Dean Attends Meeting of State CCC Officers

John I. Dean, Educational Adviser at the CCC camp attended a state conference of educational advisers at Waco, May 4, 5 and 6.

Mr. Dean reports that the conference was for the purpose of discussing and analyzing administration of the educational program in the camps of Texas. The meeting was attended by 68 educational advisers.

A discussion of the illiteracy problem revealed that West Texas has a smaller number of enrollees unable to read and write than any other section. One hundred per cent instruction of illiterates is reported in the Lubbock District.

Elementary courses, secondary education and vocational work were considered at the conference.

The building of libraries, counseling and guidance of enrollees, and the right use of leisure time were problems given a large place on the program.

Grand Jury Gives Report On Work

The State of Texas,

County of Dawson.

In the District Court of Dawson County, Texas, April term, A. D. 1936. This the 12th day of May, A. D. 1936. To The Honorable Judge of Said Court.

We, your Grand Jury for said term of court respectfully represent to you all that we have carefully investigated all criminal matters that have been brought to our attention during the term. We have deliberated five days in the investigation of crime, and have returned eight bills of felony indictments, having voted no misdemeanor bills of indictment.

From our investigations we find that crime has diminished in this county, and that this condition has been brought about by the good citizens and the work of our officers in this county. We are extremely glad to make the report showing that crime has decreased in this county, and we attribute such condition largely to the high type of citizenship that we have in this county, who make it a difficult place for the criminal to live and engage in unlawful business.

We have examined the courthouse and jail and find that the same is being kept in a good and sanitary manner.

We wish to express our appreciation and gratitude to our District Judge, Bailiffs, District Clerk, our County and District Attorneys and to all other officers who have assisted us during our deliberation. We also express our appreciation to the good citizens of this county, who have appeared before us and given their testimony to the end that justice might be done.

Having finally concluded our labors, we most respectfully ask that we be finally discharged for the term.

Carpenter Discusses Old Age Pensions

This is the first of a series of questions that the people of Texas are asking. Orville S. Carpenter, state pension director, answers them frankly and to the point.

Q—Why cannot assistance be paid to every person in Texas who is 65 years of age or older?

A—First, because the Texas law says that assistance may be paid only to those in "need"; second, because the Federal Government will not allow us to pay Federal money to people who are not in need.

Q—Will not Federal money mean a lot to Texas?

A—Yes. It will mean that several millions of dollars each year will be given to the aged people of Texas that they would not otherwise get, it will mean that with it a person will be able to receive as much as \$30 a month, and without it no one could get more than \$15 per month.

Q—What does the Federal law say about "need"?

A—It says that the Federal appropriation is made for the purpose of enabling states to assist "aged needy individuals." (Sec. 1)

Q—Was this "aged needy individuals" question checked?

A—The Social Security Board stated that this was the correct interpretation of the law.

Q—How does the Texas definition of "needy" compare with that of other states?

A—Texas has the most liberal definition of "aged needy individuals" in the United States. The Texas law is much more liberal on this point than that of any other state in the Union.

"Hop" Halsey Enters Race For Legislature

Declaring for a better system of old age pensions; increased rural school aid; state monopoly in liquor control, and a unicameral legislature as main planks in his platform, "Hop" Halsey of Lubbock announces his candidacy for the office of state representative of the 119th district, subject to the action of the Democratic voters in this summer's primaries.

Halsey, son of Mark Halsey, Lubbock druggist, said he plans to conduct an active campaign for the office and will endeavor to meet as many of the voters as possible before the July primary. "I'm not entering this race for the fun of it, as some of my friends and one or two of my opponents have indicated," Halsey said. "I am serious in my intentions and believe a young man as capable of filling the office as anyone else."

Halsey says the present old age pension system in Texas is wholly inadequate and that he will strive for a more efficient and business-like plan.

He favors state monopoly in liquor control, believing this to be the best method for solving the situation. He favors sale in unbroken packages only.

Finishing his pre-law course at Texas Technological College this year, Halsey says he saw the need for greater appropriations for the school and especially the dire need for a new library building.

"I believe the greatest task a representative from this district can perform is to see that Tech, the third largest school in the state gets appropriations commensurate to its importance as a unit of our educational system," he says. "If elected, I will always keep that point in mind."

He opposes a sales tax of any sort and says he favors, instead, more equal distribution of the tax burden of the state so that natural resources such as sulphur, oil, gas and minerals should be levied in comparison to land taxes.

Having worked in a drug store ever since he was six years old, he says he believes his experience in meeting the public would aid him greatly in the duties as a representative. He says he is for "organized labor and will seek to protect the working man's interests as much as possible."

Halsey says he is in favor of shifting the burden of payment of district courts clerk salaries from county to state as recently proposed by county officials associations.

Halsey is a native of Bell County and has been a resident of Lubbock for twelve years.

EMPLOYMENT INCREASES

Austin, Texas —Reports from more than 1,400 representative Texas concerns show a total of 76,395 workers were employed in the State during the week ended April 18, an increase of 1.6 per cent over March and 1.4 per cent over April last year, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. Total payrolls for the week are 3.4 per cent above the like week in March and 4.7 per cent above the corresponding week in April last year.

Cities showing gains above the average increase for the entire State for the comparable period are: Abilene, El Paso, Laredo, Lubbock and Waco. Industries showing better than average gains are foundries and machine shops, furniture manufacturing, laundries and dry cleaning, newspaper publishing, millwork, power and light, steam railroad car shops, structural iron works, beverages, brick tile and terra cotta, cement, commercial printing and cotton textiles.

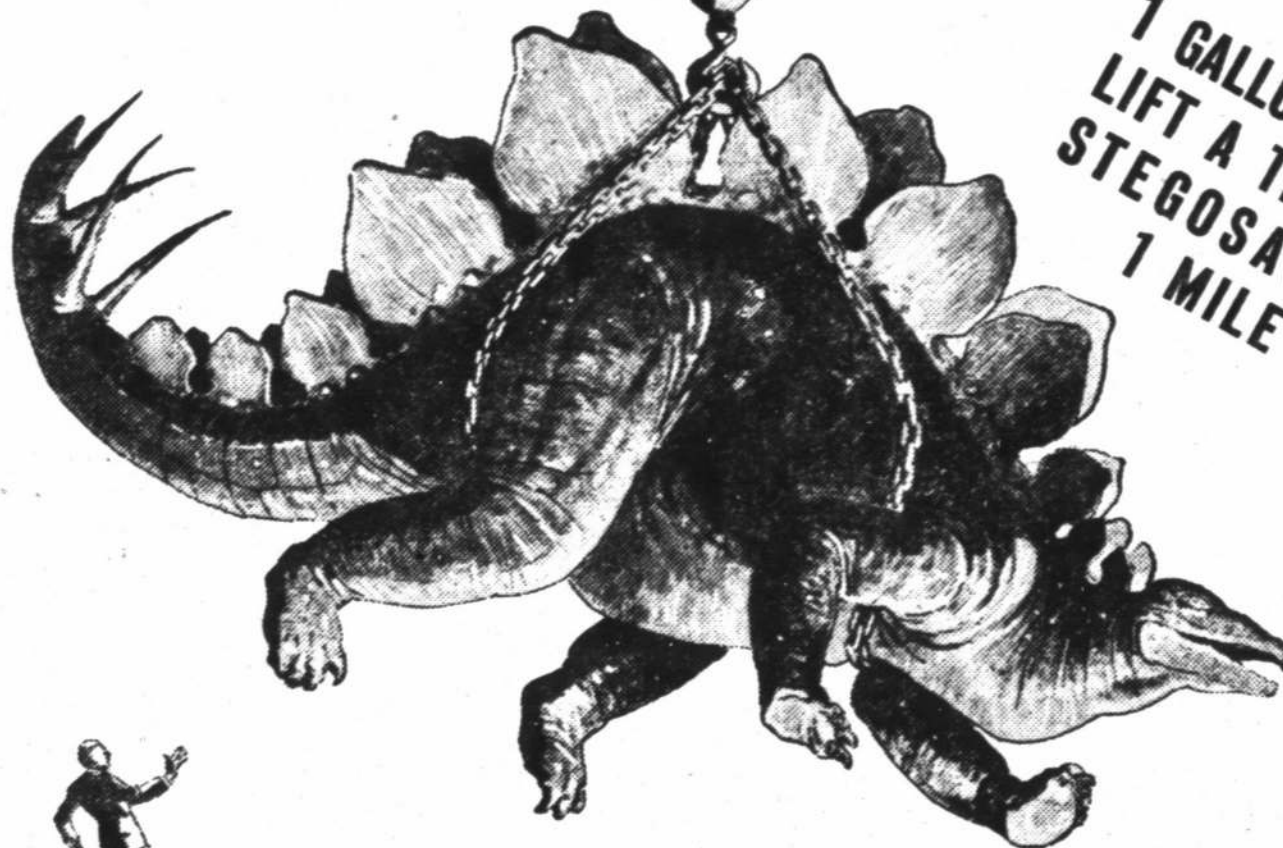

This year we can raise them and learn how to store them, and they will be a big help to us. Besides that, I want some herbs like my grandmother used to have. "You just as well plant it for old Beck because the county agricultural agent came before our home demonstration council and told us the government was not going to pay any farmer for any land that he took out of corn if his work stock and his folks didn't have enough. And the government don't think you've got enough unless you've got the 20 bushels for every person like I was talking about, and 70 bushels apiece for each head of work stock."

"I tell you what you can get money for though, Papa, and that is if you plant me a nice pretty grass lawn all around the house, you can get paid for that at the same rate you get paid for planting grass in the pasture."

"All my life I've been wanting a lawn. It looks so cool like. And it helps keep the house from being so dirty. And the children don't get their clothes near as dirty if they play on the grass as when they play in the dirt. It makes the washing easier."

"Besides that, everybody that passes the house would say, 'Look at that pretty lawn', like they do when they pass Mrs. Jones' place. Now, her house isn't a bit better than ours, but it looks like a great, green velvet carpet."

"Papa, when you sign up that cropping plan with the county agricultural agent, sign up for an acre of lawn around the house, won't you please?"

12,000 Youths To Be Employed In Texas

Austin—The Texas labor quota for the National Youth Administration has been set at 12,000. Lyndon B. Johnson, State Director, has announced.

Mr. Johnson said that the established quota will take care of all youths who are now at work on NYA projects as the total number employed is less than 12,000. A sum of \$352,000 has been set aside for the prosecution of NYA projects in Texas.

A report from Washington shows that on more than 6800 work projects the National Youth Administration is employing approximately 210,000 out-of-school young people. Falling under four general classifications—Youth Community Development and Recreational Leadership, Rural Youth Development, Public Service, and Research—the projects are adapted to the needs of the individual communities and approved by state directors.

The big majority of Texas youth projects are sponsored by local public and quasi-public organizations which furnish equipment and supervision.

"In this way," Director Johnson states, "the NYA is enabled to spend more than 85 percent of its project fund for youth labor." Preference in placing youths on jobs is given to members of large families so that where the need is greater the family income may be supplemented.

A survey of projects underway in the Lone Star State reveals that the largest number sponsored by a single organization is approximately 130 under the supervision of the Texas Highway Department. Youths on these projects are building "pocket-size" parks, school bus stops, and improving other highway areas.

Youths working on 90 projects sponsored by county school superintendents are rendering office assistance. Miscellaneous school projects call for boys and girls to enlarge and maintain rural libraries, improve school grounds and athletic fields, and to do minor repair work on school buildings.

Twenty projects are located in the offices of the Texas Relief Commission where youths render services outside the normal budgeted scope of the organization. County agents and home demonstrators are sponsoring approximately 50 projects which take youths into the field. The work consists of spreading better health, sanitation and domestic science practices and disseminating information on improved farming methods.

On other youth projects youths improve parks, supervise recreational activities, sew for the needy, bring files up to date and in general render many public services.

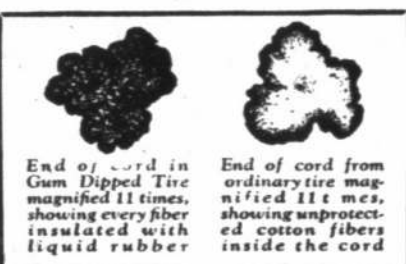

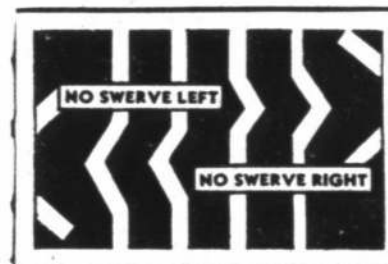

FARM NOTES

By Joe C. Williams, County Agent

Time For Sign-up Extended

The time for sign-up on the new farm program has been extended for another week. Every producer should fill out a Work Sheet even if he does not intend to cooperate with the new program as such producer may want to go into the program during the coming years. Should a producer want to come into the program during the years 1937, 1938 or 1939 he might have considerable trouble in getting a base for entering into contract. This is very important that all producers sign up the work sheets in order for them to get a cotton base or any crop base.

There is some talk of permitting the county to go on an average acreage based on percentage of the cultivated land in the county to be established as a cotton base. For example: should the county have an average of sixty percent cotton in relation to the average land in cultivation, or what ever such percentage will be, such action is being talked. In other words we would say that there is an average of 350,000 acres of cotton acres in the county, with some 700,000 acres in cultivation, then the average base for cotton could be changed according to the percentage, which under the basis would be each farm would have a base of fifty per cent of cotton to the cultivation of all acres. This is only talk and not set by the county committee. Would like to have expression of farmers to such a plan.

Government Loans

Those who are anticipating getting a crop loan are urged to do so as soon as possible and see Miss Imo Jeanne Humphrey as the closing date for making applications is May 31. In other words, those who want to make such applications should do so before that date as that is final according to Mr. Harold Himmel, loan agent, located in the agent's office.

ON TEXAS FARMS

After reading the March reports of the county agricultural agents, M. R. Bentley, Extension agricultural engineer, commits himself to the belief that the work done in terracing and contouring land on Texas farms and ranches was "stupendous and colossal." Bentley thinks that the answer to the oft-asked question "How can I terrace when there is nearly always a growing crop?" is to be found in some of these reports.

Live Oak County—Crops must be planted on this land before the terracing machinery is available, but the farmers are leaving out a 25 foot strip along the terrace line so that the terraces may be built at any time the machinery becomes available.

Howard County—Early maturing or

soil improvement crops will be planted on a strip 40 feet wide along the terrace line to leave ample room for the terrace building work without molesting other crops.

Oldham County—Henry Creitz, farmer of Adrain says, "I will mark my terrace lines at present with one round of a disk plow or small county grader that I can pull with my own tractor. Then I will do all working and planting on the contour between the lines, adding at least one round to the terrace each year until a good crop is made; then I can complete the terraces, in the meantime getting some advantage from the terraces and much from the contour farming."

Lee County—C. F. Wieder, farmer in the Good Hope community, recently decided to strip crop his land and build the terraces next fall after harvesting the crop.

Falls County—H. E. Wrenn, farmer living near Marlin, has had terrace lines run on 90 acres, changed his rows to run with the lines and will strip crop this land before building terraces. Part of these strips he has planted to sweet clover and will plant hegar on the other strips with the intention of building the terraces this summer after these crops are harvested. This gives an opportunity to build the terraces after crops are made and during a time when the ground is in better shape for moving the dirt.

Henderson County—The county agricultural agent in this county has been suggesting to farmers that in all instances where terrace lines are being run, if they fail to get their terraces built at the present time, by all means run the rows on the terrace contour with the intention of building the terraces after the crop is harvested, when more time is available.

Wheeler County—Farmers in this county who will be unable to wait for the county grader are leaving a wide row so that the line can be found next year and there will be no necessity for rerunning these lines again. Many of these farmers who will not have time to build terraces are listing their land with the terrace lines.

Prices for Texas Centennial half-dollars, which commemorate 100 years of progress in this state and which are being sold to augment state and federal funds in the building of the Texas Memorial Museum, range from the regular \$1.00 price to more than three times that amount. The increase in the price of the coins shows a growing demand for them throughout the Nation.

Memorable occasions in the history of Texas will be shown in dioramas now being prepared by the Humble Oil Co., and which will be on exhibit at the Centennial Central Exposition in Dallas. Following the Central Exposition, the dioramas will be donated to

the University of Texas for the Texas Memorial Museum.

Home owners in Dawson County have received loans, for refinancing purposes, from the Home Owners' Loan Corporation, amounting to \$120,115, as of January 2, 1936, according to an announcement made by H. P. Drought, State Director of the National Emergency Council of Texas. This total represents 73 individual loans to

Regular Medical Examinations Should Be Given Children

Austin, Texas—Call has gone out from the State Department of Health to county health officers to act as chairmen and organize committees for observance of Child Health Day during May. Dr. J. W. E. H. Beck, field director of the maternal and child health division, is state chairman by designation of Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer.

Although May Day is Child Health Day by act of Congress, communities are free to choose any day for the observance.

This slogan has been officially adopted for Texas Child Health Day: "Annual physical examination by your physician and dentist, immunization against diphtheria, typhoid fever, and smallpox. Safe water and proper sanitary equipment for home

and school." These suggestions are set forth in Dr. Beck's letter to county health officers.

"May Day—Child Health Day is a challenge to all parents to take stock of the health needs of their children, with special reference to immunization of those of the preschool age. The records of this office reveal that during the year of 1935, 64% of the deaths caused by diphtheria occurred before the child reached 5 years of age, 23% between the ages of 5 and 9 years, 6% between 10 and 14 years, and 7% were over 15 years of age. Therefore it is imperative that you have your children immunized against diphtheria during that first year of age."

"We recommend an annual examination for each child, by your family physician and dentist now, and hereafter this annual examination should precede the opening of your fall term school term. Your physician and dentist may find some set-backs. If so, they are at pains to advise the parents of the proper treatment and to doing so serious illnesses will be prevented."

"It is suggested that the parents of the children in Texas take special interest in pure drinking water for the homes and schools, and make every effort to secure for their children the proper sanitary disposal equipment. We strongly urge that provisions be made throughout the State for suitable places where children may have proper exercises, sanitary swimming pools, and places for play and pleasure."

Farmer Gets Cultivated Land Back To Pasture

Seeing is believing, for the doubting Thomases, in the case of revegetating an abandoned field on the John R. Knight farm near Stratford, Texas, according to T. V. Weaver, of the Soil Conservation Service.

After having cultivated a field consisting of 20 acres for a period of 20 years, Mr. H. Altringer, who owned the farm until his death in 1931 when Mr. Knight acquired it, decided to revegetate this 20 acre field because of its rocky and gravelly nature.

According to Bert Cook, local resident of Stratford, Texas, who lived on the farm from 1927 to 1933, the owner took advantage of the favorable moisture conditions which produced a luxuriant growth of blue grama grass, (bouteloua-gracilis) on his bottom prairie land. He cut 5 acres of this grass with the mowing machine in the fall of 1927. After letting the grass hay cure for one day, he raked and stacked it.

The following spring the grass hay was scattered from a wagon on the field. The maize crop on the field the preceding year was cut with row binder. Therefore, the only residue remaining was the stubble of these milo stalks which were about twelve inches high. The milo rows were

counter-wise to the prevailing slope but not on the contour. The slope was approximately 3 per cent.

This 20 acre plot was not fenced separately from the wheat field the first two years after re-seeding, thus the livestock had access to this piece of ground while grazing on the wheat pasture during the fall and winter of 1928 and 1929. In the spring of 1929 it was fenced in with the big pasture. According to Mr. Cook, this was the best pasture on the farm in the summer of 1929.

This pasture is in fair condition and has a good sod today, according to T. V. Weaver, agronomist, Soil Conservation Service. The grass is thicker than on the adjacent native pasture, or on adjacent land which was seeded to sweet clover in the spring of 1928, but which died out because of dry weather conditions in 1932. The grama grass however, has begun to encroach on this area from the revegetated plot and is dotted with scattered bunches of blue grama grass, the line of demarcation between the seeded and the unseeded plot being very evident.

This method of retiring cultivated land to permanent pasture got the job done, even though it was somewhat crude and could not be depended upon in years with extremely favorable moisture conditions.

A 100 acre field on this same farm was taken out of cultivation in 1911 after having been cultivated five

years. The reason for taking this field out of cultivation was desertion of the farm by the owner. Succeeding owners did not cultivate the field again. No seed was added except those which matured from adjoining pastures. It does not have over one-fourth the sod that the reseeded plot referred to above has.

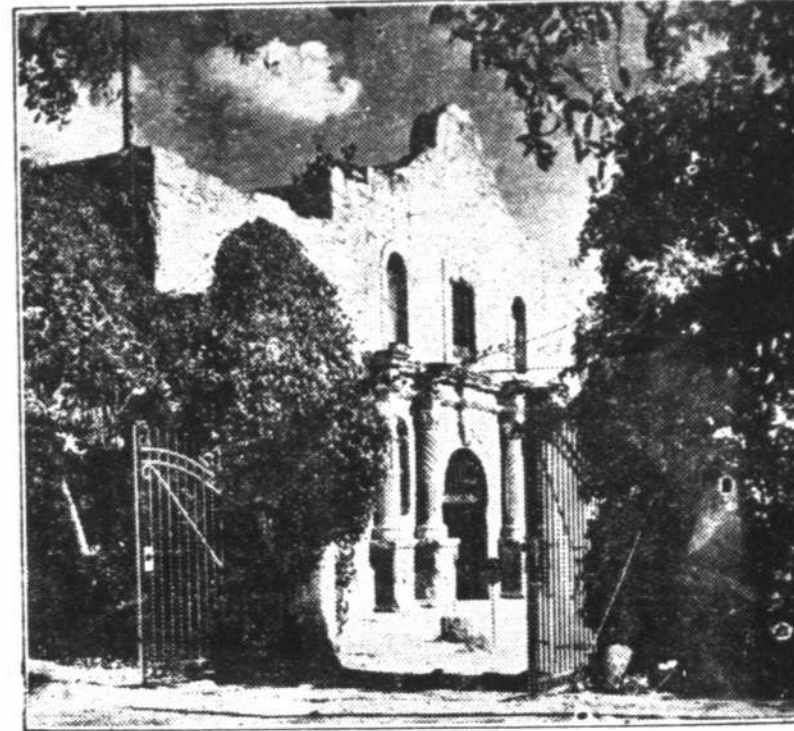
There are several years difference in the period of time the two processes, namely: the revegetation of cultivated fields by mechanical means and simply the abandonment of a field hoping that nature would cause it to 'hair over' with native pasture grasses. The revegetated plot proves conclusively that it pays to sow grass seed rather than depend upon nature to do the job.

The Soil Conservation Service, of Region Six, has 48,000 pounds of Blue Grama Grass seed for seeding cultivated fields which are to go back to native grass.

Land on the Dalhart project which is being seeded to grass was planted on the contour last spring to sudan grass. The sudan crop was left as a cover on the soil and grass seed was broadcasted in the past two months.
