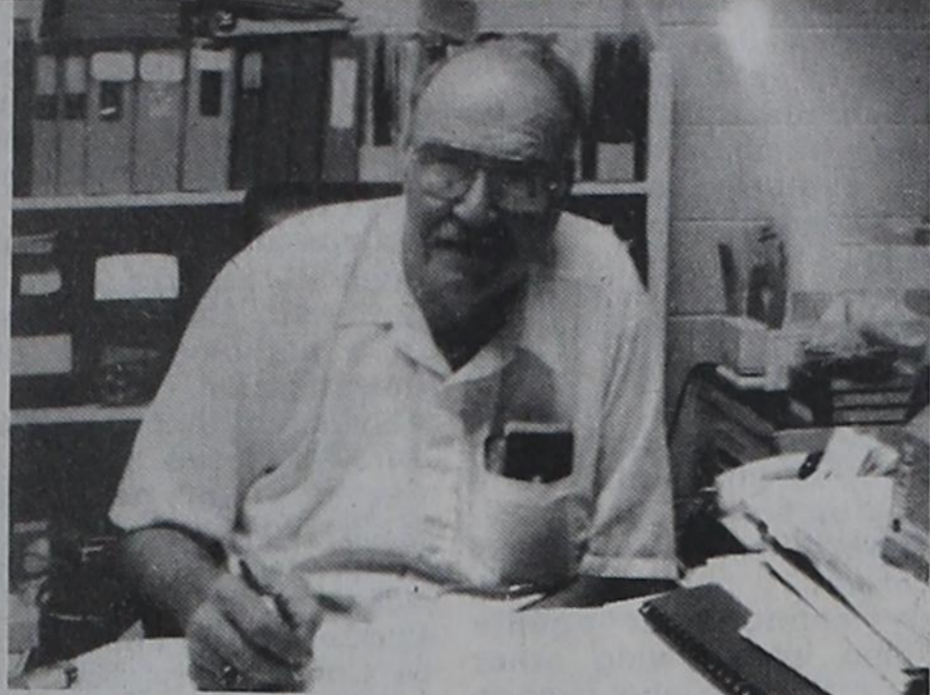

Reception to honor Craig

Farwell Elementary School Principal James Craig will be honored with a retirement reception from 2-4 p.m. May 27 at the Farwell Community Center. Craig is retiring from Farwell Schools after 30 years' service.

He has been here long enough to have taught a lady, her daughter, and been principal to her granddaughter. He has also worked with two generations of several families.

Craig was born in Sherman County Texas. He graduated from Plainview High School in 1945, and then he earned his bachelor of science degree from Wayland Baptist in 1949.

Craig farmed in Sunray, Texas for the next 10 years. Three of those years Craig served on the school board there.

He returned to college to earn his teaching certificate, by taking courses at West Texas State and Eastern New Mexico University.

In 1960 he accepted a teaching position in Farwell. Later he returned to school to earn a master's degree from Eastern New Mexico University.

"Teaching per se hasn't changed all that much," said Craig of the differences since he began his career, "but there are all sorts of legislative demands on teachers today like the essential elements which must be taught and mastered and documented. These are all things that good teachers were already doing. If they would just let them teach, things would be a lot better. Instead, we have all of this increased accountability."

The first year Craig taught in Farwell he had a high school Texas history class with 56 students in it. "That wouldn't happen today, but somehow we survived," he noted.

Craig started coaching junior high girls' basketball the second year he was here. "I had a couple of excellent groups of kids," Craig said of his teams proudly.

He vividly remembers playing Springlake- Earth 7 times one year. Springlake eventually beat Farwell in the district playoff that year with a team that took Springlake- Earth High School to state a few years later when the girls were in high school.

Back in those days, Farwell Junior High played at least 30 games in a season instead of the 12-15 that they play today.

"We had lots of support from the parents," Craig remembers.

Besides coaching and teaching, Craig also drove a school bus those first years in Farwell.

"I made \$3,240 a year plus my bus drivers' pay," he noted. That was enough to feed his family and allow them to buy a house. "Things have sure changed."

Craig taught and coached 2 years. Then he served 16 years as the junior high principal. He spent his 19th - 23rd years as an administrative assistant and business manager for the schools. He has been the elementary principal for the past 6 years.

"I worked in the tax department the 5 years that I was in the administration office. I was business manager and a tax officer," said Craig.

In those days, there was no central appraisal office for the county. Dorothy Eason was the tax assessor.

"I did all the appraising of rural property in the district," said Craig.

Which of these many and varied assignments did he like best? "At a given time I enjoyed all of them," said Craig.

"When I was the junior high principal, I didn't think there was any way I could handle elementary kids," he laughed. Now he admits that though he "loves all the kids, particularly the elementary."

One of his teachers, Nancy Roberts, summed up Craig's relationship with the children: "They come up to him in the lunch room and just hug him. When they go to the office, it hurts them to tell James that they have done something wrong. He is so large that he could seem like a monster to them, but he is more like Santa Claus."

Mrs. Roberts also noted many of the improvements to the elementary school over the past few years- many of which were done at his instigation.

The classrooms have been carpeted and there is now a computer for each class. There are even some compact laser disks for teaching certain subjects. The second grade classroom has a unique playhouse/ puppet theater that Craig designed and built.

Improvements to the playground are some of the most recent additions to the school. The Farwell P.T.A. members had asked for a few improvements, and the school board voted to allocate some funds for the project. But, it was Craig who designed most of the new equipment and found local businesses to provide time and materials so that the playground was substantially improved at a cost far below the prices in a playground equipment catalog.

"James is always coming back from places like Army Surplus stores with boxes of useful items," said Mrs. Burch.

Even though Craig is retiring, he will still remain active. He has long been involved in the Texico - Farwell Lions Club and the Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church.

"School matters will be one of my interests when I do retire. I'm still interested in the school we have here," said Craig said.

Craig and his wife, Nelle, also plan to do some fishing and traveling when he retires.

"I still have my farm, and I'll go help my brothers and nephews with the harvest," said Craig.

He also plans to spend some time with his daughters, Loyce Anne Mills of Forsan, Texas; Robyn Allyce Palady of Amarillo; and Jamey Lynne Craig of Gatesville; and his six grandchildren.

The Texico City Council voted Tuesday to support the planned cleanup campaign.

Councilman Ronnie Warmuth is spearheading the task. A "brainstorming" session is scheduled at 6:30 p.m. mdt June 4 at Texico High School (classroom No. 5) for ideas. The public is invited.

The resolution passed by a 3-0 council vote (Bryan Kube and Oran Jay Autrey were absent) read:

"Whereas, the community of Texico periodically needs to rejuvenate itself, and

"Whereas, the problem of hazardous debris, vacant and dangerous buildings, and abandoned vehicles has steadily grown worse, and

"Whereas, it is the responsibility of the council for the City of Texico to provide a safe and secure environment for its citizens;

"Therefore, the Council of the City of Texico resolves to support a proposed community-wide cleanup, in any manner necessary and convenient as allowed by law for the interest of its citizens."

The council also had a lengthy discussion of the proposed cleanup, especially dealing with large debris.

City Attorney Duane Hamar explained the laws dealing with various situations and the routes the council can take.

Along these lines, Hamar said he would start foreclosure proceedings against the owners of the Westerner Motel. The motel has an unpaid utility bill of about \$400.

Hamar will file a lawsuit to seek a court order to sell the motel property at public auction to satisfy the lien.

In other business: Mayor Doyal LaRue said that councilman Kube plans to resign since he has moved from Texico to Lubbock. A new councilman will be sought.

Water Supt. Billy Hammit

reported that a bad valve has caused problems with the tower well pump. Six homes were without water Monday night and three others Tuesday. Water has been restored to those homes.

A new valve was to arrive Wednesday afternoon, with

Other persons interested in serving on the board should contact Atchley.

Another meeting will be slated by Atchley. It will take awhile for the program to be set up since the board needs to be incorporated.

More support has been given for the community-wide cleanup planned for Texico this fall.

Ronnie Warmuth, Texico councilman who is spearheading the effort, said he has received a letter of endorsement from the Curry County Commissioners.

The commissioners said that manpower and equipment will be made available when Texico requests it for the cleanup.

Warmuth also reported that the National Guard has offered its assistance, both in manpower and equipment.

Warmuth has sent out let-

ter to Texico and Twin City churches and organizations asking them to support the cleanup and to send a representative to a "brainstorming" session June 4.

This meeting is open to the public. And any groups or churches not contacted are asked to send a representative.

The meeting will start at 6:30 p.m. mdt in Classroom No. 5 at Texico High School. The room has blackboards, which are ideal for "brainstorming."

The deadline for letting Warmuth know if they plan to support the cleanup is May 31.

The idea behind the brainstorming session is to get as many ideas as possible. This will be followed up with more specific sessions to coordinate the work.

The cleanup is scheduled to begin in September. It may take a day, a week, a month or several months.

Ideas range from picking up trash to removing large pieces of rusted junk to planting flowers and shrubs.

A note from SPS' Jim Martin:

Now that folks are spending more time outdoors due to the warmer weather, it's also time to remind you to be careful around power lines and electrical facilities.

When you trim trees, repair roofs and do other things around the house that might bring you into contact with

overhead lines - watch it! And a note to farmers: Metal irrigation pipe is an excellent conductor of electricity. Moving a tall section of pipe or lifting it to dislodge an animal, for example, could be fatal if there's a power line overhead.
And if you install an evaporative cooler, watch out for a puddle of water around it.

We do not have a list of the honors given at the Farwell High School Honors Picnic because no list was kept.

Law enforcement agents continue to gather information about former Bovina resident Diana Lumbrera, 31, who has been charged in Garden City, Kansas with first-degree murder in the death of her 4 year old son, Jose.

While Mrs. Lumbrera lived in Texas, five of her children and one child under her-care also died.

Parmer County Deputy Sheriff Richard Bonham said the Texas Rangers have joined the county sheriff, Bovina Police, and Castro County Sher-

iff's office in the investigation.

"We are gathering records and interviewing people who knew her," said Bonham.

He indicated that The Texas Rangers would be able to assist in gathering information from places like Lubbock or Amarillo.

Bovina Police Chief Gary Coleman is contacting an ex-husband who now lives in Pecos, Texas. Mrs. Lumbrera appears to have had more than one ex-husband, but the law enforcement agents do not have all the facts in this matter yet.

Law enforcement agents are also interviewing other family members and friends of the family about the deaths of the children.

According to District Attorney Johnny Actkinson, the law enforcement agents are gathering birth certificates, death certificates, marriage licenses, divorce decrees, medical records and autopsy reports from as many sources as they can find.

In Texas, autopsies must be ordered by a judge or justice of the peace. Once an autopsy is completed, one copy of the record goes to the judge who ordered it, and the other copy goes to the doctor who treated the child. Part of

the problem lies in finding out who has what records.

There was one autopsy ordered here in Parmer County on one of Mrs. Lumbrera's children by Friona Justice of the Peace Frances Euler. Law enforcement agents have those records.

Once all of the autopsy and medical reports have been gathered, they will be sent to a pathologist for careful investigation. "We will probably send these to Dallas," said Actkinson. He noted that Parmer County has used their facility in the past.

Actkinson also said that an autopsy was done on Jose Lumbrera, the child who died in Garden City, Kan., which was done almost immediately

after the child died.

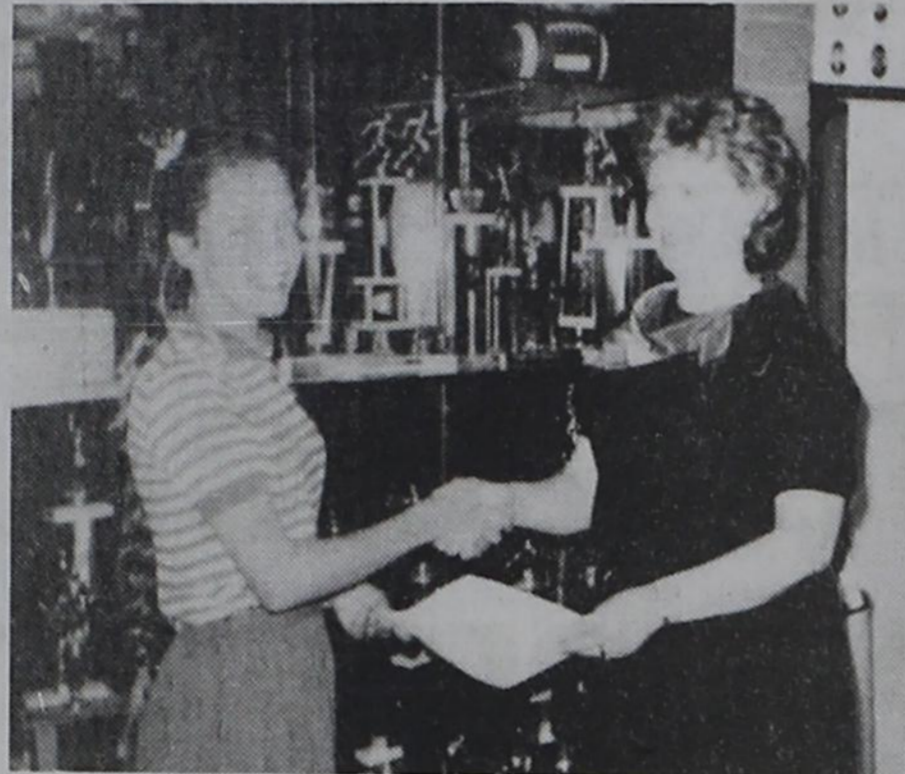
"As I understand it, there was a seminar of criminal pathologists in town (Garden City) at the time of the death. There were about 20 renown pathologists there at the time," said Actkinson.

Actkinson related that he had heard from the County Attorney and prosecutor in Finney County, Kan., that a second autopsy was done on Jose Lumbrera later.

The first autopsy was done on the child almost immediately after death. It listed the death as "asphyxia due to smothering."

A second autopsy reportedly ruled death by "asphyxia not related to criminal causes."

Mrs. Donahey was a member of First United Methodist Church and was a charter member of the Pleasant Hills Ladies Club.

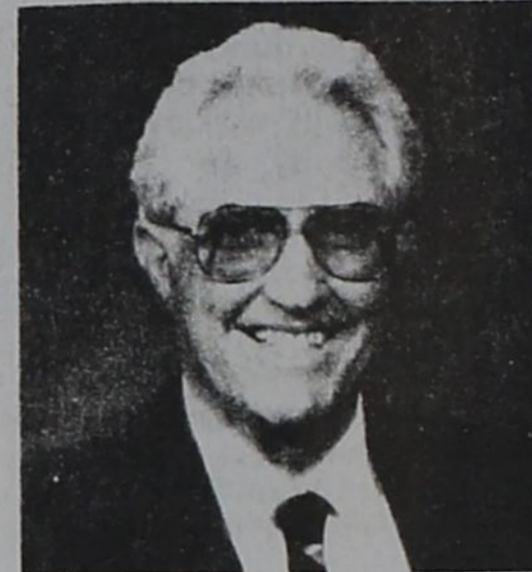
She is survived by 1 daughter, Geraldine Burford, Texico; 5 grandchildren; 11 great-grandchildren and 2 great-great-grandchildren.

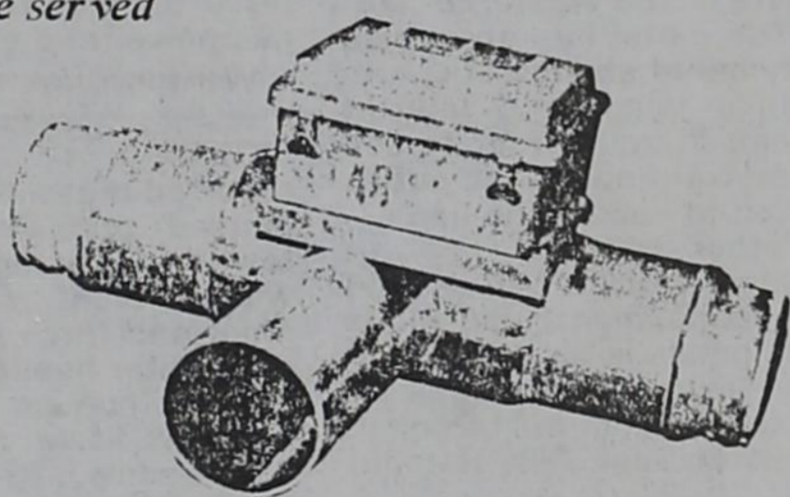

she has participated in basketball and golf. Kaci is a member of National Honor Society, Band, Student Council, and FHA.

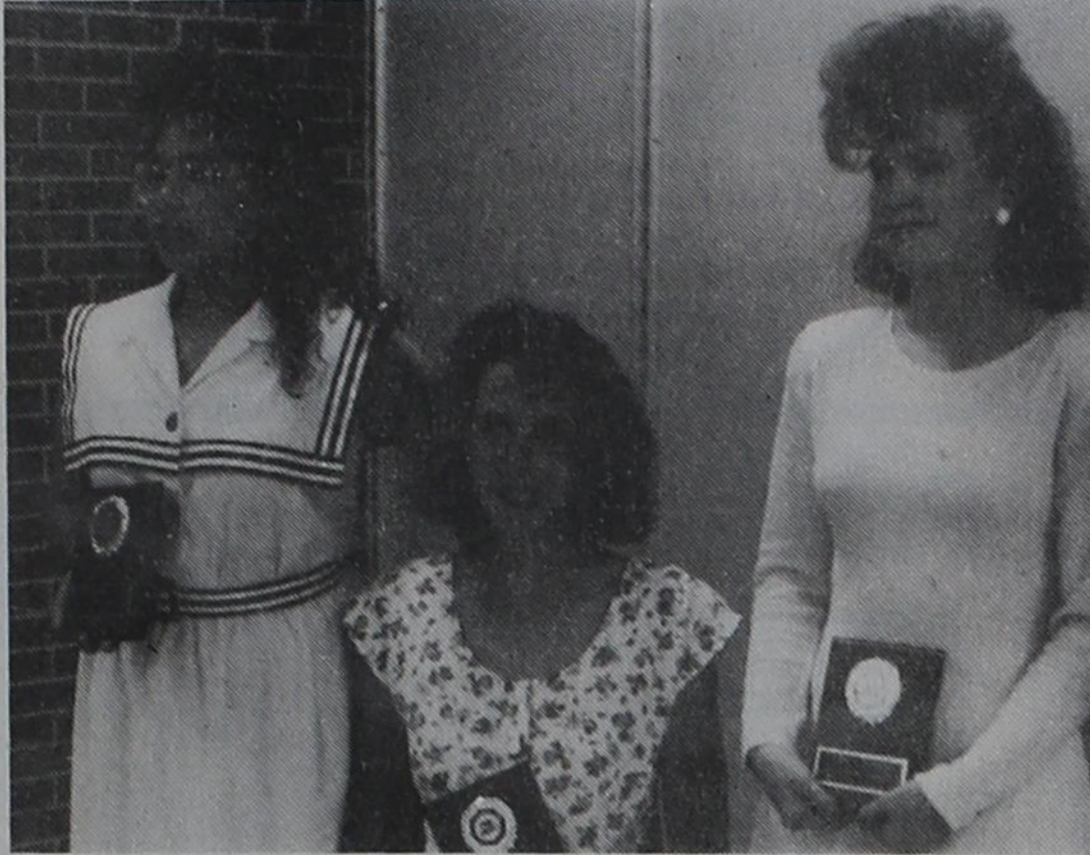

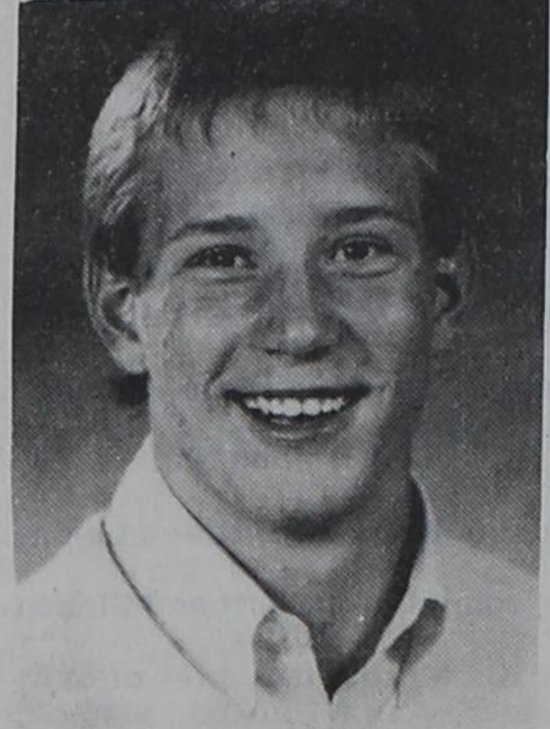
- On May 18, Michael Bermea Perales, 26, Hereford pled guilty to driving while intoxicated subsequent. He

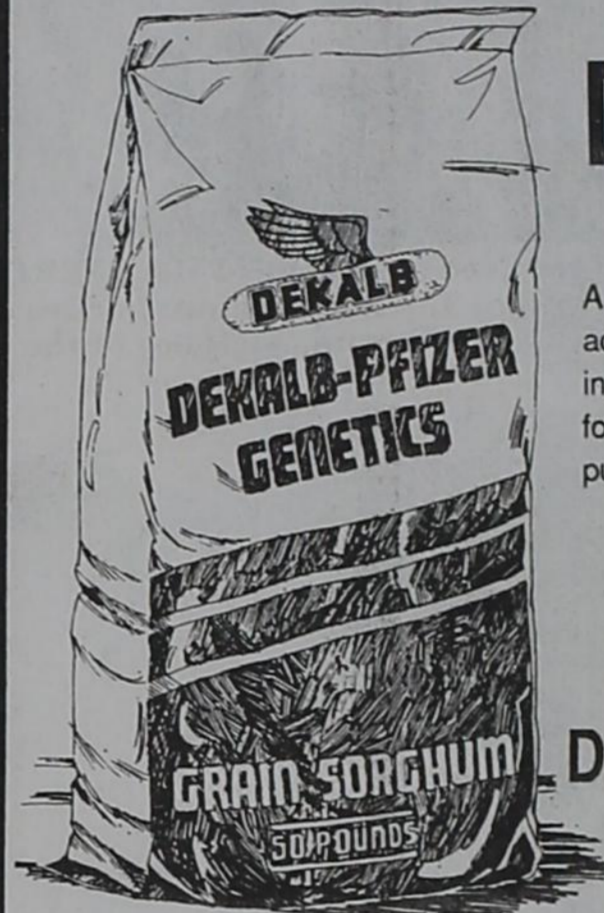

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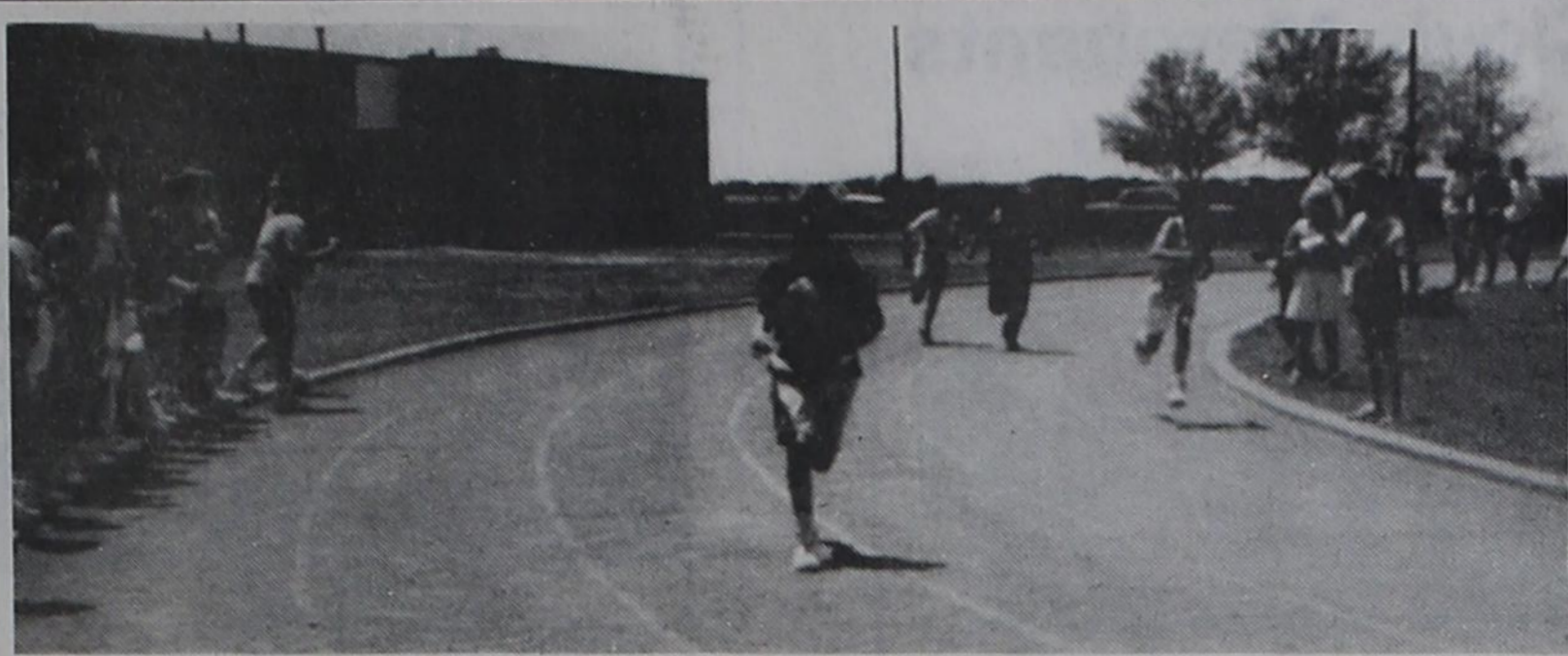
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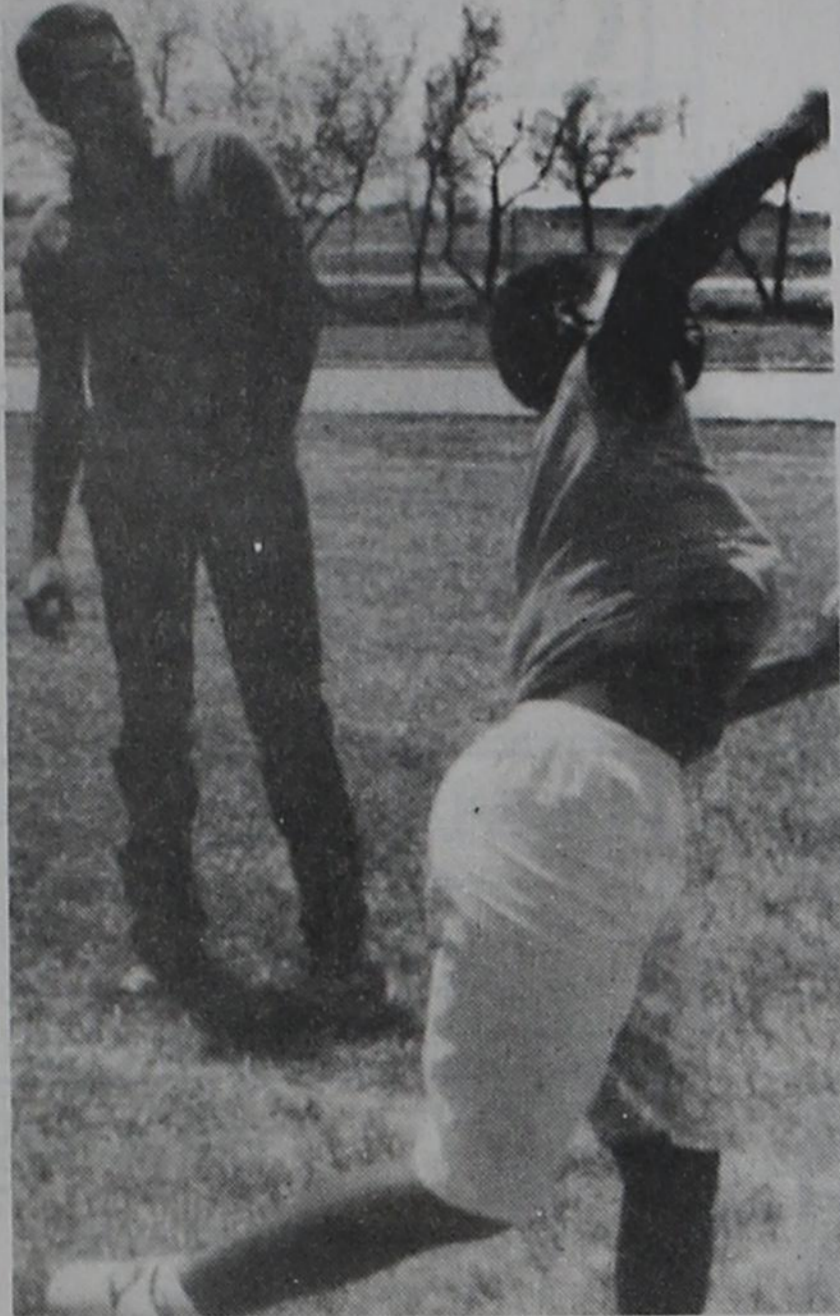

Hutchins was named to the Deans' List which requires a grade point average of 3.250 or above.

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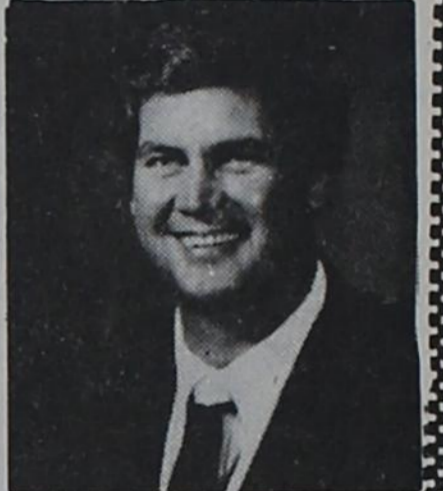

Recipe of Week

Bankok Beef Bundles

- 1- 1 1/4" thick top sirloin steak, cut into 1/4" slices
- 1/4 c. lemon juice
- 1/4 c. brown sugar
- 1/4 c. soy sauce
- 2 cloves garlic, crushed
- 1/4 c. peanut oil, divided
- 8 large lettuce leaves (redleaf suggested)
- 1/2 c. alfalfa or radish sprouts (radish is spicier)
- 4 scallions, chopped
- 2 tbs. minced cilantro tops
- 2 tbs. minced fresh mint
- 1 recipe Tangy Dipping Sauce below

Combine first five ingredients and 2 tablespoons of the oil. Marinate at least one hour (overnight is ideal). Drain meat on paper towels. Heat one tablespoon of oil in skillet or wok. Add half of the meat and stir - fry rapidly over high heat. Remove cooked meat and keep warm. Repeat with the remaining 1 tablespoon of oil and meat. Divide meat among lettuce leaves. Top with sprouts, scallions, cilantro and mint. Roll up each lettuce leaf like a burrito, folding one end over meat and rolling lettuce around the filling. Serve bundles with small dishes of Tangy Dipping Sauce.

Tangy Dipping Sauce

- 1 clove garlic
 - 1 small dried or fresh chile pepper
 - 1 tbs. lemon juice
 - 3 tbs. soy sauce
 - 3 tbs. water
 - 2 tbs. peanut butter
 - 1 tbs. brown sugar
- Puree garlic and chile in a blender or food processor. Add remaining ingredients and process until smooth.

Everything You Always Wanted To Do With Leftovers

- 1 lb. leftover roast, steak or stew beef, cut into bite size cubes
- 2 green bell peppers, chopped

- 1 red bell pepper, chopped
- 4 large ripe tomatoes, chopped
- 1 c. chopped red onion
- 1 15 1/2 oz. can 3 bean - salad
- 1/2 c. green salad olives, sliced
- 12 ripe olives, sliced
- 1 c. medium or long grain rice
- 1- 14 oz. can artichoke hearts, chopped
- 1 - 4 oz. can green chilies, chopped fine
- 1/2 c. zesty Italian salad dressing

Mix all ingredients. Stir in Italian dressing, cover and chill in refrigerator overnight.

(If you do not have leftover meat, you will need to brown a tender cut of beef that has been cubed in 2 tablespoons vegetable oil until desired doneness.)

The Texico Chamber of Commerce voted Monday to have a garage sale in June to benefit Chamber projects, such as the renovation work at the Community Center.

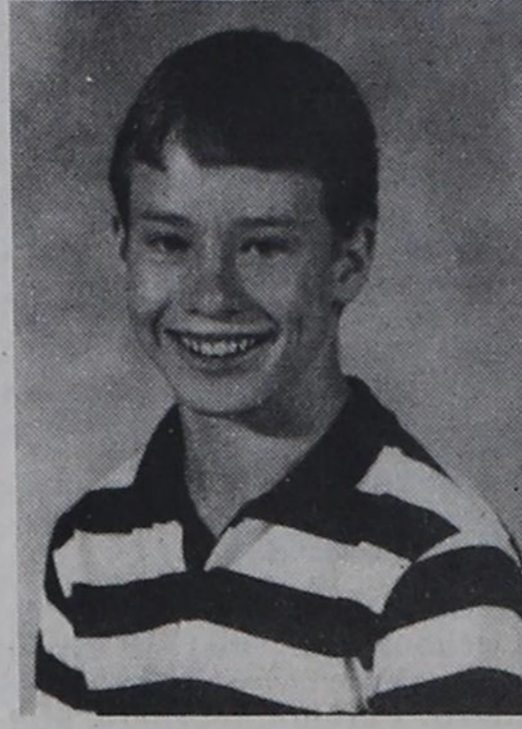
Ann Cooper will spearhead the sale, tentatively scheduled for mid-June.

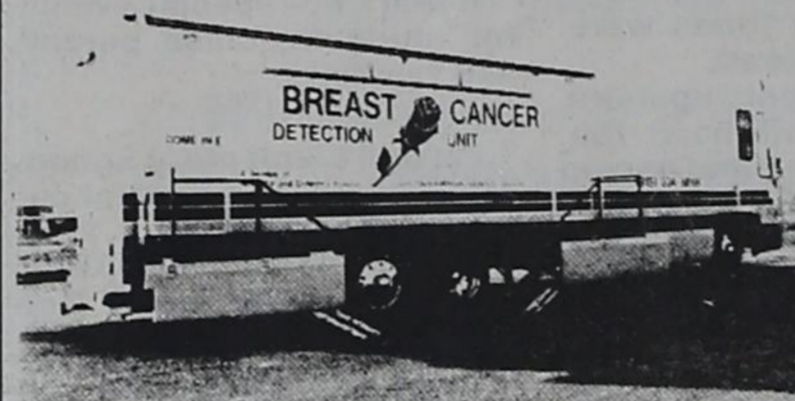
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

Discounts will be lower

Assuming an average quality crop, discounts on 1990 High Plains cotton will be lower than in 1989, according to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

Looking at a schedule of loan program premiums and discounts just released by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, PCG concludes that the preponderance of area cotton this year will be discounted from 40 - 60 points (.4-.6 cents) less than last. That, together with a base quality 50.25 cent loan, 20 points above last year, will mean 1990 loan values three to four dollars per bale higher than in 1989, PCG points out.

Standard procedure is for each year's discounts to be set at the simple average of the previous year's loan discounts and average spot market quotations for the first seven months of the same marketing year. But, as discussed below, there was an obvious departure from that procedure in 1990.

Most High Plains cotton falls in the white, light spot and spotted grade categories, staples from 30 through 34-32nds of an inch (30's through 40's), and carries mike readings ranging from 2.6 through 4.9. There also are changes in this year's mike discounts, but they will have little net effect on average loan values because decreased discounts on staples 30 and shorter are largely offset by increased discounts on longer cottons.

Outside these involving staple 32, discounts for 1990 are lower on 80 percent of the grade and staple combinations that dominate High Plains production. Curiously, however, that percentage is almost the exact opposite for 32's, on which discounts were raised on 17 of the 21 staple 32 qualities above the spotted grade. It will be noted also that while discounts on almost all qualities of 32" were increased, discounts on all qualities of 33's, without exception, were decreased... in amounts generally larger than the norm for other staples.

The Plainview Production Credit Association (PCA) received a Farm Credit Achievement Award from the Farm Credit Bank of Texas (FCBT) for the second consecutive year.

Directors of the locally-owned cooperative are H.L. Porter, Jr. of Petersburg, chairman; Bill Carthel of Friona, vice-chairman; Troy Christian of Farwell; Willie Gene Green of Olton; Harley Wells of Plainview and Bill Black. The association has offices in Plainview, Dimmitt, Floydada, Friona, Muleshoe, Olton, and Tulia.

In making the announcement, farm officials commended the PCA on its financial strength and high quality portfolio.

"The association board and management team have demonstrated their ability to effectively direct and manage the association's business affairs for the benefit of its stockholders," said Paul S. Day, president of the FCBT's Production Agriculture Lending Operations.

"Plainview PCA has been attentive to its financial position and developed a financially strong organization," he added, "and has exhibited the ability to control credit risk while maintaining a loan portfolio of the highest quality."

In accepting the award, Association Chairman H.L. Porter said, "We have always placed the best interest of our member borrowers first and that has been the foundation of our strength as a PCA."

"We will continue to abide by that philosophy, as we strive to meet the credit needs of farmers and ranchers in our area in the years to come," he added.

Plainview PCA has approximately \$72 million in loans outstanding to approximately 870 farmers and ranchers in eight counties.

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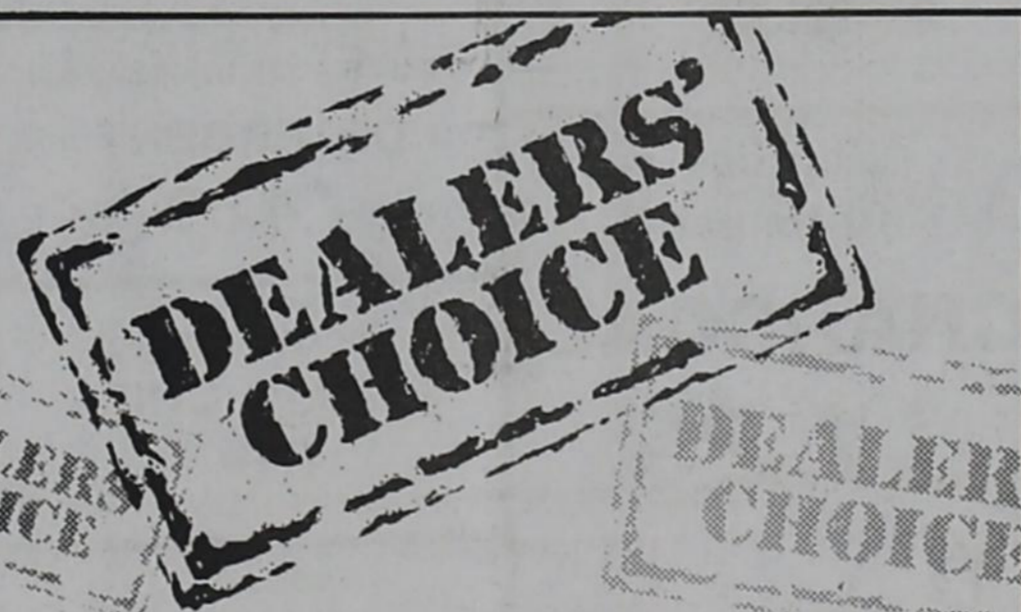
