CHICKEN FEED, JUST CHICKEN FEED

If you were one of those old-fashioned individuals who blinked with amazement a few years ago when Dr. Francis E. Townsend came forward with his plan to pay pensions of two hundred dollars a month to all persons over sixty years of age, you ought to be told that the California physician has changed his mind now. He has revised the figure—upward. Doc Townsend thinks now that two hundred dollars a month would be merely a starter. "In a few years," he says, "we'll go to three hundred dollars."

That sounds like an excellent way to make the More Abundant Life a reality, all right; but the Denison Herald considers it a piker's proposition. What's the idea, the Herald wants to know, of stopping at three hundred dollars? Is somebody trying to short-change the deserving old folks? Shucks, the thing to do is to create some honest-to-goodness prosperity by paying pensions in really worthwhile amounts. That's the kind of program the Herald wants to see carried out. It's a humanitarian publication, is the Herald, with a heart as big as a barrel.

Where's the money coming from? "You would raise that question!" exclaims the Denison paper, continuing: "But—phfft! We dismiss it—like that! To raise such a question shows that you belong to the economic royalists and do not have the welfare of the old people at heart. To oppose raising pensions to the moon and taxing the workers out of existence to pay them shows that there is something wrong with your heart. Since the crackpots seem to be in the majority these days, we propose to join them and recommend the payment of REAL pensions to the aged—say about one million dollars a month. If you are going into this thing, why be a piker? Why stop with a measly \$300 a month?"

Why, indeed? We reckon the Herald has showed Doc Townsend up this time.—Texas Weekly.

SELLS TEXAS TO THE WORLD

Declaring that "Texas must tell the world before she can sell the world," Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel this week urged all Texans to co-operate in the drive to place an outstanding exhibit at the New York World's Fair as the first step toward the industrialization of Texas.

"We must advertise to the world the vast resources, the opportunities for industrial development, and the conditions for betterment of life which abound in Texas," the Governor said.

Pointing out that the 45th Legislature created the Texas World's Fair Commission to arrange exhibits at the fair, Governor O'Daniel said that "Recently, at my request, representative business and industrial leaders met with Lieutenant-Governor Coke Stevenson and me to discuss the project. At this meeting considerable sums were pledged and I have since received numerous assurances that others will respond with substantial contributions."

Governor O'Daniel revealed that a feature length motion picture in technicolor covering every phase of Texas life has been made under the sponsorship of Karl Hobbeltzelle of Dallas, vice-chairman of the Commission.

"This picture, covering Texas' historic highlights, resources and potentialities, agricultural and industrial development, scenic attractions and cultural advantages, was produced under the direction of James A. Fitzpatrick of Hollywood, the famous Voice of the Globe travelogue producer. It is the plan of the Commission to show this colorful production, without charge, in Texas' own theatre in the Court of States at the World's Fair," the Governor said.

Home-Spun Farm Security

The pot of gold at the foot of the rainbow still eludes the eager fingers of the hopeful who have been waiting for some magic of government to boost them into prosperity. There are not going to be enough homes for the homeless, enough jobs for the jobless, enough pensions for the aged, to be handed down by some legislative legerdemain of dividing up the wealth already in existence. Government can help and is helping but there will never be "farm security" for those who lean too heavily on outside props and fail to make the most of their own resources at home.

Good home living grows where it is planted and tended, not in legislative halls at the state or national capital. The grass that grows along the branch and in the fence corners will feed a cow or a flock of sheep. The grass that springs up in the cotton patch will keep a flock of geese happy and save hoeing, to say nothing of turning into feathers and luscious meat. The insects that infest the crops and the waste around the barnyard will go a long way to keep a flock of hens. A flock of turkeys will pick boll weevil and leaf worms off considerable cotton.

Terraced fields will give greater yields and properly spaced furrows in the pastures multiply the grass. A mower to keep weeds down does the same. Lambs in the corn field after it is laid by keep grass and weeds down and pay for the privilege. A ditch which can be dug in a day without a dollar of cash outlay will store enough ensilage to feed the family milk cows and their calves through a long hard winter or a summer drought, and when feed is thus stored it can't blow away, burn up, dry out, or decay.

Our frontier ancestors made the most of what they had, and left us a tradition of self-reliance and independence of which we may well be proud. All

around us today are unused opportunities for self-help, (only a few of which have been mentioned) uncultivated resources for added income, unplowed fields of opportunity from which a rich harvest of human satisfaction awaits those who exercise the vision, the resourcefulness and the energy which enabled the pioneers to conquer the continent.

It is quite true that the present generation of farmers haven't the freedom of action, the virgin soils, the unspoiled forests, the luxuriant grass and plentiful game and fish of the pioneers, but we have proportionally more implements with which to work and greater knowledge of how to use the resources left to us than had those rugged old individuals who did the job with an axe and a rifle. The same courage and initiative coupled with the improved crops and livestock, and better information on how to make the best of them, enable the present generation to produce more per acre and get greater returns per hour of labor than the best of our fathers could have done.

The only way a nation can have more is to produce more, whether it be peanuts or flying machines. New wealth is created only by applying thought and work to the materials which are at hand. Real farm security is a grass-roots job first of all, and the help of laws is only secondary. The old saying "God helps those who help themselves," is a mighty good text. Let's grow up, and quit chasing rainbows. Political panaceas and high-flown economic theories

Second Largest Telescope Ready For Use Mt. Locke

Installation of the huge two and one-half ton, 82-inch lens for the University of Texas' McDonald Observatory will be completed this week and the second largest finished telescope in the world will be ready for use. The giant lens arrived at Alpine last Tuesday and was carefully transported by truck 32 miles to the top of Mount Locke, 6,791-foot high Observatory site.

The lens is one-foot thick and accurate to one millionth of an inch. Scientists predict it will place the University of Texas and University of Chicago astronomers in a position to probe the mysteries of outer space more accurately than any efforts heretofore.

Second in size only to the Mount Wilson Observatory lens, the McDonald Observatory glass has been in the progress of manufacture and polishing since December 31, 1933.

When the mirror rests securely in its steel cradle inside the dome, fulfilled will be the desires of the late W. J. McDonald, Paris, Texas, banker and amateur scientist, who willed on his death, in 1926, a \$1,000,000 estate to the University of Texas to finance the "erecting and equipping of an astronomical observatory to be kept and used in connection with and as a part of the University for the study and promotion of the study of astronomical science."

In 1932 The University of Texas emerged from a series of law suits contesting the will with a \$800,000 fund for construction and maintenance of the Observatory. The late President Harry Yandell Benedict, himself an astronomer and mathematician, and President Robert M. Hutchins of the University of Chicago, in April, 1932, began negotiations that resulted in an arrangement that allowed The University of

Texas to plunge immediately to construction with Chicago under a 30-year contract, providing the staff for both the McDonald and Chicago's Yerkes Observatory.

In size competition, the McDonald Observatory telescope, instrument working on the flection principle instead of better-known refractor type, outstripped only by the lenses at Mount Wilson Observatory and the 200-inch eye prepared for the Mount Palomar Observatory, both in California. Competition between telescopes is eliminated by the co-operation plan under which astronomical pool their resources, each instrument being used as a complement to existing apparatus.

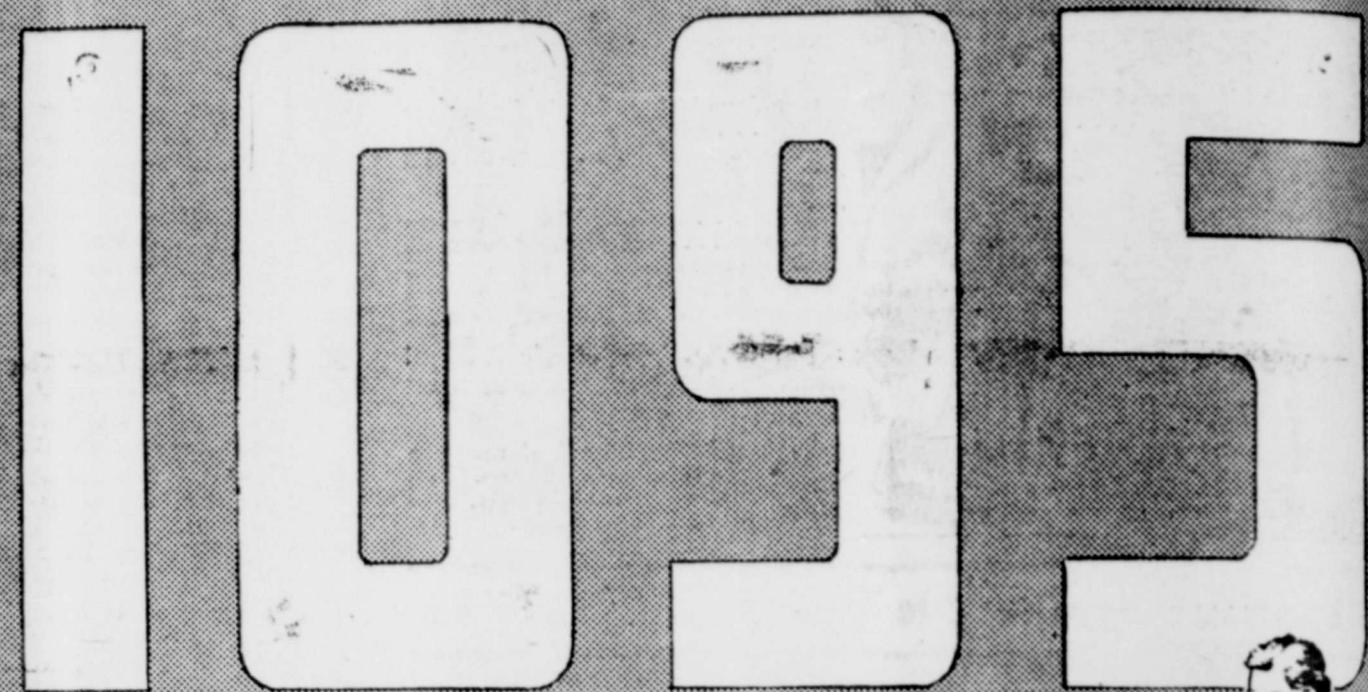

County Hikes Agent's Pay

But Miss Bennett Will Go To Waco, Anyway

Commissioners of Wichita county unofficially agreed Monday to vote an increase of \$110 annually in the salary of Miss Leta H. Bennett, county home demonstration agent, but turned a deaf ear on the plea of a women's delegation for an advance of \$400 per year.

According to delegates present from women's home demonstration clubs, an advance from \$1,000 to \$1,400 per year as the county's share of Miss Bennett's salary would be required to retain her in this county. As a consequence of the commissioners' stand, it appeared settled that Miss Bennett will soon transfer to McLennan county, which recently entered a bid for her services.

One week earlier, Miss Vida Moore, district agent, told the commissioners court that "she thought Miss Bennett would remain in Wichita county if the county's share of her salary were advanced to \$1,200." At that time the court declined to take such action and immediate protest of women's clubs throughout the county against proposed loss of the present demonstration agent resulted in the petition presented Monday by the women's delegation.

Miss Bennett had agreed from the beginning to remain only upon an increase to \$1,400, the court was told. In explanation, the delegation said that in McLennan county, she will be provided with an assistant agent, with a secretary, and will have no work with girls' 4-H clubs.

"Considering the saving to be had in living expenses in McLennan county," Mrs. E. S. Easton of Electra, president of the county council, said, "the \$1,110 offered by McLennan county offers Miss Bennett more compensation than it would in Wichita county; and the work will be lighter."

Mrs. Easton, Gale Lowrance, A. A. Evert and Solon Downing, spokesmen for the approximately 350 members of women's demonstration clubs in this county, pleaded that successful continuation of the excellent work now being done in those groups requires Miss Bennett's retention.

"She is the best demonstrator we have ever had," said Mrs. Downing, herself this county's first home demonstration agent about 19 years ago.

Aside from the county's payment of salary, the home demonstration agent receives \$1,200 salary, and \$300 car allowance annually from the state.

Routine reports were approved by the court during its morning session.

J. M. Isbell, division engineer for the state highway department, and J. R. Fanning, member of the field engineering staff, asked the court again to provide an additional 50-foot strip for right of way on highway 5 west of Iowa Park. Action was deferred to permit further investigation. The additional right of way is desired to permit construction of the new route without disturbing use of the present pavement in lieu of a detour during construction.

His Picture Hangs in Almost Every House In Russia

I want to tell you some little known facts about a man who has been dead almost twenty years; and yet a city of seven hundred thousand people has been named in his honor; and a hundred million people regard him as their Patron Saint.

His name was Lenin, and he started in Russia the greatest economic experiment the world has ever known—an experiment that is bound to have some effect on you and me and almost everyone else in the world.

Lenin was a little, bald-headed, wrinkled man; and when he sat in a chair, his legs were so short that they hardly touched the floor.

He didn't care anything at all about his looks, his trousers were usually too long, his nose was slightly turned up, he had a squint in one eye and he probably never wore a silk hat or a frock coat in his life. He was happily married, and his wife

loved him so much that she refused to leave him when he was exiled; so she went with him into exile in order to look after him and care for him.

As a child, Lenin was serious and gloomy, seldom played with other children and never took part in athletic games. When he grew to be a man, he had no interest whatever in music or poetry or religion; but he studied law and spoke four languages—French, German, Russian and English.

During the great famine of 1891, when millions of poverty-stricken peasants died of starvation, typhus and cholera, Lenin became convinced that something radical had to be done. From that time on, he became a flaming revolutionist.

During the next twenty-five years, he was hounded and driven from one country to another, living at various times in Germany, Austria, France, Poland,

Switzerland and England. When he lived in London, he would often go and sit for hours at a time beside the grave of Karl Marx, the father of Socialism.

He wrote one of his revolutionary books in prison; and, in order to avoid detection, he wrote it in milk instead of ink. The writing could be read only after it was dipped in hot water. He taught his disciples to use invisible ink when they wrote to him.

In November, 1917, Lenin became dictator of Russia and confiscated all private property. The owners of the great estates fled in terror, as the peasants took possession.

Russia was almost starving at the time and Lenin refused to take sugar in his tea because the other people couldn't have sugar. Although he was the supreme ruler of Russia, he wouldn't permit himself to have even the simplest luxuries.

Five years later, he was suffering from hardening of the arteries, and he had a stroke of paralysis. He lost the power of speech, and he had to learn to talk all over again like a child. His right hand was paralyzed so he learned to write with his left hand. For two years, he fought desperately with death, saying over and over again, "There is so much work left for me to do."

His picture hangs today in almost every house, every factory and every worker's club in all Russia. Millions of people worship him almost as if he were a God.

His body now lies embalmed in a glass casket; and probably at this very moment, hundreds of reverent pilgrims are filing by it with uncovered heads. Nearly a thousand a day do him this honor.

One of the most interesting
visitors in Austin recently was
R. C. Bowen of Fort Worth. A
former automobile mechanic, he
has become the most important
figure in bus transportation in
the United States. Bowen, a na-
tive Texan, had the first garage
between Fort Worth and Waco,
at Italy when he was only 18.
In 1918, when the oil boom hit
West Texas, Bowen began run-
ning trucks between Mineral

Wells and the boom towns of
Caddo and Breckenridge, which
had no railroads. Then, with
Breckenridge as the base, he op-
erated many trucks throughout
the oil fields. Selling out this
business in 1925, Bowen turned
his attention to buses.

Half a dozen individuals were
running cars or buses between
Fort Worth and Weatherford; as
many more operated from Wea-
therford to Mineral Wells, and
still others ran between Mineral
Wells and Breckenridge. There
was no regulation or no safety
measures for the passengers, and
layovers were long and tiresome.

That year, Bowen bought out
40 individuals, established the
West Texas Coaches between
Fort Worth and Abilene as well
as Fort Worth and San Angelo.
By connecting with a line at
Llano, he became the first to
give transcontinental bus serv-
ice. Three years later, he sold
one-half of the lines and equip-
ment for \$1,250,000.

To the holdings that he retain-
ed, Bowen has added others un-
til today Bowen Buses have
routes totaling 3,900 miles daily.
His relations with labor have al-
ways been harmonious—his driv-
ers work seven hours a day and
are members of the A. F. of L.
He carried passenger insurance
long before the law required it.
He tries to keep ahead of public
demand with his service, explain-
ing: "The people appreciate your
efforts to give them the very best
and latest." He is spending \$80,-
000 this year to air-condition his
coaches.

"R. C." is quiet, modest and
the easiest fellow to talk to that
you ever met. His career is proof
that our nation still is the land
of opportunity.

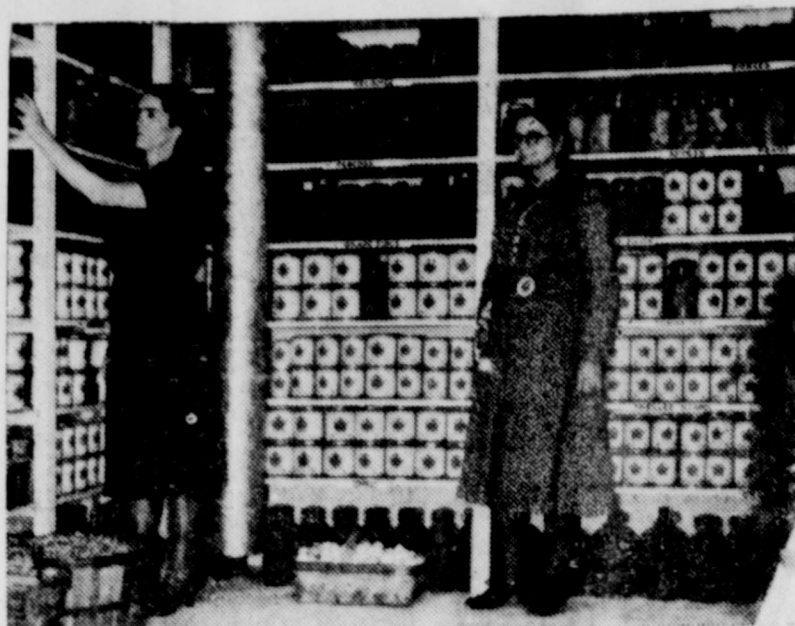

Rural Home Makers' Work Showed Great Progress During Year of 1938



Home demonstration club women and 4-H club girls of North Central Texas made lots of headway during 1938 towards furnishing food, clothing, and shelter for their families, the annual report of Vida Moore, district agent of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, shows. Miss Moore supervises the activities of county home demonstration agents in District 3, a triangle made up of 17 counties and bounded by Wise county on the southeast, Montague on the northeast, Hardeman on the northwest, Stonewall on the southwest, and the Red River on the north. The 5,400 club members in the district planted 2,179,753 row feet—more than 412 miles—of vegetables, and constructed 213 frame gardens for out-of-season production. From the gardens came fresh vegetables and a surplus from which 418,108 pints were canned, 114,426 pounds of vegetables and fruits stored fresh and 126,373 pounds stored in dried form. To further supplement this supply of food these families stored 22,219 pounds of nuts, produced 44,741 pounds of fruit for home use, and added 18,901 pullets to their already established flocks of 27,801 laying hens, which produced 230,331 dozen eggs for home use. To store this food, 351 ventilated pantries and cellars were added during the year. Club women of Archer, Cottle, Foard, Haskell, Jack, Knox, Wichita, Wilbarger, and Young counties specialized on kitchen improvement and renovated 596 kitchens, while 85 new ones were added. Other items of improvement included the addition of 380 windows and 57 cleaning closets. Bedrooms also came in for their share of improvements as 2,611 women and 4-H club girls improved their bedrooms during the year. They added 112 new bedrooms, 444 homemade mattresses, 566 factory made mattresses, 8,727 pieces of bed linen, and 1,392 pieces of furniture, and made 5,513 bedspreads, 531 woolen covers, and 1,775 dresser scarfs. Improvements were not confined to interiors, as more than 900 women and girls worked on the home surroundings. Their work included the sodding of 291 lawns, the planting of 5,350 nursery and 2,493 native shrubs, 7,181 trees, and 1,772 roses. They rooted from cuttings 2,249 plants—and all this at an expense of only \$1,460. Clothing records were kept by 1,302 women and girls, and those showed an average cash expenditure of \$29.25 per person for the year. "These figures represent people, families, and homes," Miss Moore pointed out. "Every figure represents some better fed family, some home made more comfortable, or some person better dressed because of these contributions toward the improvement of rural home life."
