

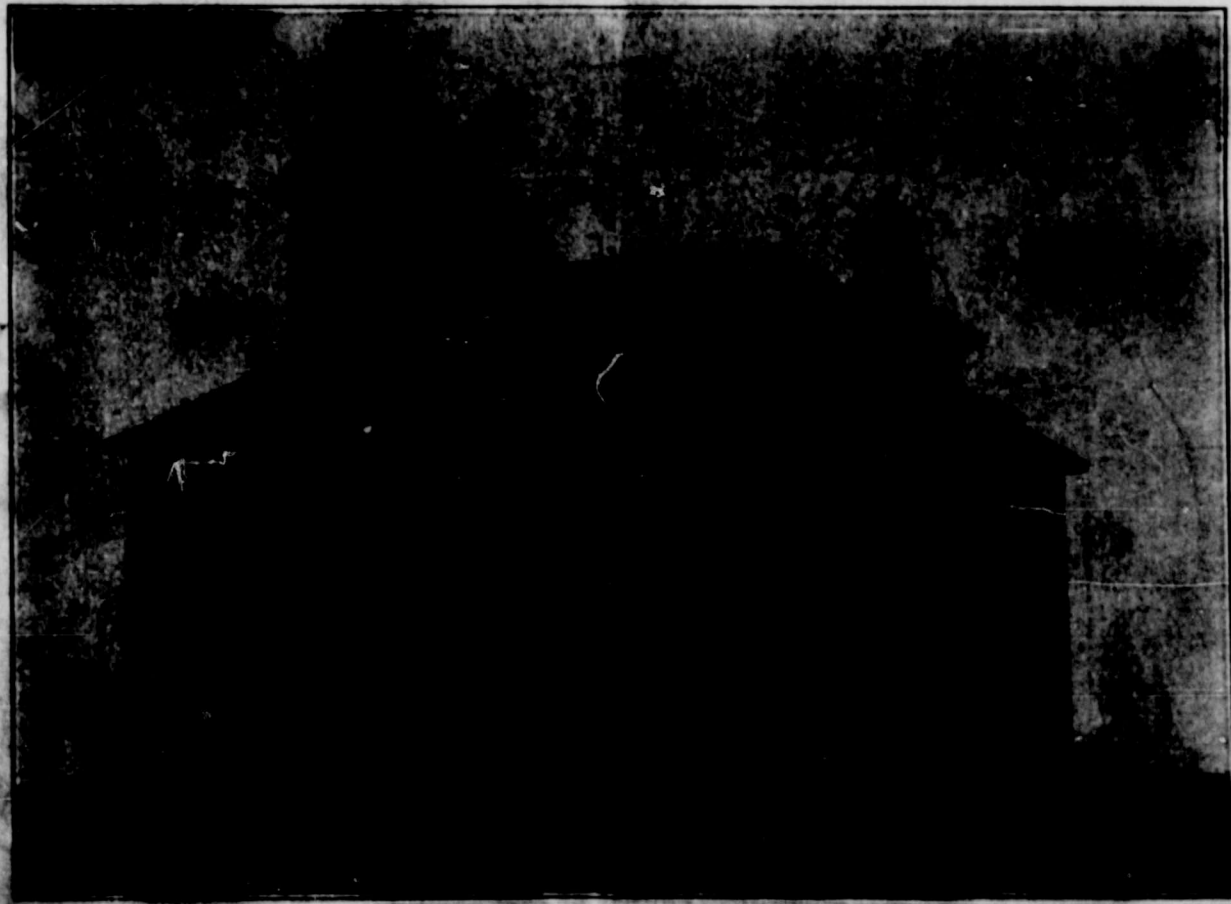

OUR SPLENDID PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Ochiltree can boast of as good if not the best public school in the North Panhandle. Our schools which closed last week had an enrollment of 146 pupils. This enrollment was largely increased over the preceding year by the tireless efforts of Prof. M. E. Wakefield and his assistants, Miss Jesse L. Harris and Miss Leona Grogan. While the proper grading of the pupils has not been what the several teachers would like it, yet they have accomplished much with the material at hand. And the school will start the next year's work under more favorable conditions. The enrollment next year will reach possibly 250 and the board of education will add two more teachers to the list. Our splendid schools have attracted many settlers to Ochiltree county and will continue.

The public school building was erected last year at a cost of \$4000, all donated by our

liberal, high-minded citizens who had the welfare of the county at heart. It is now a part of the public property and there will be plenty of funds to hire the 5 teachers and maintain the school for 8 or 9 months.

The building stands on a beautiful campus containing 13 acres, and when all the improvements are made, will be the finest school grounds in the Panhandle.

The new catalogue of our public school will be issued next month and the course of study from the primary grades to the high school will be given.

NEW TELEPHONE LINES COMING

Two new telephone lines are now being built to Ochiltree. H. D. Densmore of Canadian, who owns and operates an extensive system on the Santa Fe railroad is building a line from Canadian by way of the Tandy ranch to Ochiltree. He will connect with switch board or

central office here of the Ochiltree Western Telephone Co.

The second line is a private one and is being built by C. H. Barrett, Dr. Palmer, A. W. Fore, John McCurdy and others of that locality. It will also connect with the central office here.

With the completion of these lines and with new poles, wires and other improvements that the Western people are making, will give Ochiltree communication, not only with a majority of the farmers of the county, but with the nearest connection to Guymon and points on the Rock Island R. R. and to Canadian and Higgins and all points on the Santa Fe.

SURVEYORS ARE AT WORK

The Shattuck Monitor of last week has the following railroad news;

"The engineers and surveyors for the new railroad running west from Shattuck to Raton, New Mexico, arrived in town yesterday and the work of sur-

veying the new route will begin at once. The new road is now a certainty and will traverse Wolf creek on the south side. Lipscomb, Ochiltree and Hansford, all county seat towns in the north border Texas counties will be on this road and no doubt will make good towns. There is a wonderful field in this section for both development and investment. The road will touch the New Mexico coal fields and will be a factor in cheapening fuel for this section of country."

The Shattuck-Ochiltree railroad proposition seems to be getting down to some plan of action and the prediction now is that the dirt will be flying on the grade within a short time. —Shattuck Monitor.

The 17000 acres of school land in Bailey and Lamb counties, belonging to Ochiltree county, should be sold at once and the proceeds used to build up the schools of the county. This money could be used to a better advantage now, than at any future time.

In Texas, where there is a law compelling the railroads to make full reports of their business to the railway commissioners, there is a particular aversion on the part of these service corporations to "show the books." They have failed to report, and suits aggregating 1 million dollars in each case have been filed against all the roads in the state. Probably no other state suffered more for a time from the neglect and impo- sition of the railroads, and as a natural result of this disregard for public rights, Texas now has the most drastic railway laws in the Union, some of them unjust to the corporations. For instance, if a through train is more than an hour late at a division point, an extra train must be sent out to take care of the passengers in waiting. And this law must be obeyed unless the railway commissioners specifically waive its application.

Four tons of Spanish peanuts raised in Texas have just been ordered by the department of agriculture of the India government, and will shortly be shipped from San Antonio to Bombay, India. News of the development of the peanut as a forage crop in Texas having reached India, that country will experiment with the plant as a stay against the times of famine with which it is afflicted. The value of the peanut for stock feeding has been amply demonstrated in Texas. Last year thousands of acres were sown. In some cases the peanuts were baled and handled as any other forage crop, in other the hogs were turned into peanut fields and fattened for market.
