## Fuller Foods sells to Lowe's Market

### Sale to go into effect on June 28th

Fuller Foods, an Affiliated Foods supermarket, has sold to Lowe's Market. The company is set to take over daily operations on June 28<sup>th</sup>.

Co-owner Judy Honeycutt said that the whole transaction took less than a month, and she is pleased that a couple that were dear friends to her mom and stepdad, Virginia and Raymond Fuller, will be taking over the business.

Yvette and Roger Lowe started Lowe's, the family-owned company, in 1964 with a store in Olton, Texas. Lowe's Market now owns 152 stores in Texas, New Mexico, Colorado, Arizona and Kansas and is headquartered in Littlefield.

According to Honeycutt, Raymond and Roger served on the Affiliated Foods board together. Roger is currently the chairman of that board. Roger Jr. has taken

over the day-to-day operations of Lowe's Market, and his sister, Lezlie Lowe is an attorney that also works for the corporation.

Honeycutt said that it's im-

portant to her that Fuller Foods be run by a company that cares about its employees, its customers and its community. Store Manager Rick Alvarez was noti-

fied of the sale on Tuesday, April 26<sup>th</sup>, and an employee meeting was held on Wednesday, April 27<sup>th</sup>.

During the employee meet-

ing, Roger Lowe Jr. eased some troubled minds when he told employees that everyone still has a job at the store. No one will be laid off because of the ownership change, no benefits will be cut and no pay will be cut.

Lowe also told those attending the meeting about the company, outlining set priorities: 1. God 2. Family and 3. Groceries.

"I know they live that," Honeycutt said.

Honeycutt said that the Lowe's company is known for its commitment to community. "That was important to Terry and me," she said, referring to her sister who is also co-owner of Fullers.

Lowe's is partially an acquisition company, and the owners are well-versed in buying existing stores. The probability of renovation of the building that has housed Fullers since 1985 is

Westbrook freshman Miranda Goswick is going to state! She took the gold medal at the UIL 1A Regional Track Meet last week to qualify for a chance to compete in the high jump at the state meet. Early voting may have gotten off to a slow start in the Westbrook city election and Loraine school board election, but things have taken off since then. Both early voting clerks report over 20 ballots cast in each election on the last day of early voting, Tuesday, May 3<sup>rd</sup>.

Both elections are set to be held Saturday, May 7<sup>th</sup>, and everyone is encouraged to make their voice heard by voting.

Westbrook City Secretary Pansy Fernandez reported 28 votes had been cast so far in the election of mayor and city

## Sharyland rate case filed with PUCT

Sharyland Utilities, LP, formerly Cap Rock Energy, was ordered by the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT) to file a rate case before April 30<sup>th</sup>. This comes after customer complaints reached a fever pitch last fall, and lawmakers were contacted about Sharyland's distribution charges which are the highest in the state.

According to a story by

PRNewswire, the utilities company did file the system-wide rate case with the PUCT on Friday to set regulatory delivery rates for all service territories.

"This filing will consolidate Sharyland's two existing tariffs (one for its Stanton, Brady and Celeste "SBC" service territories and one for its McAllen service territory) into a single tariff that

will set uniform system-wide rates for all territories. The filing proposes \$3 million a year in rate credits for all residential customers which will help hold regulated delivery rates essentially flat for the average residential customer in its SBC service territories..." the story says.

The activities will kick off at 9 a.m. on Saturday, May 28th, with a morning bird hike. The guided hike will last about two hours and should be finishing up around 11 a.m.

"Join our morning guided bird hike as we first will give thanks to those that have served and lost their lives with a moment of silence under the American Flag," O'Haver said recently.

After paying respect to the brave, hikers will take off around the park to visit various habitats and learn about the birds found along the way. Anyone planning to attend should bring binoculars, scopes and cameras if possible to help enhance the program.

It is important that hikers wear weather-appropriate clothing and good footwear for hiking. As the morning progresses, hikers will carpool to a few spots and hike all around within the park. Terrain is expected to be easy to modest.

## Kayaking event open at C-City State Park

If you've ever wanted to try out kayaking, the staff at Lake Colorado City State Park has planned an event suited for beginner kayakers coming up this month. Kayak with a Ranger is set to be held Saturday, May 14th, and everyone is welcome to take part in the program.

Two sessions of Kayak with a Ranger will be held that Saturday. The first session begins at 9 a.m. and lasts until about 10:30 a.m. and the second session is immediately following, from 10:30 a.m. to noon.

The introductory program will teach basic skills and knowledge for kayaking and equipment. Anyone planning to participate should

call the park to sign up ahead of time, as seating is limited.

Personal flotation devices, commonly called lifejackets, are available at the park, but everyone is encouraged to bring their own if possible. Kayaks will be available or you can bring your own to join in on the fun.

There is no cost for the program. Only the daily entrance fee of \$4 per adult and children over 12 must be paid. Children 12 and younger get in free. Also, if you have a valid Texas State Park Pass, there is no charge.

## Asst. D.A. Thompson speaks to Lions Club

Assistant District Attorney Ricky Thompson was the guest speaker at the Colorado City Lions Club weekly meeting at noon on Friday in the civic center. He showed a shocking video and followed by telling Lions about the ways criminals are prosecuted in the 32nd Judicial District.

The video showed part of a traffic stop on Hwy. 84 near Roscoe where a driver was pulled over by DPS State Trooper Galindo for speeding. As the trooper ran the man's license to check for warrants, the driver went back to his car and grabbed a revolver and fired several shots at Galindo.

Fortunately, all shots missed and Galindo returned fire and ordered the man to get down on the ground. The suspect, who was shot in the hand, complied with the order and an off-duty police officer came to aid Galindo. The officer saw the incident as he drove down Hwy. 84, and he stopped and held the suspect

at gunpoint until Galindo could secure the man in handcuffs.

The suspect had a warrant out for his arrest for failure to appear and faced two years in a state jail. Thanks to prosecutors in the DA's office, he's doing 10 years in federal prison for unlawful possession of a firearm by a felon and will face another 60 years in state prison for attempting to murder Galindo.

"Our office has the easy part," Thompson told Lions.

The 32nd Judicial District consists of three counties, Fisher, Nolan and Mitchell. Each county helps with funding, as does the state of Texas. The local district employs investigators who are paid solely out of a drug forfeiture fund.

Thompson said that law enforcement officers file reports following an incident like the one on the video. After the reports are filed, prosecutors in the DA's office follow up with interviews and case investigations.

The cases are presented to the grand jury, and nine of the 12 members of the grand jury must vote to indict in order for a case to be sent to trial. Each county in the district handles trials and appearances a little differently.

After indictments are handed down, suspects are arrested. In Mitchell County, suspects get three dates on trial dockets. Because Thompson and his colleagues serve more than one county, personnel prepare for many cases at one time.

"All kinds of things can happen at trial," Thompson said.

The Assistant DA addressed the question of why many suspects get plea deals, especially when they are sex offenders. He said that the burden of proof is cast on the prosecutors, and proof can be difficult to obtain, especially in cases where the victims are younger.

Thompson said that criminals often get offered plea deals to ensure that they are punished in some way. Probation is used as a tool, as he estimated that about 90% of people don't make it through probation and end up in prison where they belong.

Victims of sex crimes face difficulties when it comes time for trial. "It's usually their word against the suspect's," Thomp-

son said, "and many are reluctant to testify."

In those cases, probation and the requirement of registering as a sex offender is better than the offender getting an acquittal at trial because the victim couldn't testify.

A new law that went into effect on September 1st, changed the way grand juries are selected. Before, a commission selected a diverse group of people to be called for duty on the grand jury. Now, selection is random based on driver's license numbers.

Thompson said the law that was meant to be more fair to minorities has actually caused a completely different result.

Thompson grew up in Sweetwater and graduated high school there. He and his wife are the parents of three young girls. He is the brother of local attorney, Jeannie Fuller.

After winning the Republican nomination in March, Thompson is running unopposed in the District Attorney race and will take over DA duties on January 1, 2017.

## TUMBLEWEED SMITH Where Texas became Texas

It was quite an honor to be asked to narrate the re-enactment of the 17-day convention leading up to Texas declaring its independence from Mexico. The re-enactment occurred at Washington on the Brazos State Historic site the weekend of March 5th and 6th. Steve Haley, a lawyer from Brenham, pored down the hour and a half script used in previous years to a 30-minute version titled BIRTH OF A REPUBLIC. It was performed in the amphitheater twice on Saturday and once on Sunday. It was a record turnout at the park, with 8,500 people attending the Texas Independence Day celebrations.

The six actors wore authentic costumes of the period and the oratory flowed just as it did 180 years ago. Perhaps the most dramatic scene was when a rider on horseback came in with the news that the Alamo had fallen.

The convention opened on March 1, 1836 in a small unfinished building, the only building big enough in the new city of Washington to house the deliberations. Washington was chosen as the site because city fathers agreed to provide the hall at no charge. One of the early settlers, Dr. Asa Hoxey, chose to name the settlement after his hometown of Washington, Georgia.

The 59 elected delegates voted to declare independence from Mexico on March 2. During the 17 days of the convention, they adopted a constitution and organized an interim government. During the convention, Mexican General Santa Anna was attacking the Alamo. When it became apparent that the Mexican Army was advancing in the direction of Washington, the convention ended and the delegates, along with the citizens of Washington, fled to safety. They returned after Sam Houston's volunteer army defeated Santa Anna at San Jacinto on April 21. Washington town leaders lobbied to have their city named capital of the republic but Waterloo was chosen instead. The name was later changed to Austin.

A replica of Independence Hall has been erected at Washington on the Brazos (to differentiate from Washington on the Potomac) State Historic Site. Every Texan should stand in that building and realize what occurred there. The park also has the Star of the Republic Museum, which addresses the years of the Texas Republic, 1836 to 1845.

More than 100,000 people visit the park annually. It is located between Navasota and Brenham in a rural setting. The Alamo, located in downtown San Antonio, gets several times more visitors than WOTB, but the park association is working to make more people aware of the significant history there. The park is open seven days a week. As part of the Independence Day celebration, the names of the 59 delegates are read aloud. Their descendants, who have been invited, cheer when they hear their forefather's name called. The entire weekend features all kinds of entertainment. Next year you should dress up in Texas pioneer clothes and go there.

delivery customers are wanting. They say the rates are already too high and customers in west Texas need relief. Customers in this area are considered to be in the SBC service territory.

Last November, customers who are charged distribution rates by Sharyland gathered at the Settles Hotel in Big Spring to meet with the Office of Public Utilities Counsel (OPUC) and a few of lawmakers. The OPUC is an agency that is supposed to represent residential and small commercial utility consumers' interests.

The OPUC was created by lawmakers in 1983 to specifically represent the interests of consumers.

The agency's website says, "We strive to provide the most up-to-date information available in order to inform, assist and protect Texans with regards to the electric, telecommunications and water service industries."

Unfortunately, the last Sharyland rate case hearing slipped by and no one from the OPUC was at the meeting to lobby for customers and a rate hike requested by the company passed through without much of a fight. Representatives at the OPUC have assured angry customers that it

won't slip by again. Since that time, the market has been deregulated and customers were optimistic about being able to choose a different provider and enjoy lower rates. However, that's not what happened.

Following deregulation, Sharyland became an electric delivery company like Oncor. So, customers that were happy to pick another provider soon saw delivery charges by Sharyland on their bill, often at a cost of more than the electricity usage itself.

Jan Jones, an activist and Sharyland customer in Greenwood, shared the costs of her electric bill from back in November. Her total bill was \$237.07, with usage totaling \$100.25 and Sharyland delivery fees totaling \$136.42, along with taxes and other fees. Jones said that she thinks that the high delivery charges slipped by most customers at first.

The few number of meters in this area, coupled with the large geographical area, give Sharyland a low customer density out here. Company representatives have said the low density is driving up costs and making the high rates a necessity.

Sharyland distributes electricity to about 51,000 meters in

west Texas. Customers with Sharyland as a distributor have even seen a backlash when trying to sell their homes. Jones said that when prospective buyers find out average prices of electric bills, they may lose interest in properties. She speculated that the high electric delivery prices could negatively affect property values in an already depressed market region.

With Sharyland filing its rate case on Friday, Michelle Gregg at the OPUC said there may be action on the case as soon as this week.

"The OPUC is ready to hit the ground running as soon as the case is filed," Jones said.

She went on to say that she has heard that it could take the better part of the year to finish the case hearing.

Sharyland issued a press release last week regarding the rate case, and Mark Caskey, Sharyland Utilities President explained the utilities company position.

"When we acquired Cap Rock Energy, we took over a system that was outdated, in poor shape, and undersized for the load it was already serving," Caskey said. "Five years later, our customers are starting to see the benefits of our investments through a more

robust and reliable system."

The release says that Sharyland is making commitments to its customers as part of the rate case filing, including:

- \$3 million per year in rate credits for all residential customers in all Sharyland territories
- A stronger, more reliable transmission and distribution system
- A detailed explanation of the significant capital investment in transmission and distribution infrastructure over the past three years to support approximately 15 percent annual load growth in the region and to modernize and renovate the outdated Cap Rock Energy system it acquired in 2010

According to the press release, the filing proposes \$3 million per year in rate credits for all residential customers, which will help hold regulated delivery rates essentially flat for Sharyland's residential customers in its SBC service territories, even though

significant investments have been made to support the growth and to improve the system.

"Residential customers in our SBC territories are already experiencing high delivery rates from our 2013 rate case, and we do not want to add to that burden. The \$3 million in annual rate cred-

its that we are proposing will be borne solely by Sharyland Utilities," said Caskey.

exciting to Honeycutt.

"They have the capital to make improvements," she said.

Honeycutt said she expects better benefits for employees, store upgrades and automation to come after Lowe's operations get underway. She expects that things will become more streamlined and efficient under the new ownership.

"We appreciate Judy and her family for the many years of service to Colorado City, and we are honored that they have this opportunity to include this store into our family of grocery stores," Roger Lowe Jr., VP and CEO of Lowe's, said Tuesday.

Both families are committed to making the transition smooth for both the employees and the customers.

Alvarez said that he plans to continue work as the store man-

ager. "I was born and raised a Fullers guy. Raymond treated me like a son, so I will always be a Fullers guy," he said.

Knowing the owners will make the transition easier for Alvarez as well. When he was just 24 years old, Raymond asked Alvarez to become the store manager, but he didn't enjoy it at first. At the time, Fuller Foods employed 48 people, small times when compared to the 85 to 90 it employs today.

After going through five store managers, Raymond went to the young man again. In 1997, Alvarez went from being meat market manager to store manager.

"I told him (Raymond), 'This is for you. I'm doing it for you. I don't do it for the money,'" he said. "I've treated it like I own it ever since."

While the change will be bit-

tersweet for Honeycutt, she said the timing seems right. She said Fullers customers are the reason she's kept the store after the deaths of Raymond and Virginia. Citizens here have supported the store in a number of ways.

"What's in store for Honeycutt? She said she's keeping the house shared by her and her sister, so she can come visit whenever she likes. She still enjoys the small town life that Colorado City affords, but she will also enjoy being able to spend more time with her family.

Talk around town has been that the grocery store will be closed for three weeks after it becomes a Lowe's Supermarket, but that certainly isn't true. Honeycutt said that the store may close three hours early on June 27<sup>th</sup> to allow for the ownership change.

## Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the market or appraised value of your property
- the unequal appraisal of your property
- the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
- any exemptions that may apply to you
- the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal
- the taxable status of your property
- the local governments which should be taxing your property
- the ownership of the property
- the change of use of land receiving special appraisal
- any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board (ARB) that applies to and adversely affects you.

**Informal Review**  
*(Insert description of appraisal district's informal review process, if any, then give name and telephone number of person taxpayer should contact.)*

The taxpayer will be contacted for an informal meeting with the appraiser after their protest has been filed.

**Review by the ARB**  
 If you cannot resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the ARB.

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You will receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening or on a Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD plans to introduce at the hearing to establish any matter at issue. The law provides that before a hearing on a protest or immediately after the hearing begins, you or your agent and the CAD shall each provide the other with a copy of any materials - whether in paper or electronic form - intended to be offered or submitted to the ARB at the hearing. (Multiple copies of these materials typically must be brought to the hearing so that each ARB member has a copy of all the materials to review.) To the greatest extent practicable, the hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative

will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. In most cases, the CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented.

In certain protests, the chief appraiser has the burden of proving the property's value by clear and convincing evidence. You should review ARB hearing procedures to learn more about evidence and related matters. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office or from the Comptroller of Public Accounts at [comptroller.texas.gov/taxinfo/taxforms/50-132.pdf](http://comptroller.texas.gov/taxinfo/taxforms/50-132.pdf).

You should not try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they have not talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

**Review by the District Court, an Arbitrator or SOAH**  
 After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you are not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 60 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. In certain cases, as an alternative to filing an appeal in district court, you may file, not later than the 45th day after you receive notice of the ARB order, a request for binding arbitration with the county appraisal district. In certain cases, you may appeal to the State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH). An appeal to SOAH is initiated by, not later than the 30th day after you receive notice of the ARB's order, filing with the chief appraiser of the county appraisal district a notice of appeal. Appeals to district court, binding arbitration, or SOAH all require payment of certain fees or deposits.

**Tax Payment**  
 You must pay the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute, the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken or the amount of taxes due in the previous year.

## Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB\*

**Usual Deadline**  
 On or before April 30 for residence homesteads and May 31 for all other property (or within 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are not allowed after the ARB approves the appraisal records for the year.

**Special Deadlines**  
 For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the determination was delivered to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change did not result from a protest you filed), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the change was delivered to you.

*(You may insert deadline for protests concerning omitted property if doing so would avoid taxpayer confusion.)*

In 2016, the protest deadline for Mitchell County is June 2nd.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually Feb. 1) or no later than the 125th day after the date you claim you received a tax bill from one or more of the taxing units that tax your property. The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

\* The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or legal, state or national holiday.

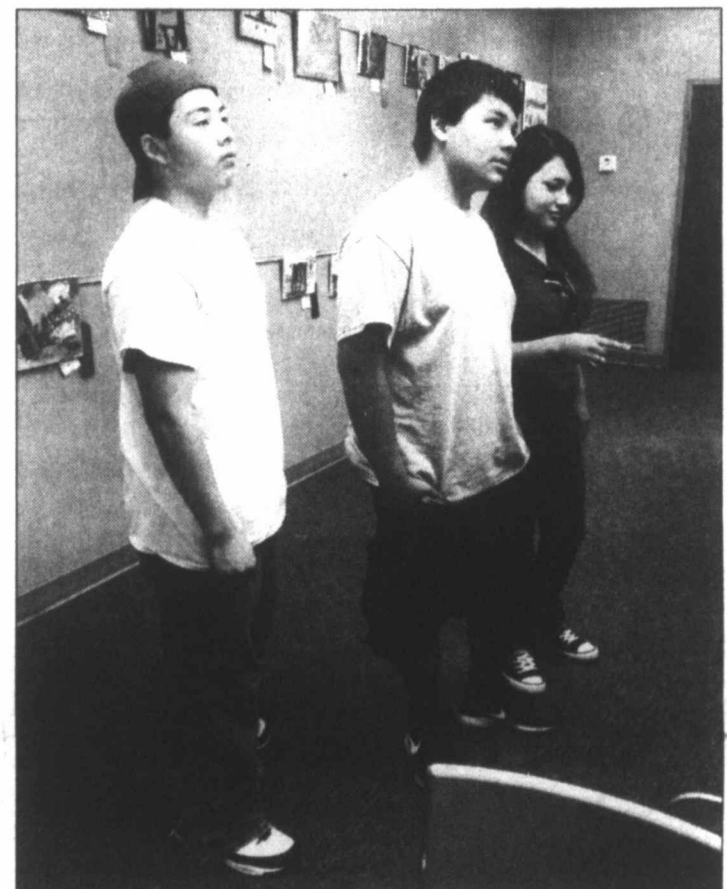


Perez brought the heat against Muleshoe during his outing. Perez held Muleshoe hitless over two innings, allowed no earned runs, walked none and struck out two.

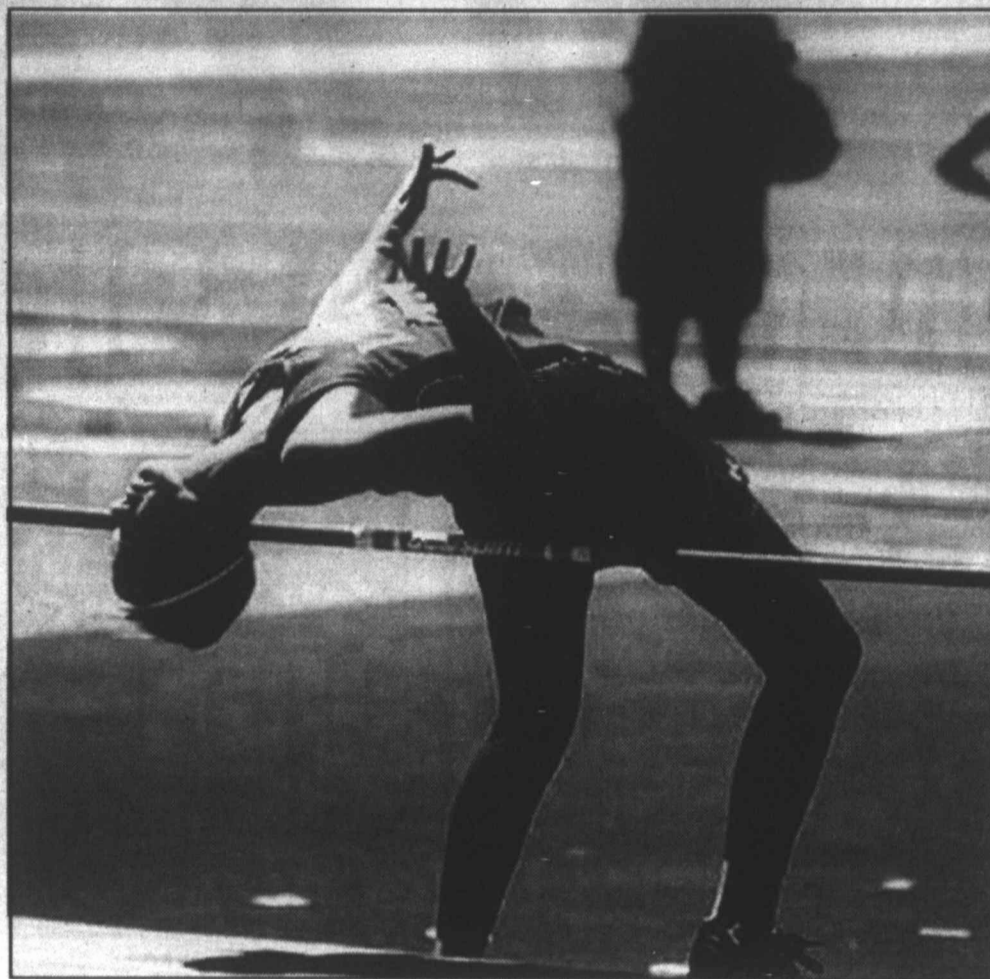

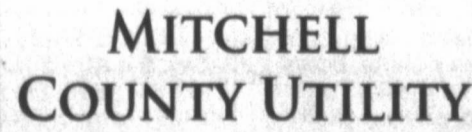

## Motorcycle insurance higher in Colorado City than other parts of Texas

According to an analysis by Value Penguin, Colorado City is among the more expensive cities in Texas to insure a motorcycle. Costs here were found to be a bit above the state average.

Texas is the second most populous (27.5 million residents) and the second

largest state in the U.S. It's known for its diverse landscapes as well as its cattle and oil industries, amongst many other things. The Lone Star State has a great climate for motorcycle riding, so the people at Value Penguin set out to see which citizens have the best

motorcycle insurance rates in Texas.

They gathered motorcycle insurance quotes from five major carriers for a sample 45-year-old male rider. The policy quoted included bodily injury protection of \$100,000 per person/\$300,000 per acci-

dent and \$50,000 in property damage coverage. The study showed the most expensive place for the sample policy was 97.5% higher than the cheapest in Texas.

With Alpine coming in as the #1 cheapest place to buy motorcycle insurance in the state, Colorado City

was ranked 155 out of 230 cities in the study. Folks in Alpine pay an average of \$523 for motorcycle insurance, while people in Colorado City pay an average of \$765. The state average is \$749.

Motorcycle insurance premiums in nearby cities saw less expensive rates. Citizens in Snyder and Sweetwater pay an average of \$716.

Other cities found to have the cheapest motorcycle insurance premiums were Groesbeck, Crockett, Floydada and Canyon. Conversely, the five places with the most expensive

motorcycle insurance in the state include and are primarily near Houston. Listed from most expensive are: Seabrook, Baytown, Houston, San Antonio and Katy.

Residents of Seabrook pay a little over \$1,000 to insure their motorcycles, and those in Katy pay nearly that much with costs coming in at \$943.

The study analyzed motor motorcycle insurance quotes for a sample policy and rider across 320 municipalities and census-designated places in the state of Texas. The quotes gathered were from five major carriers - Progressive, Nation-

wide, Esurance, GEICO and Dairyland.

The rider was a 45-year-old male who was married and had completed a motorcycle training course. He also had a clean driving record. The policy itself included bodily injury protection \$100,000 per person/\$300,000 per accident and \$50,000 in property damage coverage. The deductibles for both Comprehensive and Collision coverage were \$500.

The motorcycle used when gathering quotes was a Harley Davidson Street Glide (1690cc) with no anti-theft device installed.

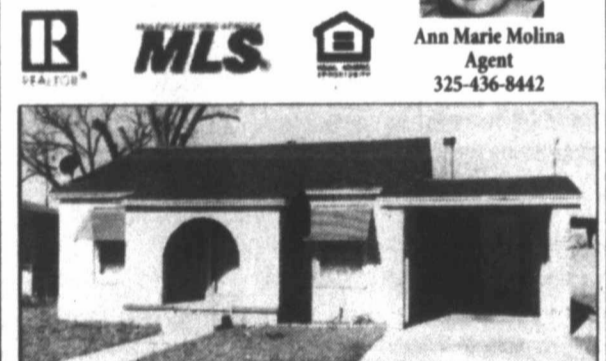
