MILLION BALES COTTON CONSUMED IN AUGUST

New York.—More American cotton was moved into domestic consumption and export during August this year than in any other August in the history of the cotton trade, it was reported Monday by the New York Cotton Exchange.

The movement aggregated 1,129,000 bales in August, compared with only 884,000 last year and 660,000 two years ago.

In only one other year the World War period of 1917, has the movement of American cotton in August exceeded 1,000,000 bales.

COTTON GRADE AND STAPLE REPORT FOR PREVIOUS WEEK

The following report is issued by the United States Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Agricultural Economics, Division of Cotton Marketing, Austin, Texas, for the week ending September 14.

There was an increase in the proportion of the lower grades of white cotton classed this week from Texas gins. Slight changes occurred in the percent of the various staple lengths this week compared with the same groups last week.

Receipts of samples from District 3, which comprises the Red Lands and Plains of West and Northwest Texas, including Mitchell County, were sufficient to form the base of a report this week. Approximately 60 per cent of the cotton from that area was White Strict Middling and Middling; however, the per cent of spotted and tinged cotton from that section was greater than from any other section now ginning in volume, being about 14 per cent of the samples classed. Eighty-six per cent of the cotton from that area was $\frac{3}{8}$ to 31-32 inch in staple length.

NRA Parley Hears Cline

Walter D. Cline of Wichita Falls, a regional director for the national recovery administration, spoke to a large crowd gathered at the city hall in Sweetwater Wednesday night.

In addition to Sweetwater citizens were NRA committee and compliance board representatives from Loraine, Colorado, Roscoe, Abilene, Roby, Rotan, Snyder, Merkel, Sylvester, Blackwell, and Hamlin. D. A. Clark, Sweetwater, was chairman of the meeting. A concert by the Sweetwater high school band preceded the address.

In his address Mr. Cline stated that changes had been taking place in the world from the beginning, and declared that the election in 1932 was a revelation that the people of the United States wanted a change.

"The new deal places emphasis on a man's right to earn a living," he said. "The NRA adds to political and physical freedom a right to work."

He urged that NRA committees and compliance boards proceed with care. Members of these committees, he said, should be fair minded and courageous and urged them to follow as closely as possible the golden rule, "do unto others as you would have them do unto you."

Loraine representatives attending the meeting, though not members of any committee, were W. J. Coon, A. Callahan and J. W. King.

After the meeting the Loraine representatives talked to Mr. Cline for a short time and he advised them to urge that Loraine select a committee to secure consumer pledges and a compliance board.

BUSINESS FAILURES LESS IN TEXAS IN AUGUST

Austin, Texas, Sept. 18.—Only 33 commercial failures occurred in Texas during August, 1933, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. This number is the smallest on record since 1920 with the exception of 1928, when only 28 firms failed. Forty-one were recorded for July, 1933, and 70 for August, 1932. The average for August, 1930, 1931, and 1932, is 72.

Liabilities of firms failing in August amounted to \$765,000, with assets of \$418,000 shown. Liabilities of firms failing in July totaled \$732,000, with assets of \$387,000, whereas liabilities of failing firms in August, 1932, amounted to \$1,410,000, with assets of only \$396,000.

Sweetwater's now-famous Chuck Wagon will be one of the featured attractions. Meals will be served from it to first comers both days, at 25 cents a plate, all proceeds above actual expenses to be donated to the local Red Cross chapter. It will be chuck-wagon grub, too, without any trimmings, and you'll have to eat it in old-fashioned cross-legged style.

In addition to merchants prizes for kid and ladies' free for all races, more than \$1,100 will be offered in cash prizes to winners of the five featured horse races and the rodeo events that are to come afternoon and night of both days.

WHY NOT A GYM FOR LORAIN HIGH SCHOOL

A trustee of the Loraine Independent School District made the suggestion to us a short time ago that Loraine build a first class gymnasium for the Loraine High School. We thought at the time, and still think, that the suggestion is a pertinent one.

Loraine High School does need a gymnasium in which her students can take regular exercise. It would enable the school to add physical training to its courses.

A good gymnasium should be built at this time for around five thousand dollars. Taking this figure as a basis the Loraine school district would only have to underwrite thirty percent of it, or \$1,500. The other \$3,500 could be secured in a self-liquidating loan from the public works fund to be repaid over a period of forty years.

Other cities throughout the United States are taking advantage of the opportunity to secure money from the government to build needed equipment for their schools. Why should Loraine not do something along this line? The cost will not be prohibitive. People in the community need the work. The school will benefit greatly.

At least one business man in Loraine took exception to our editorial last week in which we stated that Loraine is a "dead" town.

We stated last week that "so far as the readers of The Mitchell County News are concerned, judging from the amount of advertising from local merchants carried in its issues, Loraine is a 'dead' town." We are going to repeat the statement.

This newspaper is being published in Loraine for the betterment of the community. It would not do anything knowingly to retard the progress of the town. It has no other purpose other than the upbuilding of the community and to make money for its owners.

A newspaper, unlike any other business enterprise, is a community affair. It has only a limited number of customers for its advertising space. There are approximately 40 business institutions in Loraine. This newspaper cannot expect to secure advertising patronage from any other source than through these business concerns and an occasional utility or national advertiser. Other business institutions have an opportunity to draw patronage from hundreds of people throughout this territory.

People in this community are like those in other communities. They like to trade in a wide awake town, a town in which they know before they leave home that they can buy what they need and want and at what price they can buy it. How are they to be

informed of these things if they are not informed through advertising?

How much easier would it be for the people in this territory to do their trading in Loraine if the business interests advertised their wares and their prices through the local paper? People in this community are just as intelligent as they are anywhere—they like to know what they are buying. If they are not informed of what the stores in Loraine have to offer, they have just as well go somewhere else where they know they can find what they want.

Because mail order houses advertise is the only reason they get the large business they do. It is not because their merchandise is superior or their prices lower. They tell the people by word and picture what they have to offer and quote the price at which they expect to sell it. They do not expect people to trade with them because they have been in business for twenty or thirty years on the same corner. They send out finely illustrated catalogs once each year and follow it up with well illustrated circulars and newspaper advertisements they go after the business.

It is out of the question, of course, for local merchants to use highly illustrated catalogs to inform the people of this trade territory of their merchandise, the cost would be prohibitive. Nicely illustrated advertising with prices in the home town newspaper is not prohibitive and any good business man knows that such advertising will bring him results. Intelligent people, such as we have in the Loraine trade territory, would appreciate it if the merchants of Loraine would inform them about their merchandise and the price at which it can be bought.

JUST A PLAIN TRUTH

For the past two years we have been urging our local citizens to do their buying from local business houses instead of sending or taking their money elsewhere. We honestly believe we have been instrumental in keeping many dollars at home through these urgings. We believe that every business house in town has benefitted thereby.

We still hand out the same advice, but we would feel a little better if some of our local firms would show some degree of appreciation in their behalf by not sending out of town for their printing.

Reciprocity is reciprocity only when it works both ways. It is greed when it works one-sided.

These may be plain words, but it is also plain truth.

COUNTY TAX RATE IS SET AT 80 CENTS

Current Comment From Washington

In an address before the American Bar Association, the Attorney General adds his testimony respecting the wisdom of emergency legislation. Whether hard situations justify peculiar laws is something which, as a broad

question is open to discussion, with the qualification that it is a question which the average person is hardly competent to discuss. Some statements in the address, however, are so easy to comprehend that the wayfaring man, though a fool, need not err therein.

"Today," says Mr. Cummings, "we are no longer a nation whose problems are local and isolated. A shut-down of a great mill or a smelting in Boston a century since was not felt in Rhode Island, much less in Pennsylvania. Today almost every economic and social problem is both local and national."

There is no large amount of information in the statement that we do not live that way now. The Attorney General wisely concludes, however, that the fact should not be forgotten. It appears to be his view that some of the seemingly-strange steps being today to make matters better are not drastic remedies for an acute attack. Rather, they are medicine suited to economic disease which could not exist under conditions that prevailed a hundred years ago.

State after state continues to vote wet, which reminds us of several matters. Perhaps the most salient of these is that if the people are dissatisfied, they can have their will. The wets are gleaming present satisfaction. For the dries there is the consolation that the same power that apparently is going to lay aside the Eighteenth Amendment can take it on again, if such a course seems expedient. If liquor comes back, the prohibition movement will assume new life and activity. It is a good thing to have a hearty opposition, and even though the land

concludes that it wishes to be wet, it will be wholesome to have a lively party, political or otherwise, with definite opposing views. It is never well to conclude that all the right is on one side. That view may cost the dries the security of the Eighteenth Amendment. If the wets win, they will do well to avoid the frame of mind that wrecked the power of their opponents.
