U.S. WANTS NOTHING BUT PEACE

John Daly of the 30 War Prisoners Black Cat Division Hoe Peanuts For on Way Home Guyle Greynolds

WITH 13TH ARMORED DIVISION IN ASSEMBLY AREA COMMAND. — Enroute to the United States from the European continent, Pfc. John L. Daly of 1109 W. Ninth, Cisco, Texas, is now being processed at Camp Atleta in northeastern France, as a member of the first ETO armored division to be ordered to the Pacific.

Pfc. Daly is a member of Co. A, 30th A. I. B., and served with the 13th Armored Division in the Battle of the Ruhr Pocket and in the drive through Bavaria into Austria.

The 13th, known as the Black Cat Division, captured more than 30,000 German prisoners in the fighting in the Ruhr and took an additional 19,000 in Bavaria.

Pfc. Daly is the husband of Marian Daly of Cisco. He will be given a furlough before the division begins its training for action in the Pacific.

Ciscoan's Group Has Flown 238 Combat Missions

WITH THE 15TH AAF. — After serving in Italy with the 15th air force, Staff Sgt. Charles H. Nix of 306 E. Ninth street, Cisco, Texas, will return soon to the United States with the 456th bomber group. He will go on furlough after reporting at Fort Sam Houston, Tex.

Since coming overseas Nix has been assigned to the 456th bombardment group, a B-24 Liberator bomber group which participated in numerous bombings of German-held targets throughout southern Europe and the Balkans.

The veteran unit is being returned to the States for a period of training and receipt of new equipment before jumping into the battle against Japan. The training and additional equipment has been made necessary because of the changed tactical situations which ground and air men of the group will experience in the Pacific theater.

The group has flown 238 combat missions since entering the Mediterranean theater of operations.

Japs Pull Troops Out of China to Bolster Nip Coast

SAN FRANCISCO, July 20. — Japanese commanders are reported to be pulling thousands of troops out of Central China to guard the shores of the Yellow sea against a possible American landing.

The report from a Chinese army spokesman coincided with a meeting of the Japanese cabinet to consider "problems of the day." These problems included the whereabouts of the rampaging U. S. Third fleet, Australian capture of a fourth Borneo oil field, record air assaults on Japan and the China coast, and general Chinese gains in the south.

Maj. Gen. Kuo Chi Chih said that in the last month 100,000 Nipponese troops have been shifted from central China's Hunan province to Shantung province to meet American amphibious assaults. Others were transferred to the coast from north China.

THAT'S WHAT PRESIDENT TRUMAN SAID TODAY WHEN U. S. FLAG WAS RAISED OVER BERLIN

POTSDAM, July 20. — U. S. President Harry S. Truman, speaking at a symbolic flag-raising over conquered Berlin, said today the United States wanted not one piece of territory, but "peace and prosperity for the world as a whole."

The speech had great significance against its background of the Big Three conference, where the President is joining Britain and Russia in helping to settle European boundary and other problems.

"We are raising this flag in the name of the people of the United States, who are looking forward to a better world, a peaceful world, in which all the people will have an opportunity of enjoying peace and opportunity," Mr. Truman said.

The Stars and Stripes raised over the United States group council headquarters — in the former headquarters of Germany's air defense — was the flag that flew over the Capitol in Washington the day the United States entered the war against the Axis. It flew over Algiers when that city was Gen. Eisenhower's headquarters and over Rome when the first Axis capital was captured. It is destined to be raised over Tokyo.

"Let's not forget that we are fighting for peace and for the welfare of mankind," Mr. Truman told the troops lined up for the ceremony. "We are not fighting for conquest."

"There is not one piece of territory or one thing of a monetary nature that we want out of this war. We want peace and prosperity for the world as a whole. We want to see the time come when we can do the things in peace that we have been able to in war. If we can put this tremendous machine of ours, which has made this victory possible, to work for peace we could look forward to the greatest age in the history of mankind."

"That is what we purpose to do."

Mr. Truman told the soldiers, picked infantrymen from the Second Armored division, that they had "proved conclusively that a free

People of US. to Invest Huge Sum in World Bank

WASHINGTON, July 20. — Bretton Woods out of the way, a world-minded Senate prepared today to pump \$2,800,000,000 into the Export-Import bank to finance post-war international trade.

Expected speedy passage of legislation to increase the bank's lending authority would lift to \$5,725,000,000 the commitments toward world reconstruction and stability the Senate has approved in clearing its decks for scheduled ratification next week of the United Nations charter.

The major share of these funds, under legislation approved yesterday by a 61 to 16 vote, goes to the international bank and stabilization fund upon which 44 nations agreed at Bretton Woods, H. H. just a year ago.

A. & M. - University Duel Not on Thanksgiving Day

AUSTIN, July 20. — The Texas Aggie football game will not be a Thanksgiving Day event this year.

Gov. Coke R. Stevenson said today he will designate the fourth Thursday — the 22d — as Texas Thanksgiving Day and the game is scheduled for Nov. 29.

University officials say it will not be practical to change the date of the football game which had been set on the theory that the last Thursday of the month would be Thanksgiving Day.

The teams have met on Thanksgiving Day, alternately at Austin and College Station, since one game a year became the rule for their competition. The 1945 game will be at College Station.

Methodist's Crusade for Christ Lower Colorado River Authority Must Pay Taxes US. Now Has the Largest Navy in World's History

CHICAGO, July 20. — The Methodist church Crusade for Christ, seeking \$25,000,000 for war relief and reconstruction in the United States, has been over-subscribed by nearly \$2,500,000.

Bishop J. Ralph Magee, head of the church in Chicago and chairman of the campaign, said more than \$18,000,000 in cash already had been received from members of the 41,000 Methodist churches in the United States.

The program calls for 1,000,000 new converts, daily devotions in every Methodist home and establishment of 500 new churches.

AUSTIN, July 20. — In an important decision overruling a long-standing pronouncement of the tribunal, the Supreme Court has sustained an act of the legislature which will require the Lower Colorado River Authority to pay sums out of its revenues in lieu of taxes on public utility properties formerly privately owned. The legal principles laid down in this decision will have application to the several other and large Texas river authorities if and when they take over private utilities.

WASHINGTON, July 20. — Marking the fifth anniversary of the Two Ocean Fleet, the navy says 1,322 fighting ships have been added to its forces in these five years.

Thus the navy now boasts a force of around 1,500 fighting ships, the biggest navy in history, ready to support the invasion and force the Japanese enemy to its knees.

Added to the 383 combat ships on hand on July 1, 1940, and deducting the 140 announced combatant ship losses, brings the total to 1,565 fighting ships. From this must be deducted an undisclosed number transferred to Allied Nations under lend-lease.

And the job is not yet done. Building yards, navy and private, are still at work completing the building program now grown to a five-ocean program, and a total of 224 ships remain on building schedules.

The record five-year construction program included 331 ships built in navy yards and 991 in private shipyards.

TYLER RECYCLING PLANT. DALLAS, July 20. — The War Production board has approved construction by the Lone Star Producing company of a \$936,000 recycling plant at Tyler, the WFPB announced here.

INFLUENZA, TYPHUS. AUSTIN, July 20. — Influenza, forgotten for a time in the statewide polio scare, was back in the Texas picture this week with 391 cases reported. Polio cases rose to 45 which was 24 more than reported for the preceding week. The year total was raised to 357 cases from 72 cases.

PRESIDENT PLAYS PIANO. POTSDAM, July 20. — President Truman played Beethoven's Minuet in G on the piano at the joint request of Premier Stalin and Prime Minister Churchill as a musical climax to his state dinner Thursday night.

MORE SHOES PROMISED. WASHINGTON, July 20. — Twenty per cent more shoes will be made for civilians in the last three months of this year because of reduced demands for military footwear, the War Production Board and OPA announce.

MEAT CONTROL.

The meat problem in this country may be described as not particularly serious, but interesting. Generally speaking, there is as much meat available as we really need. The problem is to pass it around fairly in the domestic market, and also to see that only enough is sent abroad to relieve the legitimate needs of our foreign friends and allies. This requires fair and careful handling.

The immediate problem is to curb the "black market" which encourages human greed and which gives so many people unfair privileges, while disrupting legitimate distribution.

To this end, the Patman bill, extending price control for another year, sanctions slaughter outside of the normal federal inspection plants, provided it is certified by the department of agriculture and done in a sanitary manner. The regulations for this purpose will soon be established, and meat will be expected to "move in legitimate trade channels within legal price ceilings."

Such federal control, if religiously applied, will remedy the

situation whereby much of the meat produced can not be shipped across state lines. With this adjustment everybody should be satisfied and the industry as a whole should benefit.

Germany, France, Italy
Good Examples.

Progressive Farmer: What were scholars saying before World War I—in fact as early as 1907—about the effects of the German system of compelling everybody

to take military service? Last week we picked up Dr. W. M. West's much-used American textbook, Modern History, written in 1907, and read:

"This system constitutes an enormous burden; but the German victories in 1866 and in 1870 convinced all Europe of its military utility, and since 1870 every state

in Europe has adopted it, with slight modifications. Thus Europe is a group of armed camps. England relying on her navy, and the United States trusting to her position, are the only great countries that are now free from it. No doubt, certain good results come from the military discipline; but on the whole, the present European army system is the most woeful and immense waste of energy that the world ever saw, and the great problem of the future is to get rid of it."

This scholarly 1907 testimony is interesting in 1934 for many reasons. First, it shows how Germany's starting military conscription forced other nations to do the same thing—just as America's starting it now would do. Second, when war came, however, soldiers from England and America which had no military conscription were not long inferior to soldiers from Germany, France, and Italy where the most drastic peacetime conscription had prevailed.

Third, Europe's militaristic leaders demanded more and more military training (just as they would do here) until all Europe became "armed camps" and it came to be said, "Every European citizen carries a soldier on his back." As President Woodrow Wilson said in 1919 in language we may well recall today:

"Nobody who really knew anything about history supposed that Germany could build up a great military machine as she did and refrain from using it. They were constantly talking about it as a guarantee of peace, but every man in his senses knew that it was a threat of war—and the threat was finally fulfilled and the war began."

If some boys in American towns and cities need physical development and labor, let's not adopt a German made military system for

them, but put them in CCC camps or some other "moral equivalent of war," to use William James' phrase. Certainly our farm boys, with their daily hard labor and their all-too-limited opportunities for schooling, should not be forced to waste one of life's golden years on a Nazi-like conscript system which is falsely labeled "a guarantee of peace" when it is really "a threat of war." Write your Senator or Congressman quickly now if you are interested.

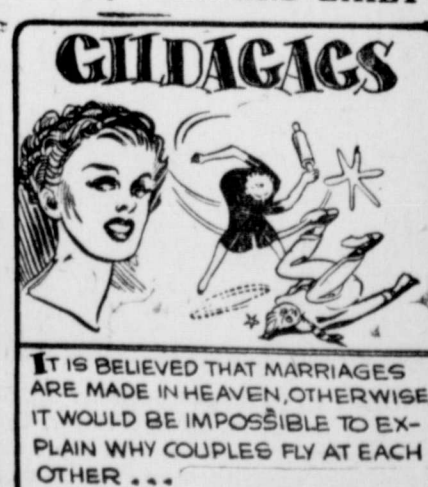

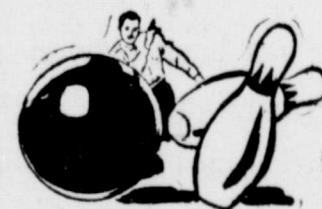
