BUYS WHEAT FOR \$1 BUSHEL CASH; USES IT ON SUBSCRIPTION

The Herald is receiving a very
nice response from its announce-
ment that it will take wheat
at \$1.00 per bushel on the pay-
ment of subscriptions up until
August 15. Already many have
taken advantage of the offer
and have brought their wheat
in while many others have not
notified this office that they will
bring in their wheat.
In its announcement, the
Herald requested that all par-
ties who did not raise their own
wheat, purchase it direct from
a farmer and pay him no less
than fifty cents a bushel for
the wheat. One instance has
been called to our attention
where a dollar a bushel was paid
for the wheat to turn in.
W. H. Kuhn brought in two
bushels of wheat the first week,
purchased from Mrs. Clara Al-
len at this price. When asked
about the deal Mr. Kuhn stated
that he did not raise wheat
and did not feel that it was right
for him to take advantage of
the offer under any other
conditions. He also felt that some-
one should benefit from the of-
fer as his subscription was due,
so he paid his two dollars to
Mrs. Allen for wheat to turn in
on his subscription.

**Panhandle Teachers Institute At
Canyon, September 3-4-5;
Josh Lee Will Speak**

CANYON, Tex., July 28.—(Spe-
cial)—The largest attendance in its
history is expected when the Pan-
handle Teacher Institute holds its
annual session in Canyon on Sep-
tember 3, 4 and 5. Teachers from
twenty Panhandle counties will at-
tend.

**FRANK FOILES TURNED OVER
TO SHERIFF BARNETT ON
FELONY IS TAKEN IN
PERRYTON**

TELEPHONE MANAGER SAYS SHATTUCK STORY IN ERROR

R. B. Fairly, general manager of
the Standard Telephone Co. with
offices at Lubbock, writes A. F.
Yaggey, district manager of Perry-
ton, as follows in regard to the story
recently printed in the Ochiltree
County Herald with reference to the
installation of the common battery
system at Shattuck. We quote in
part as follows:

"In the first place, no thought
has entered our minds as discrimi-
nating between Perryton and Shat-
tuck. As a matter of fact, we pro-
pose installing common battery
equipment in both exchanges and
the Perryton installation is sched-
uled ahead of the Shattuck job.
"Our construction program this
year has not progressed as rapidly

paring the budget during 1930. This
was brought about through the
change in financial conditions of
which we are all aware.
"We have always considered Perry-
ton as one of our key towns and,
as such, have established district
headquarters from which to super-
vise our operations in that section."

CHARGED WITH "DOPE" THEFT

**SUSPECT TAKEN IN BEAVER
DRUG STORE ROBBERY OF
SEVERAL MONTHS
BACK**

The value of the Bureau of Identi-
fication at the sheriff's office in
Perryton was again demonstrated
during the past week in the clear-
ing up of a drug store robbery at
Beaver, Okla., a case of several
months standing, when Virgil Blake
was turned over to Beaver county
officials and charged with the of-
fense.

The drug store was entered three
or four months ago and a large
quantity of morphine and other nar-
cotics taken. Officer W. J. Pottorff,
chief of the Bureau of Identification
and Investigation was called to
Beaver to take finger prints off of
the articles in the store and four
prints were found.

On Monday evening of this week
Blake was arrested at Woodward,
Okla., as a suspect of the depot rob-
bery at Booker and brought to Per-
ryton for finger printing. He was
cleared of having anything to do
with the depot job but on referring
to his files, Officer Pottorff im-
mediately connected him with the
drug store robbery.

Sheriff Don Griggwood was notifi-
ed and came down after Blake tak-
ing him to Beaver to await trial in
district court. Blake is said to be
a drug addict and at one time ran
a barber shop at Forgan, Okla.

SCHOOLS WILL HAVE REG- ULAR 9 MONTHS TERM

During the past week false rum-

Perryton that the local school
would have a short term

authority for their statements.

All of the instructors in the
schools have been signed up on
contract for a nine months term.
At no meeting of the trustees of
the Perryton Independent School
district has the subject of short-
ening the term of school ever
been approached. No one con-
nected with the school has ever
mentioned the subject. The erec-
tion of the new junior high
building could not possibly effect
the running of the schools dur-
ing the present term.

of it for you can be assured that

are false. The Perryton Inde-
pendent School district is in
good shape financially and has
been excellently managed ever
since it was organized. Possibly

is that regular financial state-
ments are not prepared by the
school district and presented to
the people of the district so that
they might know the conditions.
If such a statement were pub-
lished regularly and the people
knew these conditions, such rum-
ors would never be started.

DEPOT ENTERED THURSDAY NITE

**DEPOTS AT BOOKER AND PER-
RYTON AND SERVICE
STATION, FARNS-
WORTH ROBBED**

Three robberies were reported last
Thursday night, the Santa Fe sta-
tions at Perryton and Booker and
the Phillips Service station at
Farnsworth. About fifty dollars in
cash were taken from the three con-
cerns.

Nothing was taken from the dep-
ot at Perryton, the place being
entered by breaking a latch and pry-
ing the window open. The burglars
were evidently frightened and left
without opening the safe or taking
anything.

The service station at Farnsworth
was entered in the same manner
and about thirteen dollars in cash
was taken from the cash drawer.
The Booker depot netted the bur-
glars the biggest haul, being enter-
ed in a like manner, knocking the
knob off the safe, and taking over
forty dollars in cash.

Officer W. J. Pottorff was called
to take finger prints on all three
jobs, working with Mr. West, spe-
cial agent for the Santa Fe on the
two depot robberies. Deputy Sheriff
D. D. Talliaferro is also assisting
in the investigation.

Local officers state that they are
working on the case and expect to
have it cleared up soon.

ALVIN TEAS DIES FROM HEART FAILURE JULY 2

The following account of the
death and burial of Alvin Teas, a
pioneer resident of Ochiltree coun-
ty, is taken from the Corvallis Ore-
gonian. Mr. Teas was a brother of
Mrs. E. L. Whippo of this city. His
wife, Mrs. Lovina L. Teas, was post-
mistress at Old Ochiltree for over
fifteen years.

"Alvin Teas, a recent resident of
1919 Western Ave., died early July
2 at the family home following an
illness from heart disease. Mr.
Teas was born on a farm near New-
port, Ind., November 23, 1857. He
was a birthright member of the
Quaker church. In 1893 Mr. Teas
went to Texas, where he lived on a
farm, coming to Corvallis in 1920.
He joined the Methodist church in
Texas and since coming to Corvallis
has been a member of the
Madison Street Methodist church.

"He was employed at the college
until his health failed him about a
year ago.

"Mr. Teas is survived by the wid-
ow, Mrs. Lovina L. Teas; one son,
John, of Corvallis, Texas; two step-
sons, Paul P. and Raymond Bates,
Corvallis; two sisters, Mrs. E. L.
Whippo, Perryton, Texas, and Mrs.
Albert Lacy, Muncie, Ind.; and three
brother-in-laws: James H. Whippo
and Chas. B. Beck, Corvallis, and
E. L. Whippo, Perryton, Texas.

"The funeral services were held
Friday afternoon at two o'clock in
the drawing room of the Hollings-
worth funeral home, with Rev.
Smith officiating. Interment was
in the Newton cemetery."

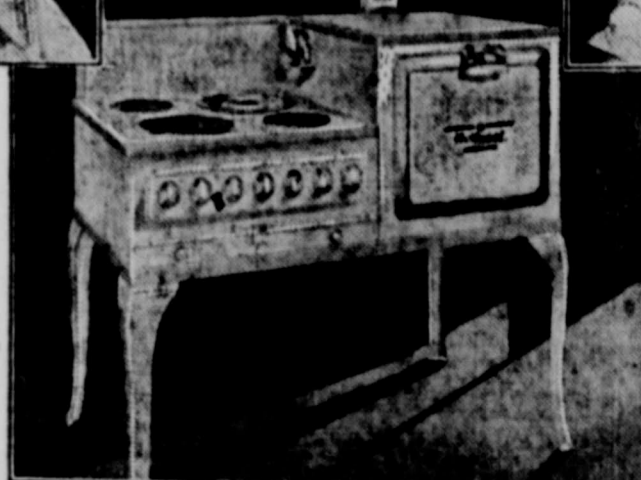

A New Feed Crop

Goodwell Experiment Station Report on Teryary Beans For Hay Production

GOODWELL, Okla., July 28.—After seven years trial the Panhandle Agricultural Experiment Station has reported results of growing Teryary beans for hay production. Feeders of dairy cows in the Panhandle region have for many years been seeking a substitute for alfalfa in some crop which is adapted to upland production of hay rich in protein. The betted known varieties of cowpeas and soybeans have been tried with fair success but never become popular on account of the relatively low yield produced. According to Dave R. Cawfield who recently published a study of annual legumes based on the result of experiments at Goodwell the Teryary bean shows promise of overcoming several objections heretofore experienced with other legume crops and supplying the long felt need for a rich protein hay.

"Protein" says Cawfield, "is what you pay for in cottonseed meal and other concentrates used to balance off a ration of sorghum grains or forage. Although the yield of Teryary beans lacked about 400 pounds per acre being as high as sorghum forage in a 7 year average it produced twice as much protein per acre as kaffir and three times as much as sweet sorghum."

Cawfield's bulletin will be sent on request asking for Panhandle Bulletin No. 25.

The question of the digestibility of Teryary bean hay as compared with better known feeds has been covered by an experiment of E. E. Jacobs in which Teryary bean and cowpea hay were compared as dairy feeds.

Jacobs says, "There is apparently no difference in the feeding value of Teryary bean hay and cowpea hay when fed to dairy cows."

A report of this experiment may be had by requesting Panhandle Bulletin No. 26.

FARM WOMEN ANALYZE THEIR HOME ACCOUNTS

Making a budget and keeping records of household expenditures have been consistently advocated by home management specialists the last few years. The purpose of keeping accounts is to learn where the family income goes, and, if necessary, to make changes that will result in increased satisfactions for all the family.

Some homemakers in Erie County, Ohio, kept accounts under the direction of the county home demonstration agent for five years. In making her report to the United States Department of Agriculture the agent said: "A number of interesting points were brought out when the results were summarized and compared. There was great surprise at the number and cost of guest meals—what might be termed the high cost of hospitality. The women also noted the higher cost per meal in a small family than in a large one. All agreed that giving children an allowance develops in them a sense of the value of things. The economy of using home produced foods was greatly emphasized. The meetings resulted also in the development of nutrition standards in meal planning when it was seen that food expenditures and a balanced diet were necessarily related, and that maintaining better nutrition standards even at higher food cost was more important than expenditures for some other items."

ADVERTISING AND PRICES

Vast sums spent by large manufacturers and merchants for advertising are responsible for a popular superstition to the effect that advertised goods are higher in price than they would be if they were not advertised. The word "superstition" is used advisedly, because it has been demonstrated many times that advertising lowers, instead of raises, prices.

Advertising campaigns are costly and the consumer must pay for them, but they are paid for by new business the advertising attracts. There is nothing paradoxical in a situation where a manufacturer or merchant adds an extensive advertising appropriation to his budget and then turns around and cuts prices.

Million-dollar advertising programs make it possible for the manufacturer to lower his prices by so increasing his production that he can effect real economies through mass production and can spread his profit over a greater number of sales.

Advertising enlarges demand and thereby makes it possible for the retailer to buy stocks in larger quantities at lower cost. Moreover, goods well advertised are more than half sold before the customer enters the store, which lowers sales resistance and sale costs.

The price tags on advertised commodities are, in themselves, proof

that business can save money for its customers by spending millions for advertising.—Leader, Eau Claire, Wisconsin.

MERCHANTS SHOULD GUARD AGAINST THE GRAFTING SCHEMES

Monday morning there dropped into Guymon a high pressure advertising man whose mission was to give a business survey of the city for the benefit of our city merchants. In other words he would go to some hotel, have a genteel voiced young lady call up the merchants, read to them a stereotyped form of ad pertaining to their business with their names inserted and charge them from twenty to twenty-five dollars for the genteel boost printed in some paper. He tried to negotiate with the editor of the Herald for the publication of these worthless writeups. We made him our regular ten cents per line price for the publication of this business, and this precluded the possibility of them being printed in our paper. This would amount to ninety cents per inch and take away from the possibility of him getting away with from fifty to seventy-five per cent of the profits of such a purchase. The editor informed the man that we did not wish to print his material at all, and that if we were compelled to do so that if we would insist upon the full line rate for his publication.

Newspapers circulating under the second class rating of the Post Office Department can not refuse such advertising if the price is paid, but they can classify the matter and insist on a rate that makes publication unpopular with such grafters. The Herald has no use of any business that we feel is fleecing the business men of our city.

Another scheme that was attempted on the business men this week was a church directory. Some time ago the ministers of the city in their association known as the Ministerial Alliance had printed in the Herald an article warning the merchants of the city not to give advertising to solicitors for church advertising and things of that nature that did not bear their written endorsement. The Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce told this fellow when he came into our office that we did not favor the proposition, but that if his directory had the endorsement of the Ministerial Alliance of the city that the

Chamber of Commerce would not interfere. However, the ministers refused to give this man's plan their endorsement. In fact, he failed to call on them, but employed two young ladies of the city to work the proposition. A few of the merchants, we understand, gave their checks for this scheme, but we also understand that the checks are to be returned to the merchants due to our efforts.—Guymon Herald.

IF THE EDITOR TOLD THE TRUTH

The Ringling Eagle has been severely criticized lately for not telling the truth about the recent occurrences in Ringling, D. K. Spradling, editor, wrote in a first-page editorial June 25. He explained why he did not give the whole truth by quoting an Indiana newspaper whose editor had decided to print all the facts. The Indiana man wrote a local news item as follows:

"John Benin, the laziest merchant in town, made a trip to Beeville on Monday."

"John Coyle, our grocery man, is doing a poor business. His store is dirty and musty. How could he expect to do any business?"

John Doe, the cold-blooded village banker, suffered a sun stroke while cutting weeds the other day. No one visited him while he was in

bed. "Dave Conkey died at his home here Tuesday. The doctor pronounced it heart failure, but home brew killed him."

"Married—Miss Mary Rhodes and James Collins, last Saturday at the Baptist parsonage by Reverend Gordon. The bride is a very ordinary girl who does not know any more about cooking than a jackrabbit and never helped her mother three days in her life. "The Monument is Still There" Ex-president Calvin Coolidge during his tenure of office was known as a man of few words. He never wasted words. He never used a dozen words to express a thought which he felt might be expressed in half a dozen. The press of the country often referred to him as "Silent Cal." However, when he did say something, his words carried weight and commanded attention. Frequently his quick wit and dry humor gave added forcefulness and importance to his words. A story which has been frequently told to illustrate the laconic humor of Mr. Coolidge is this: A group of newspaper men were interviewing him, when someone made a caustic reference to the contemptuous treatment accorded George Washington by those "debunking" biographers who were trying to besmirch the good name of the Father of our Country. President Coolidge said nothing, but turned to the window overlooking the Washington monument. After gazing out silently for a short time, he turned to face his audience and remarked: "The monument is still there."

How true this is of Christ's monument, the Christian Church! For centuries men have assailed our Lord. They have dragged His spotless name into the mud, poured ridicule upon His birth and life, turned with contempt away from His vicarious atonement upon the cross, and heaped malice and hatred upon His followers; but "His monument is still there." Even the gates of hell shall not prevail against it.

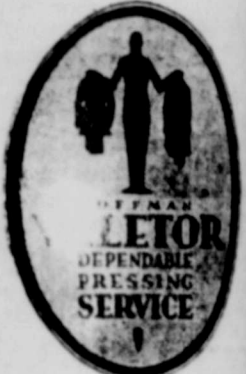

My Experiences in the World War

By General John J. Pershing

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CHAPTER XXXIV—Continued
on which this unit was soon to be engaged.

Lack of Regular Officers
It is a comparatively simple matter to absorb partly trained recruits in veteran organizations, but it is an enormous and difficult task to create organizations entirely of new material. There was a serious lack of regular officers in our organization in both staff and line. The I corps had only 7 per cent of officers from the regular army. Less than 1 per cent of all captains of the line in the A. E. F. at that time had been in the service a year, and the thought of possible immediate activity with such inexperienced leaders was not reassuring.

It was a source of real regret to me not to command the First division in person, and this, coupled with the fact that its entry into the battle was of considerable moment, led me to speak a word of confidence and encouragement. When the officers, about 900 in all, were assembled in the grounds of the chateau occupied as division headquarters they formed a rare group.

These splendid-looking men, hardened by the strenuous work of the fall and by two months in winter trenches, fairly radiated the spirit of courage and gave promise that America's efforts would prove her sons the equals of their forefathers.

The First division saw its first major offensive some six weeks later, a brilliant counterattack at Cantigny, in the Amiens sector.

Wanted the A. E. F. United
That afternoon I motored to Sarrebourg to see General Foch and sound him out regarding the prospects of uniting our divisions in a sector of our own. I told him that the secretary of war when in France, had expressed an earnest desire to hasten the formation of an American army and that this was also the wish of the President.

It was my opinion, I said, that early action would be of great importance in stimulating the morale of our troops and of our people. Now that the First division was to go into line the people at home would expect soon to hear that an American army was engaged on its own front.

I suggested the possibility that the corps might be assembled near the First division as a beginning.

General Foch agreed in principle of the suggestion, but was uncertain when the other divisions could be spared, which I, of course, fully appreciated. He pointed out that the enemy was very aggressive and referred to the severe attack against the British on the Lys between Lens and Ypres which began on the 9th and was still in progress. But looking beyond, I insisted that the Twenty-sixth and Forty-second divisions might be withdrawn at any time from quiet sectors, to be followed by the Second and the Thirty-second and also the Third a few days later.

I pointed out that this force of six divisions, including the First, would equal twelve French divisions, and gave it as my opinion that it would be better to use this American group for active operations in quiet sectors and send French divisions to the battle front.

My understanding after this discussion was very definite that the plan would soon be carried out, leaving the exact time and place to be determined.

It was immaterial to me just where it should occur, the point being to get it done.

Hard Fighting on the Lys
The German offensive on the Lys was another formidable effort to break the British line. The attack was made to the north and south of Armentières on a front of twenty-four miles by twenty-seven German divisions. The exhausted British, though they fought with most commendable courage and skill, were forced again to yield with heavy losses to themselves and the Portuguese, consisting of two divisions, who were with them.

Several French divisions were hurried to the Lys front, but it was a week after the attack began before they were put into the line. They then relieved British divisions at the famous Kemmel hill, only to be surprised and defeated themselves April 25, much to their chagrin. The battle was practically ended by the last of the month, with a gain by the Germans of ten or twelve miles and the capture of important territory from the British, but with failure to take Hazebrouck.

CHAPTER XXXV
It was always stimulating to one's morale to visit the headquarters of the Canadians, where one soon caught the fine spirit of that superb body.

I made such a visit in the spring of 1918 and talked with their corps commander, Lieut. Gen. Sir Arthur Currie; his chief of staff, Major Weber; his chief of engineers, Major General Lindsay, and others and had tea with them.

The alertness and confidence of these neighbors of ours and the excellent record they had made and were still making gave us as much gratification as though they had been our own. I remember this visit with much pleasure and recall the prediction of the Canadians that Americans would soon play an important part in the war.

General Currie deplored the fact that the British had so easily given up Paschendaele ridge, which the year before he had been told must be taken at all costs and for which the Canadians made the tremendous sacrifice of 16,000 casualties.

Calls at British G. H. Q.
At the invitation of Sir Douglas Haig, British commander in chief, I went to the British general headquarters April 29 to discuss the training of our troops with the British and study operations in progress.

We were always made welcome at British headquarters. It so happened that on the day of our arrival Lord Derby, who had just been relieved as minister of war by Lord Milner, was there en route to Paris as British ambassador. During dinner the conversation ran along freely, as though we were members of the official family. At length Lord Derby and Sir Douglas drifted to the subject of British politicians.

It would betray no confidence to say that there was considerable criticism of some who held prominent places. The coalition government came in for its share because of its attitude toward the military high command.

I took advantage of the opportunity while on the British front to visit the Noragues area to inspect the advance elements of the Seventy-seventh division, one of the divisions selected for training with the British. We took luncheon with Brig. Gen. Evan M. Johnson, then temporarily in command, and his staff officers. He praised the soldierly qualities of the men, but said they were very much behind in their training.

Makes Agreement With Haig
At Sir Douglas' headquarters he and I reached an understanding as to the training and administration of our troops that were to be temporarily with the British. In the first place, they were to be allocated by regiments to British divisions as might be agreed upon. The training staffs of British divisions were to be at the disposal of these regiments, especially for instruction in the use of the rifle and machine gun and the handling of gas.

After that, and with the approval of their American division commander, the regiments were to be attached to a British division in line, so each of the three battalions of the regiment would have the opportunity to serve with one of the three brigades in each British division. These battalions were to be commanded by their own officers as a part of the British brigade, while the staff of the American regiment was to be attached to that of the brigade.

In the next stage the American regiments, with their three battalions united under the regimental commander, were to act as a brigade in a British division. The final stage would find the four American regiments of each division united as such under its own officers, the artillery being British until the arrival of its own artillery brigade.

In carrying out this scheme the tendency at first was for British officers actually to assume command of our units in training. Our officers in most cases permitted this to be done until it was checked by my orders that "American units must be commanded in training by the officers and noncommissioned officers who are to command them in battle," and that American troops would in all cases be commanded in battle only by Americans.

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Talks Shipping in London

Following a suggestion by Lord Milner, I went to London April 22, 1918, to consider further the shipment of American troops. At our first conference there were present Lord Milner and Gen. Sir Henry Robertson, who had succeeded General Wilson, who had been the chief of the general staff; Harbord and myself. The

main point of difference that had developed in previous conferences as to just how far the Americans should be committed to serve in active operations was again considered.

I stated that the main thing was to get our units trained, and that while I was opposed to amalgamation, yet if during the period of instruction the units with which they were serving should be attacked or, if another great emergency should arise, of course, our men would go in. Naturally the British wanted unlimited infantry and machine-gun units, but I would consider nothing further than a limited extension of the six-division plan.

During the conference a cable from Lord Reading to the prime minister was brought forth, which stated that the President had agreed to the amalgamation of Americans with the British. I had nothing official at hand later than the President's conditional approval of joint note No. 18 of the supreme war council as suggested by Secretary Baker, so I promptly said that it could not be possible that any such concession had been made and that the classes of our troops to be shipped over and their disposition must be left to me.

In the next installment General Pershing gives interesting details of the discussions concerning the shipment of American troops to France.

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE

Zachariah 8:3 furnished the golden text: "Thus saith the Lord; I am returned unto Zion, and will dwell in the midst of Jerusalem; and Jerusalem shall be called a city of truth; and the mountain of the Lord of hosts the holy mountain."

These passages from the Bible (Deuteronomy 32:3, 4) were included in the service: "Ascribe ye greatness unto our God. He is the Rock, his work is perfect: for all his ways are judgment: a God of truth and without iniquity, just and right is he."

The following citation from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy, was also read (p. 296):

"We must not seek the immutable and immortal through the finite, mutual, and mortal, and so depend upon belief instead of demonstration, for this is fatal to a knowledge of Science. The understanding of Truth gives full faith in Truth, and spiritual understanding is better than all burnt offerings."

CATTLE OWNER RETURNS

CHECK TO HELP TB WORK

A check for \$220.94 as indemnity on his cattle which reacted to the tuberculin test was indorsed and returned to the New Hampshire State Department of Agriculture by Geo. C. Clark, a cattle owner of Plymouth, N. H. In declining to cash the check Mr. Clark stated that he would like to donate the sum to help carry on the work of eradicating tuberculosis from the cattle herds of the State. Mr. Clark also wrote to Dr. E. A. Crossman, Federal inspector in charge of tuberculosis eradication in New Hampshire, and expressed a desire to cancel claims to Federal indemnity for the reactors in his herd. Both the State and Government officials regard this case as an outstanding example of a public-spirited cattle owner eager to aid in the nation-wide campaign to eradicate bovine tuberculosis.

New Hampshire has been making excellent progress in the testing of herds for tuberculosis. Government records show. In April, 21,075 cattle were officially tested in that State. Three of the 10 counties in the State have already been established as modified accredited areas, signifying that all the cattle have been tested and that not more than 0.5 of 1 per cent of the cattle of these areas are tuberculous. Interest in the work in other counties, also, is indicated by a waiting list of more than 3,000 cattle owners who have recently made applications for the test. The State legislature recently provided \$600,000 for the work, which can be completed within three years.

THE CHAYOTE, A NEW OLD VEGETABLE NOW AVAILABLE

A "new" vegetable for the American table but one which has been a staple food for centuries is the chayote, sometimes called vegetable pear, mango squash, or mirliton. In the last few years there has been increasing interest in the growing of chayotes for home use and local markets in the lower South, the United States Department of Agriculture reports, and chayotes are now appearing in season in northern as well as southern markets.

The adaptability of the chayote as a table vegetable is one of its outstanding characteristics. It may be eaten plain boiled, mashed, fried, stuffed and baked, used cold in salads, in fritters, or made into sweet pickle. Unlike most squash, the chayote holds its form perfectly after being cooked. Its flavor is delicate and resembles summer squash. To some people it tastes like stewed oysters. The root, which becomes tuberlike after the first season, is starchy and may be boiled and eaten.

Botanically the chayote is related to the squashes and cucumbers. It usually fruits in the fall, though when early vine growth from old roots is not injured by spring frost it may produce a crop in the spring.

ion crop, \$75,000,000 on field corn, \$4,000,000 on sweet corn, and \$500,000 on tomatoes. Collectively, these damages exceed \$100,000,000.

Each year insects damage forests and forest products worth about \$138,000,000. One of these, the spruce bud worm, ranks third in our list of "public enemies" by reason of an annual damage of \$71,000,000. In the 10-year period 1910-1920 it destroyed about 250,000,000 cords of pulpwood—enough to supply the Nation for about 25 years at the present rate of demand.

Termites, or white ants, add 1 per cent annually to the depreciation of wooden buildings in this country. Their damage to farm buildings alone reaches about \$29,000,000 annually.

Cattle grubs cause a loss to the beef industry of nearly \$30,000,000 annually, and twice as much to the dairy industry. The damage to hides alone amounts to about \$5,000,000 a year.

Concerning the long list of insects that attack stored grain, dried foods, clothing, and furniture and those household nuisances, the cockroaches, ants, and fleas, Mr. Hyslop says the damage is incalculable. Nor can we measure the great drain by insects on the energy, thrift, efficiency, and comfort of man and beast, and the toll of diseases transmitted by these parasites.

The Federal Government expends annually about \$2,500,000 in entomological research, some years more than \$5,500,000 in eradication campaigns and in the maintenance of quarantines to keep dangerous insects out of this country.

TO CHECK UP ON BLADDER AND KIDNEY "CURES"

In connection with its continuing survey of medical preparations offered as cures or treatments for the more serious diseases of man, the Federal Food and Drug Administration plans, in the coming months, to direct special attention to products labeled as being effective in the treatment of diseases of the kidneys and bladder. Dr. J. J. Durrett, chief of the administration's drug-control laboratory, announces. Investigations which have been under way for several months indicate that several of these products are on the market, most of them containing ingredients possessing diuretic properties. "Where such ingredients are present in appropriate dosages," says Doctor Durrett, "the administration will not object to their being labeled as diuretics. Such preparations, however, by no means, constitute treatments for the various diseases of the kidneys and bladder, among which are some of our most serious maladies. In fact, these preparations are sometimes harmful to a person suffering from these ailments."

Doctor Durrett states that al-

though the Federal food and drugs act does not prohibit the sale of dangerous or deleterious drugs if they are truthfully labeled, nevertheless, sufferers from diseases of the kidneys and bladder are usually not able to diagnose their troubles nor to determine the character of treatment needed. In particular, they are unable to determine for themselves whether the diuretic would be useless, helpful, or harmful to them. Under the law, however, if an article which does possess diuretic properties is labeled simply as a diuretic, it is not misbranded. And the administration's jurisdiction ends with seeing that labels of these medicines are truthful, both literally and in the implications which their wording conveys.
