Baseball Camp Is Set At LCC

Bobby Moegle, head baseball coach at Monterey High School, has been named director of the newly formed West Texas Baseball Camp to be conducted this summer at Lubbock Christian College. The announcement was made by Dr. Herman B. Segrest of Texas Tech's Physical Education Department, who will have general charge of camp arrangements.

Moegle will conduct instructions on the basic fundamentals of baseball for boys 8 through 16 years of age at four different sessions, the first one beginning June 7. "We feel there is a definite need to provide boys in the West Texas area with instruction in the fundamentals of baseball," Moegle commented. "We don't intend to interfere with their Little League or Colt League activities or instruction—rather we want to supplement that instruction."

Moegle is beginning his fifth year at Monterey after spending three years in the St. Louis Cardinal farm system. His teams have won the District 3-AA title every year since he came to the Lubbock school. They have also reached at least the regional round of the play-offs and twice have gone to the state play-offs at Austin.

Sixteen of his graduates are currently playing major college baseball. Tro signed pro contracts right out of high school and several others turned down the pros in favor of college.

In addition to the baseball instruction a full slate of recreational and social activities are planned for each two-week session according to Dr. Segrest. "The boys will live in the new dormitory at LCC and will be supervised by college trained men," he added. The regular college dietitian will be on duty to supervise the preparation of all meals and the full facilities of the LCC Fieldhouse will be available to them. The baseball sessions will be conducted in the morning and afternoon with the recreation at night.

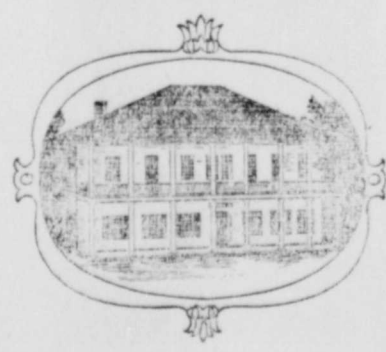

Reese Sets 2 Open House Dates In May

Reese Air Force Base will open its gates to the public on two separate dates during May, featuring the latest and best in modern aerospace equipment. On May 9 the base will join others throughout the nation in observing Armed Forces Day. On May 30, the world-famed Thunderbirds, official Air Force aerial demonstration team, will present an air show at Reese, while flying the sleek, speedy F-105 jet fighter. The Thunderbirds just recently changed to the more modern craft, with the show at Reese one of the first with the F-105.

Scheduled for the Armed Forces Day afternoon Open House are ground displays of various aircraft and equipment of the Army, Navy, Marines, National Guard and other military organizations, including the T-37 and T-38 jet planes used in Reese undergraduate pilot training, and H-43 helicopters serving as rescue aircraft.

During the afternoon the three types of aircraft will join in aerial demonstrations.

Reese gates will be open to the public from 1 to 4:30 p.m., with the public invited.

Reese, since it was reactivated in the fall of 1949, has served as the focal point for Armed Forces Day activities, with all military units of the area invited to cooperate in presenting "Power for Peace." This year the project officer is Lt. Col. Phil Harrington, Reese wing executive officer. "This year we are extremely

hopeful that South Plains families take a close look at the T-38 jet aircraft in which Reese is producing some of the Air Force's finest pilots," said Col. Harrington. "The T-38, capable of flying faster than the speed of sound, will perform in the air in various formations for the public to examine."

"Most students who come for training at Reese have never flown an airplane. The T-37 in which they get early training is an interesting plane, and also will be on the ground for inspection and will join in the aerial show."

"An important aircraft for the Air Force is the H-43 helicopter, which rescues downed aircrews and assists in putting out fires which might follow aerial mishaps. South Plains people will find this helicopter very interesting, both on the ground and in the air."

The colonel expects to have other interesting displays for Armed Forces Day, as well.

In past years, Armed Forces Day at Reese has drawn upward of 20,000 visitors annually. This year thousands also are expected to throng to the base during both open house celebrations.

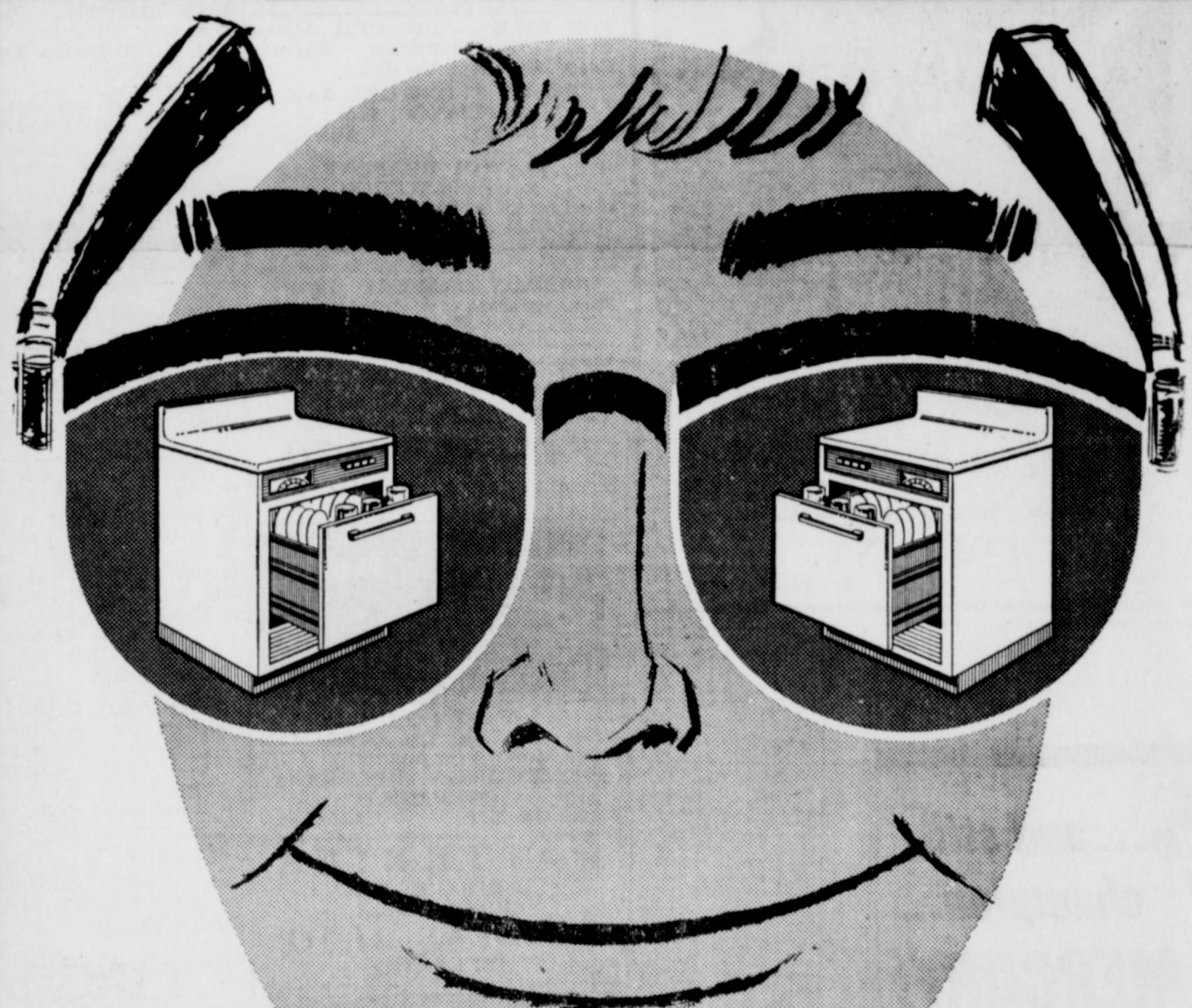
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
