Three Accidents Occur Here, One Claims Two Lives

Three accidents in as many days occurred within a two-mile distance of Hart last week resulting in fatalities to a Plainview man and another from Edcouch.

The first accident happened at 1:30 p.m. Wednesday on State Highway 194 1.8 miles southeast of town. Melvin Leon Morton of Edmonson, driving

an empty 1972 Mack truck came upon a bobtail truck which was preparing to make a right hand turn into a grain field. Oncoming traffic would not allow Morton to pass the braking truck so he drove his vehicle off the road into a field where he struck an unloaded grain cart.

The unloaded truck and empty

cart were believed to have prevented the accident from being fatal to Morton. Investigating officers were Department of Public Safety Officers Bill Scott and Dyrle Maples of Dimmitt.

Thursday morning, approximately 10:20 a.m., a second accident occurred near the

Rites Conducted Monday For Widow Of Founder

Graveside services were conducted Monday at Lawn Haven Memorial Gardens Cemetery in Clovis, N.M. for Mrs. T.W. Hart, step-mother of Percy Hart. Officiating was James Wilbanks, minister of Farwell Church of Christ. Mrs. Hart was the widow of the late T.W. Hart for whom the city was named. She died Sunday in a Clovis hospital. She was 92.

A graduate of North Texas State Teachers College in Denton, she taught in the Plainview School system in 1907 and taught at one time in Canyon.

The former Elmina D. Robinson, Mrs. Hart taught at Lone Star School, located four miles south and one mile east of Hart. Important Issues Of Constitution To Be Discussed Here Monday

Amarillo attorney Jim Blair of Perdue, Brandon and Blair law firm will be guest speaker at 7:30 p.m. Monday in the school cafeteria. The public meeting

has been arranged for the discussion of the new Texas state constitution which will be placed before the electorate Nov. 4.

Everyone should attend, especially eligible voters, and participate in the discussion so that persons might be better qualified to vote intelligently on the issue. All persons are invited to bring friends and

neighbors. The meeting is sponsored by Hart Lions Club.

One of the issues which will be brought to the attention of those present is that under the new constitution the law can be so interpreted as to allow the evaluation of Texas farm land for tax purposes to be set by the comptroller of public accounts in Austin.

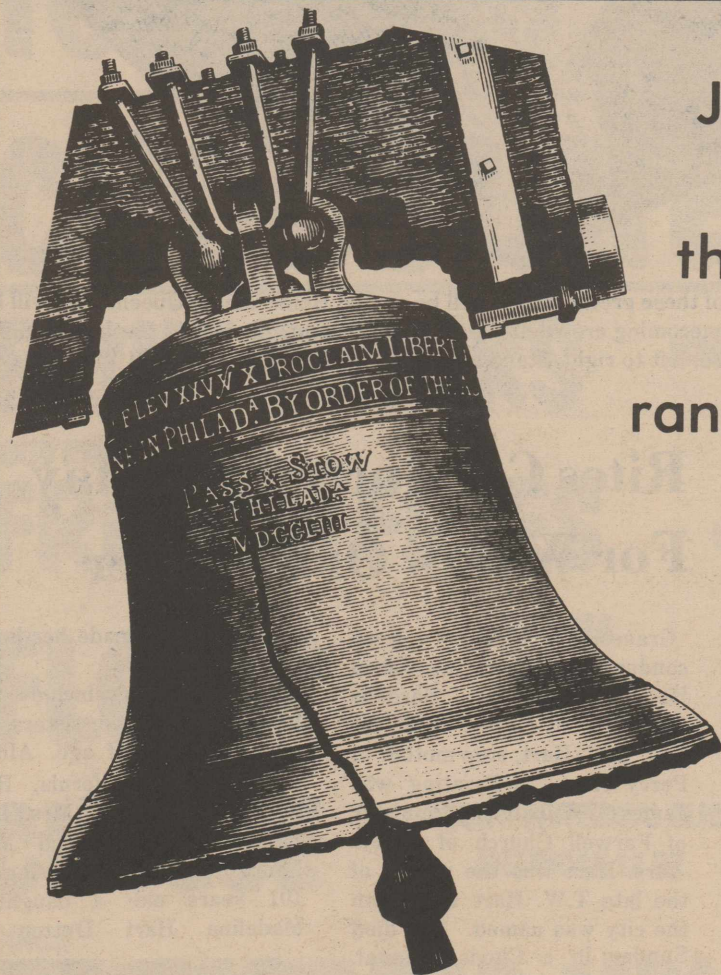

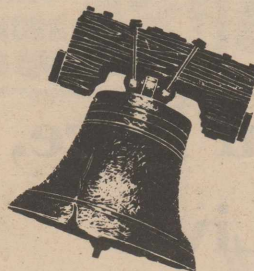

School Board Accepts Bid For Re-Evaluation Aid

School board members, meeting in regular session Monday evening, accepted a bid from Ad Valorem Tax Consultant Jim McMorries of Hereford to re-evaluate the Hart School District. Cost of the re-evaluation is \$6,000 with the school district paying the County Commissioners Court \$1,500 for the information at the tax office.

City of Hart has an option of entering into the contract at a cost of \$1,000. The re-evaluation was forced on the school district by the new school finance laws passed last spring by the state legislature and governor.

Local fund assignment for the Hart School District, that portion of the Foundation Program that the local district is required to raise, has doubled for the 1975-76 school year from \$46,000 to \$92,000. It will be \$138,000 for the 1976-77 school year since it is guaranteed by law that the assignment shall

When there's a bit of time left over from her busy schedule as wife and mother, Elsie likes to do handcrafts.

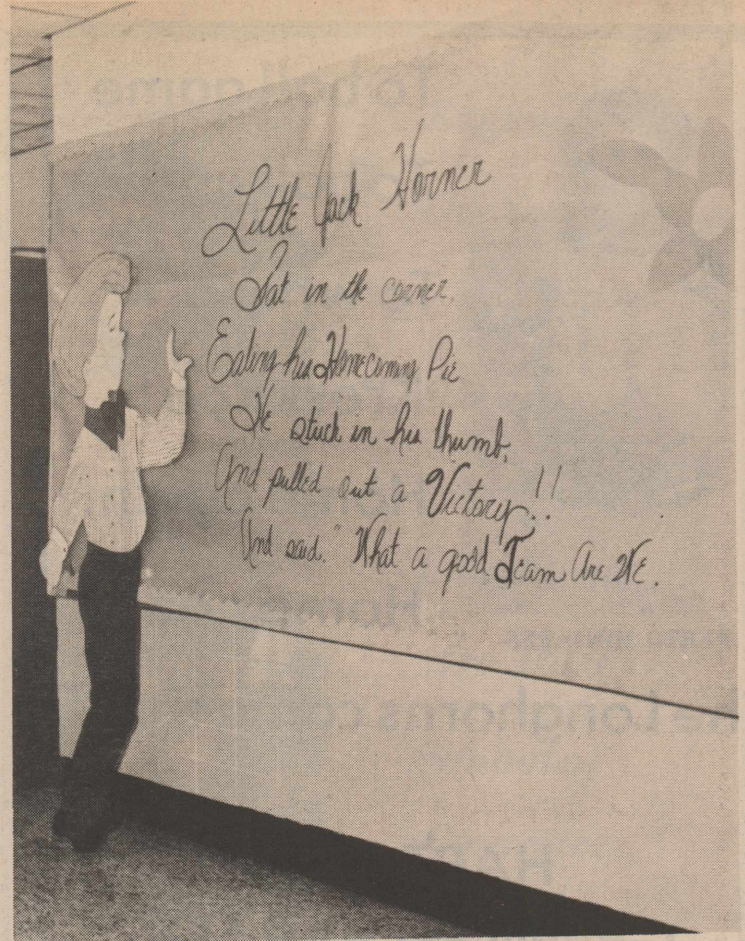
CORN FLAKE CHEWS

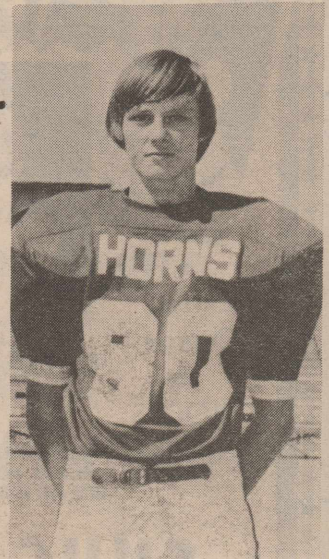

Mix in the above order. Add 1/2 cup chopped pecans. Mix well and bake in greased, floured loaf pan at 350 degrees for about 40 or 50 minutes. Let cool while cooking topping.

GLAZE
1/2 c sugar
1/4 c water
1/2 t vanilla
Mix and bring to a boil for about 1 minute, then spread on cake.

PECAN KISSES
2 egg whites
one eighth t salt
2 c sifted powdered sugar
1 t vinegar
1 t vanilla
1 1/2 c pecan halves or broken pieces
In mixing bowl beat egg whites with salt until soft peaks form. Gradually beat in sugar, vinegar and vanilla and continue beating until very stiff. Fold in pecans, drop by teaspoonfuls on greased bakng sheet. Bake at 300 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes or until firm. Note: Cookies should remain light colored. Cool on wax paper.

CVAE Students Study Fire

Students of CVAE classes have been working some two weeks on fire prevention study and demonstrations. Working with students were Mr. and Mrs. J.V. Wescott, Jerry Jansa and David Knox.

"Basically," Knox says, "we learned effective ways to put out fires and learned what fires really were and why things burn."

First hand study of fire extinguishers was an emphasis in the study. "Students learned what was inside an extinguish-

er and how they work." Jansa and Knox demonstrated the proper use of extinguishers and some students were allowed to use them.

"We also learned how to put out gas and oil fires -- demonstrating the use of CO-2 and dry chemicals. Students learned that water was very ineffective."

Knox said the project also included first hand experience in extinguishing burning wood fires and putting out fires on clothing.

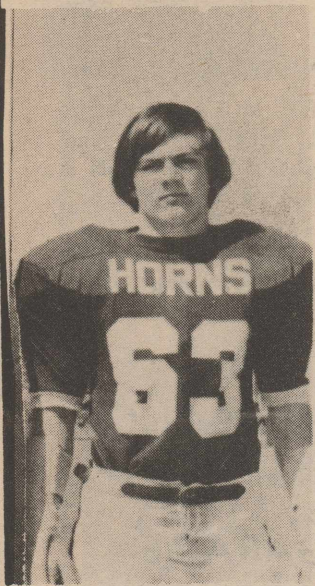

provided by the Canyon Fire Department.

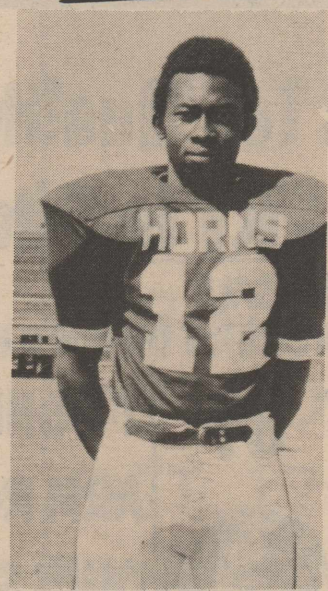
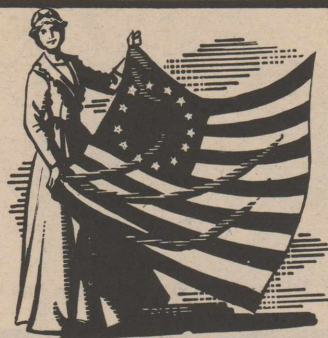
Following a brief orientation, the firemen were transported to the drill field where they fought controlled fires in three separate projects, which included LPG fires, truck spill fires, and house fires.
