The bale weighed 565 pounds lint cotton, and was ginned by the Irvin gin.

Cotton Early This Year

In an interview with Len Irvin, owner of the gin, Tuesday, he commented on the fact that the cotton is coming in early this year, stating that he could only remember 3 or 4 times in the past 25 years he has been operating a gin that the cotton came in during August.

He didn't grade the cotton, but stated it was nice cotton.

Winds, dust storms, rain, hail whipped a scattered over the South Plains Friday night.

South and east of Littlefield the heaviest precipitation had a combination of small cloudbursts, which lasted about 10 minutes. Rain measuring 1.01 inch here. This area, previous Sunday night, received an inch.

Along the fall south of the community, about 10 miles from Littlefield, in the same area, hundreds of acres of cotton heavily damaged by hail Sunday night.

350 Acres Damaged

Mr. Smith of three miles south of Littlefield, who had about 195 acres of cotton damaged around the last hail on July 22, said the storm seemed to start just where it finished the last time, and got the balance of his 350 acres of cotton Friday.

Feed Also Damaged

Mr. Smith also had about 100 acres of feed damaged in the neighborhood of 15 or 20%.

He said this was the sixth time that hail had fell on his farm this year, and the fourth time he sustained sufficient damage to file a claim.

Many Farmers Sustain Loss

Other farmers who sustained hail loss in the vicinity of the Smith farm were: R. L. Chitwood, Rube Stinson, Bill Price, (Mrs. Ada Crawford's place), Doyle Pinson, Jay Beeson, Everett Hucklebee, "Sonny" Pickrell, and Fred L. George.

Approximately three inches of rain fell in that vicinity on July 22, and 1.60 inches Friday.

Homer Finney of 9 miles north and one mile east of Littlefield reports approximately 50% loss to his cotton crop from Friday's hail. He also said that numbers of farms in that vicinity sustained losses, but that the hail area extended only a short distance west of his farm.

Morton Expected To Have Strong Team This Season

MORTON, Aug. 26—Morton's Indians aren't likely to be championship contenders in the District 4-A north half football race this fall, but the Redskins are prepared to ambush and "scalp" a few of the leaders along the way.

Last year Coach Melvin Crawford's Indians won three of nine games. This year they hope—and expect—to do better. The squad has 10 returning lettermen, and is more than five pounds to the man heavier than in 1948.

Morton's line, which lists five of last year's regular and two other lettermen, promises to be much stronger this fall. The starting line will average better than 155 pounds per man, with an experienced boy at every position.

The team went through what Crawford termed a "quite successful" conditioning period Aug. 15-20 at Roaring Springs, and to date there have been no serious training injuries.

Information On Hunting, Fishing Licenses Are Furnished By Game, Fish Commission

The Game, Fish and Oyster commission announces new licenses effective September 1.

Big Game Hunting License—Required of all residents of Texas who hunt deer and turkey. License also valid for hunting all other species of game during open season. Exemptions—Citizens under 17 years of age and those hunting on land on which residing are exempt, but must hold an exempt Big Game Hunting License if deer and turkey are hunted. Exempt license does not permit citizens 17 years of age or over to hunt on land other than where they reside. Exempt license may be issued, without charge, upon application by qualified persons. No written application is required.

The Resident Hunting License remains in effect and is valid for hunting all species of game except deer and turkey, but is not required of a person who holds a Big Game Hunting License.

Resident Fishing License—Required of all citizens who:

1. Fishes anywhere with artificial lure.
2. Fishes outside the county of his residence with live bait.
3. Fishes outside the county of his residence and adjoining counties with any kind of bait.

Exemptions—License not required of any person under 17 years of age or who holds a commercial fisherman's license.

Non-Resident Fishing and Five-Day Fishing Licenses—Required of all non-residents who fish in the state of Texas.

Exemptions—Licenses not required of any person under 17 years of age.

Chocolate Nut Bars

Broadcast: September 5, 1949

2 1/4 cups sifted cake flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup cocoa
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup fat milk
1/2 cup soft shortening
1/4 teaspoon vanilla
1 unbeaten egg
1/4 cup finely cut nuts

Sift together flour and salt. Mix cocoa with 1/4 cup sugar. Stir in milk slowly until smooth; let stand. Put shortening and vanilla into bowl. Add remaining 1/4 cup sugar, 1/4 cup at a time, mixing until fluffy. Beat in egg. Stir in milk mixture and nuts. Mix in flour, about 1/4 cup at a time. Spread stiff dough in shallow ungreased pan about 6 x 10 inches. Cover with wax paper; press with fingers to smooth the top. Chill about 6 hours, or overnight. Cut into bars 3 x 1/4 inch. Put on ungreased baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 15 min. or until firm to the touch. Make 2 doz.

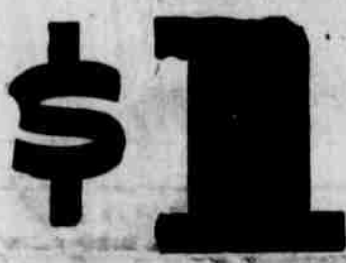

Two students from Lamb county were among a record group of 742 who received bachelor's and master's degrees at North Texas State college at Denton Thursday night, August 25.

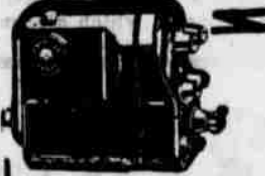

Nurses Needed To Treat Polio

Polio victims in 14 midwest states need at least 100 more registered nurses at once, according to an appeal for nurses made today by Lona L. Trott, director of nursing services for the Midwestern Red Cross area in St. Louis.

"For the past two weeks we have had a backlog of more than 100 emergency requests for nurses," the nursing director said, pointing out that Red Cross recruits the nurses at the request of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis which meets treatment costs where family resources are inadequate. The appeals are coming in from 14 states where sick people can be saved many of the dreaded after-effects of polio if prompt nursing care is available.

Urging retired or married nurses or those who employers can release to call home to a Red Cross chapter for enlistment, Miss Trott pointed out that although the organization has obtained 529 polio nurses since July 1, the demand for skilled nursing care is increasing. Demands are particularly heavy from Missouri, Iowa, and Illinois, she said.

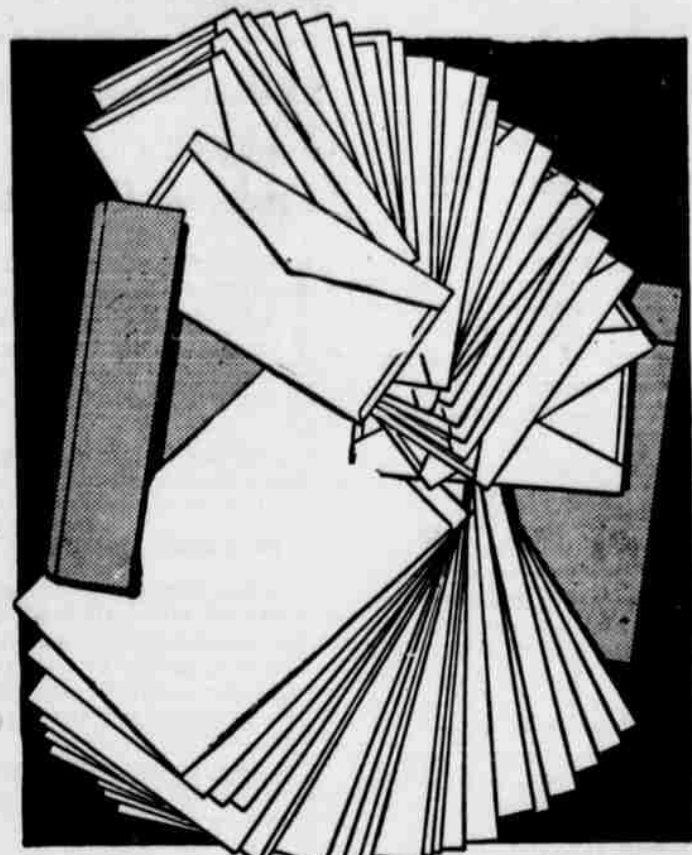
