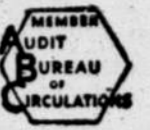

Tire Situation Is Critical At This Time Says OPA

Depleted stocks of passenger car tires indicate that the tire situation is most critical at this time, Wm. G. Williams, OPA district rationing executive stated today, as he urged all drivers to use every means to stretch the life of tires.

Although tire quotas have been maintained at the 2,500,000 figure for August, in an effort to maintain driving during critical hot months, in several sections many people who have received tire certificates have been able to find tires to buy, Williams said.

In explaining the necessity for passenger car tire conservation, Williams pointed out that there are about 100,000,000 passenger car wheels rolling on rubber tires at this time. Since 1942 OPA has rationed about 43,000,000 tires. This means that there are still over 55,000,000 pre-Pearl Harbor tires on the road. Most of these tires have been capped at least once, many two or three times. On the other hand, maximum production of passenger tires this year will not be over 25,000,000. The War Production Board says that present demands for tire replacements cannot possibly be met at this time.

All indications are that "A" card holders will not get new tires for many months and every conservation method must be used if cars are to be kept running, Williams said.

Local 4-H Boys Inspected Two Army Air Fields

Local 4-H Club boys report that they had a most enjoyable trip Wednesday when the county agent, T. A. Barfield, took them to Lubbock Army Air Field as well as the South Plains Army Air Field.

The boys arrived in Lubbock Wednesday morning and first went to the Lubbock Army Air Field where they saw an exhibition on chemical warfare and watched the handling of bombs. They then went through a B-17 Flying Fortress as well as a B-25.

The group, composed of 126 4-H boys from various counties on the plains who raised enough food to feed a fighter in the past year, were then taken through an instrument training center, and some of the boys were allowed to fly link trainers.

After lunch, which they were served in the mess hall, the group inspected personal equipment carried by pilots, including life rafts, parachutes, and various types of flying suits.

They then viewed a movie which showed the part the air corps played on D-Day and in the crossing of the Rhine, as well as other actual combat pictures.

Afterwards they were permitted to watch phases of parachute training. An instructor gave an exhibition on how to land parachutes and to turn them, as well as how to maneuver them to avoid wires, trees, etc.

The crowd then went to South Plains Army Air Field where they were allowed to inspect bombers. They drove over the field and saw B-17's which had been in combat in Germany and which were marked with symbols designating the number of German planes they had knocked out.

The boys then returned home after a very enjoyable day.

CIVILIANS AT WAR

The Government needs and asks its citizens in this 192nd week of war against Japan to:

3. Fill one of the remaining openings for cadet nurses in September classes. If you are a high school graduate you may be eligible for valuable professional education free in a school of your own choice plus maintenance and a personal allowance. Write to U. S. MORE WOOLEN APPAREL FOR CIVILIANS IN FALL

A greater supply of wool top-coats, overcoats and dresses by this fall and worsted suits by this winter is expected to result from the revocation by WPB of two orders that had maintained wartime control over the production of wool and worsted fabrics, WPB reports.

SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM TO CONTINUE IN 1946

School Lunch Programs throughout the Nation will continue to receive Government assistance during the 1945-46 fiscal year. Schools which participated in the program during the 1944-45 fiscal year are being reinstated upon request under a simplified agreement. Schools wishing to participate in the program for the first time may apply to the Department of Agriculture, Washington 25, D. C.

The School Lunch Program is designed to operate under local sponsorship of school boards and other school organizations, parent-teacher groups, civic groups and other non-profit organizations. A group desiring to sponsor a lunch program and needing financial assistance to operate one adequately, may apply to the USDA for aid. If the application is approved, the USDA and the sponsoring group enter into an agreement setting forth the responsibilities of each.

VETERANS PLACED IN 88,495 JOBS

Local offices of the U. S. Employment Service placed 88,495 war veterans in jobs during June, an increase of 2,870 over the May total of 85,625, according to the War Manpower Commission. Placement of veterans of the present war increased 4,493 in June to a total of 74,093 over the May total of 69,600.

Professional and managerial positions accounted for 1,776 of the June placements, clerical and sales work, 5,782; service trades, 7,510; skilled jobs, 13,682; semi-skilled jobs, 18,032; and unskilled, 41,723. An increase is noted in each classification. Total placement of handicapped veterans declined in June to 11,185 from the May total of 12,331.

NEW RULING TO CONTROL DISTRIBUTION OF MEAT

A measure designed to prevent retailers, wholesalers and processors of meat products from acquiring slaughterhouses and diverting meat supplies to controlled outlets is announced by OPA. The action, effective July 29, also prevents slaughterers from acquiring retail, wholesale or processing establishments and diverting their products to these establishments. This action does not prohibit affiliations, but does control the amount of meat that can be diverted to any affiliated outlet, OPA explains.

This amendment to Control Order 1 provides that a slaughterer cannot deliver to any retail, wholesale or processing establishment with which he may now become affiliated, any larger percentage of the

meat he currently delivers into the county or trading area where the establishment located than he delivered to that particular establishment during the 3 reporting periods immediately preceding the effective date of the new action.

SUGAR DISTRIBUTION WILL BE IMPROVED

Secretary of Agriculture Clinton

P. Anderson says that civilian distribution of sugar, particularly in eastern areas where shortages are most acute, should be improved through a redistribution of 40,000 tons obtained through a reduction in military procurement. The action does not increase the total amount of sugar allocated for civilian uses, but is designed to assure more even distribution of available supplies.

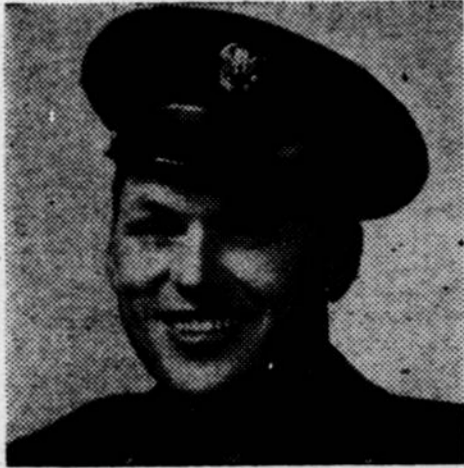

Lane and Harmon Had Part In The Okinawa Battle

ABOARD THE USS COLORADO IN THE PACIFIC—Two Lamesa Navy men, Bruce H. Lane, gunner's mate, second class, USNR, and Billy Joe Harmon, seaman, first class, USNR, son of Oran F. Harmon, fought aboard the USS Colorado for 60 days and nights at Okinawa.

The Colorado expended there more ammunition in support of ground troops than in any of the previous occupation support and bombardment operations in which she participated. The ship took up her station off the beaches seven days before the invasion to help in the softening-up bombardment, and then for 60 days she continued her relentless pounding of enemy positions. She helped beat off numerous air attacks launched against units of the Fleet operating in the area.

During those months when the 7th rolled across France, fought bitter battles in Holland, slowed the German Ardennes counter-offensive at St. Vith and then roared in on the kill of the Wehrmacht east of the Rhine river and north of the Elbe, the Ordnance Battalion repeatedly worked under fire and in great danger.

S-Sgt. V. Crowell Has Crack At Japs After 31 Missions

Editor's Note: The following article which concerns the B-24 Jeter Bug crew of which S-Sgt. Victor Crowell of this city is a member, was written by Sam Kinch and appeared in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram Thursday, August 9:

WITH THE 7TH AIR FORCE BOMB GROUP, OKINAWA, July 29—The B-24 Jeter Bug on which four Texans have flown 32 combat missions together during the past 13 months, got its first crack at the Japanese homeland this week.

The big Liberator dropped its bombs on Honshu, and Staff Sgt. Doyle Ebel of Houston, tail gun-

ner, said "we got more flak there than on all our other 31 missions put together."

The plane, a veteran of 81 combat missions, has been hit by anti-aircraft fire five times but no member of the crew has been hurt.

It is named for the first pilot, 1st Lt. W. F. Jeter, Dallas. Other Texans in the crew are 1st Lt. Herbert Harter, Amarillo, co-pilot, and Staff Sgt. Victor Crowell of Lamesa, nose gunner.

The Jeter Bug is part of the oldest bomber squadron in the Air Forces, the one of which Capt. Colin Kelly was a member before he crashed to death while bombing the Jap battleship Haruna. The squadron was at Hawaii when the Japs struck Pearl Harbor, and its fliers have fought back up through New Caledonia, the Solomons, Tarawa, Guam and now Okinawa. The squadron has made 29 moves during the war.

The Jeter Bug crew is sweating out its required eight more combat missions, after which members are due to go home for a rest.

This veteran outfit, accustomed to making itself comfortable on uncomfortable islands, has a carbonated water machine that is the ultimate in GI ingenuity.

With two reclaimed airplane oxygen tanks and a drum of carbon dioxide gas, the fliers are able to mix soft drinks with carbonated water—something unusual for combat outfits.

Crowell's wife and parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Crowell, live in Lamesa.

Pvt. E. Foote Gets Badge For His Services On Cebu

WITH THE AMERICAL (CORRECT) INFANTRY DIVISION IN THE PHILIPPINES — Pvt. Leon L. Foote, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Foote Star Route, 4, Lamesa, has been awarded the Combat Infantryman's Badge, after serving through the bitter Cebu campaign.

Veteran soldier's of Foote's unit say the fighting on Cebu was tougher than anything the Americal (Correct) Division hit in its previous campaigns at Guadalcanal, Bougainville, and Leyte. On a battlefield tour, Lt. Gen Robert Eichberger, Eighth Army Commander, said Jap positions on Cebu were the toughest to reduce that he had ever seen.

Dug in like termites in a system of pillboxes, caves, interlocking tunnels and trenches, the Japs inflicted heavy casualties on advancing ranks before a combination of air power, artillery, and virtually every known infantry weapon forced them to retreat. Foote's regiment, the 182nd, a veteran unit with more than three year's overseas service behind it, was in action almost constantly.

The Lamesa boy has been overseas 6 months and wears the Asiatic-Pacific ribbon with one Battle Star and the Philippine Liberation ribbon with one star.

Pfc. T. Molina Earns Bronze Star Medal

WITH THE SIXTH ARMY DIVISION ON LUZON — Pfc. Tereso R. Molina, son of Mrs. Nicholas R. Molina of Route 1, Ackerly, has been awarded the Bronze Star Medal by the commanding general of the 6th Infantry Division for heroism in action against the Japanese near Santa Barbara, Luzon, P. I., on January 10.

When his platoon was surprised by a Jap ambush, Molina held his ground and fired into the Jap positions to cover the withdrawal of his comrades.

Molina is a member of a front-line rifle company of the 1st Infantry Regiment of the "Red Star" 6th Infantry Division.

J. Procter, S2-C Returns On Leave From Overseas

James M. Procter, 18, seaman, second class USN, whose wife lives on Star Route 4, Lamesa, has returned from a tour of Pacific battle duty aboard the Navy's storied aircraft carrier the USS Hornet, now undergoing typhoon-damage repairs at a West Coast Naval base.

The Hornet has had 14 months of rugged action in the forefront of the drive back to the Japanese capitol. No enemy ever succeeded in damaging the ship, but more than 1,400 Jap planes and some 1,270,000 tons of Jap shipping bear testimony to the savagery with which she struck throughout her 150,000 mile cruise.

The Hornet struck the first blow in the liberation of the Philippines, launched the first installment of the full-scale carrier-plane raids on Tokyo, took part in the destruction of the Yamato, 45,000-ton pride of Japan's battle fleet, and weathered two typhoons.

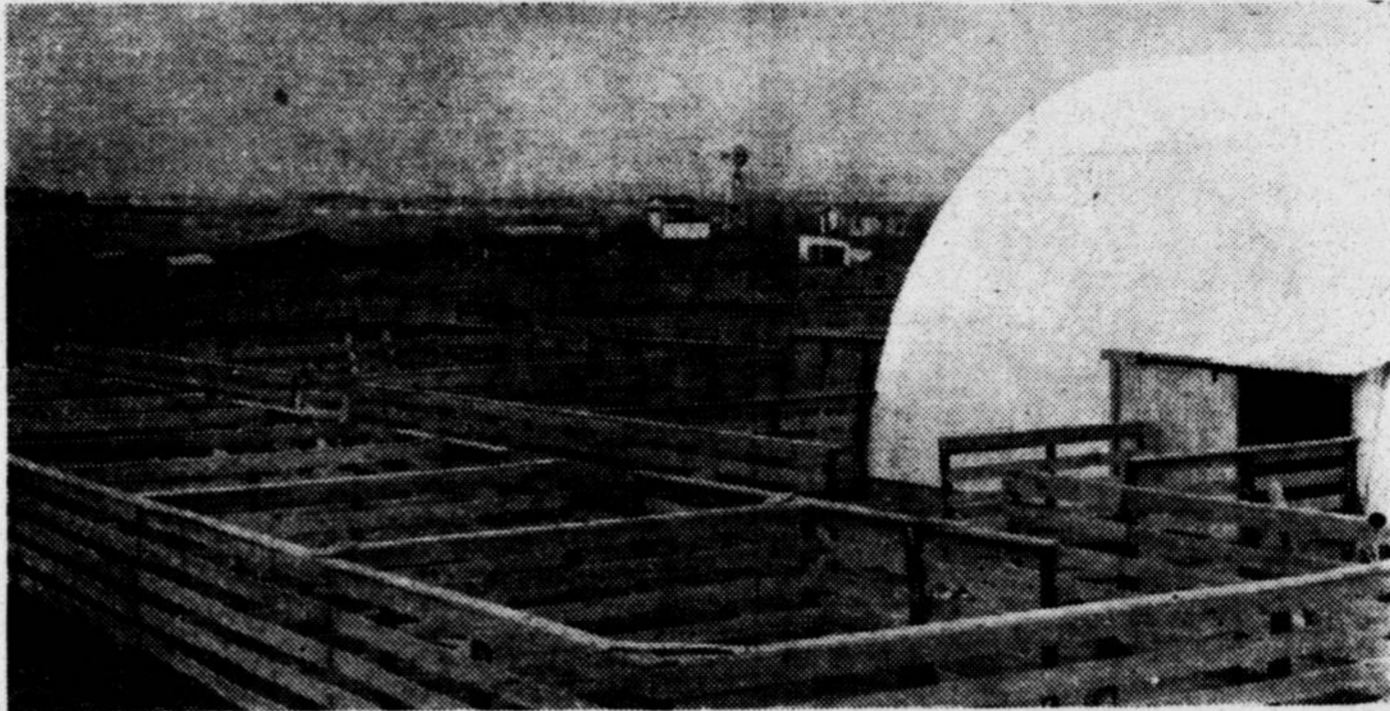
