By City Commission

Water Rates Adjusted

City commission met July 27 with Bill Ritter, Jerrie Horton and Ronnie Truelock present.

Kaci Jones of Brown, Graham and Co. of Tulia met with the commission to discuss and present the 1980-81 audit, which was accepted by the commission.

Commissioners voted to raise water rates in order to cover the rise in operating expenses. The minimum for

5000 gallons will remain at \$7.50 while the cost per thousand will be increased from 50 cents to 70 cents, effective with the Sept. 20 reading. Water tap fee was set at \$150 for three-fourths inch tap, \$200 for one inch tap and \$300 for two inch tap. Sewer taps will increase from \$20 to \$75.

Discussion on building codes resulted in adoption of a code to be drawn up later.

The commission voted to install two flashing beacons on Broadway for a school crossing to insure safety for children crossing the street going to school.

Next meeting is slated Aug. 24 at 8 p.m. in City Hall.

She moved to Dawson County in 1924 and to Hart in 1951. Mr. Welty, a farmer, died Dec. 8, 1973.

Melvin Barton, spokesman for the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, says the corn will be offered for unrestricted use sale at market prices, but not less than the formula price established by the Commodity Credit Corporation.

Barton says the minimum amount of corn that will be considered for acceptance is 1,000 bushels. Offers will be received and sales will be made on a first come, first served basis.

Energas Company Asks Hike In Natural Gas Rates

Energas Company today notified the 63 cities on its West Texas City Plant System that the company is filing for new rates for natural gas service to residential and certain business customers, effective, Sept. 4, 1981.

For the average residential customer on the system, the proposed new rate would increase the cost of a thousand cubic feet of gas by 63 cents, from \$3.40 to \$4.03.

The proposed new rates apply to domestic and commercial type, small industrial, and large air conditioning customers on the West Texas City Plant System of Energas. About 180,000 customers are affected, in an area extending from Pampa to Odessa.

Energas officials said the decision to file for new rates was made after a study by an independent consulting firm revealed that revenues from the West Texas City Plant System in 1980 were \$22.4 million less than the cost of service. The new rates are expected to increase Energas revenues about \$18.5 million, they said.

"It has been three years since the last rate increase was requested in West Texas City Plant System rates," Charles Vaughan, Energas president, said. "During that time, the consumer price index has increased about 40 percent and our costs for material, labor and taxes have increased proportionally. These increases coupled with certain inadequacies in our purchased gas adjustment clause have produced a serious deficiency in earnings from the system."

Vaughan said that, while the new rates cannot change the imbalance between revenues and costs that occurred in recent years, they can restore the balance somewhat for the future.

"To provide the service our customers expect, Energas must be able to make commitments for gas supplies well into the future. To do that, the company obviously must have revenues that approximate its present costs," he said.

To the West Texas system customers affected by the change, the new rates will mean an average increase of about

18.5 percent. For an average residential customer on the system, using 107 thousand cubic feet per year, the typical monthly bill would increase \$5.61, from \$30.32 to \$35.93.

After receiving notification of the rate change, the governing bodies of the 63 cities and towns on the system may take no action at all, in which case the rate change becomes effective Sept. 4, 1981. If the cities decide to act on the request, they are required by law to study the filing made by the Company and set rates accordingly. However, when the 1978 change was proposed, the cities formed a committee to study the request and to recommend what action by taken. Energas officials said it is possible that a similar procedure may be followed on the current rate request.

Energas Company is a division of Pioneer Corporation, a diversified energy resources corporation, headquartered in Amarillo.

SOYBEAN SITUATION—Soybeans will likely face ups and downs in the marketplace this year, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Since many Texas growers have considerable expenses tied up in their crop this year due to replanting costs and can expect lower yields from late plantings, forward contracting to assure a profit on at least part of the crop might be a good bet. Market prices by harvest time will depend on weather conditions the rest of the growing season, the overall U.S. crop and export demands.

Ag Update

FROM CONGRESSMAN KENT HANCE

RECENT SALES OF CCC CORN IN TEXAS -- Responding to the Soviet Union invasion of Afghanistan in December 1979, President Carter imposed a partial embargo of agriculture commodities and high technology against the USSR on Jan. 4, 1980. In an effort to ease the pressure the embargo caused on U.S. markets, the President directed the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) to purchase and store all grain intended for sale to Russia. About 51 million bushels of this CCC-owned corn were diverted to the Texas Panhandle, with transportation, storage and interest paid by the government.

Recently, Department of Agriculture officials decided to upgrade corn in storage by selling, at a rate of 50 hopper cars per week, all corn graded less than Number 3 yellow, but the rate was reduced to 30 hopper cars per week at the insistence of the High Plains Congressional Delegation. Reducing the volume of grain to be sold each week does not solve the problem, but it is an effort to keep the CCC from destroying our local market until an export market for the remainder of the CCC-owned corn can be found.

If necessary, I will introduce legislation to prohibit the CCC from selling the corn stored in the Panhandle for domestic use. This will force the CCC to sell this corn on the export market.

1981 FARM BILL - The House should vote soon on the 1981 Farm Bill, which, as it is now written, is one of the worst pieces of farm legislation I have ever seen. All commodity loan rates are too low, the Disaster Program has been replaced by Federal Crop Insurance, and the Dairy Program has been butchered. I am hopeful the Agriculture Committee can improve the bill before it comes up for a vote by the entire House membership.

ESTATE AND GIFT TAX REFORM -- Almost certainly, Congress will soon approve substantial relief from federal estate and gift taxes. At the minimum, Congress probably will phase in an increase in the estate tax exclusion so that estates up to \$600,000 are exempt from the federal estate tax. Additionally, the gift tax exclusion should be increased to \$10,000 from \$3,000, along with an unlimited marital deduction. Special use valuation also may be revised. These reforms are important to preserve family farms and closely held businesses.

Cook Of The Week

It must have been a moment of weakness - in the brain, that is - for me to decide, "I'll be 'Cook of the Week' myself." Of course there is no one who clips more recipes, who drools more over food or who craves more cookbooks than I...and then I wonder, "What's for supper?"

So, what better time to jump into the water than when I'm away from the scene - now, you'll have forgotten by the time I see you again.

The recipes I share are some that have won my seal of approval and, in general, that of my family or friends. I did not say My Better Half. Gene - and sometimes my children - have often been known to wonder, what will she serve next? It's surprising they've not organized a chapter of Reluctant Guinea Pigs Incorporated.

The Veg All salad is a delish recipe given me by Delores Burch...the Yankee Tortilla Casserole, I clipped from a cook in the Kress Chronicle. I cannot recall how long and from where I got the lime Jello salad but the yummy strawberry one came from a collector cookbook of Deaf Smith County cooks.

Although it seems I've always lived in Olton, I am a transplanted Oakie. I was almost two when my parents came to the Valleyview Community northeast of town from Olustee, Okla. We moved into town in 1941.

Little did I realize in high school that a silly little pastime would someday be a phase of the job I have today. Many idle hours...and much notebook paper...were filled with my society editor writings. With wild imagination, I wrote detailed accounts of the nuptial vows of make-believe brides and grooms. When I secretly developed a crush on Gene, the far-fetched names were alias monikers for Gene and Mozelle. Some 25 years later, I'm writing real accounts of real brides and grooms.

A bored old woman is something I don't intend to be. There are so many things I want to do...and plan to do...if only I get "a round tuit." I want to read, read, read! I want to crochet, embroider, pickle and paint! I want to

visit, to go, to do and to see! And, someday, I want to dig into my past -- to discover my roots....skeletons don't scare me.

There are so many items on my list of favorite things that I'd have to borrow phrase from Maria in the "Sound of Music" and say... "These are a few of my favorite things...."

Gandbabies...stained glass windows....green grass in spring....okra....iris...guppies...jig saw puzzles....hot bread...Lions...figurines...paintings....Christmas....photographs....old friends....new friend....strawberries...baseball... "Little House On The Prairie"...ice cream...old keepsakes....and Gene.

VEG ALL SALAD

1 can Veg All, drained
1 8 oz can French style green beans, drained
1 8 oz can whole kernel corn, drained
1 med fresh cauliflower, diced
5 radishes, sliced (I don't count!)
2 oz jar stuffed olives, sliced
1 sm onion, chopped

Toss with dressing made of ½ c mayonnaise (not salad dressing), ¼ c wine vinegar, French salad dressing to taste. (Use #303 cans of green beans and corn if you're serving several people) Keeps well in covered container in refrigerator.

LIME JELLO SALAD

1 lg pkg lime Jello
1 c boiling water
1 8 oz pkg cream cheese
1 15 oz can crushed pineapple
1 c chopped pecans
1 10 oz 7-Up

Dissolve Jello in boiling water. Add cream cheese. (I like to allow cheese to reach room temperature and dissolve Jello-cheese in blender). Add pineapple and 7-Up. Refrigerate until almost set, whip and add pecans. Allow to congeal.

STRAWBERRY RED HOTS SALAD

1 6 oz pkg strawberry Jello
1 c red hots
3 c boiling water
1 carton frozen strawberries

½ c pecans

1 15 oz can crushed pineapple, undrained

1 8 oz pkg cream cheese, softened

Dissolve red hots in boiling water, stirring while dissolving. Add Jello and stir till dissolved. Add frozen strawberries and stir till thawed. Reserve ½ c pineapple and add remainder to Jello mixture. Pour half this mixture into clear 9x13 Pyrex dish. Refrigerate till set. Blend cream cheese with ½ c pineapple and nuts. Spread over congealed Jello. Top with remaining Jello mixture. Return to refrigerator and let set till firm. Very good, very pretty.

YANKEE TORTILLA CASSEROLE

12 tortillas

1 sm can green chilies

½ lb (or more) hamburger

1 lg onion, chopped

1 can cream mushroom soup

½ can milk

Garlic salt, pepper to taste

Grated cheese

Brown hamburger and ½ onion in skillet. Drain grease. Grate cheese in bowl, add chilies, ½ raw onion and meat mixture. Mix well. Put in tortillas as you would enchiladas. Roll and place in baking dish. Cover with mushroom soup and milk which have been mixed together. Bake in 350° oven 20 mins. or long enough for sauce to bubble. Top with more cheese if desired.
