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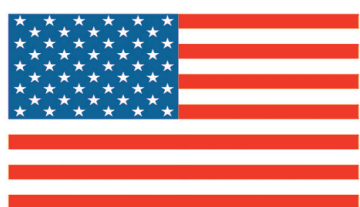

Big Spring ISD Board of Trustees discuss property appraisals

Big Spring ISD trustees listened Thursday evening as Richard Petree, interim chief appraiser for the Howard County Appraisal District, presented some bad news. Due to what the state of Texas is claiming is under-valuation of Howard County properties by recently ousted HCAD appraisers, the school board will have to pay the state taxes for about \$3 billion worth of local property, but will only collect on about \$2.8 billion worth of properties.

“A quick example: If you have a house that sells for \$100,000 and we appraise that house for \$80,000, that means we’re at an 80 percent ratio,” Pe-

tree said. “We don’t use just one sale, we use a lot of sales of houses, they use com-

mercial income approach to value on commercial properties. Overall, your values were significantly below what the standard is, and that’s 2020 values. That is costing you millions of dollars, literally, going forward.”

Petree said property in Howard County was appraised by new appraisers, and values should increase by between 12 and 20 percent.

“I put the three people who are appraisers into high gear, and they have looked at every property in Big Spring ISD this year. I have a system they are utilizing that will enable us to get the values right. So we’re going to get the values moved up to where they need to be. It is absolutely horrible timing,

Area Wide Art Show returning to Heritage Museum

The Big Spring Art Association is bringing back the

Area Wide Art Show. Last year, due to the pandemic, the Art Show was placed on hold in the best interest of the

artists and community. This year, the Art Show is set to run from May 4 through May 27 and will take place in the main exhibit hall at the Heritage Museum.

“It’s been so long since we’ve been able to get out and experience the beauty of life; we want to encourage everyone to come out and enjoy some beautiful art,” Michelle Worthan, President of the Big Spring Art Association, said. “This show is important because it helps to promote the arts in our community and gives local artists, and some out-of-town artists, the opportunity to share their art with the community. It also helps bring visitors to town.”

Entries for the show will be

accepted on April 29 and 30 between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. A ribbon cutting by the Big Spring Area Chamber of Commerce Ambassadors will officially mark the opening of this year’s show.

“There will be a wide variety of art pieces to not only admire, but also purchase,” she said.

A new category has been added to the show: miniature paintings. Any piece smaller than 10” on all sides will qualify for entry into this new category. The traditional categories will also be included: Oil/Acrylics; Pastels/Colored Pencils; Photography; Mixed Media/Watercolor; 3D/Sculpture/Jewelry/

Fire danger, red-flag warning and more as dry conditions remain in effect for Howard County

Midland’s National Weather Service (NWS) issued a Red-Flag warning for wildfire danger at about 2:15 p.m. Tuesday.

Although the warning was set to expire in the early evening hours Tuesday, dangerously dry conditions remain in effect, according to meteorologist Greg Murdoch of NWS Midland.

“What that means is that effective weather in combination with the fuel dryness leads to conditions that are favorable for fires to start and grow,” Murdoch said. “They may exhibit some resistance to control.”

Murdoch said the red-flag warning would end Tuesday night, but that doesn’t mean the danger is over.

“The winds will decrease (Tuesday evening) and the red flag warning will expire at 9 o’clock,” he said. “Normally what we’ll do if the winds are going to last longer than what we initially forecast, then we would extend it. We don’t foresee that right now. What we do foresee is that the air tonight is going to remain very dry. Fire conditions will be categorized as ‘poor’ overnight, and so going into (Wednesday), that’ll lead to another day of very dry conditions across the area. That will include Howard County. But the wind will be less than what it is (Tuesday), so probably there won’t

be a red flag warning, but it will still be very dry and fire danger will probably be at least ‘high’ tomorrow.

Murdoch offered some advice regarding fire safety during dry conditions.

“They should be cautious doing things outdoors, whether it’s work, you know...building fence, or welding pipe or mowing the yard... anything that can cause a spark can set a fire off when the grass is dry enough,” he said. “Probably the most common-sensical thing people can do is be especially cautious with open flame or activities that can generate sparks.”

Howard County Volunteer Fire Chief Mitchell Hooper said Howard County has been under a burn ban for several weeks, but that status is determined by local officials – Howard County commissioners – while the Red-Flag warning is issued by the NWS.

Hooper said the NWS warning adds extra emphasis to the county’s prohibition on burning.

“On days like this, no burning outside,” he said. “Even days leading up to days like this, no burning outside. Another weather site issued a notice that Texas may not get rain until July...a good, soaking rain.”

While Howard County has been fairly lucky with regard to wildfires, the incidence of outdoor fires has been increasing.

because all of us would say, ‘Oh my, we’re right in the middle of this pandemic, and then you’re going to go ahead and raise values.’ The crazy thing is, if you look at values even here in Big Spring, the values are increasing above what they should have been in 2020. It’s being driven by an extremely low interest rate at the Reserve Bank. You can get 30-year mortgages now in the 2.5- to 3-percent range. That’s driving people to say, ‘I’d better buy a house while I can do it with this low an interest rate.’”

BSISD Superintendent Jay McWilliams said the district was denied a waiver for the incorrect appraisal because the situation hasn’t been corrected sufficiently to satisfy the State Comptroller.

Normally if that happens, you get a waiver, so it wouldn’t hurt us. But, because the MAPS (Methods and Assistance Program Study) was failed, we didn’t get a chance to file a waiver,” McWilliams said. “Last year it hurt us a little, but it’s really hurting us this year because the state comptroller said our values for Howard County are a little over \$3 billion, but the Appraisal District said it’s only \$2.8 billion. That may sound like it’s not a lot but that’s a lot of money. We’re not bringing in near as many dollars tax-wise as the state thinks we should.”

Petree added that, while property assessments will be going even higher, the district should be in compliance with the state in the near future.

In other business, the district heard a presenta-

tion by Mark Ball of Hellas Construction Inc. on the status of Memorial Stadium’s artificial turf, and what a replacement would cost. The issue was listed on the agenda as a discussion item only, and so was not up for a vote at the meeting.

A new installation by Hellas of artificial turf suggested by Ball at the stadium would cost \$798,000, although Ball offered a \$15,000 discount if the district signs off on the project by May 1.

Ball told trustees that the stadium’s current turf – installed in 2012 – is nearing the end of its lifespan, and already shows significant signs of wear.

McWilliams said the stadium’s current turf will undergo a Gmax test – measuring its ability to absorb force – next week.

“In simple terms, it’s a bounce test,” he said. “The basically go around with a machine and they drop it and it hits, and there’s a computer and it registers on there what the turf is.”

The superintendent added that the turf will need to be replaced either this year or next year due to safety concerns.

The board also approved: extension of the district’s current depository bank contract with BBVA; an agreement on audit services with Bolinger, Segars, Gilbert and Moss LLP accounting firm of Lubbock; a gift of \$1,500 to the Big Spring High School girls’ track team from Hillcrest Child Development Center; purchase of instructional materials for the district’s Pre-Kindergarten program; and hired staff and faculty for the 2021-22 school year.

At the end of the meeting, McWilliams announced that the school district now has a smartphone app available on Google Play and the Apple App Store.

Some 'do-overs' in life.

I vividly remember lively arguments with friends on the school playground. They often went something like this: "Hey, I messed that one up. I get a 'do-over'!" "No way! There are no 'do-overs'. You're out!" "If you give me a 'do-over' then I'll give you a 'do-over'." That could go on for some time. Golfers call them mulligans. The rest of us call them mistakes. The truth is that we could all use some 'do-overs' in life.

It has been that kind of season for me lately. There are some things I wish that I could go back and 'do-over' again. I have yet to discover a method of time travel, so that is out of the question. However, I am so thankful that we serve a God of second chances. He doesn't give up on us, but continues to give us loving guidance to course correct along the journey of life.

It makes me think of the story of Jonah, the prophet who deliberately ran away. After the Lord corrected his direction through a storm, and then sent a "great fish" to get him back on track, this is what God says to him: "Then the word of the Lord came to Jonah a second time: 'Go to the great city of Nineveh and proclaim to it the message I give

you.'" (Jonah 3:1-2) God didn't give up on Jonah, but kept calling him back. Time and time again throughout Scripture we see God giving His people 'do-overs'. I'm so thankful for this amazing grace that offers us second chances.

Maybe you feel like you need a 'do-over' today. As long as you still have breath in your body, God's grace is available to you.

We saw that clearly on Good Friday in Jesus response the the thief on the cross.

"Jesus answered him, 'Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in paradise.'" (Luke 23:43) The Word tells us whoever calls on the name of the Lord will be saved. If you are in need of a second chance, all you need to do is call on Him today.

Reflections: What about our soul

Most of our conversation, it seems, revolves around our bodies and money: how we look, how to stay healthy, how to remain young, how to become wealthy. We spent 2020 hunkered down, masked up and isolated just to stay alive.

Concern for our bodies drives a large segment of our economy. United States health care expense passed \$3.81 trillion in 2019. Most of this, of course, was corrective surgery and treatment, but elective cosmetic surgery totals more than 13 billion dollars.

This includes liposuction, breast augmentation and hair removal. The fitness industry with its books, talk-shows and exercise facilities is enormous. In 2014 fitness center revenues in the U.S. exceeded \$24 billion.

I can understand this. Since my body is the only one I have, I want to take care of it. Of course, I guess there are limits to which I want to do this. I love Blue Bell ice cream and I like to sit in the stands snacking on a hot dog while I watch healthier people compete on the field.

I can also understand our interest in money. We all have to pay our bills, and most of us have ambitions to own our home, drive a nicer car, send our kids to college and enjoy vacations.

But what happened to the concept of the soul? We seldom hear the word mentioned, including in our churches. Jesus taught that, as important as our bodies may be, nothing is as important as our soul.

Regarding the body in comparison to the soul, He said, "Do not be afraid

of those who can kill the body but cannot kill the soul. Rather, be afraid of the One who can destroy both soul and body in hell." With respect to money, Jesus said, "What good will it be for someone to gain the whole world, yet forfeit their soul? Or what can anyone give in exchange for their soul?"

Horatio G. Spafford, a wealthy lawyer in the 1860s, seemed to live a charmed life enjoying both health and wealth. But, in 1870, he lost his son to scarlet fever. When his wife's health began to fail, he decided to move his family to Europe. Delayed by his commitments at work, he sent his wife and four daughters ahead. On November 22, 1873, their ship sank at sea. Only his wife survived. Returning to the spot where the ship sank, Horatio Spafford stood looking over the swelling seas where his daughters drowned and wrote these words:

"When peace, like a river, attendeth my way, When sorrows like sea billows roll; Whatever my lot, Thou has taught me to say, It is well, it is well, with my soul."

Horatio and Anna Spafford spent the rest of their lives caring for homeless children, the poor and oppressed.

We are more than our bodies and more than our money. Our "soul" is who we really are, whether rich or poor, healthy or sick. Our soul is shaped by acts of kindness, honesty, virtue, generosity and faith. The destiny of every nation and every generation is ultimately determined by the soul of its people.

It seems like all of the motivational speeches I have heard always have some sort of financial something attached to them. At the end of most of these speeches, you might hear the speaker say something like – if you want to learn more about how to

be and do better, then, stop by my table at the back of the building on your way out and purchase my latest book. This is good if you are learning how to better maneuver in the business world.

But what about the church? What about our daily, intimate walk with God?

What about the topics that really matter, topics like love, forgiveness, faith, grace, mercy and acceptance? We should want to do and be better. But even more than doing right, our desire should be to live and grow in the fact that God has forgiven all our sins. And when I say all, I mean – past, present and future.

No amount of motivational speaking can convince me to believe that all of my sins have been forgiven. But I find that Christ's love constrains me to not only believe this great truth, but to embrace and accept it. You see, if I am motivated to do something, I am probably going to do it by my own power, my own desires, and maybe even by my fears or

anxiety. But believing that God loves us as we are, and not as we should be, cannot be accomplished by the power of motivational speeches, because these speeches always push us to do "good works". Well, the fact that God loves us as we are and not as we should be, tells us that there is no amount of good works that we could ever do to obtain His love or favor. We love God because

He first loved us. This means that we are still loved, even on the days that we lack the motivation or willpower to love Him.

To constrain means to compel or force; to urge with irresistible power. In God's love, mercy, forgiveness and acceptance, I find an irresistible power which presses me to believe on Christ because all of these things are free by His grace. And this constraining power can only be found in the love of Christ, that same Christ who is the end of the Law for righteousness to all who simply believe on His Name.

What were they thinking?

When my father passed from this earth to Heaven's glory, my heart was broken. I had lost my best mentor and friend. I travelled back to Northern Nevada where my roots were strong, to participate in the most devastatingly emotional experience of my 30 years of living. I went to pay my last respects to a man who spent his life making his family a great place to spend their growing up years. His wisdom helped me make many of my adult decisions I could pass on to my own family.

What I was thinking when I saw him last was mainly, "Now what?" Beyond that question I couldn't think what I would do without his wisdom. Then it came to me—I still have that same wisdom today to help me through this life. And best of all I'll see him again with all those who have gone from this life to Heaven above.

Have you ever wondered what the women at the tomb of Jesus were thinking as they approached the sealed tomb with no one with them to roll the stone away? Perplexity, desire to see His dear form one more time, desire to wrap the form of their beloved mentor in preserving spices and perfumed ointment, and emotionally respond once again to the dear face they had loved for three years or more, must have been just a few of their thoughts.

As the account of the women was told in Scripture, they approached the tomb of Jesus not expecting to see anyone there in sympathy with their need to anoint His body for a proper burial. They didn't get the fact that He rose again. They expected to have to find someone to roll the stone away. It certainly didn't happen as they expected. They were still wondering why it had to be that He even died.

When they did approach the tomb, the stone was rolled away. They were amazed, I'm sure, to say the least about their emotional state at that time.

Bidding quiz

You are South, both sides vulnerable. The bidding has been:

North	East	South	West
1♦	Pass	1♠	Pass
2♥	Pass	?	

What would you bid now with each of the following four hands?

- ♠AQ83♥K75♦1062♣QJ3
- ♠J9652♥84♦Q73♣K94
- ♠K9843♥10♦QJ85♠A106
- ♠AJ964♥KQ72♦9♠A32

- 1. Three notrump.** Partner obviously has a good hand, since he bid his suits in reverse order, running the risk that you might have to take a preference to three diamonds if you had a poor hand containing more diamonds than hearts. In the given sequence, partner should have more diamonds than hearts as well as at least 17 points.
- However, though the possibility of a slam exists, you really can't do more than jump to three notrump to show your extra values. It would be wrong to bid only two notrump, since you could do that with a much weaker hand.
- 2. Three diamonds.** With barely enough values for an initial response, you must try to slow partner down by bidding three diamonds. It is tempting to bid two notrump because of

your club stopper, but partner is likely to take such a bid more seriously than if you simply return to his first suit. If partner passes three diamonds, it is probably the best contract.

- 3. Four diamonds.** This hand is far better than the previous one, and you can show your additional values via a jump-raise to four diamonds. It is true that in doing so you are bypassing three notrump, but there is no assurance that that contract would prove safer than five diamonds, while there is a strong possibility that partner might want to investigate a slam once he hears your encouraging response. He might have the A-K of diamonds and two side aces, as well as other values sufficient to justify a reverse, in which case a slam is very likely to be made. This possibility should not be ignored.
- 4. Three clubs.** A small slam in hearts is already certain; the only remaining question is whether there might be a grand slam. Three clubs is a waiting bid as well as a cuebid, its chief purpose being to force partner to reveal more about his hand. If the auction develops favorably, you might wind up bidding a grand slam in hearts; if not, you won't settle for less than six.

Today in History

Today is Friday, April 9, the 99th day of 2021. There are 266 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On April 9, 1939, Marian Anderson performed a concert at the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C., after the Black singer was denied the use of Constitution Hall by the Daughters of the American Revolution.

On this date:

In 1682, French explorer Robert de La Salle claimed the Mississippi River Basin for France.

In 1865, Confederate Gen. Robert E. Lee surrendered his army to Union Lt. Gen. Ulysses S. Grant at Appomattox Court House in Virginia.

In 1940, during World War II, Germany invaded Denmark and Norway.

In 1942, during World War II, some 75,000 Philippine and American defenders on Bataan surrendered to Japanese troops, who forced the prisoners into what became known as the Bataan Death March; thousands died or were killed en route.

In 1959, NASA presented its first seven astronauts: Scott Carpenter, Gordon Cooper, John Glenn, Gus Grissom, Wally Schirra, Alan Shepard and Donald Slayton. Architect Frank Lloyd Wright, 91, died in Phoenix, Arizona.

In 1963, British statesman Winston Churchill was proclaimed an honorary U.S. citizen by President John F. Kennedy. (Churchill, unable to attend, watched the proceedings live on television in his London home.)

In 1967, the first test flight of Boeing's new 737 took place as the jetliner took off from Boeing Field in Seattle on a 2½-hour trip to Paine Field in Everett, Washington.

In 1968, funeral services, private and public, were held for Martin Luther King Jr. at the Ebenezer Baptist Church and Morehouse College in Atlanta,

five days after the civil rights leader was assassinated in Memphis, Tennessee.

In 1979, officials declared an end to the crisis involving the Three Mile Island Unit 2 nuclear reactor in Pennsylvania, 12 days after a partial core meltdown.

In 2003, jubilant Iraqis celebrated the collapse of Saddam Hussein's regime, beheading a toppled statue of their longtime ruler in downtown Baghdad and embracing American troops as liberators.

In 2005, Britain's Prince Charles married longtime love Camilla Parker Bowles, who took the title Duchess of Cornwall.

In 2010, Supreme Court Justice John Paul Stevens announced his retirement. (His vacancy was filled by Elena Kagan.)

Ten years ago: A man armed with several weapons opened fire in a crowded shopping mall in the Netherlands, killing six people before taking his own life. Sidney Lumet, the award-winning director of such American film classics as "Network," "Serpico," "Dog Day Afternoon" and "12 Angry Men," died in New York at age 86.

Five years ago: After weeks of frantic searching, Belgian authorities announced they had identified recently detained Paris attacks suspect Mohamed Abrini as the "man with the hat" who was spotted alongside two suicide bombers who blew themselves up at Brussels Airport the previous month.

One year ago: The government reported that 6.6 million people had sought unemployment benefits in the preceding week, bringing the total to 16.8 million in the three weeks since the coronavirus outbreak took hold. New York recorded another 799 deaths from the virus; it was the third straight day in which the daily total reached a new high. British Prime Minister Boris Johnson was moved out of intensive care at the

Gibson has strong rebound for Rangers in 2-1 win over Blue Jays

Kyle Gibson rebounded from a horrendous opening day start for Texas by striking out eight over six scoreless innings, and the Rangers beat the Toronto Blue Jays 2-1 in the rubber game of their three-game series Wednesday.

Gibson (1-0) scattered six hits with one walk while throwing 55 of 82 pitches for strikes.

"It was just nice for Gibby to get back out there and do what we expected with all of the work this guy has put in," manager Chris Woodward said. "He looked like the No. 1 today ... He kind of set the tone."

Six days earlier, in the first opening-day start for Gibson in his nine big league seasons, the Rangers led 5-0 at Kansas City before he had thrown his first pitch. But Gibson recorded only one out while facing eight batters and giving up five runs. It was the shortest opening day start in franchise history, the shortest in the majors since 1982 and the only time he failed to get out of the first inning.

Nick Solak homered off left-hander Hyun Jin Ryu (0-1), who struck out seven without a walk over seven innings.

"He's impressive, to see somebody pitch like that all of the time," Toronto manager Charlie Montoyo said. "He's our ace, and he gave us a chance."

Marcus Semien hit his third homer for the Blue Jays, a leadoff shot in the eighth.

Ian Kennedy, the third Texas reliever, struck out three around a hit in the ninth for his second save, both in less than 24 hours. The 36-year-old right-hander went to spring training on a minor league deal with Texas, which then lost potential closers

Jose Leclerc and Jonathan Hernandez to injuries.

Gibson got an out against the Blue Jays on Semien's flyball to left on the first pitch, and had five strikeouts the first time through the order. Toronto had the bases loaded with one out in the fifth after Semien walked before Cavan Biggio grounded into a double play.

"I don't know that I really needed to do too much work in between the ears honestly," Gibson said about his thoughts since the opener. "As I looked back on it ... I ended up creating some of the damage that they did just by not having good command."

Woodward said he would chalk up the first game to "opening day weirdness," then added, "This is what we were expecting."

Solak led off the Rangers second with his first home run this season. Catcher Jose Trevino reached on an infield single later in the inning and scored when Leody Taveras blooped a broken-bat single to short right.

Ryu has allowed only two runs in each of his two starts, with 12 strikeouts and only one walk, but the South Korean pitcher has gotten only three runs of support.

"Overall, it was a good outing," Ryu said through a translator. "I was able to make sure the hitters got soft contact, and that allowed me to throw seven innings."

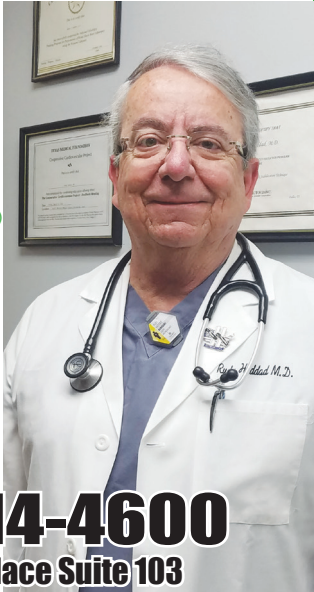
