The advance rate request by the telephone company was meeting the city council at their meeting about a month ago. At that meeting the council took the matter under advisement to give the problem more study and also to inform the local patrons of the company of the rate increase asked, etc.

Telephone representatives were present at the council's meeting Tuesday night of last week to receive the answer. Two of the councilmen present indicated they were opposed to the increase. Other council members were absent, and all in all, this meeting adjourned without any decision being made either in favor of the rate increase or opposing it.

Opposition to the rate increase voiced by some councilmen attending the meeting was that many of their constituents were opposed to the increase, and that we are their servants in office and obligated to follow their bidding. Another councilman took the view that the area had suffered four years of drouth and the people were strained severely as to money matters.

Chest X-Ray Campaign To Come Sept. 27

Martin County's free Chest X-ray campaign will get underway at 1 p.m. Tuesday, September 27, at Chapman's Farm and Home Supply.

The X-raying will continue Tuesday until 6 p.m. and will start again at 9 a.m. Wednesday, September 28, and continue until 1 p.m. that day.

The purpose of the drive is to find unknown cases of tuberculosis by X-raying everyone in the county 15 years of age and over.

Mrs. Bill Lively, general chairman, has named other committee chairman. Ed Davis, Cecil Bridges and James Jones are in charge of the location. The Beta Sigma Phi members will be hostesses, clerks and will conduct a telephone campaign to remind citizens of the dates set.

"We cannot be satisfied with less than 100 per cent in our campaign to X-ray every adult in the county," Mrs. Lively said. "That means every one, even those who look and feel the picture of health."

"Tuberculosis sneaks up without warning. You can have TB without knowing it, because it has no apparent symptoms in the early stages. However, the chest X-ray can detect TB, no matter how early the stage."

Most of the people who have X-rays during the campaign will have clear X-ray films, indicating healthy lungs, she said. Only a comparatively small percentage of X-ray films will show up some kind of trouble which may lead to a diagnosis of tuberculosis. Most cases will be found in the early stage when the disease is easiest to cure.

"No community is safe from tuberculosis while a single case of this communicable disease exists in it. The spread of tuberculosis in this area cannot be stopped until we have located all cases of the disease so that they may be placed promptly under treatment."

Glasscock Area Gets 2 Wildcats In New Activity

The area of Northwest Glasscock County, southeast of Stanton, has gained locations for deep and shallow wildcats.

The Texas Company No. 1-A B. H. Hillier Estate is a new 9,900-foot exploration 14 miles southeast of Stanton.

It is 660 feet from north and east lines of section 13, block 35, T-3-S, T&P survey.

Southland Royalty Company has staked location for a 3,100-foot Permian wildcat in Northwest Glasscock County, 11 miles southeast of Stanton.

It is No. 1-35 L. S. McDowell, 467 feet from south and east lines of section 33, block 34, T-2-S, T&P survey.

Drilling will start at once on both projects.

Two outposts have been staked to the Varel (San Andres) field of West Howard County.

Three-quarters of a mile southwest of the most westerly producer in the pool, Shell Oil Company spotted No. 1 Guitard Trust Estate, 665 feet from north and 661 feet from east lines of section 18, block A, Bauer & Cockrell survey.

Half-mile east outpost to the pool will be drilled as Russell Maguire, Wichita Falls, No. 1 Little, 330 feet from south and 990 feet from east lines of section 6, block 33, T-1-N, T&P survey. It is to drill to 3,400 feet.

Pan American Production Company No. 1 Shook, wildcat in Northwest Martin County, was being drilled below 11,754 feet in line and chert on a 12,300-foot contract.

Location for this test is 29 miles northwest of Stanton, 660 feet from north and east lines of labor 90, league 259, Borden County School Land survey.

Cotton Forecast Is Up a Little

While the second estimate of the cotton crop shows the nation's yield this year will be 145,000 bales more than the earlier estimate, the estimate for Martin county remains the 50,000 bales figured earlier. County Agent Gerry Hanson and some of his advisers figured the Martin county crop at the 50,000 figure when the first estimate came out, "and we don't see any reason to change this estimate," Hanson said Tuesday.

The nation's crop was set by the United States Department of Agriculture at 12,873,000 bales, with the Texas crop estimated at 3,850,000 bales. This compares with a crop last year of 13,696,000 bales and a 10-year average of 12,952,000 bales.

She is striving in the best way she knows to fit him with a foundation to an education that will in the end amply qualify him to match intelligence with the scions of the educated world.

A school poster published in The Journal of the National Education Association contains five resolves which might well be taken by adults as well as children:

"1. I will control my tongue, and will not allow it to speak mean, vulgar, or profane words. I will think before I speak. I will tell the truth and only the truth.

"2. I will control my temper, and will not get angry when people do things that displease me. Even when indignant against wrong and contradicting falsehood, I will keep my self-control.

"3. I will control my thoughts, and will not allow a foolish wish to spoil a wise purpose.

"4. I will control my actions. I will be careful and thrifty and insist on doing right.

"5. I will not ridicule or defile the character of another; I will keep my self-respect and help others to keep theirs."

We cannot afford to let our children get ahead of us in any of these five particulars.

Some New Laws Have Gone Into Effect

The Texas State Legislature, at its last session, did considerably. The law body passed some 209 new laws, which became effective Tuesday, September 6.

The largest tax measure in Texas history, designed to bring in \$50,000,000 a year, will cost the cigarette smokers, beer drinkers, and auto and truck drivers.

The scandal-shaken veterans land program will be more tightly regulated. Under new regulations, prison terms up to 10 years and fines up to \$10,000 can be slapped on buyers and sellers found guilty of a fraud or misrepresentation.

Housewives may find grocery stores offering fewer "good specials" as the so-called "unfair sales" act takes effect . . . it will allow grocery sales below cost only if the seller agrees to sell in unlimited quantities or if he is forced to sell below cost to meet competition. Small grocers pushing this legislation, claiming some large chains have been trying to put them out of business by selling some items at a loss.

Cities and counties will be authorized to spend money to advertise and promote their growth and development. Commissioners courts will be limited to appropriate no more than 5 per cent \$100 valuation for such purposes.

It is unlawful to distribute or sell lewd, depraved or corruptive "comic books" and publications in Texas.

In the field of domestic relations, suit will be permitted against a parent who fails to provide support for a child under 18. Persons seeking to divorce will have to wait 60 days instead of 30 before a suit may be heard or granted.

The United States Forest Products Laboratory at Madison, Wis., has developed a cheap wood-fiber building board which is said to filter out poisonous gas and radioactive fall-out. Spokesmen say that the "diffusion board" might someday be used to build shelters for troops and civilians.

Christian Believes All Work is God's

To the intelligent and earnest Christian, who knows his New Testament, there is no such thing as secular work.

Paul admonished the early Christians, whether they ate or drank, or whatever they did, to do all to the glory of God.

It might seem a strange and incongruous conception to one engaged in work of plain drudgery, or to one doing a routine task, day after day. A great part of the world's daily work is drudgery, if one thinks of it in that way.

What of the "woman's work," that until the emergence of appliances and household helps (including more male participation in the work of the home) was "never done"?

Even the work of the artist in many instances has its element of patient drudgery.

Drudgery is almost more a matter of the spirit than of the nature of the work.

There is a sort of finished

whole in the work of the world, and to have a part of it in the right spirit is to achieve a certain mastery of life.

But the glorification of work should never justify or excuse unnecessary work, or antisocial conditions under which work is sometimes done.

We have moved a long way from the days of the exploitation of child labor and the worst sweat-shop conditions.

It may be that in many areas there is still some way to go, but in some respects a major problem in an era of shorter hours concerns the use of leisure as much as the conditions of work.

Work! So necessary, so vital, so much man's cooperation with the Great Creator, and with the Christ who said, "My Father worketh hitherto and I work."

Army Needs Men Who Are Qualified Now

Army aviation, which has some of the latest developments in aircraft, is in need of qualified men to fill vacancies in the repair and maintenance sections.

Technical training in four-month courses is available for high school graduates who meet the rigid qualifications for the aircraft field.

Included among the Army aviation equipment is the new Convertiplane, a helicopter type plane with rotors on the wings. Once in flight, the rotors will shift from a vertical to a horizontal position, converting the helicopter to a regulation airplane.

Commercial aviation has been interested in the Army experiments with the convertiplane since aircraft of this type may be the answer to the landing problems of airfields with limited runway space. Recent test flights proved the capability of the aircraft, which was developed at Fort Worth, Texas.

Information on a career in Army aviation may be obtained from the U. S. Army Recruiting Station, Post Office on Mondays and Thursday in Stanton.

Time Again To Think Of Car Inspection

AUSTIN—Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today that the Public Safety Commission has set September 15, 1955, through April 15, 1956, as the new Motor Vehicle Inspection period for state motorists.

Garrison pointed out that this will give Texas car owners a full seven months to report to one of the more than 4,000 licensed inspection stations in the state for a safety check of their vehicles.

Notary Public Commissions Issued To 90,932 People

A. M. Muldrow, Secretary of
State of the State of Texas, an-
nounced that 90,932 Notary Pub-
lic Commissions (new term June
1, 1955 to June 1, 1957) had been
mailed to the County Clerks of
the 254 counties in Texas.

108,485 persons were reap-
pointed on June 1, 1955, but only
83,341 requalified for this new
term from the various counties.

7,591 persons applied for No-
tary Public Commissions for the
first time and were approved by
the Secretary of State. Most of
these new notary applicants
have qualified and their Com-
missions have been mailed to the
County Clerks.

Due to a completely revised
system and the use of modern
business machines, the Office of
Secretary of State with a limited
staff was able to appoint and is-
sue commissions for 90,932 per-
sons in less than three months
time. This is the earliest Notary
Public Commissions have ever
been issued. The new system re-
quired the cooperation of the
County Clerks in order for it to
be workable.

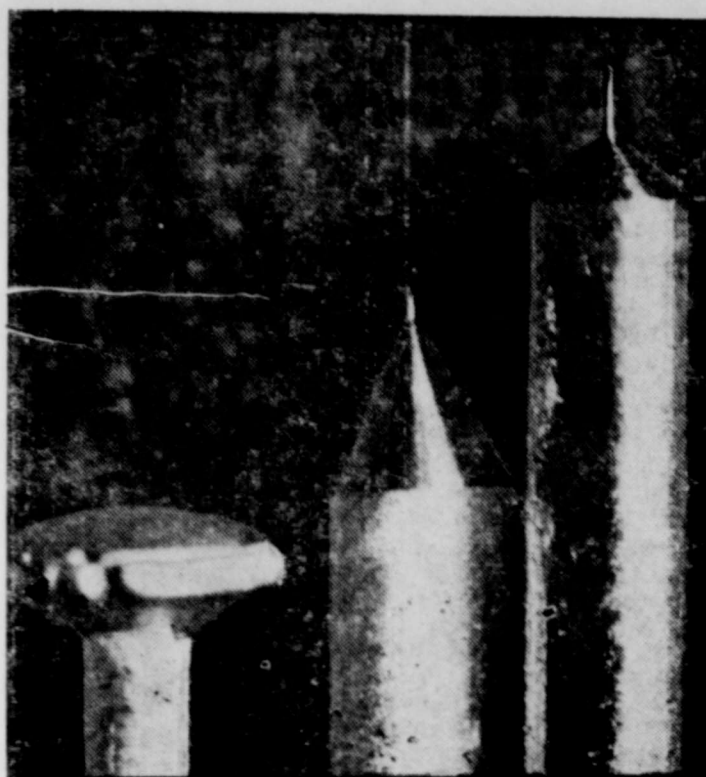
The Secretary of State also
said, "I am extremely grateful to
each and every County Clerk in
Texas for their generous devo-
tion to duty and for their cour-
tesy in helping my office to ap-
point and commission the 90,932
individuals who will hold office
as Notaries Public."

Farm & Ranch Review



By JAMES E. KELLY

The Business Research Department of the University of Texas announces after a survey that Texas will produce more than half the nation's grain sorghum crop this year, with a bumper crop expected to beat last year's yield more than 20 per cent.

The Bureau also reports remarkably high yields are in prospect for most of the cotton-producing area, due to improved soil moisture supplements by irrigation of about 25 per cent of the state's crop. Boll weevil infestation is somewhat worse this year than last, but damage has not been excessive.

Reporting on livestock, the Bureau says most cattlemen feel they can see their herds safely through the coming winter season. Prospects for early fall and winter pasturing are better than they have been in years, and there was a bumper crop of hay.

The old saying teaches that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

Many Texas cotton farmers are learning to their regret that the saying is all too true. Boll weevils are ripping through fields all over North Texas. They are costing some farms as much as a quarter of a bale to the acre, says C. B. Spencer, agricultural director of the Texas Cottonseed Crushers Association.

Failure to clean up after last year's crop must bear much of the blame for this situation, bug experts declare.

The Texas Beef Council announces that Beef Week in Texas will be October 30 - November 5 this year. The Council will also support the national Beef-Vegetable promotion September 22 to October 1.

The membership drive chairman and captains of the Texas Farm Bureau from some 100 counties will assemble in Austin September 21, to adopt plans to start the 1955 membership campaign. The TFB membership is up nearly 10,000 the same time last year.

The county Farm Bureaus have set a statewide goal of 71,000.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced that the average loan rate for 1955-crop, upland cotton, basis Middling, 7/8 inch, will be 31.70 cents per pound, gross weight.

If parity at the beginning of the marketing year, as of August 1, is higher than the estimate used in determining the advance minimum support rates, the dollar-and-cents support price is increased accordingly. If the August 1 parity is lower, however, the previously announced support price is not reduced.

A survey made recently in eight Panhandle counties showed that excellent control of grasshoppers had been obtained by chemical sprays. Grass saved on the 700,000 acres of rangeland treated had an estimated value of \$525,000. The surveyors found an additional 2 1/2 million acres of rangeland still heavily infested with hoppers and grass lost on this land was estimated at \$1,875,000. Control measures could have been applied for about 60 cents an acre.

Color television will be introduced to Texans on this giant, movie-size television screen at the 1955 State Fair of Texas, Oct. 7-23. The singer is being televised by the camera visible at lower left-hand corner of picture. Both Dallas TV stations will transmit color programs daily from the fair and closed circuit shows visible only on sets at the fairgrounds will be presented nightly. The RCA Color TV Caravan, the only mobile color TV unit in the world, will be based at the fairgrounds all during the fair.

runs for governor, is Will Wilson. He would not run against Hart.

New Veterans Land Plan

Texas' veterans land program is off to a fresh start.

Under new laws the board places responsibility for administration squarely on the shoulders of the land commissioner. Ex-officio members, the governor and attorney general, are charged only with policy-making functions.

Commr. J. Earl Rudder said he was ready to accept the responsibility.

Local advisory committees, blueprinted in the 54th Legislature's reform laws, are already being formed. These committees, appointed by commissioners courts, will provide a check on findings of state appraisers.

Land purchasers who are delinquent in their payments, have been notified to pay up or forfeit their land. Many delinquencies involve block deals believed to be of questionable nature.

Rudder indicated the board should be able to start considering loan applications again soon. All the original \$100,000,000 was exhausted under the administration of his predecessor, Bascom Giles. Some, however, has been recovered by court action.

Giles has been sentenced to the state penitentiary on charges of complicity to theft and consenting to accept a bribe.

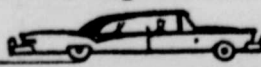

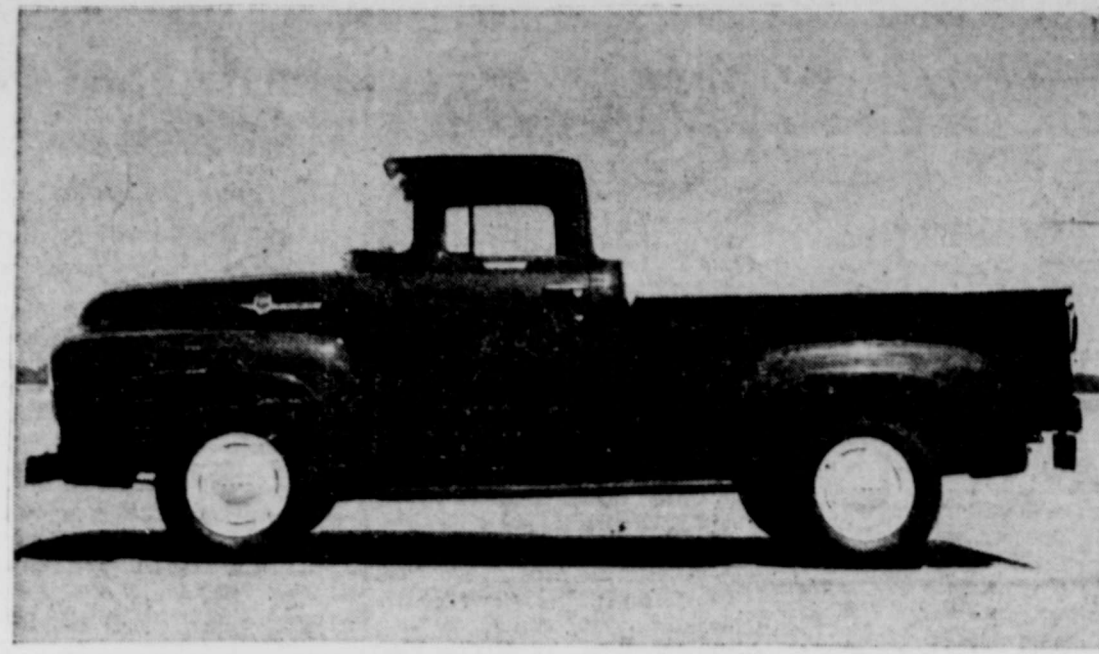
