Those who have traveled North recently have noticed, I suppose, that there is no marker of any kind at the intersection of Farm Road 644 and Highway 84 at the South edge of Hermleigh. Highway 84 was recently completed as a four lane highway around Hermleigh and as yet no markers have been put up at the intersection telling travelers that Farm Road 644 is the route to Loraine. The Lions Club ought to look into the matter and see that proper markings are put up so that people will know where to turn off the highway to come to Loraine.

Loraine has been fortunate this season in that no disastrous fire has occurred during the burning season. The potential for causing a big fire has been present all the time but fortunately none has occurred. Take a gin that burns burrs (none of the Loraine gins burn their burrs) and a high wind and something is likely to be set afire. The Loraine gins do burn the burrs and have the tops of their burners covered to keep the sparks from flying. In spite of this precaution some of the fire gets out of the burner and drifts about and if it should land in a patch of weeds covered with cotton lint a disastrous fire could easily start. Every precaution should be taken to prevent such fires.

A farmer told me a few days ago that before the boll weevils struck he was sure that his irrigated cotton would make 2 to 2½ bales per acre. After the weevils struck he gathered just a little more than a bale per acre. It takes a bale per acre they tell me to pay expenses of irrigating cotton so this farmer didn't come out much ahead.

This same farmer said that people ought to keep their fence rows clean in order to destroy a good hibernating place for the weevils during the winter. He is right of course for grown-up fence rows are ideal hiding places for weevils and other insects. Everyone will have to do all he can to prevent the spread of the boll weevil or else our country will turn out like some others I know where the weevils forced farmers to quit raising cotton.

CROP ROTATION GOOD PLANT DISEASE CONTROL PRACTICE

College Station-Methods of disease control in crops have been getting fancier and fancier in recent years, but the practice of crop rotation is still one of the most effective, says Harlan Smith, extension plant pathologist.

Continuous cropping of the same field with the same or closely related crops year after year will result in increase plant disease troubles, Smith points out. A disease of only slight importance the first year may carry over in the soil and become more serious each succeeding year.

Many disease organisms, such as those causing downy mildew, wheat rust and tomato or potato late blight, are wind-borne. Others are carried on or in the seed. All of these diseases may occur on new land. After a disease organism is introduced into a new field it may linger until the infection finally reaches serious proportions. Corn smut is a good example of a fungus that is carried to a new field by wind-borne spores, and then survives in the soil for several seasons.

Newly cleared woodland or recently plowed grassland is usually as free of soil-inhabiting disease organisms as any land that can be found, Smith says farmers and ranchers should make every effort to keep such soil disease-free.

A plant disease already established in a field often can be avoided by planting a crop that is not susceptible to that disease, Smith advises. Farmers should learn to recognize diseases, and when they occur, should plant a different or resistant crop for several seasons. Some disease organisms may live in the soil for years, even when a susceptible crop is not grown. Others can be controlled after the land is planted to non-susceptible crops for only a few seasons.

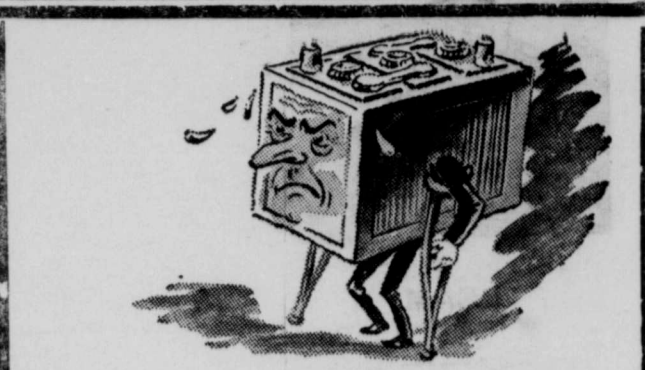

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. Does the Veterans Administration have outpatient clinics for the treatment of veterans' service-connected injuries in every state of the Union?

A. Yes, they are located in every state of the Union, including Alaska and Hawaii.

Q. How much is the VA burial allowance and to whom is it paid?

A. The allowance is \$250, and it is paid to the funeral director or if the director has been paid, to the person who paid the veteran's burial expenses.

Q. On what basis are some penicillin veterans eligible for VA hospitalization?

A. They may be eligible for VA hospitalization if they were discharged, retired or released from active service for a disability incurred or aggravated in line of duty, or are receiving compensation for a service-connected disability, or would be eligible to receive such compensation if they were not receiving retirement pay.

Q. Is it true that the monthly payments for orphans attending school under the War Orphans' Education Assistance Act vary from \$50 to \$110, depending on the amount of death compensation or pension they are receiving?

A. The rates of payment are: \$110 a month for full-time school attendance; \$80 a month, if three-quarters time; and \$50 a month if half-time. The rates are not determined by receipt of compensation or pension.

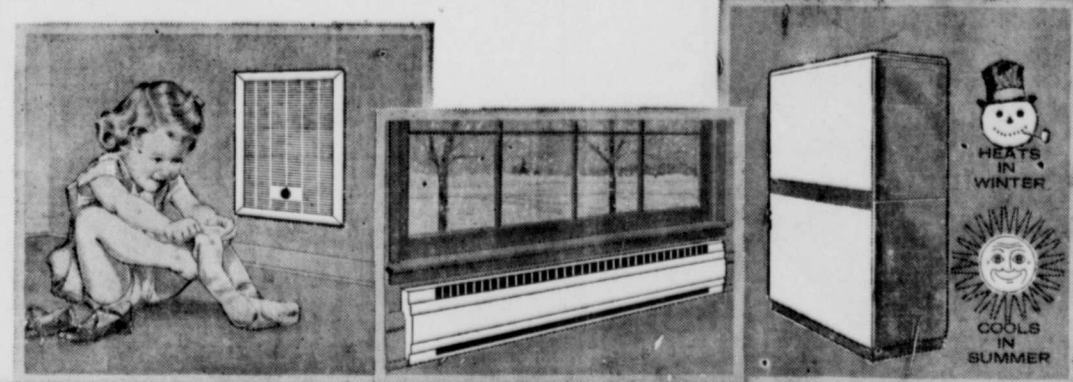
