C-C MEMBERS SHOW INTEREST

LIVELY DISCUSSIONS HELD AT MEMBERSHIP MEETING ON TUESDAY EVENING, MAY 9

The May membership meeting of the Perryton Chamber of Commerce held Tuesday evening at the Legion Hall, developed into one of the most interesting held so far this year, with all the members present taking an active part in the discussions held regarding the various Chamber activities.

Although the crowd attending was smaller than at the previous meetings, a splendid program was presented by Irvin R. Buchanan, who presided at the session.

A thorough discussion was held on the Script issue of the Chamber resulting in the appointment of a committee composed of C. W. Claybaugh, M. P. Browning, C. B. Rogers, Dave Calhoun and R. T. Shindler to investigate and regulate the retirement of the issue.

R. H. Holland gave a short talk on the banking situation and the financial changes brought about by the inflation program of the administration and the change in going off the gold standard.

R. T. Shindler reported on the coming Great Plains Highway association convention to be held at McCook, Neb., on June 6, presenting plans for asking the convention for the 1934 meeting. He also spoke on the canning kitchen program of the Chamber, his talk being followed by a round table discussion.

The trades day prize awards came in for a full discussion resulting in the body recommending to the directors a plan of action in conducting this activity. The recommendations were given due consideration at the weekly directors luncheon Thursday noon and a joint meeting with the members of the merchants committee has been called for next Thursday noon at which time all details will be worked out and made public.

RELIEF FUNDS ARE DEPLETED

FEDERAL FUNDS FOR RELIEF WORK ARE PRACTICALLY EXHAUSTED; REDUCE WAGE TO \$1.00

The Federal Aid funds allotted to Perryton and Ochiltree county are practically exhausted and the few dollars remaining are to be used by the committee in charge in order to benefit those in the most need. In the future the numbers of days work per man per week will be reduced. All single men without dependents have been removed from the lists together with others who are not in such dire need. Effective Monday, May 15, the daily wage scale will be reduced to \$1.00.

The committee in charge of the administration of Federal Aid funds in this county, namely Dave Shanks, chairman, Oscar C. Flowers, R. T. Shindler, H. C. Sanford and C. B. Rogers, are to be complimented on the worthwhile projects which they have completed with these funds and at the same time furnished employment to hundreds of our citizens.

A partial list of improvements from the \$12,000 allotted to this county includes permanent streets and sidewalks at Farnsworth and Waka, many blocks of caliche streets in Perryton, thousands of feet of caliche side walks in Perryton, grading and caliche on drives at Ochiltree cemetery, improving crossings to Main Street in Perryton from side streets, the new Ranger athletic field, numerous improvements at rural schools throughout county, public relief gardens for summer consumption and canning, and many other minor projects in both town and country.

The Federal relief funds in this county have not been spent foolishly and we are sorry to state that this is not true in many counties. The committee has given much time and thought to the matter and has really obtained as nearly as possible a dollar's worth of value for every dollar expended. Many counties simply tried to make jobs regardless of what they had left after the money was gone. This was not the case in Ochiltree county. We have something to show for our relief funds and at the same time, many families have been provided with the necessities of life without being subjects of charity.

FIRST SCRIPT NOTES REDEEMED THURSDAY

The first Perryton Script notes to be redeemed in cash were presented at the First National Bank, Thursday noon, by C. E. Whippo, president of the Chamber of Commerce sponsoring the Script issue.

The notes redeemed were No. 4 of the one dollar issue and No. 8 of the fifty cent issue, both notes being completely filled with trade stamps. The dollar note was last stamped by the Stewart Printing company and the fifty cent note came from the Hurn Dry Goods company. Both notes were in the first script issue put into circulation on January 27 and tendered to the Stewart Printing company in payment for printing the script.

During their period of circulation, the \$1.50 in script transacted \$54.00 worth of business to accumulate the thirty-six trade stamps each, and it estimated that it probably changed hands at least that many more times where stamps were not required, making the script do a total of approximately one hundred dollars worth of business.

DID NOT HOLD TAXPAYERS MEETING LAST SATURDAY

CONSIDER CANCELLING BONDS

COMMISSIONERS MAY REQUEST VOTE ON CANCELLATION OF PART OF COUNTY HIGHWAY BONDS

It is very probable that the Commissioners Court of Ochiltree county will call for an expression from the voters of the county on the matter of the cancellation of approximately \$360,000.00 of the \$400,000.00 highway bond issue. This matter was discussed at the regular meeting of the court in April and at that time, it was decided that they would probably call the election at the regular May meeting which was held last Monday, May 8.

At this meeting however, it was decided that as an economy move, the election would be deferred until August 26, when the state wide election to vote on constitutional amendments will be held. These constitutional amendments will include the beer measure. The cancellation election could be held at the same time without any additional cost.

The commissioners, after due consideration and much thought, have decided that \$400,000.00 of the authorized issue will be required for the purchase of rightaway and other expenses to complete No. 117 and No. 4. While the amount to be cancelled has not been definitely set, it is very probable that it will be \$360,000.00, leaving only \$40,000.00 to be retired by the county.

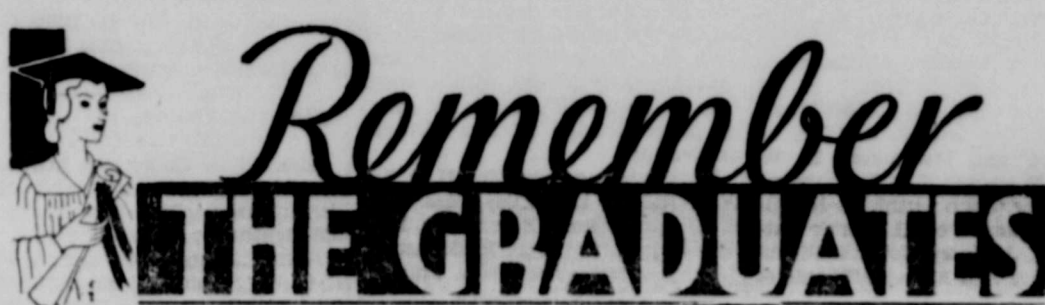

Advice To Bankers In 1863

In December, 1863, Hugh McCulloch, then Comptroller of the Currency and later Secretary of the Treasury, addressed a letter to all national banks. Those institutions had only lately been organized and their executives, one must assume, were greatly in need of the Comptroller's sage admonitions. Bankers today can absorb with profit much of the McCulloch advice. Here are some of his splendid paragraphs:

"Let no loans be made that are not secured beyond a reasonable contingency. Do nothing to foster and encourage speculation. Give facilities only to legitimate and prudent transactions. Make your discounts on as short time as the business of your customers will permit, and insist upon the payment of all paper at maturity, no matter whether you need the money or not. Never renew a note or bill merely because you may not know where to place the money with equal advantage if the paper is paid. In no other way can you properly control your discount line, or make it at all times reliable.

"Distribute your loans rather than concentrate them in a few hands. Large loans to a single individual or firm, although sometimes proper and necessary, are generally injudicious and frequently unsafe. Large borrowers are apt to control the bank; and when this is the relation between a bank and its customers, it is not difficult to decide which in the end will suffer. Every dollar that a bank loans above its capital and surplus it owes for, and its managers are therefore under the strongest obligations to its creditors as well as to its stockholders, to keep its discounts constantly under its control.

"Treat your customers liberally, bearing in mind the fact that a bank prospers as its customers prosper, but never permit them to dictate your policy.

"If you doubt the propriety of discounting an offering, give the bank the benefit of the doubt and decline it; never make a discount if you doubt the propriety of doing it. If you have reason to distrust the integrity of a customer, close his account. Never deal with a rascal under the impression that you can

prevent him from cheating you. The risk in such cases is greater than the profits.

"Pay your officers such salaries as will enable them to live comfortably and respectfully without stealing; and require of them their entire services. If an officer lives beyond his income, dismiss him; even if his excess of expenditures can be explained consistently with his integrity, still dismiss him. Extravagance, if not a crime, very naturally leads to crime. A man cannot be a safe officer of a bank who spends more than he earns.

"The capital of a bank should be a reality, not a fiction; and it should be owned by those who have money to lend, and not by borrowers. The Comptroller will endeavor to prevent, by all means within his control, the creation of a nominal capital by national banks, by the use of their circulation, or any other artificial means; and in his efforts to do this, he confidently expects the cooperation of all the well-managed banks."

"Pursue a straightforward, upright, legitimate banking business. Never be tempted by the prospect of large returns to do anything but what may be properly done under the National Currency Act. 'Splendid financing' is not legitimate banking, and 'splendid financiers,' in banking are generally either humbugs or rascals."

Interesting as Mr. McCulloch's paragraphs are now, they might have been even more interesting and beneficial four or five years ago. We think the thoughts are no less significant for bank borrowers and would-be borrowers and bank officers than they were in 1863.—The Texas Bankers Record.
