## COMMUNITY PUBLIC SERVICE CO. WINS 1ST PLACE SAFETY AWARD

Community Public Service Company has again won first place in its group in the Public Utilities Division of the National Safety Council's annual fleet safety contest, it was announced at the National Safety Congress in Chicago on October 19.

This is the seventh time Community has won such a first-place award since the National Safety Council began its fleet award program 15 years ago, says Floyd Hamilton, CPS manager here. In addition, the power company has won two second-place awards and one third place award during the 15-year period.

Community's fleet, which is

comprised of 277 vehicles, operated 4,013,000 miles during the 12-month contest period with only eight chargeable accidents. This is a rate of .19 accidents per 100,000 vehicle miles. Average rate for the 37 utilities reporting in the group is 1.30.

Community Public Service carries on an intensive year-round safety education program for employees, not only for vehicle operation but also in personal and line safety techniques. Responsible for this continuous safety program is the CPS safety department headed by Personnel and Safety Director W. J. Milligan of Fort Worth. Safety director for this area is Joe Garrison.

## Hunting Season Opens For Geese

Geese and duck hunters who plan to hunt either in Texas or Oklahoma should purchase a federal duck stamp. The stamps, at \$3 each, may be purchased at the Post Office.

Goose season starts Nov. 3 and will continue thru January 1. The bag limit is five in possession and additional provision restricts hunters to not more than two Canadian geese.

Duck and coot season is from Nov. 18 thru Dec. 17, both days inclusive.

Quail season opens Dec. 1 and runs thru Jan. 16, with the bag limit set at 12 per day with 36 in possession.

Deer season opens Nov. 16 and goes through Nov. 20, both days inclusive. Turkey season is the same as deer season with the limit being one gobbler per person per season.

Squirrel season is open now and will continue thru Dec. 31. Dove season ends Oct. 30.
