

Marihuana, LSD Cases

Charges Result From Months Of Undercover Police Investigation

Two Colorado City youths—only two—are charged in criminal cases here involving marihuana and LSD.

Law enforcement officers believe, however, their arrests are the first breaks into a marihuana and drug problem which involves or has involved more.

Their evidence reveals usage has been increasing here for three years.

But the cases filed Wednesday mid-afternoon resulted only through outside undercover police working quietly in Colorado City for several months.

Only one of these undercover men was known locally, and then, only to one Colorado City official.

Yet, the arrests this week came because of a "leak" as to the undercover police identity.

Police had been hopeful they could obtain bigger game—suppliers of narcotics and drugs from outside the Colorado City area—if the undercover investigation could have continued.

But when they learned of the "leak", the arrests were ordered.

Undercover investigation, law officers believe, is the most effective manner for gathering enough evidence to file a charge.

In fact, they view the odds stacked against ample evidence being produced from routine police work.

Named in the charges filed here by District Attorney Weldon Kirk are Gary Redwine, 19, a youth who lives at 2154 Locust, and Ronnie Love, also 19, who lives at 1220 East-over.

Redwine is accused in two felony complaints filed in Precinct 1 Justice of Peace Leonard Henderson's Court of sale of a narcotic drug, (marihuana), Sept. 20 and of sale of a dangerous drug, LSD, Aug. 15.

Love is accused in one felony complaint in the same court of sale of LSD on the same Aug. 15 date.

In County Court, both defendants are accused in separate misdemeanor cases of possession of a dangerous drug, LSD, Aug. 15.

Bonds in the cases originally were set \$10,000 for Redwine in each of his two felony cases and \$2,250 in his county court case -- a total of \$22,250, \$10,000 for Love in his felony case, \$2,250 in his misdemeanor case -- a total of \$12,250.

The pair was held in County Jail Wednesday and Thursday, then released Friday on bond. Before their release, both requested Sheriff Lewis Claxton take them to a barber shop for haircuts.

When officers decided to make arrests Wednesday, Love was taken into custody near Colorado Junior High and a drive-in restaurant.

Redwine was in a car near 1000 block of Vine when arrested. A passenger with him, a high school boy, was not taken into custody.

District Attorney Kirk, like police and sheriff's officers offered only brief information concerning the cases.

However, Kirk told the Record he believed evidence was sufficient to warrant prosecution.

One of the defendants was behind closed doors with the district attorney for several hours Friday afternoon and evening, but the district attorney would not discuss the possibility of any statements in relation to the case.

He did say that he had agreed to lowering the bond for Redwine.

The Record recently had

known that officials here were pushing an investigation into narcotics but had withheld reporting in cooperation with officers since the earlier arrest of seven youths in a car in the northwest area of the city.

Police found a lead (a small packet) of marihuana near the boys' car. Laboratory analysis of the packet's contents was returned from the State Department of Public Safety Friday immediately prior to the arrest of Redwine and Love.

There has been no indication, however, that the arrest of the seven boys—three of them charged with felony possession, four of them scheduled for ju-

venile hearing because they are under age 17—is connected with the apprehension of Love and Redwine.

State laboratory analysis reported that packet found near the car of the seven boys Sept. 26 contained 22.45 grams of marihuana.

Police are known to have confiscated 10 leads (packets)—similar in size and appearance to the 22.45 grams lead analyzed by the state laboratory.

The 10 leads—believed to be marihuana—were found hidden in Ruddick Park Wednesday afternoon. Despite proximity of time of the finding to the ar-

rest of Love and Redwine, none of the charges against the pair involves possession of the narcotic.

The two recent findings of marihuana and what is believed to be marihuana are the first major evidences of the use of narcotics here in Colorado City in recent years.

Police have been finding other evidence for more than three years.

These findings—although scant and sketchy—are why Chief Browning claims "we have had some of this since I came here 3 1/2 year ago."

"It has been getting bigger all the time," he said.

Sheriff Claxton and his deputies agree with Browning and his force that narcotic usage has been increasing here.

That is why the two law enforcement agencies have been working together in investigations.

County Attorney Frank Ginzler, obtaining reports of narcotic usage from sources, also has been active in investigations for a long time.

As long ago as Nov. 9, 1967, police have logged evidence of

narcotic traffic moving in and out of the Colorado City area.

This included small amounts of marihuana seeds, drug pills, burned marihuana sticks (similar but smaller in size than a cigarette), match boxes of marihuana.

Police know that an Odessa woman was in a local motel more than a year ago for a limited period, then returned to Odessa.

Although a full match box of marihuana was found in the motel room after her departure, police withheld filing of charges here to cooperate with law enforcement agencies

working toward a "bigger case" in the Odessa area.

Another time, a match box of marihuana was found under the seat of a police patrol car. It was believed to have been hidden there by a person under arrest who was ridding himself of narcotics possession evidence.

"We had been finding traces," Browning said, "but the trail was always pretty cold."

All of this prompted the chief, sheriff and county attorney to look toward an undercover investigation.

The undercover plan was dis-

cussed by the 3 local officials last March with Abilene Police Chief Dodson, who agreed to supply undercover men from his special investigation staff.

After the campaign was finalized, Chief Browning was the only person locally to know when an undercover agent was due in the Colorado City area.

More than one was active in the undercover work. But the investigation was so secretive that only one had been known by the chief.

To Estacado

Wolves Lose 22-0

Victory drought followed Colorado City Wolves onto their District 3 - AAA path Friday night as the crippled pack fell to defending champ Estacado, 22-0.

The Wolves contained the Matador attack spearheaded by Tailback Jesse Lethridge for two quarters, but couldn't keep pace in the last half.

An alert, charging Estacado defense dealt misery to Colorado City all 48 minutes of the game. It limited the Wolf offense to 67 yards on the ground, six pass completions for 72 yards, sidetracked numerous passing attempts by Steve Vest and rushed the quarterback so effectively he averaged only 20 yards for 7 punts.

Still, the Wolves appeared headed for a halftime lead when they rebounded from Paul Moody's 21-yard first quarter field goal. They moved 66-yards from their own 26 to the Estacado 8 with 44 seconds on the clock.

Then Big—Carl Devorce, moved to fullback much of the game as Coach Truman Nix juggled assignments to cover up for injuries, rammed through the Estacado line to the one-foot mark. But a 45-yard motion penalty put the Wolves back to the 13.

They were still at the 11 when Carl May missed a field goal attempt just before the whistle.

In the second half, the Matadors were too much.

Fullback Porter Jaushlin capped a 65-yard march early in the third quarter with a 3-yard touchdown jolt. Minutes later Lethridge sprinted around left end for another touchdown at the end of a 54-yard drive.

It was 16-0 then with End Chris Stubblefields extra point kick.

The final six points wasn't earned. The Wolves, trying desperately in the final 54 seconds, failed on a fourth down. See WOLVES Page 5

School Experts Arriving For 3-Day Education Appraisal

Twenty-one educators arrive here Sunday to begin putting a yardstick to Colorado Independent School District's program of education.

The experts will apply state and national criteria as measuring devices to evaluate all phases of local public education

from buildings to teachers to curriculum.

Their three-day visit marks the final stage of a Colorado City evaluation program started three years ago.

This appraisal is aimed both for the state's 5-year accredi-

tation plan and a self-look for improving the school system to better meet educational needs of its community.

Educators in the visiting committee will come from 11 cities of Texas, all but one in West Texas.

Here are their assignments

Dr. Billy E. Askins, Department of Secondary Education, Texas Tech University, Lubbock—coordinator of studies in secondary schools.

Mrs. Juanita Avinger, Department of Education, Abilene Christian College, Abilene—elementary math and language arts.

Dr. W. H. (Tut) Avinger, Department of Education, Abilene Christian College—School plant, philosophy and objectives.

Alvie D. Bowne, teacher in Western Elementary School, Lubbock—elementary health, safety, physical education and art.

Dick Richey, Superintendent of Schools, Ballinger—staff administration, music.

C. D. Henry, Director, Office of Special Projects, San Angelo—school and community, federal and other projects.

Dr. Robert L. Holden, Department of Education, Angelo State University, San Angelo—elementary science, guidance.

Bill Holm, Department of Education, Angelo State Univer-

sity—student activity, program of studies.

Bill Hood, Superintendent of Schools, Snyder—English, school plant.

Mrs. Betty Lawrence, English-Supervisor, Abilene—foreign language, English.

Dr. Thomas Lawrence, Education Service Center, Abilene—philosophy and objectives, student activity.

Bill Moore, Director of In-Service Education, Education Service Center—vocational, secondary science.

Keene Van Orden, Coordinator of Math, San Angelo—math (grade 1 through 12), secondary science.

Mrs. Essie L. Person, Librarian, Goliad Junior High, Big Spring—instructional materials (library and audio visual).

Joe Pierce, Principal, Haynes Elementary, Lubbock—school and community, health.

Miss Fannie Pillow, Assistant Professor of Elementary Education—coordinator for elementary group study (social studies).

Mrs. Betty Scott, Supervi-

sor, Elementary School, Post--Elementary (language arts).

Leroy Scott, Superintendent of Schools, Lorraine—home economics, driver education.

Mrs. Florence Sparkman, Physical Education Teacher, Sweetwater High School—physical education, social studies.

Dr. Wesley Summer, Director of Instruction, Bryan—guidance, data processing, business education.

The visiting experts will conduct their study and evaluation of the local school program in their own manner.

Their appraisal will provide realistic measurement with which to compare the local system's own study and evaluation which began in the fall of 1967.

State criteria will be applied to agriculture, distributive education, home economics, vocational trade and industrial education programs.

National criteria will be applied to art, business education, driver education, English, foreign language, health education, industrial arts, mathematics, music, physical education, science and social studies.

A son who has spoken for his dad in 108 towns and cities the last two months reported here Thursday Texans are most disturbed about "campus unrest."

George Bush Jr., who at 24 is the oldest offspring of Republican Senatorial Candidate George Bush, stopped here for brief political campaigning on behalf of his Congressman father who is opposing Democrat Lloyd Bentsen in the Nov. 3 General Election.

He did not attempt to hide the fact that his father had an up-

hill battle in his bid to become Texas' second Republican senator.

"But the guy who can turn out the votes is going to win," the son said, "and we are going to get out our vote."

In a conservative blue serge suit, white shirt and subdued tie of stripes, the handsome 24-year-old Yale University graduate toured Root Memorial Hospital and the offices of Sun Oil Company under the guidance of Mrs. Weldon Hardegree and Bob Reilly. Before leaving town,

he made another quick stop at Radio Station KVMC for an interview.

"Dad believes no radical fringe—right or left," he said, "is going to take us through the 1970's."

"My dad believes conservatism—active conservatism that is positive, not reactive—will carry us through."

Diana Baumann was scholarship speaker; Anita Chavez, character speaker; Robert Finley, service speaker, and Gwen Tarrt, leadership speaker.

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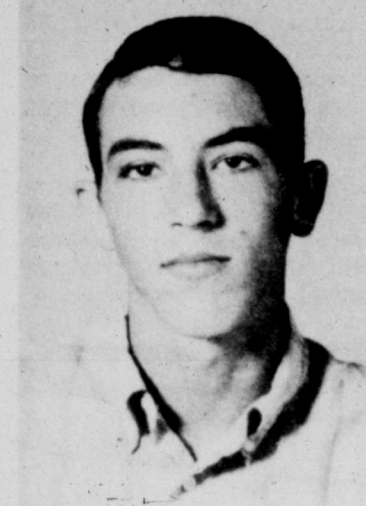

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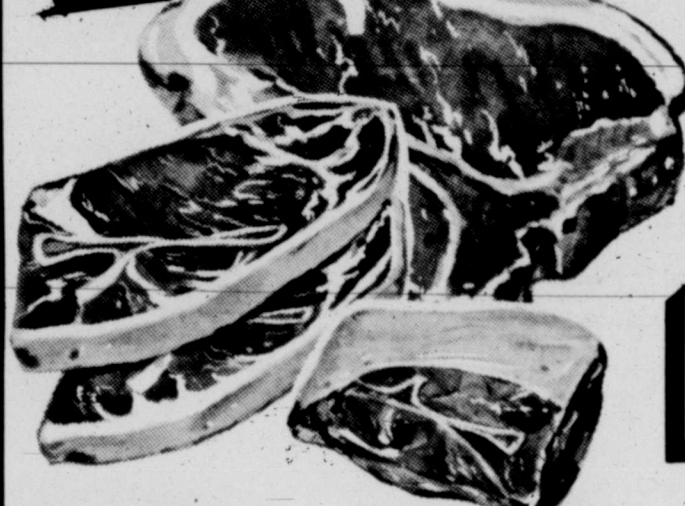
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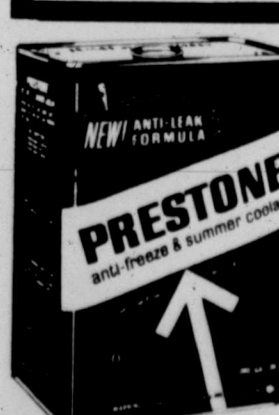
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
