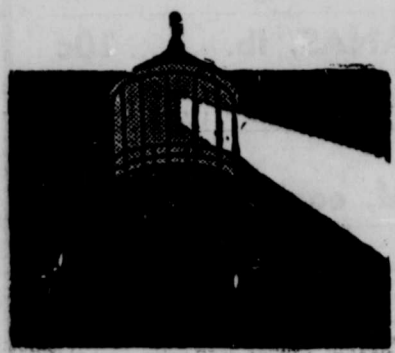

Maynards Honored At Surprise Party

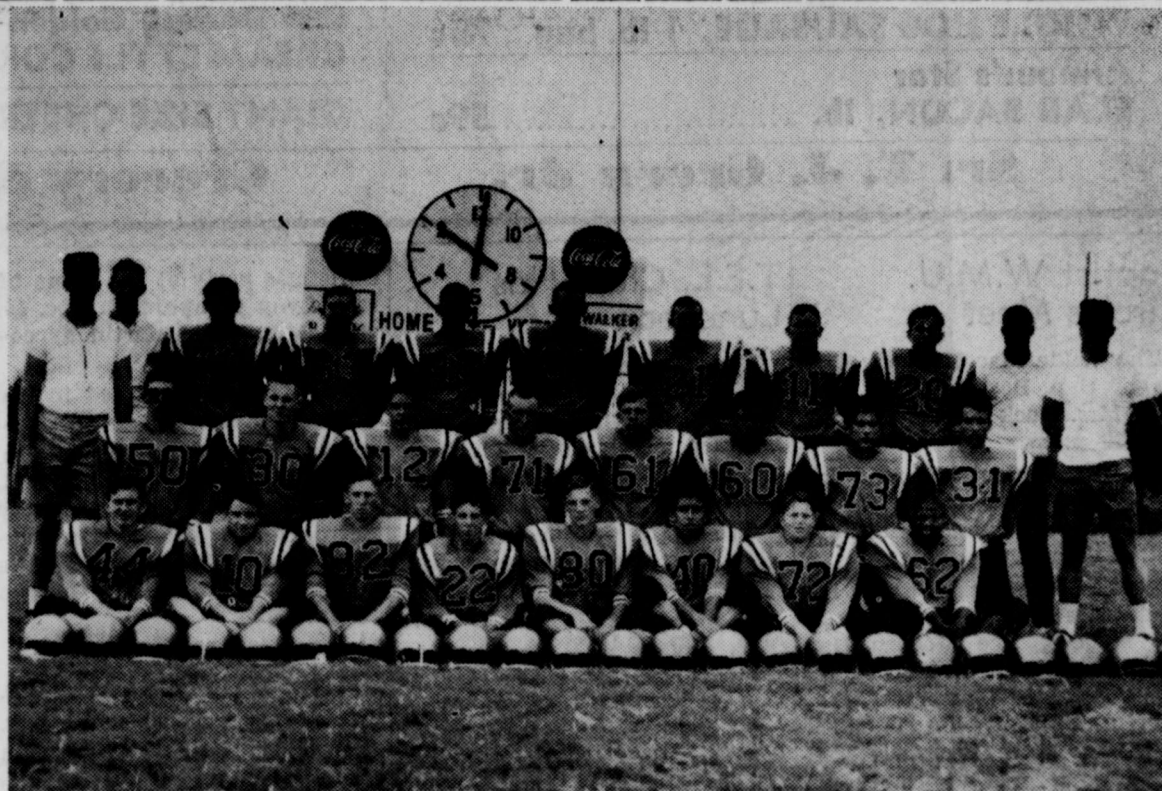
After church services at the First Methodist Church Sunday night, a large group went to the C. L. Maynard home for a surprise housewarming.

BULLDOGS TIE CARDINALS, 14-14 TO END SEASON

With the exception of two personal runs made by Hermleigh sophomore quarterback Tommy Chorn, the Lorraine Bulldogs held the Cardinals to a total of 13 yards, indicating an overall improved defense since the first game of the year.

With 14 seconds left in the first half, Chorn ran 62 yards for a touchdown, leaving the half-time score 6-0 in favor of the Cardinals.

The Cardinals kicked off to the Bulldogs beginning the second half. The Bulldogs fumbled

on the first play, giving the ball to the Cardinals on the Bulldog 33 yard line. In four plays, the Cardinals lost five yards. The Bulldogs took over and drove down to the Cardinal goal line where Terry Brewer ran in for the touchdown from the 11-yard line. The try for extra point failed.

In the third quarter, Chorn moved 67 yards for a TD and also scored the two extra points on a keeper.

With three minutes and 11 seconds to go in the fourth quarter, Terry Brewer drove in for the TD from the 10-yard mark, with tacklers all over him. Ronnie Finley ran off tackle to score the tying two points.

From this time on it was a defensive battle.

Gins Put Out 4,258 Bales So Far

At 2:30 p. m. Monday, the two Lorraine gins had processed a total of 4258 bales of cotton this season. Turning out 1552 bales the past six days.

Spokesmen for the gins said they had a total of 634 bales on their yards awaiting ginning.

Cotton is being harvested at a rapid pace. All available strippers are running, trailers are filled as soon as they are emptied. Farmers are hoping the ideal weather will continue if such is the case, harvesting of the big cotton crop will not last many more weeks.

He had a finer harmonic sense than any other musician of his day in France. She played, Clair De Lune.

Mrs. Pratt played selections from the works of a Bohemian artist, Antonin Dvorak, who was reared in abject poverty yet finally became a very famous musician. He came to America as a director of National Conservatory of Music in New York. Here he composed his greatest orchestral work, The New World Symphony. Mrs. Pratt played Largo, from this selection and Humoresque, which he wrote for his children. She also played three sacred hymns.

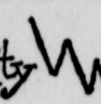
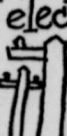
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I live in the country  I have a horse , a calf , some ducks , a baby brother , and a lot of other things they won't let you keep in the city.

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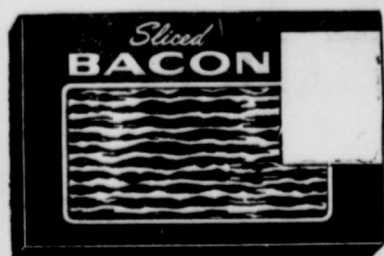
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
