caller as saying.

Police said the teen-ager later told them the strangling took place after an argument with her stepmother, Mrs. William Bannister.

Chief of Detectives George W. Linthicum said the 15-year-old Mrs. Mosley was the wife of Marion Mosley, 17, of Amarillo, Tex. He said the couple was married last May in Amarillo and later moved to the Washington, D.C., area.

The detective said that about three months ago the couple separated and Mosley returned to Texas. The girl moved into her parents' home here.

Linthicum said there had been constant friction between the young wife and her stepmother and that there was a particularly sharp argument yesterday.

Mrs. Mosley is a student at Silver Spring, Md., Business College, police said. Her father works for a Hyattsville, Md., auto agency.

Former Phenix City Official Sentenced
PHENIX CITY, Ala. (U)—With former Chief Deputy Sheriff Albert Fuller under seven-year prison sentence for taking vice pay-offs, the state shifted its attention today to an accused partner in a five-million-dollar lottery racket.

South Korea, U.S. Sign Pact Setting Economic, Arms Aid

SEOUL, (AP)—South Korea and the United States today settled their outstanding differences and cleared the way for a 700-million-dollar economic aid program.

U. S. Ambassador Ellis O. Briggs and Prime Minister Pyun Yung Tai signed the agreement, formally ending three months of wrangling.

The settlement sets forth a broad area of agreement on political, economic and military questions and reiterates the interest of the United States and South Korea in achieving common objectives.

The United States agreed to provide South Korea in the next fiscal year 250 million dollars worth of economic aid and 450 million dollars in military assistance. A reliable source said it would be America's largest single aid program for 1955.

South Korea agreed to:

1. Encourage private ownership of industrial projects.
2. Establish new procedures for converting dollars at "a realistic exchange rate" both for use by United States forces and assistance fund officials.
3. Make "efforts to balance its budget and to continue to resist inflation."
4. Procure aid supplies "wherever in non-Communist countries goods of the required quality can be obtained at the best price."

This presumably ends South Korea's bitter opposition to buying from Japan, which once occupied Korea.

Gen. John E. Hall, U. N. Far East Commander, and ROK Finance Minister Lee Joong Joo have agreed South Korea will accept repayment of loans set by the United States. The ROKs have insisted on repayment at 180 hwan to \$1, which U.S. officials considered unrealistic. They will be repaid at \$1 for 254 hwan for June, July and August and \$1 for 310 hwan for September, October and November.

The formal agreement says South Korea pledges "to cooperate with the United States in its efforts to unify Korea, including possible efforts through the United Nations." But this does not commit President Syngman Rhee's government to accept a plan without its specific approval.

The general invited Nixon, another old friend, to accompany him to Philadelphia to look for a suit.

Mrs. Parsons invited Mrs. Nixon, a close friend.

After their shopping tour and the spaghetti luncheon, the party went back to Washington by train.

Uranium Strike To Help Denver

DENVER (AP)—News of a uranium strike on property belonging to the Denver Water Board brought quick action yesterday.

After hearing a report that some assays of the ore run up to \$1,850 a ton, the board instructed Water Department Manager E. L. Mosley to negotiate for development of the strike with a royalty payment to the city of Denver.

The reported strike is in South Platte River Canyon near Waterton. Mosley said its extent has not been determined. Many uranium mines produce ore worth less than \$50 a ton.

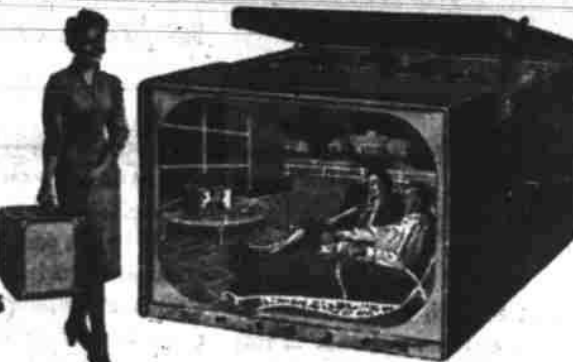

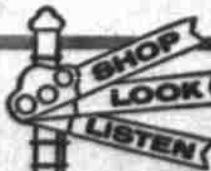

BLOOMSBURG, Pa. (U)—An official of the Atomic Energy Commission says that although the cost of nuclear fuel is cheaper than coal, nuclear reactors as a source for commercial power aren't yet as economical as more standard devices.

W. Kenneth Davis, deputy director of the AEC's reactor development program, said also in a speech last night that even a nuclear reactor now being built privately at Shippingport, Pa., would not be as economical as present power producing methods.

Kangaroos differ widely in size. Certain kinds (including the rat kangaroo) are hardly a foot in height, but others tower from five to eight feet above the ground.

The larger kangaroos are the ones of which I wish to speak today. Chief among them are the great gray kangaroos, but red kangaroos are almost as big.

Both the gray and the red kangaroos can stand on two legs. While in this position, they are held in balance by their tails, which may weigh from 20 to 25 pounds.

There are times when kangaroos go about on all four feet. They lean on their short front legs while eating grass. With their sharp front teeth they cut the blades and leave a trail which may make a person suppose that a mower has passed that way.

Because they eat grass which is needed by sheep and other livestock, and because they invade gardens at times, kangaroos are hardly popular with farmer in Australia.

Men hunt the big animals with dogs. If a great gray kangaroo is cornered, it may strike out with one of its hind legs. The blow can bring death to man or dog.

Early Discharges To Be Yule Gifts For Some Soldiers

AUSTIN — Army personnel whose release from military service would normally take place during the Christmas-New Year period will, with some exceptions, be separated between Dec. 13 and 17 in order that they may spend the holidays at home, the Department of the Army has announced.

Officers and enlisted men who return from overseas and are scheduled for separation during the holiday season will be discharged as soon after arrival as possible. For overseas returnees who would be reporting for reassignment during the holiday period, leave has been authorized.

The release policy applies only to personnel scheduled for separation from Dec. 13 and 17 and who are in the continental United States or its territories. Early departure from overseas stations to meet provisions of the policy is not authorized.

Exceptions to the policy are officers being released for reassignment or retirement, non-regular Medical Corps, Dental Corps and Veterinary Corps officers who have not completed 21 months' active duty, enlisted personnel of reserve components desiring to complete reserve obligations, enlisted personnel inducted or enlisted under provisions of the Universal Military Training and Service Act who are eligible for release prior to completing two years' active military service, but who must complete 21 months' active duty.

Electrified Bells Are To Ring Again

READING, Pa. (U)—The bells of St. John's Lutheran Church, silenced because their swaying weight had cracked the church's steeple, will ring again on Advent Sunday thanks to the magic of electricity.

The three bells, weighing a total of 11,831 pounds, originally were hung in the German building at the St. Louis Exposition of 1904 and there were rung by the late President Theodore Roosevelt.

Later, they were bought and moved to St. John's Church here. Recently, the church tower had begun to rock whenever the bells were rung by the nine bellringers—three to a bell.

Now the clappers will be operated electrically.

Thyroid Gland Is Transplanted

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (U)—Glands taken from a dead baby are apparently still living and working two years later in a young woman's body, two surgeons reported today.

They are the thyroid gland and the parathyroids, little glands which ride piggy-back on the thyroid.

They are apparently the first case of successful transplanting of these glands for this long a time.

The dramatic case was described to the American College of Surgeons by Doctors Julius A. Sterling and Ralph Goldsmith, of Albert Einstein Medical Center, Philadelphia.

The woman, now 21, had her own thyroid and parathyroids removed in 1941 because her thyroid was too active.

Later, she began suffering from muscular spasms, tremors and pain due to lack of calcium, which is controlled by the parathyroids. An attempt, at another hospital, to transplant parathyroids in 1949 failed.

She grew worse, had to go to the hospital as often as four times daily for calcium injections. She also suffered from lack of thyroid hormone.

Just two years ago, she was given the glands from a baby who died at 21 days of age. The baby's parents gave permission for removal of the glands from the infant's neck within an hour after death.

The glands were placed in the woman's groin. Blood vessels of the glands were connected with her own blood vessels.

She has been free of disease complications ever since, Sterling said. Once in a while she takes calcium pills. She no longer needs thyroid pills or other medicines.

TAIPEH, Formosa (U)—The most dangerous real estate in the world today has a total area of less than 200 square miles.

It consists of Nationalist-held islands just off the Red China coast, some within easy shelling distance of mainland guns.

They range from the Tachens—where Communist torpedo boats sank a Nationalist destroyer escort Sunday—to Quemoy, 350 miles to the south.

The Reds easily could attack these islands. If they do and the Nationalist fight as they have vowed to, there will be carnage. An undisclosed element in whether the U.S. 7th Fleet would intervene, American policy is to keep the Reds guessing.

The only Nationalist territory the United States openly has committed itself to protect is Formosa and such satellite islands as the Pescadores, which are in the Formosa defense zone. The offshore islands are outside this zone. Yet for 350 miles they lie along the Communist coastline.

Southern anchor is Quemoy, only six miles from the Red-held island where the city of Amoy is located. This situation is only 120 miles across the Formosa Strait from Formosa. The Quemoy garrison includes some 1,500 former prisoners of war from Korea.

The Communists began a series of bombardments of Quemoy Sept. 3, but this time did not repeat their invasion attempt of 1949 when they suffered heavy losses.

The northernmost outpost consists of the Tachens Islands, which unlike Quemoy are deep water islands with rugged shores easily defended except against air attack.

They are garrisoned by upwards of 1,000 troops.

In between the Tachens and Quemoy are the White Dog and Mats groups dominating the mouth of the Min River on which the Fukien provincial capital is located.

No one in Taipei doubts that Nationalist determination to hold these islands, and Communist determination to liquidate them, combine to create the most explosive potential since the Nationalists took refuge on Formosa in 1949.

HOUSTON (U)—Harold Stassen said yesterday President Eisenhower, regardless of whether he seeks re-election in 1956, should be drafted "for the good of the country."

Stassen, twice a candidate for the Republican nomination, said he will not announce again in 1956 because Eisenhower should be allowed to continue his program.

Eidom Deserves Laurel, Coach Woodard Says

DALLAS (U)—Frank Eidom, who travels as recklessly on a football field as a hot rod on a steep incline, is national back of the week and his coach, Woody Woodard of Southern Methodist, says it couldn't have happened to a finer player.

The catapulting halfback of SMU won the honor "with his mighty showing against Arkansas last week when his team took over leadership of the Southwest Conference with a 21-14 victory. All he did was run for 163 yards, score all of his team's touchdowns, play a grand defensive game and block like a steamroller."

Eidom came to Southern Methodist from Fort Arthur, Tex., heralded as a combination Kyle Doak-Walker. That was something to live up to because Rote and Walker are among the all-time greats of SMU and Southwest Conference football.

The 185-pound blazer from the Gulf Coast is the most reckless football player they've ever had out on the hilltop. He has a total disregard for himself as he goes smashing into the line. At first it worked against him. He was forever knocking himself out. In his sophomore and junior years he missed part of the season because of injuries. But Eidom learned how to protect himself by falling properly, although hitting with a total disregard of the consequences. Now he's more dangerous to the opposition than to himself.

As a freshman he rolled up 332 yards in five games, also was an adept pass-receiver, kickoff and punt returner, blocker and tackler. He missed half the season as a sophomore but still gained 181 yards on 48 carries, threw 2 passes for 57 yards, caught 3 for 65, returned 3 kickoffs 64 yards and a punt for 32. As a junior he again missed some games because of an injury but gained 293 yards on 63 carries. One run was 91 yards and it beat Rice. He also caught 4 passes for 55 yards and returned 15 punts 160.

This year he's been disgustingly healthy — for the opposition. He has gained 498 yards rushing, caught 17 passes for 215 yards, scored 5 touchdowns, ran 7 kickoffs back 149 yards and 4 punts 53 yards.

He's quite a Rote-Walker combination. He's even busier than those two worthies were.

Eidom was quick to credit his teammates' blocking for his great showing against Arkansas and Woodard declared that he had made just as important contributions in other games but this was just more noticeable. "He's a fine leader," said Woodard, "a great team man."

Eidom beat out such stellar performers last week as Ronnie Walker of Maryland, Royce Flippin of Princeton, Freddy Wyant of West Virginia, Bob McNamara of Minnesota, Hopalong Cassidy of Ohio State and Aramis Dandey of Southern California.

Kramer is the third end to gain Lineman of the Week honors this season. The others were Fred Glatz of Pitt and Ron Beagle of Navy.

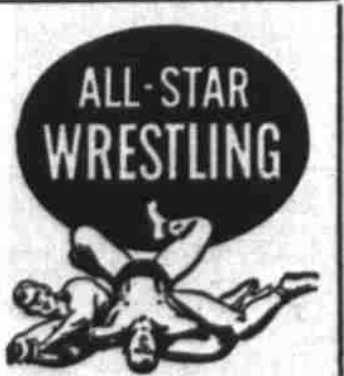

IN DAWSON COUNTY

Cotton, Grain Production Exceeds Early Estimates

LAMESA—Dawson County's estimated \$4,000,000 grain harvest is approaching its peak as warm days and cold nights add impetus to harvesting the bountiful crop. With approximately 75 per cent of both cotton and grain harvested, revisions on estimates made previously are being increased. Cotton estimates made in this county at the beginning of ginning season were 60,000 bales and as ginning reached its peak, there is a likelihood of another upward revision. The county's grain harvest of an estimated 2,000,000 pounds is being reaped from 220,000 acres and will average from 600 to 1,000 pounds per acre with a good yield of sorghum and blue panicum from an additional 15,000 acres. The first estimate on grain crops, according to Lee Roy Colgan, county agent, was 600 pounds per acre, but revised estimates have gone upward since the early crops were harvested. W. A. Britt of Britt Grain Company stated that the early grain crop will probably average around 700 pounds per acre, but the later grain is larger and more filled out and will probably produce 1,000 or more pounds per acre. Britt based his estimate on information from farmers bringing grain to his grainery. The shortage of labor has eased, according to Dayton Carroll, local

manager of the Texas Employment Commission. Combines and farm equipment have aided in expediting the harvest. A shortage of storage space has been alleviated a great deal, but most grain companies are still dumping surplus grain on the ground. The freight car and truck shortage which has existed since the early harvest began also is being eased. There have been 265 freight car loads of grain shipped out of Dawson County since the grain harvest began in addition to an undetermined number of truck loads. Cotton gins have been able to slow down heavy operations that have existed since cotton pulling began. City gins until recently have operated around the clock and the less burdened county gins have run far into the night in order to keep pace with the overflow. Most cotton fields in the county have completed the second picking and are now ready for the third, resulting from rains the early part of October. **Army Cuts Spending** CHICAGO (U)—The Army has reduced its spending 3 1/2 billion dollars this fiscal year, Army Undersecretary John Slezak said in a speech last night.

There should be plenty of turkeys, and at a lower price this Thanksgiving and Christmas, according to the best information available. There will be more birds on the market this year than last year, say the poultry specialists, which means they add that the housewife won't have to take what she can get, but that she can get what she wants. These specialists suggest that the shopper look for quality birds, well fleshed and finished and processed to give good flavor. This "good flavor" comes with the bird that has "enough fat" on it.

The trend is to smaller turkeys, weighing around eight pounds, which makes it a practical dish for even small families. Larger birds are no less practical if there is sufficient refrigerator or cold storage space in the home. Cautious shopping for the proper turkey of quality will also make the producers hereafter cautious about the type of birds raised for the market and the processors more cautious about how the birds are handled.

The year's largest sale of Angus bulls in West Texas is scheduled for the San Angelo Auction Company at 1 p.m., Dec. 8, with consignments from Moore Bros. of El Dorado, Herman Allen of Menard and Joe R. Lemley of San Angelo. Ninety top quality, large, rugged ready-for-service bulls will be offered. There are a few promising herd sires in the bunch but mainly they are top quality range bulls, two years old. Every bull is unconditionally guaranteed.

Jim Gill of Coleman has been elected a director of the American Polled Hereford Association, and is the only director on the association's board from the Southwest. Robert A. Halbert of Sonora, the association's retiring president, had the champion sale bull at the National Polled Hereford Show and Sale at Columbus, Ohio, a junior yearling that brought \$3,000 from and Indiana bidder. Gill had the grand champion bull of the show (not sale). This was a two-year-old that had been crowned champion Polled Hereford at the American Royal. Ninety-two head of the Hornless Herefords went through the sale ring for a total of \$82,315, or \$895 average. These included 30 bulls for a total of \$35,950, an average of \$1,198 and 62 cows for a total of \$46,365 or a \$748 average.

Crops loans and purchase agreements will still be available for 1955 production even under the new adjustable price support plan, according to Claude McCan, chairman of the Texas state ASC committee. McCan says there is no basis in fact to the charge that price

supports will drop out from under basic agricultural commodities in 1955. He explains that plans call for necessary moderate adjustments to be made gradually, and in line with realities of the supply situation. Under existing law, supports on basic commodities can be set at or anywhere between 82 and one-half and 90 per cent of parity. Supports will depend on the supplies of the commodities involved. At this time the 1955 picture seems to be 90 per cent of parity supports for cotton; 88 per cent for corn; 82 and one-half per cent for wheat or a national average of \$2.08 per bushel. As to price supports on feed grains such as oats, barley and sorghums, McCan points out that no decision on these reports are in, and after a further study of the effect of this drought on production.

The Spade Ranch of Colorado City has sold seven registered Hereford bulls to T. H. Campbell of Lubbock. A. T. McDonald of Houston has sold six Whiteface cows and 14 heifers to Jay Taylor of Amarillo. J. D. Miles of Breckenridge has sold 10 cows to Elan Campbell, also of Breckenridge.

Research workers at the Sooper Station of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Service have officially reached a conclusion about which old ranchers have not had any doubt for a long time. They have announced that pear, stung and chopped, and supplemented with alfalfa hay and cottonseed meal proves a satisfactory "emergency" ration for ewes.

They reached the decision after a 213-day drylot feeding trial. One hundred Rambouillet ewes were divided into five equal lots for the trial. All the ewes were bred and lambed successfully. Other "emergency" roughage rations, which also proved satisfactory, included three parts of ground cotton gin trash and two parts of alfalfa hay and fed with molasses and supplemented with cottonseed meal or a combination of cottonseed meal and urea. Alfalfa hay fed alone and a combination of Johnson Grass hay, alfalfa hay and cottonseed were also satisfactory rations.

The pear leaves were chopped before being fed for two reasons, (1) so the sheep would not get the "pear eating" habit, and (2) because the leaves were too large for the sheep to get them in their mouths. The ewes were fed a daily ration of .34 of a pound of alfalfa hay; 11.49 pounds of chopped pear, and .25 of a pound of cottonseed meal. The feed cost for 100 ewes figured on this ration was \$3.92 a day, compared with \$6.52 for those receiving alfalfa hay alone; \$5.51 for those getting gin trash, alfalfa hay, cottonseed meal and molasses; \$5.38 for the lot fed alfalfa hay, gin trash, cottonseed meal, molasses and urea, and 16.33 for the lot getting alfalfa and Johnson Grass hay and cottonseed.

Newsman At Paris Works As Usual On 90th Birthday

PARIS (U)—A. W. Neville leaned back in his easy chair at the office of the Paris News today and looked back at 60 years of getting out a newspaper. Neville rolled a cigarette, greeted old friends at an open house in honor of his 90th birthday, and went on working.

The slender, wiry old man had a lot to look back on. But he was looking forward, too, and was at his desk as usual in the News' editorial room, checking the exchange papers, writing editorials, and preparing his column, "Backward Glances." After the day's work, he was to greet his friends and acquaintances at the open house with two of his daughters, Miss Maude Neville and Mrs. Dorothy Faught, and his brother, Edgar T. Neville. Most of his friends call him "Judge" or "Sandy."

A lover of Bull Durham tobacco, the judge had a treat in store for him when he reached the office this morning. News employees had made a "tobacco tree" for him and hung 41 sacks of tobacco on its branches. Born Nov. 17, 1864, in Salem, Va., Neville has had many honors and much public recognition paid him through the years. Into his newspapering has been crammed a wealth of experiences. He wrote of the first airplane ever seen in Paris, of the first electric railway here, and of its abandonment in favor of the automobile nearly half a century later. He covered the hanging of eight early-day desperadoes by the United States, and he was at the last execution of an Indian under the old Indian Law. It was Neville that gave an account of the 1916 fire that destroyed nearly half of the city of Paris.

Once, as a guest of former Gov. James V. Alfred, he addressed the Texas Senate in Austin. He helped organize a typographical union in Paris in 1909 and was a charter member.

The judge has been active in Paris' city government, has been city secretary, and he served for a time as an alderman.

Sandwiched between all those activities and the daily grind of "getting out the paper," the versatile Neville also wrote two books. His career is neatly summed up in the title of one, "The Red River Valley—Then and Now."

The other book is a comprehensive history of Lamar County.

So it was no stranger the folks were greeting in Paris today as they said:

"Happy birthday, Judge, and many, many happy returns."

Briefs Asked In Test On Right-Of-Way Oil

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (U)—Federal Judge T. Blake Kennedy called yesterday for briefs in a suit testing the right of the Union Pacific Railroad to remove minerals from lands granted it as right-of-way. He ordered the government as plaintiff to file a brief presenting its argument before Dec. 8. Union Pacific has 10 days to file its brief after the government's is submitted. The Union Pacific has applied to the Wyoming Conservation Commission for permission to drill for oil on its right-of-way, granted across public lands in 1862 and 1864.

Louisiana Parishes To Fight Leasing In Tidelands Fight

THEBOUAUX, La. (U)—District Attorney Leander Perry of Plaquemines and St. Bernard parishes says suits will be filed against any oil company that starts operation under federal lease within the historic gulfward boundary of Louisiana.

Nine coast parishes (counties) organized yesterday to protect their tideland interests. After the meeting Perry said suits would be filed to prevent development of federal tidelands leases involving \$17,500,000.

The federal government received about \$17,500,000 in bonuses for leases within the state's boundary fixed by the 1924 Legislature, J. C. deArmas Jr., Plaquemines Parish engineer, said.

The Legislature set the boundary at a point three leagues (roughly 10 miles) from a coast line established by the Coast Guard.

Baltimore Block Fully Burned Out

BALTIMORE, (U)—An entire square block of South Baltimore was burned out last night by an 11-alarm fire that swept through a lumberyard and spread to adjoining buildings.

More than half of the city's first-line equipment—61 pieces out of 110—were rushed to the scene.

The lumberyard, two trucking firms, a garage, a tool company, numerous smaller firms and apartment houses were wiped out. Many other buildings were damaged.

At least 150 persons were driven from their homes. Three explosions rocked the area but only one person was reported injured, a fireman hospitalized with burns on both feet.

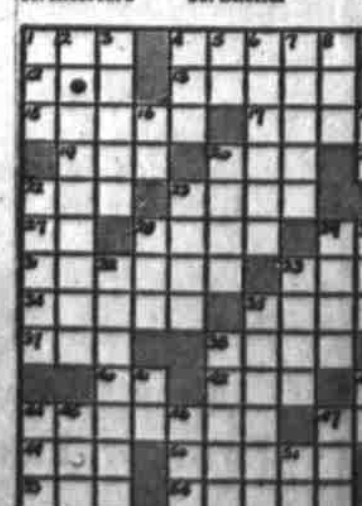

Montgomery Ward To Close Fourteen Stores On Dec. 24

CHICAGO (U) — Montgomery Ward & Co., huge mail-order and retail merchandising firm whose control by Sewell L. Avery is being challenged, plans to close 14 retail stores across the nation effective Christmas Eve.

An official who declined use of his name said 14 stores are being closed but declined to give a reason. He named only three of the stores — at Tucson, Ariz., Portland, Maine, and Battle Creek, Mich. No additional comment could be obtained from officials immediately.

Ward now has about 580 retail outlets. The last new store was built in 1941.

Avery, 81-year-old chairman, declined to make a statement about the store closings.

Avery's hold on the nation's second largest retail merchandising firm is being challenged on several sides. Louis E. Wolfson, 42, Florida financier, has served notice to Avery to get control. Fred M. Salph, St. Louis businessman and former owner of the St. Louis Cardinals baseball team, also has said he is interested in obtaining control.

Russia Agrees To Part In Atomic Science Meeting

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (U) — Russia agreed today to take part in arrangements for an international scientific conference planned as part of President Eisenhower's atom-for-peace program.

Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei Y. Vishinsky told the General Assembly's 60-nation Political Committee that East-West negotiations still were in progress on plans for a world agency to sponsor the peaceful uses of atomic energy.

Vishinsky declared he had the feeling that both sides were making every effort to eliminate their differences. He cautioned against speed.

The Soviet delegate, however, dashed some of the optimism expressed earlier by insisting at length that the proposed agency must be responsible to the U. N. Security Council where Russia has the veto.

MYSTERY TAKES NEW TURN

Hungary Announces Freeing Of Long-Missing U.S. Pair

BUDAPEST, Hungary (AP)—The five-year-old mystery of the vanishing Fields took a new turn today when Hungary's Communist government announced it has released Noel Field and his wife Herta.

The announcement gave no indication of the whereabouts of the 50-year-old former U.S. State Department employee and his German-born wife.

Although their release was announced early today, official notification was not given to U.S. Minister Christian M. Ravndal until

he called at the Hungarian foreign ministry at noon.

An Embassy spokesman declined to say whether Ravndal had raised the question of making contact with the Fields. Hungarian authorities had ignored two previous notes from the legation in recent months asking for interviews with them and for their repatriation.

The Hungarian announcement over Budapest radio came only 23 days after Poland's Communist government said it had freed Hermann Field, Noel's brother. Hermann, a Cleveland architect, had been arrested in Warsaw while searching for Noel. He is still in Poland convalescing in a sanatorium.

The latest announcement left only the fate of Noel's adopted daughter Mrs. Robert Wallach still unexplained. Mrs. Wallach, the former Erika Glaser, disappeared in East Berlin Aug. 26, 1950, while searching for her foster father.

During the intervening years, there was no official indication of what happened to the Fields, although their names cropped up in various Iron Curtain treason trials. Communist propagandists accused Noel of being an "anti-Soviet" American spy and linked him to "Titoist" plots in Hungary.

The Hungarian announcement said the Budapest government has dropped all spy charges against Noel and Herta after a review of their case indicated they could not be substantiated.

In the United States, admitted former Communists Whittaker Chambers and Hede Massing have testified that Noel Field was once a member of a Communist apparatus in Washington.

The Field mystery began in May 1949, when Noel left his wife in Switzerland and went to Prague, Czechoslovakia. He was last heard from in that city May 12. After he disappeared, his wife flew to Prague to look for him and she too vanished.

Noel's name came up in the sensational trial in October 1949 of Laslo Rajk, then Hungarian foreign minister. Rajk was accused of scheming with Yugoslavia's Marshal Tito to hand the country over to "American imperialists." He was hanged.

The prosecution at the trial described Noel as an assistant to Allen Dulles (now head of the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency) in the Office of Strategic Services—a U.S. cloak-and-dagger organization during World War II—with the job of organizing American espionage in Russian-occupied areas of Europe.

Defendant Changes Plea, Is Fined \$100

William N. Dillard, who was charged with driving while intoxicated, Tuesday afternoon changed his plea to guilty and was fined \$100 and received the mandatory three-day jail term.

Dillard had entered a plea of not guilty to the charge Tuesday morning. Bond has been set at \$500.
