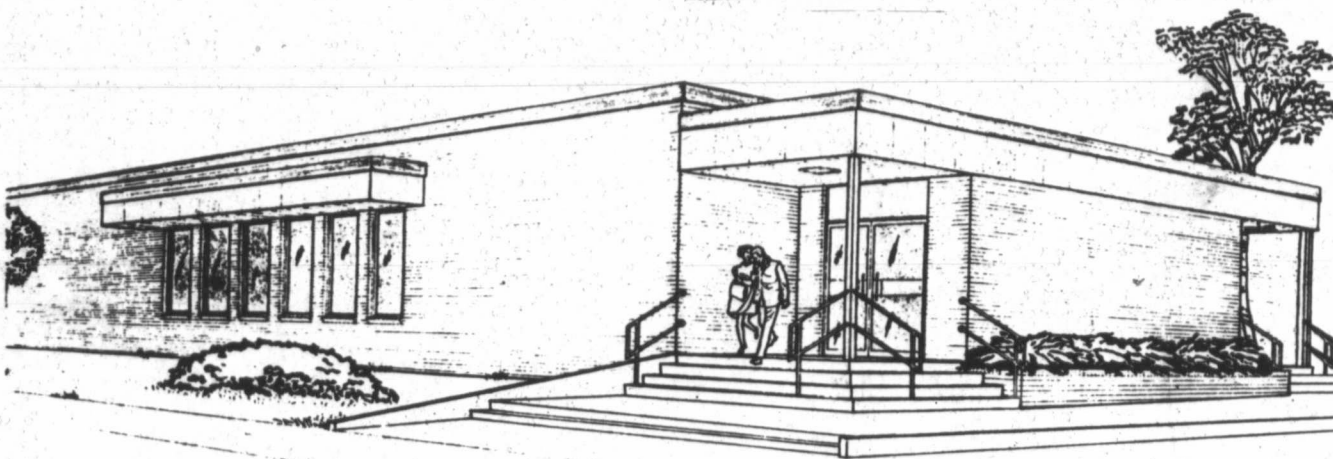

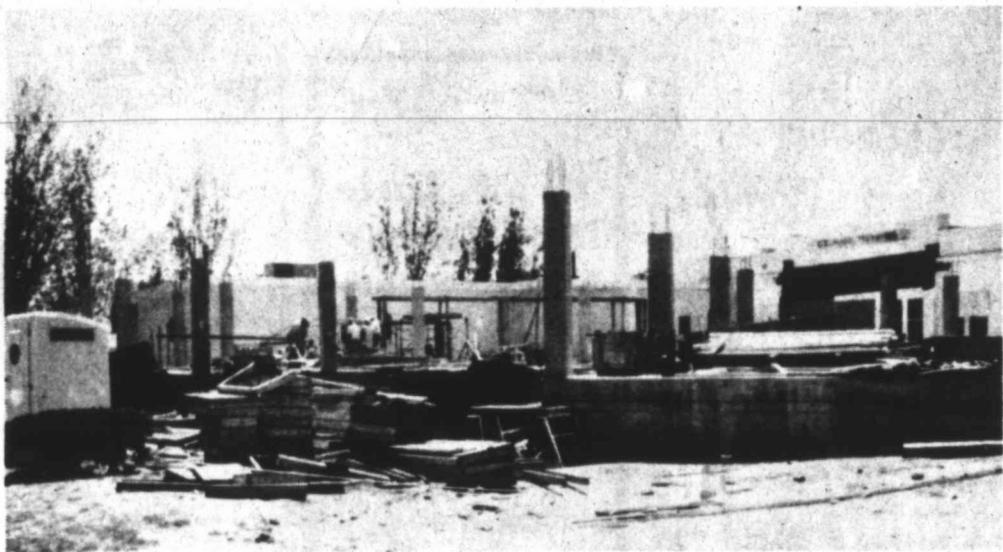

Food Stamp Sales Increase

Postmaster Arlene Morris reports that food stamp sales at Colorado City's post office for the month of June are about as usual, amounting to \$24,537 in stamps.

For that amount 281 ATP cardholders paid \$10,018.50.

June's figures compare with other month's figures since the food stamp program was started in Mitchell County in November, 1973:

--November, \$15,005 in stamps for \$6,461.75.
--December, \$15,424.42 in stamps for \$6,859.
--January, \$22,401 for \$9,252.75.
--February, \$28,079 for \$10,538.25.
--March, \$30,478 for \$11,794.50.
--April, \$31,382 for \$12,230.25.
--May, \$31,973 for \$12,831.

City National Makes Plans For New Annex

The City National Bank has announced plans to build an annex with approximately 5,500 square feet at the corner of East Second and Elm next to their present facility.

Construction work on the facility which will include a basement, is now underway. Contract to build the structure was awarded to Virgil Stone who has 300 days to complete the project.

The bank building joins a growing list of construction projects now underway in Colorado City.

The new bank building will include a 4,100 square foot community room complete with a raised stage and kitchen area and law offices for attorneys Thompson & Rees amounting to about 1,440 square feet.

The building's exterior will match that of the existing building. There will also be parking around part of the annex.

Basement of the annex will be used for bank storage.

Other construction underway presently in Colorado City includes:

--The City's new civic center which is expected to be completed in about a month.
--New patient and lobby wings at the Root Memorial Hospital. The two new wings are expected to be completed in early 1975.
--A new Colorado High School on East 17th Street which is expected to be completed in August 1975.
--Renovation of several ex-

isting school facilities. Renovation of Kelley and Hutchinson Elementary Schools is expected to be completed by the time school begins in August.
--Several new homes are now under construction and a number of other new homes are expected to be built within the near future. Local civic leaders are

also attempting to get an apartment complex built here.
--A large storage facility is also under construction at Rogers Delinted Cotton Seed Co., on Interstate 20.
--Matlock Farm Supply is building two new buildings at the new business site on Interstate 20.

Perry Barber Named Demo J.P. Nominee

Perry Barber will be the nominee of the county's Democratic Party on the November general election ballot for the position of Precinct #1 Justice of the Peace.

The decision was reached after Thursday night's meeting of precinct committee members G. D. Foster, chairman

of Precinct #1; Truman Bodine, chairman of Buford voting box, Precinct #5; and county chairman Tom Rees.
Barber submitted written application and appeared before the committee, along with applicants Forrest Smith and James Sprott.
Barber had previously been

appointed to fill the unexpired term of peace justice Leonard Henderson by county commissioners' court. Henderson resigned, effective June 1, after winning the primary election for another term in the office. He had filled the position for almost two terms before his resignation.

Henderson's resignation was a surprise, since in the primary election he had won out over a strong challenge from Odie Wise, polling 344 to Wise's 270. Legal requirements governing the office call for the appointment of an interim Justice of the Peace and for the party precinct committee to name a candidate for the office to appear on the ballot of the next election, which is the general election in November.

If Barber wins the November election, which is likely since there are no Republicans on the ballot, then he will fill out the unexpired term of Henderson until Dec. 31, then take over in his own right after Jan. 1.

School Board Meets

School board members for Colorado Independent School District met in special session last Tuesday with school architect Tommie Hucklebee with Ribard and Hucklebee of Andrews and went over details of the school building and renovation program.

Board members discussed color schemes shown them by Hucklebee for the new high school and decided to use a medium blue, said Supt. Lloyd McKee. The blue scheme will be used throughout the building for doors, walls and carpet.

In discussing carpet for the new building, the board decided

to use a better grade of carpet than was called for in original plans for the high school, approving an additional \$1,500 expenditure for the better quality Orlite carpet.

McKee also said that a teacher appointment, subject to school board approval at the next regular session of the board, has been made.

Mrs. Martha Gavin, wife of Sun Oil employee Bill Gavin, has been tentatively hired to fill the 7th grade math position at Colorado Junior High. Mrs. Gavin is a graduate of Mississippi State University at Starkville, Miss., majoring in math.

Sales Tax Up Economy Continues To Grow

Colorado City received a sales tax check Wednesday for the amount of \$19,250.66, the city's portion of money collected from sales tax by city merchants.

The check is for first quarter sales and represents an increase over last year's first quarter of \$2,250.21, last year's check for the amount of \$16,970.45.

Last check received by the city was for \$26,212.61 and was for the last quarter sales for 1973, during the Christmas shopping season. The more than \$26,000 check was the largest ever received by the city.

This week's check is the largest ever received for the first quarter since the city began receiving the checks. First quarter checks so far have been as follows:

Loraine Gets Sales Tax Check

The city of Loraine received a sales tax check this week for the amount of \$734.85, a decrease from last year's first quarter check of \$112.28, last year's check amounting to \$847.13.

The check Loraine received for the last quarter of 1973 amounted to \$1,096.08, a substantial gain over the previous year's last quarter check of \$744.13. Last quarter checks are usually the largest single amounts received by cities because of the Christmas shopping season.

Issac Ellwood Is Honored By N.I.U.

A building on the campus of Northern Illinois University in De Kalb has been named to honor Issac L. Ellwood, one of the inventors of barbed wire who later bought the Spade Ranch in Mitchell County.

A notice sent by the university states that Ellwood, one of De Kalb's "Three prophets—Joseph, Jacob and Issac" along with Joseph F. Glidden and Jacob Halsh, was one of the founders of Northern Illinois University.

"In recognition of personal efforts and financial contributions of four De Kalb citizens," the building naming committee recommended naming the university library, Founders Memorial Library. The other founder honored by the name was Clinton Rosette.

Glidden, Halsh and Ellwood were instrumental in founding the barbed wire industry in De Kalb.

After their business became established and was flourishing, Ellwood made a trip to Texas to inspect the land that was being sent so much of the company's product, and as a result of the trip, bought the Rendebrook-Spade Ranch from the Snyder Brothers, D. H. and J. W., in 1889.

The ranch has been family-owned since, Ellwood's interests going to his children, Mrs. F. H. Chappell and Mrs. R. Leland Kenney, Mrs. Chappell's children, Frank H. Chappell Jr. of Waterford, Connecticut and Mrs. B. D. (Marion) Bassham of Colorado City, now operate the ranches.

Area Youth Attend Encampment

Screwworm Cases On Increase

Screwworm cases are continuing their northward trek across Texas and producers are reminded to re-double their efforts against the costly livestock pest.

"Texas has just recorded 590 positive cases in May, or 67 percent of the total cases it has experienced this year to date," warns Dr. M. E. Meadows Jr., veterinarian in charge of the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program at Mission.

"With rains received over a number of areas recently, the moisture is expected to increase the opportunities for more worm cases, unless producers really watch their animals and treat all wounds," Meadows says.

Until the beginning of May, only 282 of the flesh-eating worm cases had been identified in the Lone Star State.

Only 54 positive cases were reported by the Mission Lab in May, 1973.

Within the past several weeks, Cottle County, in the Rolling Plains area near the Oklahoma line, recorded two screwworm cases, first for the season there. New cases also have been confirmed recently in El Paso, Reagan, Reeves and Crane Counties in the Trans-Pecos and far West Texas areas.

"Earlier, cases had moved north from the Hill Country to Concho, Runnels, and Haskell Counties, which probably accounts for the cases now occurring in Cottle," says Meadows.

Non-screwworm samples submitted by producers dipped somewhat in May. "With the Gulf Coast ticks expected to create additional worm problems, especially in the southern portion of Texas, all producers should join in the battle against screwworms," adds Meadows.

To make the battle more effective, producers should carefully check animals regularly for wounds, submit samples from worms found in wounds, treat all wounds and spray or dip livestock on a regular basis.

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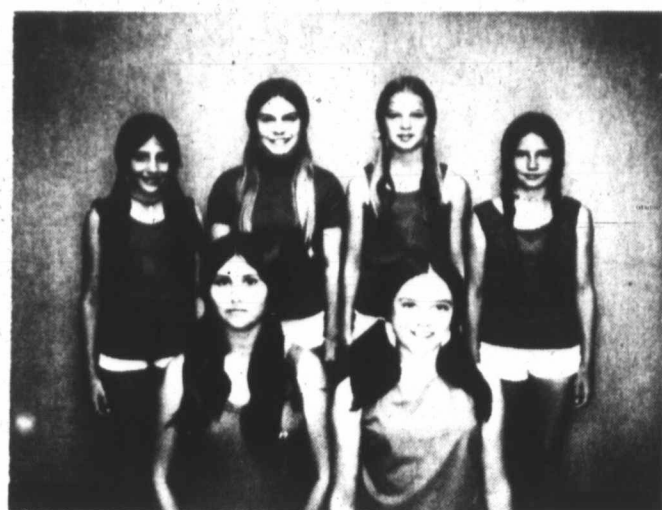

County Commissioners Budget Revenue Sharing Monies

Mitchell County commissioners have budgeted the \$155,154 received by the county in revenue sharing funds. Part of the total goes for the new addition to the jail, an expenditure of \$45,000. Largest amount in the budget is the \$70,000 to be spent for new equipment. Eight dump trucks costing a total of \$40,000 will be bought, two for each of the county's four precincts. The trucks will cost \$5,100 each. A sum of \$30,000 is set for a new maintainer. Next largest amount, other than the jail addition, is the \$30,000 set in the budget for public transportation, which County Judge Bill Carter explained meant spending \$3,000 a mile for about 10 miles of paving, to be apportioned among the four precincts at about two and one-half miles in each precinct. Carter also said that the \$5,154 set aside for recreation has not yet been apportioned, but is available for use in recreation. The \$5,000 set for the library will be spent by Librarian Ruth Dozier, who said that she had not yet made out her budget for spending the money. Last year's money apportioned for the library went toward the purchase of a card catalog file, chairs for the Hesperian Room, a new record player and the Ednalite, a reading aid machine for people who suffer from poor eyesight.

Firemen Answer Calls

Colorado City's Volunteer Fire Department has answered three calls since Wednesday, said driver Floyd Hale.

Wednesday at 1:45 p.m., a call came to the department that a pickup truck was on fire on Walnut in front of White's Auto. Firemen quickly put out the fire.

At 6:15 p.m. the same day, firemen were called to the old cottonseed oil mill where workmen dismantling a seed house had reported a blaze, probably caused, said Hale, by cutting torches being used to take down buildings.

Thursday at noon a grass fire was reported on Paris Street and firemen had no trouble in dousing the fire.

Benson Warns Of Screwworms

Livestock producers should be aware that 1974 has the earmarks of an extremely bad screwworm season, and should make every effort to reduce the number of outbreaks. This word comes from County Extension Agent Bob Benson.

Program officials are asking producers to refrain from livestock surgery or other man-made wounds to prevent screwworm infestations. The Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association has pointed out that at least 30 percent of this season's cases have resulted from dehorning, branding, docking and similar practices.

County Agent Benson urges all livestock producers to support the screwworm eradication effort by carrying out three key practices: (1) Inspecting their animals frequently; (2) Treating all wounds found with an approved product; and (3) Collecting and sending worm samples from wounds to the USDA Screwworm laboratory at Mission, Texas, for identification. The post office box is 969.

As cases are confirmed, sterile screwworm fly treatment is initiated by the USDA. "It is vitally important for program officials to know where cases are happening in order to begin the sterile fly treatment before cases are too numerous," the County Agent reminds.

As spring migrations of fertile flies from south of the Rio Grande continue, the cases move northward across Texas rather rapidly.
