1963 Car Inspection Stated Saturday, September 1st

Austin-Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today a new-type motor vehicle inspection sticker is now available for the new inspection year which began September 1.

"The only thing new about the inspection this year is the sticker itself," he said. "This new sticker is a dry mount decal which we believe will adhere regardless of weather conditions and one which has been used very successfully in other states."

More than five million vehicles registered in the state are required by law to be inspected at one of the 5,000 official inspection stations between this date and April 16, 1963. Owners of vehicles not displaying the current inspection sticker after that date will be in violation of the law.

Garrison urged motorists to get their vehicles inspected as early as possible, and pointed out: "With hard summer driving coming to an end, fall is an excellent time to have vehicles safety checked in preparation for the winter months."

In announcing the new inspection period, the public safety director said the Vehicle Inspection Program in Texas has proved itself to be a valuable tool in reducing accidents on Texas streets and highways.

Entertainment Expenses Under Scrutiny Of Internal Revenue Service

Uncle Sam's tax collection agency, the Internal Revenue Service, is taking a long critical look at tax abuses in the area of "entertainment expenses," "business travel," and "expense accounts."

Canceled checks alone are no longer being accepted as adequate substantiation for claimed expense. Consequently, before Mr. Hardworking Businessman gets too far off on the wrong foot with the IRS in 1962, Ellis Campbell, Jr., Dallas IRS district director, comes up with some helpful suggestions.

"Accurate record keeping is the best way to save federal tax money that I can think of," Campbell said.

"The following pointers can be as useful to our area self-employed folks as to corporation executives claiming deductions on personal tax returns for business expenses, whether reimbursed or not."

Campbell revealed that entertainment expense records should provide relation of the expenditure to the taxpayer's business, and the ordinary and necessary business purpose of the expense.

Records should show the name of the person or persons entertained, as well as the date and place of entertainment.

"Naturally," Campbell cautioned, "the amount of the expenditure must be ordinary and necessary. If the sum is sizeable, it's necessary for us to know whether the entertainment was paid by out-of-pocket cash, credit card, check, or charged to the employer."

WHEAT GROWERS APPROVE QUOTAS

Mitchell County's wheat growers last Thursday voted to keep the national wheat allotment of 55 million acres, and to keep national average crop support price for 1963 at \$1.82 per bushel.

A big majority of Mitchell County voters elected to keep the present program for wheat, 29 in number. Four growers voted for the referendum alternative which would lift wheat allotments completely but pay growers 50% parity instead of the 82% now in effect.

The Loraine territory and a big portion of Mitchell County received some good rains during the weekend. On Friday, the last day of August, .95 of an inch fell here in town. North of town the fall was heavier some reporting as much as two inches. South of town the fall ranged from about the amount received here in town down to a half inch or less.

Sunday late in the afternoon a hard shower came from the Northwest giving Loraine the biggest rain for weeks, the fall amounting to 1.65 here in town with the heavy rain extending South a short distance. North of town the fall was some lighter than it was here and around Lone Wolf Cemetery no rain fell on Sunday but they received 2 inches Friday.

The Wiley Walker home place reported some hail fell Sunday but not enough to do much damage. High wind accompanied the storm here but very little hail fell.

All told during the weekend Loraine received 2.65 inches of moisture. Late cotton will benefit greatly from the rain. Earlier cotton may benefit some but to what extent it will benefit will depend upon the frost.

Three inches of rain that fell all through the night Tuesday was by far the best rain Loraine has received this year. This brought the total since last Friday to 5.70 here in town. Parts of the territory reported more rain and parts reported less but every part has received some rain.

First Dose Polio Vaccine September 16

Every citizen of the Loraine community is again reminded that Sunday, September 16, is Sabin Oral Vaccine Day in Loraine and Mitchell County.

On that day free Sabin Oral Vaccine will be issued to every citizen of the community above three months of age. No one should fail to take the vaccine. It is different from the vaccine heretofore given which only prevented paralysis. Sabin Oral vaccine is designed to immunize against polio without producing clinical illness. Sabin Oral is pleasant tasting.

Sabin Oral vaccine is given in three doses several weeks apart which immunizes against all three types of polio viruses. The dose to be issued on September 16 is the first of three.

Every citizen should mark down in his date book to be at the Loraine school on Sunday, September 16, 1962, between the hours of 12 and 6 p.m. to get his Sabin Oral vaccine. This vaccine has no side effects and is absolutely safe to take.

Everyone is urged to take the vaccine in that way carriers of the disease will be immunized as well as those who might take it. Even if you are old and there is not much chance that you will ever have the disease yourself you may be a carrier and you might transmit the disease to one of your children or grandchildren, or any other child. Be on the safe side get your Sabin Oral vaccine.

MEN WANTED FOR FUTURE MISSILEMEN

Twenty-five missilemen will be enlisted September 27th for assignment to the Nike Hercules Missile Unit surrounding Abilene, Captain William L. Huffman, the Abilene U. S. Army Recruiting Main Station Commander, announced today.

Captain Huffman said that men will be enlisted to serve in the Abilene unit from nine major cities and their surrounding areas under the Abilene Recruiting Main Station. The cities are Abilene, Snyder, Big Spring, San Angelo, Brownwood, Mineral Wells, Vernon, Midland and Odessa.

Colonel Pete D. Pavick, Commanding Officer of the U. S. Army Missile Unit, said in an interview today that the young men who have enlisted from West Texas for his unit have made outstanding soldiers and missilemen.

The U. S. Army Recruiters in West Texas enlisted 55 men as a group for assignment to the unit in February 1960 and another group of 25 in June of this year. The Recruiters also have enlisted approximately 40 men individually since June of 1960. These young men are now occupying many key positions in the unit. They have the ability to receive technical training quickly, and they are performing jobs which are very important to the successful accomplishment of the mission of this unit.

As the Commanding Officer of the unit, I am very happy to have young men from the surrounding area enlist for assignment to the Abilene Missile Unit," said Colonel Pavick.

Captain Huffman emphasized that assignment to the Abilene Missile Unit is guaranteed, but satisfactory performance of duty and needs of the Army will be a requirement in later assignment of personnel. The men who enlist for the Abilene Missile Unit must pre-qualify for enlistment between September 1st and September 25th. They will be sworn into the Army as a group on September 27th. The group will then depart for eight weeks of basic training. Upon completion of basic training, the men will return to the Abilene Missile Unit.

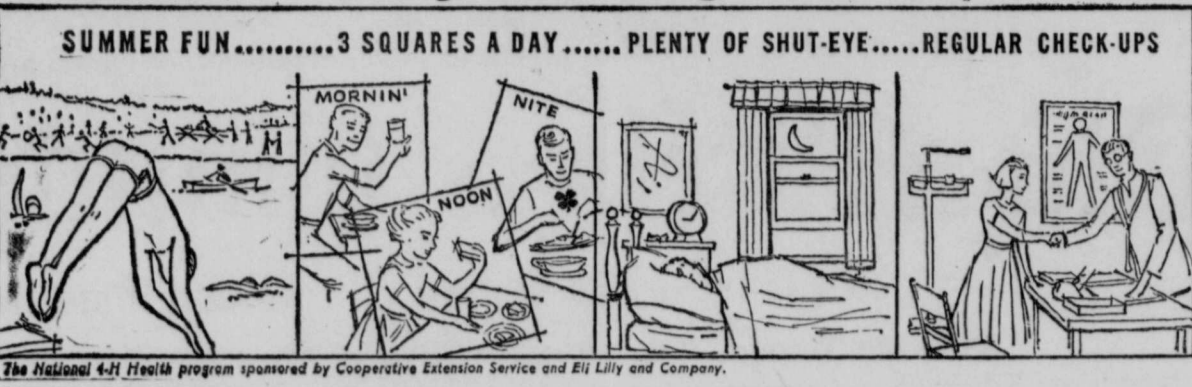

TEXAS PERSONAL INCOME AT RECORD HIGH IN 1961

Personal income, the most comprehensive gauge of consumer purchasing power available on a state basis, totaled \$414 billion for the country as a whole in 1961, a rise of \$15 billion, or 4 percent over 1960 according to Harry C. Meyers, Manager of the Dallas Field Office of the U. S. Department of Commerce.

Nationally, per capita income last year amounted to \$2,263 or 2 percent above the previous record of \$2,215 attained in 1960, Mr. Meyers stated.

In Texas, the rise in personal income was up 6 percent in 1961 over 1960, against the rise for the nation of 4 percent. Total personal income for Texas in 1961 was \$19.5 billion, up a billion dollars from \$18.5 billion in 1960. Only seven other states; Kentucky, Mississippi, Arkansas, Arizona, Colorado, Nevada, and Hawaii out ranked Texas in gain in personal income between 1960 and 1961. Nevada led all states with a 10 percent increase, followed by Arkansas with 9 percent, then Arizona increased 6 percent in 1961 over 1960.

Details on personal income for 1961 are presented in the August issue of the Survey of Current Business, copies of which may be obtained from the U. S. Department of Commerce, Dallas Field Office, 500 South Ervay Street, Dallas 1, Texas.

Farm Facts

A mathematician at the console of an electronic digital computer is helping U. S. Department of Agriculture scientists do research on animals, plants, and soils, and in chemistry, engineering, and home economics.

According to Agricultural Research, obtaining valid conclusions from even a simple experiment may involve hundreds of samples, thousands of observations and measurements, and many thousands of calculations.

That's why Agricultural Research Service scientists are serviced by a small group of highly trained programmers and analysts who use a digital computer to reduce calculation time to hours.

For example, the computer was used to determine the effectiveness of 35 insecticides tried at various dosage levels on biting flies of different ages. The flies were living under various climatic conditions.

To get valid conclusions, approximately 1,000 calculations were needed for each insecticide. It took about three hours to make these 35,000 calculations. Without the computer, the job would have taken more than five weeks.

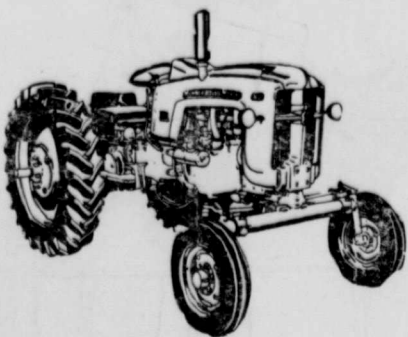

Like to fish for "whites"? Only a few short years ago the white bass (Lepomis chrysops or Roccus chrysops) was almost unknown to Texas anglers. But Mississippi River Valley fishermen had been familiar with this wonderful game fish for a long time.

In Texas, white bass appeared first in Caddo Lake, then spread over the state. Actually, these fish are direct descendants of the big saltwater striped bass. They adapted themselves to freshwater conditions and thrived. Now they are found from the Great Lakes to Mexico from Alabama through Texas.

Up to 5 pounds is claimed as a world's record for a white. However, no "official" record ever has been made.

This freshwater bass is a great scrapper. It strikes hard and keeps on scrapping until hooked.

Whites are easy to recognize. They are a silvery color on back and sides, yellow white on the belly. Black stripes that are rather indistinct relieve the unbroken silver on each side.

Distinguishing marks are the medium long mouth set horizontally in a scaly, rather conical head. White bass fins are distinctly separated. A fairly high back along with a flat perched body give white bass even more distinction.

White bass like still, deep water with a sandy, gravelly bottom. Usually the species is found in medium and large lakes and streams—seldom in small streams or tank ponds.

During February and March (and sometimes as late as April and May) the white bass in Texas move upstream looking for likely spawning grounds in shallow flowing water. Lake whites seek shallow stream inlets, while river whites prefer the sand bars.

Eggs are laid among rocks or weeds in very shallow water. No attempt is made to protect these eggs when once deposited, nor even to build a nest. The female dumps her eggs apparently with no maternal feeling. When the job is done she heads for deep water as fast as she can.

Females have been known to lay over half a million eggs at one time. Once hatched, the young remain in shallow water until strong, then migrate to deep water.

In Texas most white bass are found in big lakes such as Buchanan, Inks, Granite, Shoals, Travis, Corpus Christi (Lake Mathis, Falcon (on the Mexican border) and of course Lake Caddo their point of origin in Texas. So common are white bass in

most Texas lakes that it is not too far-fetched to claim that more than half of all game fish caught in the Lone Star State are of this species.

Schooling habits of the white bass, and the voracity with which it feeds, make for fantastic catches when the whites are running. Hundreds can be caught from one big school once it is located.

How do you locate a school of whites? Most fishermen on the big lakes cruise about, watching for concentrations of feeding seagulls. Once such a flock is found, the fishermen hurry to that spot.

If bass are there the surface will be rippled where thousands upon thousands of gizzard shad are feeding. The white bass are just beneath, gobbling up the shad.

Often the bait is grabbed the instant the gold or silver spoon (such as a Dixie Jet), or an underwater spinning lure (like the Abu), starts flashing through the water.

Fishing then is fast and furious until the school moves on. White bass may be found almost anywhere that food is plentiful.

On warm nights try fishing with small, live minnows. A Coleman lantern suspended over the water, from a boat or dock, will attract bugs. Fish are drawn to the bugs that fall into the water.

Small fish, crustaceans and insects form the major portion of the white bass diet. However, it doesn't take a biologist to inform Texas fishermen that this great game fish goes all out for gizzard shad.

White bass seldom live longer than four or five years. However, they grow fast. They reach a length of 12 inches, or longer, in two years from the date of hatching. Such fast growth, coupled with a short life span, makes for quick population turnovers.

However, they multiply so fast that strict bag limits are not necessary. So fish to your heart's content, for whites.

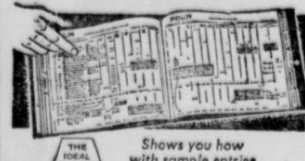

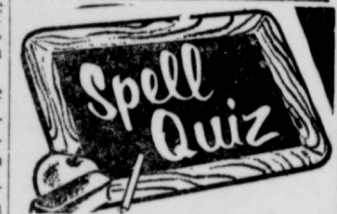

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. What are the conditions on which a U. S. veteran may receive medical care at VA expense in the foreign country in which he is residing?

A. He must be a U. S. citizen, must be residing only temporarily in the foreign country, and must need medical care for a disease or disability that has been ruled service-connected by the Veterans Administration. The exception is for veterans of United States military service who live in the Philippines, where these conditions do not apply.

Q. I am a Korean veteran and have not yet changed my original "RS" insurance policy. What are the options?

A. You may (1) exchange it for a term policy that will cost you about one-third of what you are now paying but cannot be renewed as term insurance after you reach age 50. You can convert to a permanent plan before you reach 50. Or you may (2) convert your present policy to a permanent plan now. If you exercise either of these options before September 14, 1963, you will receive a special dividend.

Q. Can I take advantage at this date of the law that went into effect in 1960 that gave veterans, widows and orphans an increase in pensions?

A. Yes, you should get all the facts and then determine whether the new or old pension plan is the best for you.

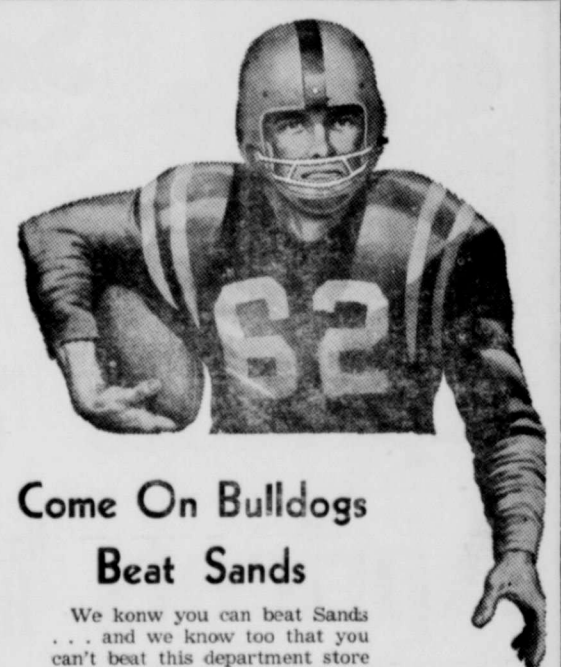

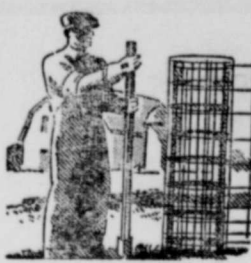

GAS TAX BEING REFUNDED

Want to add a nice chunk of cash to this year's farm income? Farmers who do are reminded that they may now submit claims for federal gas tax refunds, according to Buddy C. Logsdon, Mitchell County Agricultural Agent.

The refund may be received for all gasoline used for agricultural purposes on a farm or ranch, Logsdon says. Claims should include fuel used by the operator himself or by custom operators working for him, he added. However, fuel used in vehicles on roads and highways is not eligible for refund.

The claim for federal refunds must be made from July to Sept. 30 on gasoline used between July 1 of 1961 and June 30, 1962. The procedure is simple and all farmers who filed claims last year will receive Form 2240 in the mail this year. Farmers who did not file last year may obtain the forms from their county agent or from the Internal Revenue Service, according to Buddy C. Logsdon. He also suggests that a copy of Publication 308 of the Internal Revenue Service may be of help to the applicant.

The federal gas tax refund should not be confused with the State refund which is for a shorter period of only six months, explains Buddy Logsdon. This refund involves a more complicated process and additional information should be obtained from the State Department of Internal Revenue in Austin.

Also, Logsdon reminds that any points that are uncertain should be checked on before the claim is filed and that farmers should keep their records to verify claims submitted.

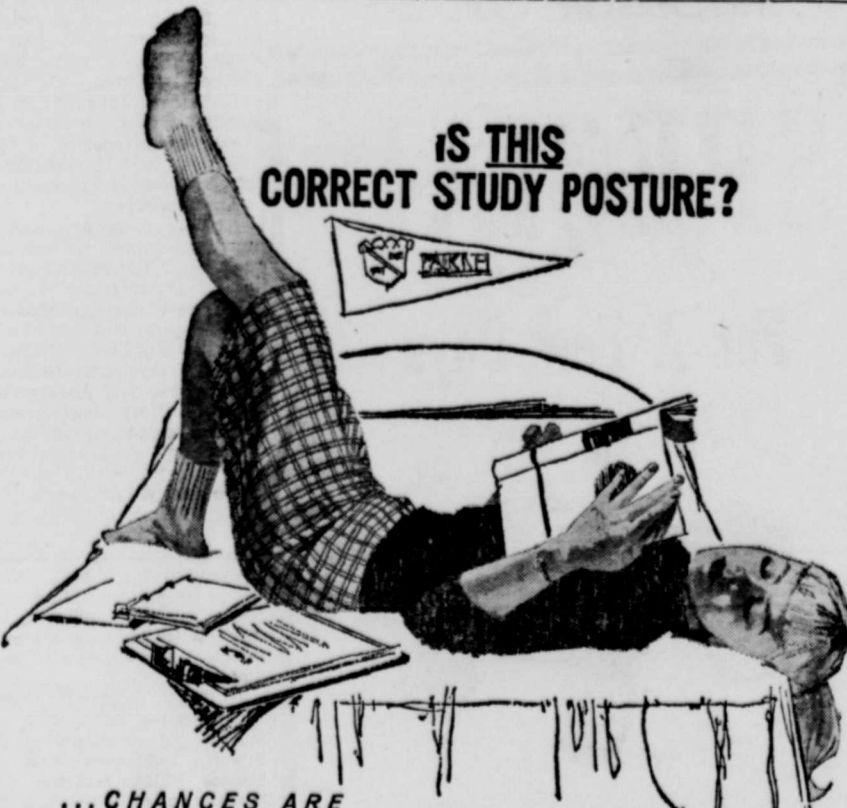
