Former Coach Is Injured In Amarillo Tornado

John Hansard, former Cisco High School football coach, was reported among the 72 persons injured in the Amarillo tornado Monday, the Press learned today. He was treated for skin lacerations and bruises.

His wife and small daughter, sustained scratches and shock, the dispatch said. They were taken to a Red Cross relief agency for treatment.

Crops Register Rapid Growth In Most Areas

Farmers were back in the fields cultivating, planting and replanting as surface soils dried in all areas except the High Plains and Low Rolling Plains where rains continued. Combining of oats was well under way in southern counties. A crop planting was being rushed in the southeast during the first full week of open weather in that area this spring. The Amarillo tornado on Sunday night was intense but local in nature. Early reports indicate no serious crop damage. It is too early to determine the extent of damage from the flooding rains Monday night in the Fort Worth-Dallas area.

Wheat continued in excellent condition, but all areas were in need of clear, open weather to harvest time. Infestations of leaf rust were prevalent in areas off the Cap Rock. Light infestations were also reported in some High Plains counties. Scattered hailstorms during the week damaged crops in local areas, and there has been some lodging in early fields. Wheat was beginning to mature in the Low Rolling Plains area south of Wichita Falls, but it now appears that harvest will not be active before June 1. In the High Plains, wheat was in full head.

Corn was responding favorably to open weather. The crop is in roasting ear stage in extreme southern counties. Fields were too wet for seeding of sorghums in the High Plains and northern counties of the Low Rolling Plains.

Planting of peanuts continued in all areas, with some acreage up to a stand in northern counties. Cotton had reached the square stage in the Coastal Bend as planting and replanting continued in full swing in practically all areas except the High Plains and northern counties of the Low Rolling Plains. Insect damage has been light. The week of open weather in eastern and southern districts was favorable for the growing crops as fields were being cleaned up.

All classes of livestock continued to make rapid growth on the abundant green feed supply. The spring movement of big steers to Osage and Flint Hill pastures was tapering off. Spring lambing was increased but volume was still substantially below the corresponding week of last year.

Homemaking Ranks High In 4-H Club Activities

"With more than a million homemaking projects being undertaken, 4-H girls are putting the 1949 theme 'Better Living for a Better World' into action," declared Guy L. Noble, director of the National Committee on boys and girls club work. Texas girls carried 44,886 of these projects, and accepted the challenge to report good records of work well done in 1949, according to Mr. Noble.

Clothing, canning, home improvement, home grounds beautification, garden and poultry are among the activities considered in the National 4-H Girls' Record awards program. In addition to learning the job of homemaking, the girls come to know the basic principles for happy family relationships and community responsibilities. The Co-operative Extension Service supervises the program.

For over a quarter of a century, Montgomery Ward has rewarded girls whose accomplishments in this contest have been outstanding. Six national scholarships of \$300 each — in place of the usual \$200 — will be given this year. An all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago will again be provided for winners in each of the 45 states participating, and for county winners, a gold-filled medal of honor. 4-H girls in Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico also enroll in the contest, and champions receive a \$100 U. S. Savings Bond.

For the 1948 record judged best in Texas, Lois Wilson, of Morton was awarded a trip to the 4-H Club Congress. There were 37 county medal winners named.

Local Firm Low Bidder On Armory At Breckenridge

Bids on the construction of the motor vehicle storage building for the Breckenridge unit of the National Guard were opened at 4 p. m. Tuesday in room 301 of the Stephens County courthouse. The bids were opened by Col. Williams, U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer and Mr. Howard of the National Guard Armory office. Low bidder was Waters Brothers, Contractors of Cisco.

Other bidders in the order of their bids were: Ed Johnson Construction Company of Waco, J. O. Boyd Construction Company of Dallas, E. R. Lambert and Son of Abilene, and D. C. Lemmons Construction Company of Brownwood.

After a study of the bids the contract will be awarded. Construction will begin within 30 days after the signing of the contract.

The building will be located on the National Guard reservation near Breckenridge.

NEW TRUCK MAKES CISCO FIRE DEPARTMENT ONE OF THE BEST

With the arrival of the new two 750 gallon capacity American LaFrance pumpers, nicknamed by the firemen "second line of defense" since both are used in case of extreme danger, and a new 1948 International combination booster and pumper.

Purchased by the city only a short time ago, the department's International is capable of throwing out 250 gallons of water from the reserve tanks, and can switch to pumping operation with the twist of a valve. The partially new truck carries 1,100 feet of two and a half inch hose, not counting two 200 feet of one and a half inch reel hose. "Fog guns" have been installed.

The LaFrance pumper, in service with the department for the past decade, carries 1,600 feet of two and a half inch hose and 200 feet of one and a half inch reel hose. The pumper, used only in case of major alarms, is capable of pumping 750 gallons of water from hydrant attachment per minute. The veteran truck among the city's mobil fire fighting units is the American LaFrance hook and ladder truck, also a 750 gallon pumper. It carries approximately 244 feet of ladder and hook apparatus, it was pointed out.

The trucks and equipment are maintained by two regularly employed firemen, C. L. Tullene and C. R. Hightower.

Miss Maud Martin Dies In Fort Worth

Word was received in Cisco today of the death of Miss Maud Martin of Fort Worth, who died at 11 a. m. in a hospital there after a short illness. Miss Martin was the sister of Mrs. G. S. Surles of Cisco and lived in Putnam and Cisco for many years before moving to Fort Worth.

She had been a registered nurse and a music teacher prior to her death.

Funeral arrangements were incomplete but relatives reported that the services would probably be held in Putnam either Friday or Saturday.

Also surviving is a brother, E. C. Martin, of Portales, New Mexico.

Final connections were being made on the two new pumping units at the college hill reservoir and the two pumps will be put into use as soon as the connections are made, it was announced by officials of the city water department today.

The installation of the pumps will finish a widespread improvement program designed by the water department for the purpose of bettering the local water conditions and assuring the entire town of ample water at all times.

The project included the erecting of a one million gallon combination reservoir and settling basin, the installing of the pumps, the laying of new lines and the installation of an automatic pressure control.

The pressure control system works on the same order of the smaller systems in use on farms and rural homes. Through a wire, leased from the telephone company it is possible to maintain an equal pressure at all times. If the pressure is lowered an automatic impulse is relayed from town to the pumps and they begin immediately to increase the pressure.

New lines have been laid or will be laid to low pressure areas and a careful check will be made to determine the success of the project before it is placed in actual operation. The checking period will probably require two to three days.

When the new system is placed in operation, the department plans extensive repairs on the old 14th street standpipe. The repairs will include patching leaks and installing pressure cut-off valves. The unit will be out of operation for three weeks but pressure will be held by other units. The lake surrounding the standpipe will be drained and the new valves will keep the water from overflowing and forming another pond.

Rains during the month of May have added approximately seven feet of water to Lake Cisco and the town is assured of a supply for the next two to three years. City officials were optimistic and expressed a belief that the majority of the water troubles for the town were over.

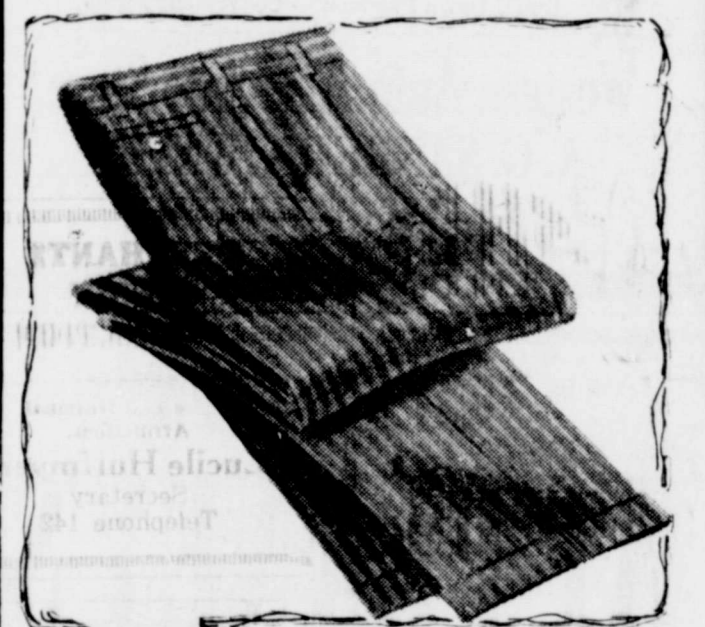

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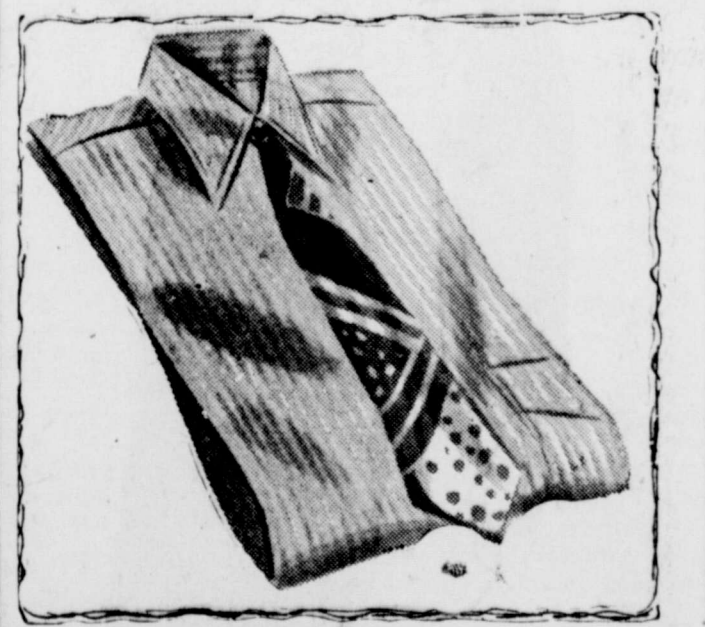
